






PRESIDEN President's Message



Keepers of the Wild

Is Home to Lions and Tigers and Bears, Oh My!

t was a safari in the desert. Each year, the Community Services Department plans and executes more than 20 field trips for residents. In

May, 50 people had the pleasure of making the trip out to Valentine, Ariz., to the Keepers of the Wild Nature Park.

It was a beautiful day. Along the way the guide pointed out places of interest and provided historical facts about the areas we motored through. The bus ride included a stop at the Cracker Barrel restaurant in Kingman, Ariz., for an early lunch. Then it was back on the bus for the remaining 30 minutes to the park.

At the park, the Sun City group boarded a tram for an informational tour. The tour guide, Linda, who is the education program director at the park, provided our group with stories about the animals and how they came to be at the park. The attraction is currently home to 165 animals; 52 different species and sub species. They go through 400 pounds of food per day.

These animals have come to the park in a variety of ways. Some are from zoos that have shut down; some were injured and have been rescued since they can't be returned to the wild; some are confiscated from people illegally keeping or selling them as pets; and others are refugees from various entertainment enterprises.

Keepers is a non-profit organization that, through donations and tours, provides a life long home to these animals. Our group saw tigers, llamas, lions, various types of monkeys, deer, a camel, goats, bobcats, wolves, coyotes, leopards, ravens, emus, ostrich, vultures, owls, a lemur and one adorable grizzly bear named Bam Bam. Bam Bam had been purchased by an animal trainer who was unable to keep her. She was days away from being euthanized before Keepers rescued her.

All the animals are kept in large natural habitat areas and are cared for by 22 employees, as well as volunteers.


Sun City residents Monica and Bud Glasman have enjoyed several Community Services trips. "Absolutely wonderful!" was Monica's evaluation of this trip. Participants all shouted their approval when asked if they had a good time.

Community Services offers a variety of one-day trips. Residents have a chance to enjoy excursions to museums, shopping areas, Colorado River floating, plays, casinos and other places of interest. It's a great way for residents to get out and about.

opportunity cat in traveling shows. He arrived at Keepers of the Wild when he no longer was a profitable resource. That happened when turned 8 months old. Bam Bam, a grizzly bear, also started out in entertainment. When her owner no longer had a need for her she was scheduled to be euthanized. She was rescued in 2014.

NEIGHBOR SMeet Don Irish

The Missouri Connection: 100-Year-Old Quilt Goes Home ative Missourian – Check. Presidential Connection – Check. National World War I Museum at Liberty Memorial – Check. It may seem like all the pieces of the puzzle fell into place easily, but Sun City resident Don Irish can tell you that his journey to memorialize an artifact of his family tree has been an adventure rooted in determination, discovery and a whole lot of patience.

"The thing that has been paramount with my brother and I is the desire to pay proper respect to our parents," said Don about the quilt his mother, Zillah, crafted for her doughboy who went off to battle enemies of the United States during World War I. And the best way to do that, Don said, was a wild idea that came to him one day about getting his mom's quilt into the collection of a museum. Only there, he said, could it be properly appreciated.

But where, when and how would become questions that would shape the strategy of his plan of attack. In 2015, when the Link first learned of Don's crusade, the magazine covered his story. Don had his sights set high – he targeted the National World War I Museum at Liberty Memorial in Kansas City, Missouri. Why? Well, Don was from Missouri and his family had a connection to another famous Missourian, Harry S. Truman, the 34th president of the United States. Don's dad, Frederick Forest Irish, served under Truman in

the U.S. Army's 129th Field Artillery, Battery F,of the 35th Division. The way Don figured it, having the quilt accepted into the museum's permanent collection would be the perfect homecoming.

But before any requests could be made, Don had an assignment: He had to get the quilt authenticated. He knew his mom had stitched the 25 panels that represented many of the U.S. military organizations on the red, white and blue blanket, but he

needed proof. So, with the help of Sun City's Quilting Club, Don headed to Kingman, Ariz., to meet an expert. At a local shop a state away, the quilt was measured, examined and appraised. It was indeed a century old and documented in excellent condition.

Over the last few months, Don's efforts have increased and the quilt has had an audience with U.S. Representative Dina Titus, D-Nev., has been the subject of another feature story and, drum roll please, been accepted into the permanent collection of the National World War I Museum at Liberty Memorial.

"Basically, I wanted to say thanks to our father for his service and thank you to our mother for her patriotism," Don said when asked about his reason for wanting to preserve the quilt's legacy. "I don't know many people who have items that are 100 years old in such great shape."

So, if you're ever in Kansas City, be sure to head to the National World War I Museum at Liberty Memorial. The Irish family quilt will be on rotating display as part of the exhibits commemorating the anniversary of the start of the Great War.

MILT GOLDSTEIN

20-Year Tour Culminates With Honor Flight to D.C.

"From the halls of Montezuma to the shores of Tripoli" proclaims the heritage of the United States Marines. From the shores of Tsingtoa, China, to the shores of Da Nang, Vietnam, with a stopover in the plains of Pohang, South Korea – travels that mark the 20-year career of Gunnery Sergeant Milt Goldstein USMC (retired), a Sun City resident and longtime member of the Military and Friends Club.

As a Boy Scout in Cleveland Ohio, young Milt always considered the Marines to be a class act. "One day, I watched a parade where the Marines marched in their dress blues and I was hooked. I wanted to enlist immediately, but I was only 17 and my mother would not sign for me. So I joined the reserves. After graduating high school and I turned 18, I enlisted. I was a Marine," he said.

Life as a Marine started at Parris Island, an 8,000-plus-acre installation located near Beaufort. South Carolina. It is the Marine Corps recruit depot, the place where the transformation from teenager to Marine begins, as it has for untold thousands of recruits since 1915.

ing, Milt's first assignment was Headquarters and Service Bat-

talion, 1st Marine Division. Their task: evacuate the remaining Marines in China still rooting out the last Japanese soldiers who refused to surrender. It was 1949 and Mao Zedong's red army was quickly overrunning China.

Modern armies require vast amounts of supplies. Once delivered by the Merchant Marine, an integral part of the fighting unit takes control. In 1950, Milt was assigned to the 2nd Marine Division and sent to basic supply school. Thus began the rest of his 20-year journey as a Marine. Originally scheduled for deployment to Korea with the Division in 1950, fate in the form of a bureaucratic mixup intervened and he was assigned stateside. In December 1953, he finally made it to Korea assigned to the 1st Marine Airwing stationed in Pohang, South Korea, as Aviation Supply Chief.

After a year in Korea, Milt returned to assignments at

El Toro in California and Parris Island, where he was when Hurricane Gracie devastated the area in 1956. Other assignments and promotions followed until, in January 1967, when Milt was assigned to the 3rd Marine Airwing based in Da Nang, Vietnam. Still in a supply role. Milt was stationed behind the front lines, but one day he had an opportunity to fly as a passenger in a C130 to the hot zone. They landed on a dirt strip and had to use JATO to take off in the limited space. While there, however, Milt witnessed a squad returning from a skirmish.

"It was a scene I'll never forget." he recalled, his face darkening with the recalled image. "Even

His tour was up and so was his 20-year hitch. Milt returned home and soon was a civilian again.

In recent years, the Corps veteran received two special recognitions. In 2014, he was awarded a customized Quilt of Valor and in 2015 he was selected for an Honor Flight trip to D.C., where he participated in the laying of a wreath at the Korean War Memorial.

- By attending the monthly Coffee With the Boards held on the third Friday of the month, 10:30 a.m., Desert Vista. This meeting offers an opportunity to informally discuss ideas with Board members.
- If your concern is in a specific area (i.e. Information Technology or Golf) you'll want to attend the appropriate committee meeting and be heard there. Schedules are published in every Link magazine.
- By attending the monthly BOD meeting, first Tuesday of the month, 9 a.m., Desert Vista. There are two times during the meeting where a member may address the BOD – at the beginning of the meeting during resident comments (where a member may speak only on items listed on that meeting's agenda) and at the end of the meeting (where they may speak on any community-based matter subject to a 3-minute time limit.

Once you've succeeded in enlisting a BOD member to sponsor your item on the monthly agenda you'll want to be sure to attend the meeting and speak in support of it. If you know of others who support your item, be sure to invite them to the meeting to help express that support.



don't know about you, but for me summer means backyard barbeques, lounging by the pool and enjoying the outdoors. Long days, and warm mornings and evenings beckon us outside with friends and family. Staying smart and with a little bit of pre-planning, we can ensure that we enjoy all the benefits of the summer while minimizing health risks posed by a few summertime worries.

Top 5 Ways to Stay Summer Safe:

experience any of these symptoms, get indoors immediately and drink water to help you cool down. Call 911 if symptoms persist or worsen.

Cover up. Too much sun exposure can cause sunburn, premature aging and skin cancer. You can reduce your exposure during mid-day by applying a lotion or spray with a sun protection factor of at least 15, while wearing a hat and light-colored clothing. These are a few practical ways to prevent health issues related to sun exposure.

Fight the bite! Bees, wasps, ants, mosquitoes and ticks are more active in the summer months. Drain any standing water to reduce mosquito breeding grounds, wear long sleeves and pants in wooded or grassy areas when hiking or camping, use insect repellant, and never poke nests or hives (always call a professional to remove a hive that presents a problem in your vicinity.) Know the signs of an allergic reaction - hives, swelling, throat tightness, difficulty



Stay Cool and hydrated. The average temperature in Southern Nevada hits 100 degrees more than 60 days in the summer and humidity is around 30 percent. Heat stroke and exhaustion are serious risks that increase when you're working or exercising in the heat. Spending time in a spa, using some types of medications and/or drinking caffeinated or alcoholic beverages can be dehydrating. Signs of overheating include: feeling faint, nauseous, changes in your pulse rate, weakness and muscle cramps, and clammy skin. If you

breathing, vomiting and/or feeling faint/lightheaded – and contact your doctor or call 911 immediately.

Watch that food. Follow five simple steps to food safety: Clean hands, surfaces and serving/cooking utensils often; separate raw meat from other food and clean any surface that held raw meat before using again; cook foods to the right temperature; chill food promptly after meals; and when in doubt, throw it out!

Stay Water Safe. Avoid solo swimming, don't mix alcohol and swimming, and designate a Water Watcher to keep eyes on children at all times around bodies of water.



Non-Resident Guest Policy

This month, CCOC will meet on Thursday, July 6, 1 p.m., at Desert Vista.

he Clubs & Community Organizations Committee (CCOC) is a standing committee of SCSCAI's Board of Directors that operates under its guidance. The committee serves as a liaison between all clubs and community organizations and the Board of Directors for the purpose of recommending changes in policy, endorsing special programs and arbitrating matters of conflict.

On May 2, SCSCAI's Board of Directors, in a 5 to 3 vote, approved CCOC's recommendation that clubs be allowed to change their constitutions to enable the club's membership to allow non-resident guests to attend as many club meetings and functions as the club chooses. Prior to this change, a non-resident was allowed to visit the club only twice per year.

Club members now have the opportunity to vote on whether they would like to adopt this new policy or not. Non-resident guests cannot join SCSCAI-chartered clubs and resident mem-

bers of the club have priority over non-residents when an activity is limited to the number of people who can participate.

Currently, each resident household is allowed 24 guest passes per year. If those guest passes are exhausted, additional adult and child day passes are available for purchase at the Administration office, as well as at Mountain Shadows and Desert Vista social monitor stations. Club officers are responsible for assuring that non-residents have obtained a guest pass. Each club is responsible to keep track of non-resident guests.

Any change to a club's constitution requires a majority vote of the club membership at a duly noticed business meeting with a quorum present.

Several clubs are currently making arrangements to query their members. The Community Services Department will make revisions to the clubs' constitutions if any changes are needed. If no change is preferred, the current constitution of each club will remain unchanged.

Time Keepers – the Hidden Heroes un City Security Patrol, like any good functioning organization, has hidden heroes. Members of various departments who work out of the public's sight keeping the

wheels of the Patrol working efficiently. This month the focus is on time keepers.

Time keepers record all hours of all Security Patrol members who volunteer their time. That includes the assigned hours as driver, dispatcher or IC (Information Center) volunteers, plus the extra shift time and hours members work at special events, the uniform store, recruiting, car washing, purchasing and storing supplies; as well as well-wishers; meeting attendance; and telephone callers who remind members of the monthly meetings. The working hours for more than 200 Security Patrol members are recorded weekly in the Patrol's computer database.

Janet Moseley, the lead time keeper, praised her team of five volunteers (readers and computer input operators) that include a former Security Patrol chief, Bill Henriod.

"It is a time-consuming but important task," Janet said. "The training for time keepers is between five and seven sessions."

Why is the maintenance of working hour statistics important? The Association provides life-time appreciation awards for members who achieve 300, 500, 700 and 900 hours of volunteering in a year. The awards are redeemable at Association properties, including Tavern at the Falls and the Summit snack bar, golf pro shops, and awards can be applied to golfing fees. New members who work 200 hours in a year are eligible for the Two Hundred Club. The Two Hundred Club rewards all members who have volunteered 200 hours in a year with a dinner in November. It is a great way to meet other Security Patrol volunteers who work different shifts and just might be your neighbor.

Janet further explained the time keepers' role. "Each week we gather the dispatcher logs and record the names and shift hours received by each assigned security officer. Then any supplemental work sheets are reviewed. From the logs, we track the hours for new members and their trainers. A print out of hours volunteered is prepared and placed in a binder for review by Patrol members. If there is a discrepancy in a volunteer's hours, we attempt to resolve the problem by referencing the log and contacting the member."

Your Security Patrol is an important and complex element in Sun City Summerlin. Its members work hard; some during the most difficult hours of the night, and there are many departments who have hidden heroes keeping the Patrol functioning smoothly.
