How Do We Live With Coyotes In Our Community?

s the human population expands in the valley coyotes, rabbits, rodents and other animals will become more prevalent. And as long as food and water sources remain available – in the form of backyard fountains or small lakes, unkempt fruit trees, pet food left outside, unsecured trash, etc. – these wildlife populations will flourish. Coyotes pose little threat to humans, but they do prey on cats and small dogs.

On September 14, 2016, more than 150 residents of Sun City gathered at Desert Vista to voice their concerns regarding the coyote population and activity within our community. In the meeting our invited experts – Joshua Cerda, urban wildlife coordinator with the Nevada Division of Wildlife, Karen Layne from the Las Vegas Valley Humane Society and Sgt. Cynthia Leavitt with Las Vegas Animal Control – all made presentations to the residents.

The experts discussed the habits and activities of coyotes and advised residents on how we should deal with the coyote population in Sun City Summerlin.

DO:

- 1. Keep pets secured indoors overnight (close your doggy door) and check front and back yards before letting pets out in the morning/evening.
- 2. Haze (harass) coyotes the moment you see them. Yell at them or throw things in their direction until they leave. Raise your arms to make yourself appear taller. A combination of these things can be used to make the coyote leave, instead of letting it stand its ground.
- 3. Limit attractants trash, fruit, compost, rodents in the area, cats roaming free.
- 4. Keep bushes trimmed above the ground. Coyotes will use overgrown bushes as a place to hide/sleep.
- 5. Pick up a smaller pet if a coyote is nearby. When walking your dog, it's advised to keep your pet within 6 feet of you. Coyotes are usually afraid of humans and won't come close to you to snatch your dog.

DON'T:

- 1. Feed pets outside. If you do feed your dog/cat outside, remove leftover food and water, as well as the containers, ASAP as they can attract coyotes.
- 2. Feed any type of wildlife under any circumstances (including birds). Animals are perfectly capable of feeding themselves. When prey animals continually gather in an area, coyotes and other predators know to keep coming back.
- 3. Run away from a coyote. It will chase you.
- 4. Leave trash outside. Make sure trash cans have a secure lid and be sure to pick up any fruit that has fallen from nearby trees.

No matter what we do coyotes will be in and around our community. We must be vigilant. If everyone does their best to follow the dos and don'ts, coyotes will be less comfortable in our community and attacks on our pets should diminish.

PRESIDE President's Message



Dissolvement would eliminate a revenue tax of \$16,000 paid annually by SCSCAI

n June 22, 1989, Del Webb filed Articles of Incorporation to establish Sun City Summerlin Community Association, Inc. The document was created and filed under the

laws of Article 81 of the Nevada Revised Statutes.

Article 81 is a concise, 15-page document that specifies that the master Association will cease to exist in 50 years, or on June 22, 2039. We are, therefore, just 23 years away from your Association ceasing to exist.

Currently, SCSCAI is required to pay the new revenue tax to the state of Nevada under Article 81 in an approximate amount of \$16,000 annually.

What can we do to eliminate this issue? Fifty percent of unit owners, plus one, can vote to change SCSCAI's Articles of Incorporation from NRS 81 to NRS 82. Should unit owners elect to change to Article 82, the revenue tax would be eliminated.

Your Board of Directors has asked our legal

counsel to explore a change to Article 82, and the Board approved the concept. The plan will be presented to unit owners for a vote after March 1, 2017.

Voting in favor of this change will do two things for our community:

- 1. Eliminate the revenue tax that we now pay under Article 81.
- 2. Create a corporation under Article 82 that will survive in perpetuity. The date of dissolvement of our corporation on June 22, 2039, will be eliminated.

Please be aware that this issue will come before each of the unit owners in 2017. Details will be made available in the Link. This matter is of extreme importance to you, and your Board of Directors intends to keep you informed before the vote is taken.

Coming soon, SunView TV monitors to most of the community centers' activity areas, as well as Wi-Fi at the Pinnacle







What's Happening in the Properties Committee?

ecapping my intention from the October Link article, I'd like to summarize the minutes of the last Common Area Properties meeting. Many times residents ask me what's happening in CAP because they are unable to attend meetings. The following is a summary of what I think residents would want to know.



Kristie McWhorter, SCSCAI fitness manager, reported:

- •The Sun Shadows swimming pool is open. It reopened on September 23.
- •There is an ongoing problem with the pool deck at Desert Vista with dirt being tracked in. Unfortunately, we cannot keep residents from wearing their shoes on the pool deck, however, our employees always use booties.
- Broken teal lounge chairs at Mountain Shadows will be redone.
- New fitness specialist Pam Shields will put out a maintenance report every Thursday for equipment that needs repair. This will ensure that all equipment is inspected and repairs are addressed in an even more efficient manner.

Louis Darling, landscape manager, reported:

- Community palm tree trimming is complete.
- The dirt has been replaced at the ball field and over-seeding is done. The grass looks great.
- The front entrance at Tavern at the Falls/ Highland Falls golf shop has been cleaned up and replanted; rock has been refreshed.
- The parking lot landscape project at Highland Falls has been completed.
- Pinnacle turf reduction and the patio area projects are done.
- Additional staff has been hired, and Louis will now be able to address maintenance prob-

lems that have been deferred the last few years.

• The entrances at Rampart, Sun City and Del Webb boulevards are projected to be completed within six months. This includes new plantings and refreshing the flowers with seasonal color.

Brandon Balek, building maintenance supervisor, reported:

- The Sun Shadows pool has been re-plastered with two coats of vapor barrier and cured. This should take care of the leak that caused the deck to peel up. Rusted railings were repaired in house at great cost savings.
- A new hot water heater was replaced at Sun Shadows, as well as the spa heater, and various spotlights have been replaced with LED's.
- Two new railings were added on the stairs going down to the Sun Shadows pool.
- The sport courts and parking lot LED retrofittings have been completed at the Pinnacle; all other facilities, sports courts and parking lots should be finished by the end of November.
- Electronic billboards (TV monitors) have been installed at Desert Vista, Pinnacle and Sun Shadows social centers. Installation followed a threemonth trial of two monitors at Mountain Shadows, where the billboards were met with great support. The monitors preview all the events happening in Sun City for the upcoming week.

Donny Long, golf operations manager, reported:

- Golf in general has been slow.
- The greens at Eagle Crest are coming back and looking good.
- The slope on No. 18 at Highland Falls has been rocked and is now complete.
- A test is being done at Holes No. 2 and 17 at Palm Valley, to not over-seed and see how the course will do.

Dennis McGrew, building maintenance manager, reported:

• Metal has been cut for the bocce ball court shade covers at Sun Shadows.

Do You Know? WAX

The Westcliff Airport Express (WAX) operates seven days a week, 5:45 a.m. to 11:15 p.m. week-days; 6:30 a.m. to 11:45 p.m. weekends. During peak hours the service runs approximately every half-hour; every hour during non-peak hours.

Do you know it is possible to make the trip to and from McCarran International Airport for as little as \$2 per person? By taking advantage of the Regional Transportation Commission's Westcliff Airport Express and nearby Park & Ride facilities, those who age qualify are charged only \$1 each way.

The two Park & Ride facilities near Sun City are located at the Suncoast parking lot (next to Alta Drive in the open parking lot) and at the Westcliff Transit Center (25 S. Durango Drive).

Tickets can be purchased on the bus or at the ticket kiosk at the Westcliff Transit Center. Only correct change is accepted. If one does not qualify for a reduced fare, the cost is \$2 each way using WAX.

The advantage of using the Suncoast location for trips to the airport is that the route begins at that location, providing ample seating and room for luggage.

At the Westcliff location, there is a clean and comfortable lobby that is open daily from 5 a.m. to 9 p.m. An RTC employee is at this location 24 hours a day, seven days a week. If the lobby is closed, one needs only to knock on the window at the southeast corner of the center to attract the attention of the attendant or scan the parking lot as the attendant may be doing a routine security check.

At the Westcliff Transit Center, vehicles may be registered with the RTC for additional security. Though these registrations are valid for only 14 days, they may be extended with a phone call to the number listed on a copy of the registration form.

The trips to and from McCarran Airport are approximately 1 hour long in each direction. On a recent trip to the airport, the bus was on schedule to the minute. Due to a bit of traffic, the return trip was delayed at some stops only 4 minutes at most. At McCarran, WAX drop-off and pickup locations are at terminals 1 and 3 on the Zero Level.

inter is coming and if you have frost-sensitive plants you may want to protect them before it gets too cold. Mulching and covering them is the most effective way to protect them, but be sure to check with the Office of Community Standards if you are not sure what is allowed. Also, since it's getting cooler please report any ice you see in the common areas. We do our best not to create ice with the watering schedule but it sometimes happens. Ice can develop when the temperature is not at freezing, so we appreciate any notifications you can provide. We want to be sure that everyone is safe and that no one slips and falls.

The Landscape Department is now watering one day a week at night until the evening temperature gets into the low 40s. Turf is watered on Tuesdays; drip on Wednesdays.

esearch shows that how you perceive aging affects how long you will live. In a study of 660 people, those with more positive perceptions of their own aging lived an average of 7.5 years longer. This effect remained after other factors such as age, gender, income, loneliness and health status were controlled.

The study also compared death rates of the 660 study participants to their answers to a survey 23 years ago. Therefore, adjusting your perception of aging while you're still young can have a tremendous effect on your life expectancy. (Tell your kids!)

No one knows for sure why a positive attitude seems to lead to a longer life. Researchers believe that positive thinking about aging can increase a person's will to live, making him or her more resilient to illness and more proactive about health. Another explanation given was that the mental stress of aging is lower for people who have a positive attitude.



What's so great about aging? Good question.

Our society prizes youth and beauty above all. Messages about aging tend to emphasize the negative aspects. But, like fine wine, people should get better as they age. Experience combined with maturity should give older people great insight. And older people are usually more in touch with spirituality and the priorities that have true depth. By following a simple, healthy lifestyle you can preserve your health and energy your whole life.

Dumbbells

re you getting bored just working out on the strength machines? It may be time to add dumbbells or free weights to your strength training program. Here are some advantages to using dumbbells for you to consider:

Get two or more exercises in one! Combine movements, such as a bicep curl with an overhead press, and work your biceps and shoulders.

Work your core! You always will work your core while performing a dumbbell exercise, which helps you to maintain balance and stability, and burn more calories!

Learn functional movements. Strengthen muscles in the same way you move in normal life – doing house work, lifting grocery bags, gardening, etc. This also will improve your athletic ability for golf, tennis, pickle ball, yoga and more.





Bicep Curl with Overhead Press:

Start with a lighter weight to practice the movement, then add more weight when you can do the exercise with proper form.

- 1. Hold one dumbbell in each hand and stand with your feet hip-width apart.
- 2. Arms should hang down by your sides with your palms facing forward.
- 3. Pull your abdominals in, stand tall and keep your knees slightly bent.
- 4. Curl both dumbbells upward until they are in front of your shoulders.
- 5. Push the dumbbells overhead and rotate your wrists so your palms face forward.
- Slowly lower the dumbbells back down to shoulder height; rotate your wrists so your palms face your shoulders. Lower dumbbells to start position.



- A car parked in the garage indicates a homeowner should be in the house.

hen it was determined that the Starbright Theatre was in need of a new piano, Ken Resnik, finance chairman of Sun City's Board of Directors, was given the task of making a recommendation for a new instrument. He, along with Kathy Bohrer, a representative of the Classical Music Club, started the search in April. The existing piano had been employed at the Starbright since the theater opened, and because of its poor quality, was deemed not worth fixing.

The search was extensive, utilizing research from internet resources, including The Piano Buyers Guide, piano manufacturers' websites and piano forums. Piano technician Robert Goodale and two Los Angeles-based concert pianists were consulted as well.

The search was then narrowed down to two instruments: a new Boston GP-193 and a 13-year-old Shigeru-Kawai SK6 in like new condition. Both pianos were comparable in price.

The Classical Music and Musicmakers clubs then elicited some experts to evaluate the two choices: Dr. Mykola Suk, head of keyboard studies at UNLV; internationally known concert pianist Dr. Spencer Baker, who is also an adjunct faculty member at UNLV, a concert pianist and director of the Music Ministries for Green Valley Presbyterian Church; Ginger Gundlach, founder and pianist of the Las Vegas Piano Quintet; and Dale Kavula, a piano teacher, organist and member of the Classical Music Club.

After a painstaking review, the Shigeru-Kawai SK6 was chosen. The piano is a handcrafted, Japanese-concert-level, 7-foot instrument. It combines new technology with Old World craftsmanship. Although it is 13 years old, the Shigeru-Kawai is in like new condition, only having been lightly played by one previous owner. Retailing for upwards of \$115,000, the piano was acquired by Sun City for \$36,000.

"I wanted the Starbright to have a performance-grade piano," said Kathy. "I am thrilled that we were able to get it. It's a top-quality piano, hand-built, very few of them are made, and very few make it to the United States."

For Dale, she believes that the improvement over the old instrument is so "obvious that the audience can hear the difference." She says that none of the other pianos "had the sound and technical qualities like this (the selected Shigeru-Kawai SK6). Ken agreed: "It is a top-rated instrument with a marvelous tonal quality that is only found in the best instruments."

If you are interested in classical music you most certainly should check out the Classical Music Club. Not only were its members involved in acquiring the new instrument, the Club is responsible for bringing a host of professional musicians to the Starbright Theatre for the community's enjoyment. CLUB SPOTLIGHT: SUN CITY CHARITIES PROVIDING RESIDENTS VALUABLE SERVICES

un City Charities (SCC) is a group of about 60 volunteers from our community who offer their services in three major areas: transportation, handyman services and information about available senior services. Michael Lee, the current president, says that everyone needs a helping hand from time to time. Neighbors helping neighbors, that's what SCC is all about.

Don't let the word "Charities" mislead you. There are costs involved with providing the services. SCC has no source of income, so donations are accepted and very much appreciated.

For example, the telephone that enables a resident to call for a volunteer is just one expense; the office can't be run without supplies. Volunteers offer their time, but they use their own equipment and pay for their own gas. When volunteers head out to assist a resident, that person is required to purchase or pay for replacement items such as light bulbs, batteries, cabinet hinges, door glides, air filters or whatever else is needed for the project.

Among the services provided by SCC, perhaps the least costly but equally valuable, is the information about senior services available in the community and surrounding area. These include adult care providers,

transportation subsidies, home repair services, Meals on Wheels, recreation and entertainment opportunities, as well as social security and Medicare issues.

Barbara Nichols, an office volunteer, has helped with the telephone calls for 20 years, having started just a few months after the originator of the program, Maile Akana. Currently, there is a need for more drivers. All volunteers undergo a brief orientation session.

Transportation by volunteer drivers is limited to necessities – medical, dental and optical appointments. However, they also will drive residents to grocery stores, beauty shops and barber appointments, in addition to banking and postal chores. Sorry, no casinos.

As volunteers age, they are not able to provide all the services needed, so Barbara says new volunteers are always welcome. You can set your own hours and do what you love.

According to Mike, volunteering for Sun City Charities is a good way for younger newcomers to become part of the community, as well as pay it forward. The service they provide today may be just what he/she will need from another volunteer in the future.

The office is adjacent to Security Patrol at Desert Vista. It is open Monday to Friday, 8:30-10:30 a.m. The number is 254-5831.
