"I wanted to give Sun City residents the holiday off from cooking, said Rick. "I offered the meal before when I worked at Koolau Golf Club in Hawaii and it was very popular. One year, we did over 100 packages!"

So let's see how Las Vegas stacks up against its island cousin.

Rick's Thanksgiving to Go menu features two options – the full dinner, which will feed six to eight people, and a half dinner that will serve up to four (the half order includes a half turkey).

Each dinner includes a turkey, stuffing, green beans almondine, cranberry relish, mashed potatoes, gravy, rolls and butter.

"Each meal is fully cooked and will be warm when picked up on Thanksgiving morning," said Rick. "All residents will need to do is reheat it when they get home and serve."

According to Rick, residents looking to swap cooking for time to spend with their holiday guests just need to call The Summit and place their order.

"Orders can be placed at The Summit and paid for at the same time. Meals will then be available for pick up on Thanksgiving Day from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. Just call us when you're in the roundabout and we'll run the food out to you curbside. Or, if residents are unable to pick up the food at The Summit, we can deliver the Thanksgiving package to their homes. All they need to do is set that up when they place their order," Rick said.

Thanksgiving to Go meals are priced at \$39.95 for the half order; \$74.95 for the full order. The Summit phone number is 702-240-1313. The deadline to order the Thanksgiving to Go meal is 5 p.m., Wednesday, November 15.



Medal of Honor Aviator ROBERT TEITLEBAUM





AS SOON AS I GRADUATED HIGH SCHOOL, I WENT TO THE RECRUITING OFFICE TO EN-LIST IN THE ARMY AIR CORPS," SAID NEW York-born, Ohio-transplant Robert Teitlebaum. "But it was 1940 and there were no openings there. The recruiter said Army Air was part of the Signal Corps. I knew Morse code from my Boy Scout days and I thought that would be useful, solioined."

Bob spent the next two years in the Signal Corps as a company clerk. Advancement was limited, but all that changed on December 7, 1941.

As America plunged into World War II, the military expanded dramatically and quickly.

"I didn't want to spend the war manning a desk," Bob said, "So, I transferred to 6th Armored Division, but I was assigned to finance. Still behind a desk."

These were dynamic times and opportunities were soon to arise. The Field Artillery had openings for officers. Bob applied for OCS and 90 days later was commissioned as a 2nd Lt. More schooling was ahead, including the Field Artillery Battery Executive Course, Basic Flight School and the advanced flight training as part of the Liaison Pilots Course. As 1943 arrived, Bob was officially an Air Observation Pilot.

Sounds simple and safe enough: An Air Observation Pilot. The primary task, however, was to locate enemy targets from the air and direct and coordinate fire on them, all Bob today, displaying all of his medals earned during two wars. Bob Teitlebaum just before deployment to Italy in 1944.

while piloting a slow, single-engine aircraft — an easy target for ground fire. But that was yet to come.

And, come it did.

In late October 1944, Bob shipped out to Italy, assigned to the 985th Field Artillery Battalion, a part of the 5th Army. During the next six months, he flew 70 combat missions, often under heavy ground fire.

"We returned to base with the plane full of holes a number of times, but my observer and I were fortunate. We were never hit." he said.

"We were attacked by enemy airplanes only once," Bob recalled. "And that was almost funny. You see, we were often passed by British Spitfires returning to their base as we headed out. They would wag their wings and fly by. This time, the returning flight of two planes didn't wag their wings. In fact, the next thing I knew, they were shooting at me. They were German ME-109s! Flight training kicked in and I put my little L-4 into a maximum dive. The Germans started to follow me down, but for some reason broke off the engagement and continued on their way. I pulled up and returned to base."

WWII ended with Bob being awarded the Air Medal with 1 Oak Leaf Cluster, the American Theater Service Medal, the European African Middle Eastern Service Medal with two bronze stars, the Pre Pearl Harbor Medal, the German

Occupation Medal and, of course, the World War II Victory Medal. The war was over, Bob was separated from the service and returned to Oregon to enter college like so many other vets.

In 1949, the Army offered Bob a Regular Army commission if he returned for two more years. (He had been an Army Reserve officer during all of WWII.)

He accepted the offer and joined the 70th Infantry Division, then based in Oregon. In June 1950, South Korea was invaded; three weeks later Bob was in Korea, assigned to the 2nd Infantry Division as a liaison officer for an infantry battalion combat team. Shortly thereafter he was flying combat missions once again, directing artillery and naval gunfire.

Korea was to prove more challenging than WWII.

"Once, as we were traveling by road to Pohang AFB, we were ambushed. Fought our way to the base only to find that the Air Force had pulled out, leaving just one pilot and plane behind.," Bob said. "I pleaded with the pilot to take me up so that I could get a better view of the situation. He said that they would be shooting at us as we took off and he was right."

"Shortly after, I was visiting my battery commander at Taegu, when we were subjected to heavy shelling rom Chinese troops. I soon realized the Chinese spotters were using our own aiming stake lights to target us. I ran out and pulled the lights down to protect our personnel and Howitzers while we were still being shelled."

The Chinese later overran the position.

Bob went on to fly 300 combat missions in Korea, often flying two or three in one day. One mission he remembers well was a disappointment.

"I was assigned to fly fire control for the USS Missouri, the first Army pilot to get the assignment. Unfortunately, a combination of bad weather and radio problems caused the mission to be scrubbed. But I did have other opportunities to do fire control for other Navy ships," he said.

Other missions were far more successful.

In October 1950, Bob was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for action over the Naktong River Sector on September 3, 1950. The medal is awarded for heroism or extraordinary achievement while participating in an aerial flight. Bob earned his medal for remaining on station and directing fire missions for the 2nd Infantry Division Artillery, despite heavy ground fire, supporting troops fighting superior strength North Korean units during what has been described as the "forgotten war's bloodiest battle."

In addition to the DFC, Bob earned an additional 14 Bronze Oak Leaf Clusters for his air medal, awarded for meritorious achievement while participating in aerial flight. He was recommended for, but never received, a Silver Star.

After his Korean tour was over, Bob returned to the States as a fixed-wing flight instructor, a duty he considered far more dangerous than flying combat missions.

In 1952, he attended Air Force Flight Training School to be certified as a helicopter pilot. He then served as a helicopter flight instructor. Finally returning to civilian life, Bob had a long career in finance at Boeing in addition to stints as a factory rep, a real estate broker and a part-time flight instructor. He moved to Sun City in 1999.

try was at peace after the cease fire agreement ending the Korean Conflict in 1953 and before the Marines were sent to South Viet Nam in 1965. During that window of truce, two high school graduates, Joan and Jean Ruble,

enlisted in the Marine Corps.

"I saw the recruiting poster and wanted to see the world," recalled Joan. "We come from a family of nine, didn't have a lot of money, and lived in Denver, Colorado" said Jean. "Joan came home saying she was joining the Marines, and I said, 'I'll go with you.'The Marines gave us the experience of growing up while we served our country."

Their first airplane trip was to Washington, D.C. They continued by train to South Carolina, heading for Parris Island Marine Basic Training Camp. "The train had mostly men and wo-

men heading for boot camp. We killed time playing cards and had several conversations with them," remembered Joan smiling as she spoke.

Upon arrival at boot camp, the women remembered sergeants yelling. They shouted that there was no escape because the alligators would eat them. Tired from travel, the recruits dropped their bags and immediately heard shouting to pick up the bags – they would be told when to drop them.

"We were scared to death, but had each other," Joan said.

Barrack life was very different from home. "We went from nine to 500," said Jean. "There were barrack duties, and we competed with each

ost Americans believed that our coun- other. Joan always got an excellent. We got up at 4 a.m. and marched. There were insects and if we scratched, we had to do pushups. We didn't have weapons training, but there was the gas house that we went into with masks."

> The women learned about the social norms of living in the South during the 1950s. "We befriended a black girl in our barracks," Jean said. "We all went to lunch off base and the server refused us. We were in uniform, too. We never experienced segregation before."

> During graduation, Jean recalled how she met the general who asked her if she wanted to be stationed with her sister. Joan said, 'Yes,' Jean said. "The general told her not to answer my question," Jean recalled.

From a class of more than 500, only 26 graduated.

Jean and Joan, known among their fellow Security Patrol volunteers, as Ruble One and Ruble Two, were sent to El Toro and Santa Ana, Calif. Since America wasn't at war during their service, only office jobs were available. Joan was assigned as a base locator for Marines and Jean was assigned to preparing documents for Marine Intelligence, which were sent to Washington, D.C.

"We felt very special just being Marines. I know our parents were, too," Jean said.

Jean and Joan were honorably discharged in 1961 and 1960, respectively. They married and had separate lives in different states. Thirteen years ago, Jean Ruble Mohler and Joan Ruble Keltner came to Sun City Summerlin.

"One day we were leaving Desert Vista and I noticed a white car with Security Patrol on the side. I stopped Lottie Tabor (a Security Patrol member) and asked her about it. That's how we joined Security Patrol," Joan said.

Jean serves as a watch commander and a dispatcher; both ladies drive a regular shift midnight to 4 a.m. At Security Patrol, they are affectionately known as "The Twins."

Keep Our Sun City Summerlin Pools Clean, Healthy and Safe for Everyone

esides being fun, aquatic exercise supports quality of life. Here at Sun City, we love our pools and want them safe and healthy for everyone. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) have found people using shared pool facilities downplay the "shared" part and overestimate a pool's chemicals power. Of particular concern is that across the United States, the incidence of recreational water infections (RWIs) associated with swimming pools and spas has nearly quadrupled in the last decade. RWIs can be quite serious, and one outbreak can affect many people.

The CDC has created a strategic national plan to prevent RWIs.

Sun City Summerlin is not immune to RWIs. However, the good news is that we can reduce our risk substantially by improving our understanding of these germs and complying with Nevada State laws regarding using shared pools and spas:

- Shower hair and body before getting into the pool or spa, even if you don't plan to get fully submerged. Germs hitch a ride to get into the water. Also, lotions, powders, perfumes, makeup and deodorant washes off and mixes in the water, changing the pH and rendering pool chemicals less effective.
- Don't urinate or defecate in the water. Stay out of the water if you have diarrhea, and wait at least two weeks after it clears before returning to the water. Some germs, like Cryptosporidium, are spread via fecal contamination. "Crypto" is

resistant to chlorine and can live for several days in properly treated pool water. Adding enough chemicals to kill these germs can make the water toxic to people. Also, urine can mix with pool chemicals to form toxic by-products that irritate airways and skin.

- Don't swallow the water. Gastro-intestinal germs spread through fecal and oral routes.
- For your own safety, if you have wounds, sores, rashes or any opening in the skin you are prohibited from the pools and spas until healed. Openings in the skin are like mini-freeways for germs to directly access your bloodstream. If you have a non-contagious skin condition that looks like a rash, contact the Fitness Department for guidance prior to heading to the pool or spa.

What if I have a medical device?

Medical devices and ports have their own health concerns. Plus, pool chemicals, water and heat all affect these devices. Persons who have any type of implanted or adhesive medical port or device should consult with the Fitness Department about health risks and best practices for using shared pools.

Even though pool chemicals and filtration do a great job of disinfecting and cleaning the water, it's best to practice safety. As Benjamin Franklin once said, "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure."

Charli's Corner

Rethinking How You Condition Your Abdominals

our abdominal muscles are an important part of your core muscles, which are used for all kinds of daily activities. If you're only using the ab crunch machine to work your abdominals, then you are missing out on conditioning in two more planes of motion – side to side and rotational movement.

Here are a few exercises to add to your workout that will help improve your abdominal and core strength:

Standing Arm and Leg Extension: While holding onto a counter or back of a chair, lift one hand overhead and the opposite leg behind you while drawing in your abs. Hold the position for 10 seconds, then switch the hand and leg. Repeat five times on each side. Your goal is to balance without holding on to anything. This exercise helps improve your posture, strengthen your lower back and increases the range of motion for your shoulders.

Planks: Lay on your stomach on the floor, lift your upper body and place your elbows on the





floor. Extend your legs back with while keeping your knees and toes on the floor. Lift your stomach off the floor by pulling your belly toward your spine. Hold for 5 to 10 seconds, then rest and repeat 5 times. Slowly build your time in the plank position. For more of a challenge, lift your knees off the floor.

Rotation: Standing with a medicine ball or dumbbell held close to your body, stabilize your hips and rotate your upper torso to each side. Do 10 reps on each side. For more of a challenge, hold the weight further away from your body.

I'm not exactly a "health nut" in the sense that I don't stick to regimented physical fitness training, nor do I deprive myself of occasionally binging on fast foods. But, I can proudly say that I have accomplished more than the average individual when it comes to physically demanding activities.

Despite two rotator cuff surgeries, degenerative lumbar spine arthritis, sciatica and knee problems, I continue to exercise to keep up my strength. I am not a vegan, nor do I abstain from alcohol. I believe in moderation. So far, this has been working for me. At my age, I really do not have any serious health problems and believe activity keeps me young!

Carlos and Trinidad enjoy living in Sun City and working out daily at the community fitness centers.

"I certainly believe that exercise leads to a better life," said Carlos, who spends time on the treadmill and Elliptical when he's not walking with his wife. Both enjoy getting out in the fresh air and walking.

"I'm a military retiree. I was a medic in the Marine Corps., where they forced you to be physical," Carlos said with a giggle. "It was where I got into shape. My father died at 51 of a stroke, and ever since then I wanted to live longer than that."

In May, Carlos completed his second Santiago de Compostela pilgrimage. The journey, in honor of St. James, is a 500-mile hike from St. Jean Pied de Port, France, to Santiago de Compstela, Spain. Carlos embarked on the adventure with only a backpack, traversing mountains, forests, along highways, medieval cities and rustic villages in rain, mud, dust and other natural challenges. He completed the journey in 33 days.

"My wife joined me for the last 70 miles of the walk," he said.

When he turned 60, Carlos celebrated his birthday in the Andes Mountains on a four-day hike of the Inca Trail to Machu Picchu, Peru,



This month's Now & Then is a little different. It's not about buildings or scenery and how they've changed during our 28 years, it's about hard work, informing people and a lot of volunteerism - components that make up the Link, Sun City Summerlin's official monthly magazine.

Since the Link first debuted in October 1990, the magazine has grown from a two-page, black and white newsletter to a full-color, 80-page glossy magazine, a website (www.suncitylink.com) and an annual advertising event sponsored by the magazine.

As our community grew, the publication followed suit. The Link features official meeting minutes from the monthly Board of Directors' meeting, news on SCSCAI standing committees and departments, spotlights on clubs, features on fascinating residents, original photography and more. Over the years, many residents have contributed to the production of the magazine by lending their expertise in their respective fields from printing, proofreading and writing to advertising, teaching and photography. The Link is organized within Sun City Summerlin as an advisory committee. SCSCAI's executive director is the editor of the Link and receives policy direction from the Board of Directors. The managing editor handles the day-to-day operations.

In 2011, the magazine began a growth spurt that boosted the page count and revenue. Today, the Link is responsible for generating \$500,000 in ad revenue with a profit of roughly \$150,000 that goes into the Association's treasury. The Link is 100 percent supported by advertising dollars that cover the cost of paper, printing, mailing and production. No resident dues are used to produce the magazine.

While most publications in the U.S. operate on a 60-40 ratio, where 60 percent of the pages are reserved for advertising and 40 percent is relegated to editorial coverage, the Link reverses the standard. In the Link, 40 percent of the magazine is reserved for ad space and 60 percent covers editorial.

Over the past year, the Link was accepted as a member of the Nevada Press Association. The NPA is the professional trade organization for news publications in the state. It was officially organized in 1924, and is dedicated to protecting the First Amendment, supporting fellowship among publications and encouraging the elevation of journalistic standards and promoting the value of advertising.

Aside from the two-and-a-half-member paid staff (Jeannette Carrillo, ME; Dianne Lowe, ad coordinator; and Jeff Young, designer), resident volunteers make up the editorial board and contribute much of their time and talents to the monthly products. Current volunteers are Bob Cohen, Adrian Cole, Tammy Collins, Dr. Mitch Fadem, Stu Gershon, Ellen Greenspan, Karen Luksich, DJ Minella, Beth Nappe and Aileen Zsenyuk.

Do You Know? How to Start a Club

Do you know how to start a new club in Sun City Summerlin? The process is not difficult. Fifty residents are required for a non-craft club, while only 25 residents are needed to begin a craft-oriented group. If you have an idea for a new club for Sun City, guidelines for establishing a new group are available in SCSCAI'S governing documents. It is also advisable to make an appointment prior to beginning your efforts with Melissa Spina, community services manager, or her assistant Janine Lowen to help make the process go smoothly.

To access the governing documents online, go to: scscai.com and click on "Governing Documents" in the menu on the left-hand side of the home page. Most helpful are "SCSCAI Rules and Regulations" and the "CCOC 2017 Procedures Manual-2017."

The office of Community Services is located at the front of the Desert Vista Community Center, across the hall from the Social Monitor's desk.

If you're looking for other residents who might be interested in joining your club startup, you may place a classified ad in the Link. Only Sun City residents may place classified ads, and the cost is \$2 per line. In the past, this method has been helpful in the startup effort of several existing clubs.

Once there is a significant number of residents interested in the purpose/activity of your new club, a room for those interested to meet can be arranged through the Community Services Office. There is no fee to RSVP a room to facilitate this one-time introduction meeting.

Often, there are groups that share common interests but do not meet the required minimum number needed to establish a chartered Sun City club. In that case, informal groups are encouraged to meet at social gatherings. If available, The Summit Restaurant can accommodate many of these informal gatherings.

As our Sun City Summerlin evolves to accommodate the interests of new residents, it would be wonderful to see new clubs that promote and encourage these interests.

Informed Delivery by the U.S. Postal Service

In response to a Link magazine article about improved U.S. postal service, a Sun City reader contributed information regarding Informed Delivery, a free mail delivery feature that residents can sign up for. Many may find the service helpful.

A little-known USPS service, Informed Delivery scans all letter-sized mail daily and emails subscribers a copy of the mail they should find in their mailbox later that same day. Residents interested in the program must register at usps.com. After completing a brief identity verification and registering, your username and password will give you immediate access to the Informed Delivery service. Subscribers should begin receiving free notifications within a week.

Free notifications may be accessed by smartphone, tablet or computer. Users can view images of the exterior, address side of incoming letter-sized mail pieces (not the inside contents) by daily email. Using the Informed Delivery service will help Sun City residents to decide if it is necessary to make a special trip to their mailbox or not.

Enrollment in the program is efficient in practice. Not only do recipients know what mail is coming each day, but if the actual mail does not match the morning email, they know what is missing and can take immediate action.

Stolen mail often is the initial step into a worse crime – identity theft, the fastest-growing crime in the nation today.

Please note that clocks will be turned back one hour on Sunday, November 5, triggering earlier darkness.

Fire-fighting Procedures for Controllable Fires

ost people assume that a fire extinguisher is easy to use, but when an actual fire emergency occurs, they learn that using an extinguisher is not as easy as they thought.

According to the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), more than 3,500 Americans die each year in fires, and more than 18,000 are injured. The agency reports that even though a fire extinguisher in the hands of a trained adult can save lives, a majority of homeowners do not know how to use them.

PASS

Pull the pin 2 Aim at the base of the fire 6 feet 6 from side to side 1 to side

Fire extinguishers are only for small fires that are just starting. Experts say that when faced with bigger fires, people should simply flee to safety. According to FEMA, fire doubles every 60 seconds; so the longer fighting a fire is delayed, the worse the fire is going to be.

The decision of whether to fight the fire oneself, or to wait for firefighting help must be made according to the type and size of the fire, as well as its location. If there are two people at the scene of a fire, ideally one should work the fire extinguisher while the other calls 9-1-1.

To correctly use a fire extinguisher, experts say that one should remember the acronym P.A.S.S.

P: Pull the pin.

A: Aim at the base of the fire.

S: Squeeze the handle.

S: Sweep at the base of the flame.

When buying a fire extinguisher for your home, choose one that's labeled "ABC," which means it is broad spectrum and can combat different kinds of fires. Also look for the seal of an independent testing organization to make sure the extinguisher is of high quality.

Next, make sure the extinguisher has a gauge that tells you how much of the firefighting chemical is left in the container. Get the largest, heaviest fire extinguisher you can comfortably handle, so you will have more fire-fighting power. Store your fire extinguishers near the exits of the rooms they are in, so you can fight the fire from a location where there's a clear path to get out.

Know both your limits and the fire extinguisher's limits.

The best way to think of a fire extinguisher is as an aid in getting out of a fire alive rather than as a device to completely douse a fire.

Periodically inspect your extinguishers to determine if they need to be recharged or replaced. Look at the gauge to see if there is ammunition left. Fire extinguishers should be recharged or replaced after each use. When using a portable extinguisher, always keep your back to an exit that is free from fire, allowing you a clear path to escape.

t the Board of Directors' October 3 meetng, a motion was passed to amend the
language in Sun City Summerlin
Community Association, Inc.'s, Rules and Regulations, Article IV regarding the serving and consuming of alcohol in and on SCSCAI property.
A motion also was carried to amend the language in the Chartered Clubs and Community
Organization's procedures manual to follow suit.
The new CCOC language is as follows:

"Alcoholic beverages consumed in any Sun City managed restaurant shall be purchased from Sun City licensed staff. During a chartered club function, or other function, alcoholic beverages may be furnished by club members or others, provided the beverage is opened and served by a licensed Sun City employee. Unused portions must be corked and returned, or properly disposed of. All the above shall be in accordance

with the Las Vegas City Ordinance 6071 section 6.50.430."

Committee Chairwoman Barbara Holden suggested that if anyone had any questions or needed clarification, they should be directed to SCSCAI's Executive Director Mitzi Mills or Food and Beverage General Manager Rick Sciacca.

Non-resident Guest Passes

The status of clubs' non-resident guest pass usage allowance was revisited. Of the 79 clubs and organizations in Sun City, eight have elected to change their charters to allow more non-resident guest participation. The majority of the clubs and community organizations had either voted not to make a change or simply had not held a membership vote to make a change.

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NEIGHBOR SMeet Herb Jaffe

Once a Journalist, Always a Writer First and foremost, a journalist's job is to be truthful," said Sun City resident and former journalist Herb Jaffe, who retired in 1995 from The Star-Ledger of Newark, N.J., after almost 40 years as a journalist. He was the legal affairs editor at the time of his retirement. He was also an op-ed columnist and an investigative reporter.

"Tell it exactly the way it is and use every means possible to assure the reader that all efforts have been taken to guarantee that what



he or she is reading is news that is totally accurate, to the best of the reporter's ability," said Jaffe. "Old school journalism dictates and demands that you do it that way. As a working journalist in print media for all of my life, accuracy and objectivity have been my credo."

Jaffe covered sporting events during his first 12 years at The Star-Ledger, including Major League Baseball, pro football, boxing and indoor track.

In his career, Jaffe has been nominated twice for the Pulitzer Prize.

Michael Chertoff, who was then U.S. Attorney for New Jersey and subsequently became the second secretary of Homeland Security under the presidency of George W. Bush, nominated Jaffe for his first Pulitzer in the mid-1980 for his investigate articles that exposed organized crime elements to the midnight dumping of toxic waste in landfills, forests, lakes and other clean waters.

"I was also nominated for a Pulitzer in the

early 1980s by my managing editor Andy Stasiuk," said Jaffe, for his ongoing investigate effort involving a prominent New Jersey health insurance company that had been fleecing elderly people by using scare tactics.

"My entry (for the first Pulitzer) came in second that year in the Pulitzer's investigative journalism category," said Jaffe. "Normally, only the winner is announced. But my editor at The Star-Ledger was one of the Pulitzer judges that year. Because of my entry, he had to recuse himself from voting in the investigate category, but he knew where the entries finished, and he told me I came in second."

Jaffe also received a commendation from Congress for his investigative revelations on Nazi war criminals who found haven in the U.S.

When not behind his newsroom desk, Jaffe could be found as a commentator for the WWOR-TV Channel 9 (New York) weekly half-hour program, "Nine on New Jersey."

But chronicling the life of a reporter is never easy and far, far reaching as journalists work around the clock. In addition to time spent researching story ideas and composing the lead to tomorrow's story in the middle of the night, Jaffe spent five years as an adjunct assistant professor of journalism at New York University, wrote freelance articles for magazines and served as a member of the New Jersey Supreme Court Media Relations Committee from 1977 to 1995 and was a member of the U.S. District Court Civil Justice Evaluations Committee in N.J., 1994-95.

In retirement, Jaffe spends his time enjoying the lifestyle he and his wife, Fran, have found in Sun City Summerlin; the couple settled here in 1995. Today, Jaffe writes an op-ed column for the Summerlin View section of the Las Vegas Review-Journal and, close to his heart, has penned five novels, "Falling Dominoes," "One At A Time," "All For Nothing," "Double Play" and "My Journey Home," all stories that, one way or another, trace their origins to his wide variety of experiences.



MODEL BUILDERS

Railroad Realism in HO Scale

ne of the oldest clubs in Sun City Summerlin is the Model Builders Club. Since 1994, at their Desert Vista facilities, the model builders have turned out model airplanes (many are radio-controlled), boats and intricate model ships, doll houses with all the furniture and, of course, the popular HO model railroad layout.

Under the first Club President, L.B. Smith, Del Webb donated the workshop and provided \$10,000 for tools and ancillary equipment to be used by all members. Membership rolls show that 66 Sun City residents joined the club in those first early years.

Today, some of our Club members have grown the club to serve the community by holding seminars on wooden model ship construction techniques and procedures. Also, the Club's dollhouse builders have made themselves available to introduce Sun City residents to their hobby. And, some of the Club's radio-controlled airplane builders can be found at local model airfields learning or instructing the art of radio-flying. But, the Club's prominent Desert Vista display has always been the HO train layout.

Built in 1995 by 18 members and subsequently (under the direction of members Fred Vincent and Peter Koppe) the train layout was totally re-designed in 2006. Visitors can drop by the clubroom to look at the fascinating panorama the members fashioned and now maintain on a daily basis. The layout has been aptly named "Lone Mountain Railroad."

In 2012, the club's newly appointed Director of Trains, Howard Kardonsky, began a new program of additions and improvements to the HO design. With the help of Pete Koppe, Dick Edmister and Rich Augulis, the crew made substantial enhancements to the railroad. The underlying support structure for the entire display was buttressed, a

digital control computer (DCC) was acquired and some of our engines were converted to DCC. In addition, a freightswitching yard was put together, and track and switches were replaced and repaired, and bridges were upgraded.

Recently, members Terry Bateman and Jeff Esber have completed the transition to total DCC. We can now run trains with six locomotives and pulling up to 40 cars!

The way of presenting the HO layout has evolved, too. More realism and a concerted effort to build and operate on more authentic railroading (as opposed to the more shallow toy train mentality) has been adopted by Howard Kardonsky and his model railroader engineers.

The Lone Mountain Railroad has thousands of parts that require skills and knowledge of electrical planning, wood working, scenery construction, as well as knowledge of materials and proper tooling all combined with artistic vision. We're always looking for new members who would like to use their skills to enhance our Lone Mountain Railroad. We're also looking for those who might like to learn model railroading and enjoy the fun of seeing Southern Nevada's largest, privately owned HO model railroad grow.

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



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
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
