irst, Happy New Year to everyone. The outlook for 2018 in Sun City Summerlin is fantastic. We have seen some wonderful advances in our community over the last year and other improvements are planned for the coming year.

The hillside property across from the Tavern at the Falls and along the 18th hole of the Highland Falls Golf Course was in bad need of rehabilitation. Our Golf Course Maintenance crew, working with Alliance Construction, removed all the dead grass on the hillside and replaced it with beautiful desert landscaping. What a beautiful improvement to the area and a vastly improved view from the restaurant.

. e Community Preparedness Committee jump-started the Neighbor Watch Program. This program will improve our community's safety and security. With the addition of the K-9 Corps to the program we are continually improving (be sure to check out the story on Page 18). Hopefully, this trend will continue through 2018!

The Landscape and Golf Maintenance crews worked diligently on turf reduction projects that replaced grass with attractive desert landscaping. The turf removal reduces our water consumption, which saves us significant water costs. Our water bill savings is well over \$100,000 per year. We are doing more turf reduction in the coming year, and the additional cost savings will be significant.

We replaced our old, antiquated phone system with a new state-of-the-art phone system. The new system will save us approximately \$36,000 per year in phone service costs.

Our Building Maintenance crews replaced much of our outdoor light bulbs this year with energy-saving LED bulbs. It is estimated that the savings in electricity will total \$79,000 a year. We have expanded our WIFI network at the Desert Vista

property and will be continuing that effort by installing additional service at the Mountain Shadows and Pinnacle properties.

This year, Tuesday, February 28, is designated as Election Day and will be the last day to cast your ballot he Election Committee is preparing to conduct the annual election of Sun City's Board of Directors. This year, Tuesday, February 28, is designated as Election Day and will be the last day to cast your ballot. Counting of the ballots will be on Wednesday, March I. Five positions will be filled. Each home has five (5) votes that may be cast for one candidate or divided among all in any manner desired. It is critical that not more than five (5) votes are marked.

Ballots (part of the Link mailing label) and a return envelope will be included in your February Link. The ballot instructions will be located on the back of the address label. The ballot portion is perforated. After you mark your votes on the ballot, remove the address portion and insert the ballot into the envelope so that the BAR CODE shows through the window in the envelope. It may then be mailed to the Administration Office, Mountain Shadows Community Center, 9107 Del Webb Blvd., Las Vegas, NV 89134; or save Sun City the cost of postage by depositing your ballot into the ballot box at Mountain Shadows. If you mail your ballot, it must arrive no later than 5 p.m. on February 28, at which time voting will be closed.

Should you lose or accidentally destroy your ballot, another can be obtained at the Administration Office. Before requesting a replacement ballot, be certain that another member of your household has not already voted. If two ballots are received from the same household, BOTH will be voided. Also, if more than five (5) votes are marked on a ballot, all votes will be voided.



un City Renaissance! Just over a year ago when I was a candidate for the Board of Directors this was my campaign slogan. When I was elected to the Board and appointed chairman of the Information Technology (IT) Committee, it was still my goal. We have a great community but many facilities, along with equipment and technologies, still need to be updated.

The IT Committee has been hard at work updating Sun City's technological infrastructure. While many of the goals are still down the road, some have been accomplished and others are works in progress. Gone are the old school notice boards. Our community centers now have electronic information boards, Sun View TV monitors, that list upcoming activities and events. Wi-Fi is available at Desert Vista and soon will be available in all community centers.

The effort to move our outdated phone system in Administration and at all monitor sta-



tions into the 21st century is well underway, and may even be complete by the time this article is published. This new telephone technology is expected to save Sun City \$3,000 to \$4,000 a month on the community phone bill.

Yes, there is still much to be done. And, yes, we do run into snags along the way. But I am proud of how much we have accomplished. And there is more to come. The IT Committee will continue its efforts to improve communications and technology throughout our great community.

The Link is staffed by two full-time employees of Sun City

Summerlin and one freelance graphic designer. It is organized within SCSCAI as an advisory committee of six resident volunteers, who have experience in publishing, news, education and photography. The editorial committee also has a liaison to Sun City's Board of Directors. The Link meets on the fourth Friday of the month at 9 a.m. at Desert Vista. Meetings are open and residents are invited to attend.

or those residents who are interested in what is happening in Common Area Properties (CAP), here is a summary of the November meeting. I am very pleased to call attention to the fact that our very own Highland Falls Golf Course was voted "Best of Las Vegas Golf Course" by readers of the Las Vegas Review-Journal. In addition, our LED light rebate from Nevada Energy came in at \$20,000.

Team leader Allan Rosenberg inspected Palm Valley and Highland Falls. There were a few lights out, but all has been taken care of. Team leader Rhoda Ring reported that the Friendship Tree at Desert Vista needs cleaning and Brandon will take care of it. Team leader Amos Barcus reported that there is some fencing that needs to be replaced at the horseshoe pits at Mountain Shadows and some caulking needs to be replaced at the pool. Also, several ceiling fans have been ordered to replace old ones. Team leader Murray Waks reported that the Pinnacle was inspected and any issues have been taken care of.

Under unfinished business, a motion was made to recommend to the Board of Directors to accept the proposal from the Softball Club not to exceed \$160,000 for the replacement of the natural infield with artificial turf. After considerable discussion, a motion was made to table the initial motion for 90 days, as the criteria of the project has not been met and not enough information was presented to make a recommendation to the Board of Directors. That motion was passed.

Brian Bagwell, golf course maintenance general manager reported:

- Sun City won "Best of Las Vegas" for Highland Falls Golf Course.
- The bunker project should be completed by the time this article is published.
- The turf removal at Eagle Crest has started; Highland Falls is also under way.
- Water costs were discussed, and Brian will report back on this.

Kristie McWhorter, fitness manager, reported:

- A NuStep has been replaced at Desert Vista and that the equipment report is posted on the bulletin board.
- More Plexiglas holders will be made for the equipment.
- Due to the very positive feedback that has been received regarding the Palm Valley Golf Course walk held last year, more walks will be planned this year during over-seed.
- The pool furniture at Desert Vista and the Pinnacle will be replaced.

Brandon Balek, building maintenance supervisor, reported:

- The LED lights have been installed at the sports courts.
- The final application from NV Energy has been received and as soon as the work is inspected, the rebate should be around \$20,000.
- Lighting at the back of the Mountain Shadows fitness center is being looked into because it is so dark in

that area.

 After January, the pool decks will be redone at Desert Vista and Mountain Shadows, and the pool will be re-plastered at Desert Vista.

Louis Darling, landscape manager, reported:

- Turf reduction at the Pinnacle is complete and will be inspected.
- The Lake Mead/Del Webb entrance at Button Willow will be next.
- The color has been done, except at the Rampart entrance, which will be redone. Button Willow West greenbelt will have a pump installed to operate the irrigation system and keep the area green.

Paul Henderson, SCSCAI executive director, reported:

- The lighting switches at the Desert Vista ballroom will be redone. Brandon will present a quote to redo all the rooms for around \$9,000.
- The design-build contractor has completed the plans to submit to the city for final plans check, approval and granting of the building permit.

Ken Resnik, special projects committee member, reported:

• He and his committee met outside the Mountain Shadows social center to review the lighting and found no need to do anything other than have some plants trimmed that are blocking the light. Louis will look into that.

Starting an Exercise Program

Study after study demonstrates that seniors damage their health much more by being sedentary

urrent scientific evidence shows that seniors should exercise, even though many older people think it might harm them. Study after study demonstrates that seniors damage their health much more by being sedentary. If you're inactive, you deteriorate. Physical activity can help restore your capacity for movement and for life.

The New Year is a great time to make goals and to make exercise a priority in your life. A complete program should include the following components:

Warm Up – A warm-up period should begin with slow, rhythmic activities such as walking or biking.

Aerobic exercises – Anything that causes an increase in the overall activity of your cardiovascular system (heart and lungs) for a sustained period, such as walking, biking, or swimming. Over time, aerobic activity conditions your heart and lungs to be able to perform a greater amount of work with less effort.

Strengthening exercises – In addition to toning your body and making all movement less strenuous and energy consuming, muscle strengthening and conditioning will help support your joints, thus preventing arthritic problems and reducing the chance of injuries caused by falls. Such programs can be accomplished by using weight machines and free weights.

Balance Exercises – Lower body strengthening exercises will help you to improve your balance.

Core Strengthening Exercises – Your body's core (the area around your trunk and pelvis) is where your center of gravity is located. When you have good core stability, the muscles in your pelvis, lower back, hips and abdomen work in harmony. They provide support to your spine for just about any activity.

Flexibility (stretching) exercises – Stretching exercises serve a number of purposes, including maintaining full motion in your joints, keeping muscles from shortening and tightening, preventing or lessening the effects of arthritis.

Cool Down – If you have been participating in vigorous physical activity, it is extremely important not to stop suddenly. Abrupt stopping interferes with the return of the blood to the heart and may result in dizziness or fainting. You need to reduce the intensity of the exercise gradually and end with a few slow stretches.

Warning: Be sure to consult your physician before beginning an exercise program.

Benefits of Treadmill Training & How to Get Started

alking is often called the best and easiest form of exercise, but when it's too cold or too hot to go outside it is often overlooked. Come inside to get your walk on! Treadmill training or walking is a great way to get healthy, and you never have to worry about the weather. Walking helps to maintain healthy muscles, bones, ligaments, tendons and keeps your joints flexible, which increases your ability to balance. Your cardiovascular fitness improves by strengthening your heart and lungs, reduces blood pressure and cholesterol levels. Wow, it makes you want to start treadmill training right away if you aren't already doing it. Here's how to get started:

Get Familiar with the Treadmill's Control Panel. Sign up for an equipment orientation for basic instruction from a trainer at your fitness center or read the instructions on the machine con-

sole before you turn it on. Most treadmills have

the same features, including preset or manual

and incline adjustments and body weight input. Know the Safety Features. Learn where the emergency shut-off switch is and test it. Typically, it is a large red button in the middle of the machine console. Our treadmills are equipped with safety clips to attach to your pant waist. If you trip or lose your balance, the safety clip will automatically pull the emergency shut-off switch for you. Start Slowly. To start walking on the treadmill, straddle the belt. It's often easiest for a beginner to hold onto the handrails and place one foot on the belt and follow along with the machine pace. When you are comfortable with the pace, step onto the belt, let go of the handrails and walk normally. Get to Walking. Start by walking at a slow, comfortable pace that allows you to maintain a conversation. Keep your head up and stay centered in the middle of the belt (not too far forward or back). Increase the speed or incline to challenge yourself.





Do You Know?

There Is a Difference Between Community Monitors

Do you know the difference between a Social Monitor and a Fitness and Pool Monitor? These groups of resident employees look out daily for our well-being and enjoyment of our social, craft, club and fitness properties. Each group has specific responsibilities.

Common duties for both groups include enforcing Sun City Summerlin's rules and regulations; dealing with first aid and safety issues; checking equipment in and out for use by clubs and individual residents; preparing work orders for facility and equipment repairs; performing room counts to track facility usage; and providing customer service to residents and guests by answering questions and any other needed assistance.

Social Monitors serve at Mountain Shadows, Desert Vista and the Pinnacle. They are under the supervision of Melissa Spina, Community Services manager. Additional duties of Social Monitors include: Selling tickets to shows, dances, bus trips and other community performances and events; selling guest passes; reconciling monies at the end of shifts; preparing coffee and water for meetings and rentals; and signing up residents for AARP's driver safety classes, the AARP annual tax program and fitness lectures. In addition, Mountain Shadows Social Monitors are responsible for the neatness of the Mountain Shadows library and for posting notices on the Mountain Shadows wanted/ad board.

Kristie McWhorter, Fitness manager, oversees Fitness and Pool monitors. These monitors are located at Sun Shadows, Mountain Shadows, Desert Vista and the Pinnacle fitness centers. Duties specific to Fitness Monitors are: Observing residents for unsafe actions or behaviors that might indicate health emergencies such as low blood sugar, stroke or heart attack; resolving any resident conflicts that may occur at fitness centers; managing fair usage of fitness equipment and pool lanes; and working with custodians to ensure a clean environment.

Social, Fitness and Pool Monitors are trained in first aid and CPR, as well as the use of AED's (automated external defibrillators). In addition, this year Fitness and Pool Monitors participated in a water training safety class, taught by ARC-certified life guard educators from Lifeguard Society. The instruction focused on helping those in our pools and spas who might be having a health emergency.

All of our monitors work diligently to aid those of us residents and our guests in enjoying our Sun City amenities. They all have our safety and well-being as their prime concern.

Couples on Patrol Share a Unique Twist on 'Date Night'

I always have felt more comfortable when I was able to communicate verbally, so writing these 12 articles will be a chance for me to express myself in a different manner.

The Security Patrol celebrated its 25th birthday last year and now we, the members of the Patrol, have the opportunity to continue the accomplishments of those who came before us and the opportunity to add to that list of accomplishments. Patrol members come from a great variety of backgrounds. Their occupations or vocations prior to retirement were teachers, a nurse, a secretary, salesmen, a doctor, a laywer, a CPA, a homemaker, military, a cab driver, a union member, a caterer and an administrator to name just a few. The members of Patrol are a microcosm of the residents of Sun City. But, the members of the Patrol have one thing in common, they are volunteers. Like so many other residents of Sun City, they were volunteers before they retired. Being a member of Patrol has given them the opportunity to continue as a volunteer and the opportunity to be a part of "neighbors helping neighbors."

It has been said (because of my advancing age, I don't remember by whom)

that as good as the recipient of a good deed might feel for the kindness shown to them, that it pales by comparison to the good feeling of the volunteer (or "Good-deed Doer" as the Wizard of Oz call them). I remember as a youngster growing up, hearing the praise that presidents Eisenhower and Kennedy gave several times in speeches. They both referenced millions, now billions, of dollars that would have to have been spent to accomplish what volunteers did every day.

FEATURE: CHANGE IN MAIL DELIVERY SCHEDULE HAS CARRIERS WORKING

ail delivery work shifts for Sun City's U.S. Postal carriers have been changed by the Summerlin Post Office. Previously, carriers serving Sun City Summerlin delivered mail from 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. A revised schedule now has them delivering mail from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. The later starting time is causing mail to be home-delivered as late as 8 p.m. in Sun City.

"It is appalling that senior citizens can't get their mail on a timely basis," said Tom Brennan, a 19-year resident of Sun City. "For residents' safety, mail should be delivered while there is still daylight."

There are 17 separate mail districts throughout the Las Vegas Valley, but only the Summerlin district and one other area have had their deliveries altered to later hours. Sun City residents Bruce and Jeannie Petrie, who live directly behind Mountain Shadows Community Center, are getting their mail as late as 7 p.m.

"Our neighbors are upset about having to go out after dark to get their mail and I sympathize with them," Bruce said.

Resident Lonnie Shannon, a Neighborhood Watch K-9 Corps dog walker, has lived on High Range Drive for less than a year. She worries about her neighbors, who she sees going out for their mail at night.

"It is risky for some of them to navigate sloping driveways at night," she said.

Mail not distributed by 5 p.m. requires carriers to stay on the job until everything is home-delivered. No mail is held over until the next day, necessitating that some carriers are working as late as 9 p.m.

"We're paid time-and-a-half for overtime, but most nights I'm not home until after 9 o'clock," said one longtime Sun City mail carrier.

Some mail carriers have expressed concern about delivering mail later than they did in the past because residents who find their boxes empty in the afternoon may assume that they are not getting mail that day and fail to recheck the box at a later hour.

"After dark I may put mail in their box that remains there, unlocked, overnight," explained one mail carrier who wears a miner's cap as he negotiates his route in the darkness.

As to why the delivery schedule was changed remains a mystery.

As of press time, nine telephone calls to the local post office to ask the question were never answered; and a recorded message was not accessible.

In all, 15 postal carriers serve Sun City Summerlin. For outgoing mail, residents are reminded to use the blue mailboxes located at their nearest community center.
