

hank you to all Sun City homeowners for your diligence in returning the ballot question regarding the change in SCSCAI's status from an NRS81 to an NRS82 corporation.

The result of the election, which was certified by SCSCAI's Board of Directors Secretary on April 27, revealed that the Association had met its goal of 50 percent, plus one vote to begin working with its legal team to file paperwork with the Nevada Secretary of State's Office. The change in status will ultimately guarantee the perpetuity of Sun City Summerlin Community Association, Inc., and relieve us from paying the state commerce tax, which will save us approximately \$16,000 per year. In addition, the change also will reduce the amount of other fees paid by SCSCAI. The amount of overall fee savings associated with the sale of tickets to community events is expected to net Sun City thousands a year in savings.

In all, more than 4,184 votes were cast to approve the change. That number represents over 53 percent of homeowners who responded to the ballot less than a month after it was mailed to homes with the April Link.

I hope that you have enjoyed learning more about the Association's departments and the individual staffs that make up Sun City Summerlin's service team. Since January, the Link has endeavored to go behind the scenes to reveal what a dedicated crew we have working for residents. So far, we've covered the science of grass with Golf Course Maintenance, the philosophy of entertainment with Community Services, the importance of compliance with Community Standards and the creativity of storytelling with the Link. This month, residents will learn about the *modus operandi* of fitness and how that department strives not only to help residents live longer and healthier lives, but to ensure that they have fun doing it.





Incarcerated
Burglars
Tell What
Does/Doesn't

yle Iboshi, a senior investigative reporter for KGW-TV in Portland, Ore., questioned 86 inmates currently serving time for burglary in Portland's Department of Corrections. The burglars responded to questions detailing how they broke into, as well as what they were looking for during home burglaries. What the reporter learned could help keep others from becoming a target.

Did posted home security signs deter you?

Burglars had mixed opinions about home security systems. Some burglars said signs didn't faze them. Others knew how to disable alarms or avoid setting them off, but most said they would leave immediately if an alarm did go off.

If there was a visible security camera, would it keep you from breaking in? Burglars agreed that security cameras were a deterrent, but added that a camera also signaled valuables inside the home.

If you heard a radio or TV inside the home, would you still break in? Most burglars feared someone might be home if they heard a radio or TV and said they wouldn't break in. "Absolutely not," wrote a burglar.

Did you ever do surveillance on a home, and if so what were you trying to learn? "Who lives in the home, what are their weekday

schedules (weekends are too unpredictable), what do they drive, is there a dog," wrote one inmate. "What time the house would be empty," answered another.

Cash and credit cards are the ultimate find. Jewelry and guns are almost as good as cash. "If I got guns, they were easy to sell," said a former burglar. Laptops, phones and other electronics are easy to take and can quickly be sold. "The main thing I hunted for in a home was a removable safe or locked box," one burglar wrote. "I would leave everything else to get a safe that I could carry."

Burglars aren't going to remove a heavy safe from the home. Large safes and safes bolted into the floor or wall are too difficult to deal with. "Safes that cannot be picked up or carried off are too much work for possibly no reward."

What can homeowners do to avoid being burglarized? "Alert police if you see something suspicious at a neighbor's home. Know your neighbors so you recognize different people in the neighborhood. Be neighborly. Neighbors can be one of the best security systems. Have a true neighborhood watch," recommended a convicted burglar.

Upon completion of the fourhour course taught by an AARP-certified instructor, you will receive a certificate that may qualify you for an insurance premium reduction for up to three years. Max: 30. Signup is available now. Classes are held at the Desert Vista Community Center.

Clubs to Decide Limit on Non-resident Guests

Notice went out to all chartered club presidents on May 2, advising them of the Board of Directors' decision that modified the CCOC procedure manual language regarding non-resident guests at club meetings and events. 

Do You Know? How Age Matters in Sun City

"Even though many new residents are in the younger age brackets, the average age has remained virtually the same," said longtime BOD member Ken Caroccia. In fact, compared to the membership in 2008, Sun City's current membership is only 2 years older even though nine years has passed. How is that possible? The answer points to how many of us are living longer.

Notice the trend: In the past nine years, the number of residents in the 95-100 age bracket has increased more than 400 percent. Where we only had three residents over 100 in 2008, we now have 20, a 700 percent increase. The same could be said of the 85 to 95 brackets, where there has been significant increases.

Throughout the years, the ratio of men to women has remained constant - 45 to 55 percent. Similarly, the average age of our male population has consistently been two years older than our women, 77 versus 75, today. In 2008, it was 74 versus 72. ~ Bob Cohen/Link



OUR TEAM

The lifeblood of the Fitness Department is our people! Every member of the fitness team is an example of active, vibrant living. You can catch many of our team members during their off-duty time swimming, playing sports, dancing, serving with community health organizations, teaching and more.

Kristie McWhorter, our fitness manager, holds a master's degree in exercise physiology and has been with us for 10 years. She is also a certified senior fitness specialist, an ACE-certified personal trainer and a group exercise instructor, as well as a functional aging specialist. She is an active health ambassador within our community as well as outside. One of her passions has been improving balance and falls prevention. She has spearheaded falls prevention programs in Sun City for several years running. She also represents Sun City Summerlin as a member of the Nevada Goes Falls Free Coalition and promotes falls prevention in the Las Vegas community.

Heather Senn is our assistant to the fitness manager. She is a certified health education specialist, holds a bachelor's degree in public health and is a physical therapist assistant. She is the main coordinator of the health and wellness programs, including the monthly health education

seminars and the annual health fair. Heather began a new diabetes empowerment education program for residents this year that made a great impact in many of our resident's lives.

Charli Douglass, fitness specialist, is a certified senior fitness specialist and ACE-certified personal fitness trainer and group exercise instructor. You may have caught up with her at a fitness center, or read one of her "Charli's Corner" monthly features in the Link that focus on proper technique, types of workout plans and making exercise science easier to understand.

Pam Shields, fitness specialist, is certified senior fitness specialist, an ACE-certified personal fitness trainer and a group exercise instructor as well as a functional aging specialist. She also is a member of the Alzheimer's Association Speakers Bureau. She oversees our fitness department equipment maintenance program, keeping our exercise equipment in top shape. You'll also be seeing more of her as she launches the "Use It or Lose It: Brain Health Program," a four-week program to help residents understand how different aspects of life interact for optimal brain health.

Both Charli and Pam, together with our Certified Group Exercise Instructors Doris Poders-Barsky, Melissa George and Zoe Johnson teach our department-sponsored group

fitness classes at the Desert Vista Fitness Center. These include Sit & Be Fit, Body Sculpting and Core Strength & Balance. Heather joins Pam and Charli in teaching equipment orientation classes for residents at each fitness center, showing how the equipment operates, important safety features and talking about creating basic workout plans.

Our team also includes a top-drawer crew of 40 fitness/pool monitors. They make a busy, multi-faceted job look easy. One thing you may not know is that while they keep things humming along with a smile, they are also keeping a keen watch out for your safety and well-being while you are enjoying the facilities. All monitors are trained in CPR, first aid and basic water safety, and they all serve as "first responders" for residents and guests experiencing health issues while using the fitness centers. While we would wish they never had to use that knowledge, we salute our hometown heroes whose quick thinking and action has helped prevent more than a few serious situations for residents and guests over the years.

FITNESS CENTERS

Our four fitness centers are our most visible, tangible aspect of the Fitness Department. No matter where you live in Sun City Summerlin, there is a fitness center within a couple of miles of you that offers a menu of options to support an active lifestyle. Each center boasts at least one pool and spa, and through the entire network of centers, residents have access to tennis, basketball, racquetball, pickleball, bocci ball, miniature golf, walking paths, cardio and resistance training equipment, and group fitness classes.

Unlike our social halls, fitness centers are private facilities and non-residents must be accompanied by a

If you're looking to increase your understanding of brain health and promote a brain-healthy lifestyle, this workshop is for you.

The four-session course will provide you with all the necessary tools and tips. Numerous studies have shown that brain health is multifaceted. It is not just about exercise, nutrition or playing brain games. If you are looking to support thinking skills and reduce the risk of serious memory loss, you must engage in different ways. This includes a focus on physical, mental and emotional health.

The Use It or Lose It! program, based on the Cleveland Clinic's 6 Pillars of Brain Health, consists of a series of four two-hour workshops. The workshops include a mixture of lecture, discussion, activities and exercises aimed at improving the long-term brain health in cognitively healthy adults. Because the program focuses on prevention and not treatment, participants must be free of significant memory impairment, such as diagnosis of Alzheimer's or a related memory disorder, or other cognitive compromises that may impact their ability to benefit from the course.

resident with a current Association ID to use the facilities as a guest. All households are allotted 24 guest passes per year. As an active adult, 55+ community, fitness centers are not open for children under the age of 19, except for dedicated times for children accompanied by resident adults to use pool facilities at Desert Vista, Mountain Shadows and Pinnacle.

Some of the most important questions around our Fitness facilities have to do with some other accessibility issues:

- Caregiver Access Contact the fitness manager with a doctor's letter and she will guide you through the process of getting your caregiver set up to access the center with you. They will be able to get a special ID card and you can preserve your guest passes for family and friends.
- Longer-Stay Family Caregivers Contact the fitness manager with a doctor's letter and she will authorize temporary access to a family member/s caring for a resident for an extended period.
- Medical Discharge to Community Exercise Need to bring a physical or occupational therapist, a sports medicine physician, or a cardiac rehab specialist with you to help you set up a post-rehabilitation exercise program? Have the provider contact the fitness manager ahead of time to authorize their visit. You will need to use a guest pass for the visit as certain liabilities are at stake. Obtaining prior approval helps ensure a smooth, professional experience for this important part of your plan of care. Additionally, by having your healthcare professional speak with us, we can

exchange valuable information about other resources that will support your continued recovery during the transition.

• Support Animals – You can apply for a special permit from the Administration Department. You'll need supporting documentation from a physician. After approval, your animal will officially join you on your Association ID.

HEALTH & WELLNESS PROGRAMS

Less visible but no less important, our health and wellness programs complement our fitness centers by empowering residents to greater health, function and well-being. We support a healthy community by partnering with about 60 local healthcare providers to bring timely, relevant and accurate health information to you for monthly screenings, seminars and workshops. Through these relationships, in 2016 alone, Sun City Summerlin was able to host 55 health education seminars completely free of charge to residents!

Our Annual Fall Health Fair and Flu Shot Clinic boasts an average attendance of 900 residents, and our Annual Spring Walk brings out about 100 runners and walkers.

THAT LITTLE EXTRA

In addition to all this already great stuff, the Fitness Department contracts with an on-site licensed massage therapist, Deborah Butterfield, whose massage studio is located at the Pinnacle Fitness Center; and two nationally certified personal fitness trainers, Daria Clarke and Cece Ceccarini. Both of these amenities take Sun City Summerlin to the next level of service for our residents.





ARTHUR PATTON

Another Day, Another Dollop in the Merchant Marine

t wasn't very glamorous duty; it was a job. One that had to be done because without it, the invasion of France in 1944 and the island-hopping campaigns of the Pacific would have been virtually impossible. That job was serving in the Merchant Marine. It was vital because nearly all the troops and every truck, tank, cannon, and the bullets, shells and fuel that they required, was transported by ship — and the enemy knew that. A greater percentage of those serving aboard merchant ships in WWII died in the line of duty than all of the other U.S. Services – 1 in 26 mariners.

One of those serving mariners was Sun City resident and Military & Friends Club member Arthur Patton. When asked why he joined the Merchant Marine, especially in light of the casualty figures, he replied, "We didn't know how dangerous it was." (All through the war the government minimized the damage being done to our shipping to prevent the enemy from learning how

effective the submarine attacks were.) "I was about to turn 18 and the draft was waiting. A friend of mine had signed up for the Merchant Marine and told me the pay was four times higher than the Navy's, so I joined just before my birthday in 1944."

Arthur served on a number of ships in both the Atlantic and Pacific, mostly troop transports. He sailed from New York to Liverpool, England, and Le Harve, France, bringing fresh troops to that theater before transiting the Panama Canal to support the fighting in

the Philippines, Guam and Saipan.

The ships he served on weren't the famous ones we all know. They were the S.S. General John Pope, the S.S. Cody Victory, the S.S. Marine Dragon and the S.S. Sheephead. Names that were little known then, except to those who sailed on them and certainly forgotten now. Both Arthur and his ships were among the lucky ones; they never became a part of the 1 in 26 who died.

"Most of the time, I served on troop transports. When the war ended, our job did not. All of those troops had to be ferried home. So, we made runs from Japan to Seattle.

et you didn't know that for the past six years eight couples have been acting as ambassadors to folks from all over the country and other parts of the world. Why?

Think back. We all moved to SCS from someplace, and making that big decision was not easy and would directly affect the rest of our lives. Various factors influenced us, but we had some common things to consider: Will we like it? Will we fit in? Will it be hard to make friends?

In 2010, a golf marketing ad hoc committee came up with the idea that, as a golf community, we needed to be more competitive with the newer, developer-marketed retirement projects. Otherwise, we would face a substantial reduction in the proportion of SCS residents that support our golf programs. Reasons: Many of our existing, older residents were playing less or moving away and potential new golfing residents were relocating elsewhere without even knowing about SCS. As a matter of interest, in the early 90s we had approximately 2,500 golfing residents, whereas currently that number is closer to 1,000. While outside play has taken up some of the slack from a financial standpoint, the community still needs to increase the percentage of people that live and play golf here in order to properly support our golf facilities in the future.

So, the Golf Ambassador Committee stepped in. The idea was to provide a resource to those looking for a retirement community with lots of amenities, particularly golf. A link was set up on the SCSCAI website where

potential homeowners could request information and talk with a resident to get a feel for what it's like to live here. The Ambassador Committee eventually grew to eight couples and more will be needed to handle the growing number of boomers that we expect will be coming our way.

During the past six years, ambassadors have served more than 180 people. Of those, we have 50 new residents. Many of the others could still move here, as they may be waiting on the sale of their home or remaining in their current job for a while longer. These are active people who not only enhance our golf programs, but are also taking a leadership role in the future of our community.

Special thanks to SCSCAI BOD President Joe O'Connell, for his help in bringing the initial idea to fruition; Jim Neighbors, SCSCAI head golf pro-fessional, who assists ambassadors with golf and lunch arrangements; Tom Burt, who has been a big help in coordinating our Internet activity; and, of course, our ambassador couples who give a minimum of a full day to be with the invitees, as well as much preplanning and follow up.

For those of us involved, we receive much joy and satisfaction by having the opportunity to help others with their very important decision. A win! Win!


Team Leader Reports:

Motions for April 5, 2017

- The Board of Directors unanimously approved to accept the bid from Jet Development at a cost not to exceed \$116,000 for the Highland Falls patio enclosure as recommended by SCSCAI Executive Director Paul Henderson.
- The Board of Directors unanimously approved the appointment of Barbara Holden as the chairwoman of the Community Preparedness Committee (CPC).
- The Board of Directors unanimously approved the purchase of two speed limit flashing signs from the City of Las Vegas at a cost of approximately \$4,000 each.
- The Board of Directors unanimously approved a motion at the recommendation of Common Area Properties Committee Chairman Ken Caroccia to install an automatic door opener at Mountain Shadows at cost not to exceed \$6,000.
- The Board of Directors unanimously approved a motion at the recommendation of Common Area Properties Committee Chairman Ken Caroccia to purchase 500 maroon chairs with silver trim at a cost not to exceed \$25,000. An additional cost of approximately \$5,000 will need to be added for shipping and handling. The total cost of the project is not to exceed \$30,500.
- The Board of Directors unanimously approved the Finance Committee's recommendation to reduce the reserve funding level of 80 percent to 75 percent.
