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LANDSCAPING

Understanding Summertime Watering

hen watering during the summer you must be careful not to over-water. Over-watering in the summer is the most common killer of plants. Plants will naturally wilt during the hottest part of the day. If your plants wilt a little, don't panic and give them more water. Rather, check and see if they need it first. Over-watering can cause root rot if the plant sits in water, especially in the soil here in Summerlin. You can easily check to see if a plant needs water by digging a small hole on the opposite side of the drip emitter. The first inch or so should be dry, but after that the soil should be moist.

Another way to test the soil is to buy a moisture meter probe at your local home improvement store. You will want to place the probe serval inches down into the dirt to get a reading that more water is needed.







GRAND CANYON CAVERNS & KINGMAN RAILROAD MUSEUM



The Grand Canyon Caverns are the largest dry caverns in the United States, located 200 to 300 feet below the surface. Guests enter and leave the caverns by means of an exploration elevator, dropping 21 stories underground, making the caverns easily accessible. Because the caverns are so deep underground, the temperature is always constant, a mild 56 degrees, and there is zero humidity. The caverns offer a number of unique geological formations that can be easily viewed from smoothly paved walking trails. The walking trails have handrails, and there are a number of benches for resting along the way. THANK YOU FOR YOUR SERVICE

he was born and raised in the farm country of northeastern lowa, the daughter of a veterinarian whose practice focused on farm animals. As a teenager, Margaret Keith often accompanied him on rounds. Eventually, she assisted him in surgery learning how to suture by watching him perform. Thus began a love affair with medicine. But these were the 1930s and the most practical route for a woman was nursing.

"In 1940, I entered nurses training at St. Luke's Hospital in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, and followed the normal curriculum; that is with affiliate courses being taken at nearby Coe College. In late 1941, everything changed. Our Coe classes were to be accelerated to clear the way for Coe to become a cadet training center for pre-flight candidates. Hundreds of young men arrived at Coe and our classes were staggered to fit their schedule. We now realized that our participation in the war was imminent," Margaret recalled.

There were other changes, some subtle, some not, Margaret said, remembering how recruiting posters began appearing at strategic points in the hospital and at nurses' homes. The entire instruction program changed. New medical terminology came into play. The emergency room became a triage area and all emergencies were handled in a military manner with weekly drills established by the government.

"The last 18 months of our accelerated training was service-oriented and we were made aware that it was our duty to serve our country and that we were needed," she said. "After graduation, in June 1943, I took the state boards in Des Moines and immediately volunteered for duty and reported for an Army physical at Fort Des Moines. Fort Des Moines was a WAC (Women's Army Corps) training center and the streets were full of women drilling. The atmosphere was that of a country at war."

Margaret was commissioned as a 2nd Lieutenant and reported to Wright Patterson field in Ohio on December 23, 1943, as a Regular Army Nurse.

'A snow storm enhanced our arrival, which was already memorable with 1,800 nurses reporting on the same day for basic training," Margaret recalled. "Some of the men's barracks had been converted for our use - 120 women to a floor!"

"Shower and bath use was by number and time slot. The very next day, we were issued our uniforms—white and blue clothing with the traditional blue cape. We had Christmas Day off, but basic training began at 5 a.m. on the 26th.

As their training began, Margaret said the drill sergeant immediately explained to them how they would undergo regular combat training, which meant crawling under barbed wire while under machine gun fire, scaling rope walls, and drill, drill and drill some more.

"RKO and Pathe news were there taking newsreels. There was no question that we were in the Army now," Margaret said.

By 7 a.m., the nurses were in their nurse-issue uniforms and ready to begin their 12-hour hospital shifts. Meals were served in the hospital mess hall. Pretty standard stuff, but there was one special event Margaret said she never forgot.

"Every noon, high-ranking medical officers would eat in the mess hall. The building was heated and cooled by units that hung quite low from the ceiling. The fans would circulate on and off thermostatically controlled.

"As I carried my tray to my seat, the heat came on with full velocity. That, in turn, whipped my nurse's cap off and in horror I watched it sail directly into a colonel's soup. I shall never forget watching him lift the cap out and seeing the starch run into his soup! I couldn't stop because there was a line behind me. A mess hall attendant retrieved the cap and brought it to me in an empty soup bowl."

After basic training was completed, Margaret was assigned to flight nurse training in Louisville, Ken., under the direction of former commercial flight stewardesses who were RNs. The aircraft used were C-47s with the interiors stripped and straps for hanging litters installed.

"My first orders were to Tinker Air Force Base in Oklahoma," Margaret said. "We were transported by train, assigned to a Pullman car. Frederick March, the actor, was on our car and insisted on having our meals brought to the

Pullman as his treat. For a girl from lowa, that was something special. Once we arrived at Tinker we were taken to our quarters, which, to our surprise, were private rooms with only six nurses sharing a bath. What a luxury!"

The work day primarily involved training medics for overseas combat duty. The men were from all over the U.S. with language dialects from Maine to California to the Deep South. Another new experience for an lowa girl.

The base hospital was fully equipped with everything from operating rooms to labs, a pharmacy, dental clinics and clergy. The patients were primarily base personnel – pilots, flight maintenance personnel and WACs. There were a wide range of surgeries performed, everything from appendectomies to broken bones.

"There were quite a bit of mental evaluations as men used all kinds of ploys to get discharged under Section 8 to avoid overseas duty," Margaret said. "A normal work day began at 6:30 a.m. when you reported to the night nurse for

report, narcotic count and key exchange. Morning was generally devoted to teaching medics. The afternoon was dedicated to teaching emergency hospital setup in battle zones, first aid, injections, etc. Between 5 and 7 p.m., we did charting in the wards, reports to the night nurse and again narcotic count and key exchange. We did that for 27 straight days and then had three days off."

In 1944, Margaret said the nurses had a new medicine added to their arsenal – penicillin. It worked well against venereal disease. Unfortunately, it

was one of the main usages. Unfortunate for several reasons, including the fact that there were so many patients. The drug came in powder form that had to be hand-mixed with sterile water. VD patients required injections every three hours around the clock. Many nurses, including Margaret, became allergic to the drug through breathing the fumes during mixing.

In 1944, all air base nurses became part of the Army Air Corps, thus requiring a complete change of uniforms. Gone were the blue and white of traditional nurse uniforms and in were the brown and white and, of course, olive drab.

"USO troops came to the base often," Margaret said. "Kay Francis, Rudy Vallee, Bing Crosby and Bob Hope, among them. When that happened, we had officer's club duties, which required full dress uniform and receiving line duty to greet the guests."

As the war progressed, Tinker AFB would handle more and more patients coming in from the combat zones for transfer to base hospitals near home. From the European Theater they were often the first stop from Warner Robbins, Ga. Flight nurses and medics cared for up to 30 patients per plane. "We transported them to our hospital by

ambulance, bathed them, changed dressings and administered IVs. By 7 a.m., they were back on the plane while we decontaminated and readied the wards for the next arrivals. Wounded from the South Pacific usually stopped at Hickam Field in Hawaii first. More often than not, they were diagnosed with mental conditions, jungle rot and malnutrition. Many of them were survivors of the Bataan death march and internment in Japanese POW camps. Included were nurses who had been raped and severely abused, including some who had their tongues out! "They were given separate accommodations and special care," Margaret said.

About this time, Margaret was promoted to 1st Lt. with a monthly salary of \$175.

On April 12, 1945, President Theodore Roosevelt died. It was a sad day for all Americans, but the war was continuing and the wounded kept arriving. In addition, babies were still being delivered and base personnel were still

getting sick. On top of all this, Oklahoma City was devastated by a tornado and the base hospital was being used for treatment of injured civilians.

Four months later, the war was over.

"In November, I was the first woman discharged from McClellan AFB in California," Margaret said. "The flight surgeon conducting the discharge assumed he had a room filled with men and said, 'We'll make this fast fellows. Please strip to the waist,' which brought a fast

response from those who realized a woman was in the group. I was sent to the base hospital for my discharge physical."

At the time of her discharge, Margaret was up for promotion to captain and was offered the opportunity to attend Pennsylvania Women's Medical School, a dream her father always held for her. But she declined both offers," she recalled, saying "I had been married in January of that year and another phase of my life was about to begin."

Margaret met Byron when he was a patient at her hospital, but it wasn't then that their romance started. Months after his discharge, Byron, who was a flight engineer, returned to the hospital to visit friends. A coworker invited Byron and Margaret to dinner at her house. Months later, when the co-worker's first child was born, Margaret and Byron, who happened to be in town, were invited to meet the new arrival. Then the romance blossomed, culminating in a marriage that lasted until Byron's passing in 2011.

After the war, Margaret continued her career in nursing, working at Mercy Hospital in Sacramento. Margaret retired in 1974. She and Byron moved to Sun City in 1989.

I hold several certifications in group exercise with a focus on aging fitness.





DID YOU KNOW THAT SUN CITY HAS 2 OUTDOOR WALKING TRACKS?

Living in the desert is hot ... and cold. But, if you have lived here for a while, you've probably noticed that just before the summer heat and winter chill kicks in, Mother Nature gives us about 4 weeks of gorgeous weather on the cusps of each season. And those are the days when taking your exercise routine outdoors makes the most sense. During the rest of the year, prime walking times can be enjoyed in the early mornings and just after sunset.

In Sun City, residents have two outdoor walking tracks that are open 24/7, year round. They are located at opposite ends of the community. So, no matter where you live, you will be close to one of them. Each track is a quarter-mile in distance, and each track has ample parking located nearby.

Residents can find one walking track behind the Mountain Shadows Fitness Center. The track is shaded by mature trees, so you'll always get a break from the sun, no matter what time of day you head out. The track's surface was newly painted last year and the special surface provides a smooth, even path. A unique feature of the Mountain Shadows track is the pull-out exercise areas. If you're looking to change up your walking routine, the pull-outs offer instruction on exercises to help work your arms and more.

At the Pinnacle, the cement track circles the softball field and features elevation changes. Whereas the walking track at Mountain Shadows is relatively flat, the Pinnacle track features uphill and downhill slopes.

It's no wonder walking is a popular exercise in Sun City.

Learn How to Turn Off Water Service to Your Home

CPC's instructors were overwhelmed by the number of Sun City residents who wanted to attend home safety classes that were held in January. The hands-on class was limited to 30 residents. The committee took more than 100 calls from additional residents wanting to attend the emergency safety classes. The room size was expanded and three more classes were scheduled at Desert Vista. Still, CPC was unable to accommodate everyone. One final class is set for July 10.

water district technician arrived soon with tools to turn off the water.

In Sun City, the primary water line for a residence is under the concrete slab. In Angela's case it had burst. The point where the water escaped was under the bathroom wall, where damage was extensive and repairs were costly.

Since that night I have learned a great deal about how to stop water leaks and the tools to use. I also know there are significant responsibil-



The late-night call came from Angela frantically reporting that a geyser of water was erupting through the bathroom wall that was common with her neighbor's. Angela's residence was rapidly flooding. The initial assessment was that the neighbor had a broken water main, but no one was home on that side of the wall.

Thanks to my CPC training, I knew that the shut-off valve for each residence in Sun City is in the sidewalk, approximately lined up with the front door. So, I grabbed a screwdriver to lift the vault cover and quickly discovered the bad news for Angela. The neighbor's water meter showed no movement. I opened the vault to Angela's service and observed the meter dial spinning like a top; the broken line belonged to Angela. A



ities associated with turning off water service to a home. Lessons learned have been incorporated into community preparedness classes for Sun City residents. If there is a crisis, there are practical emergency responses that can be taken until designated responders arrive.

Take Care to Practice Safety When on the Web

Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Detective Sean Taylor enlightened Sun City residents about the darker side of the Internet during a talk presented in May at Desert Vista. Taylor, a detective with Metro's Internet Crimes Task Force, told the group of residents in attendance, "I like to catch bad people who like to catch good people on the Internet." According to the detective, "The Internet is a great tool that offers countless advantages, but beneath the surface it can be treacherous. If we are careless, we create personal vulnerability about which we may be unaware until it is too late." During his presentation, Taylor focused on preventative measures residents can take to resist Internet scammers who often target seniors.

"Refrain from putting personal information on social media. No one needs to know where you live or work," Taylor said. In addition, do not publicize your telephone number or email address. If an offer seems too good to be true, it may be a scam. If you are skeptical, do research before


doing anything else. And always know that the IRS will not ask for personal information from you. Never agree to send payment to anyone if you have not initiated the contact.

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

If It's Summertime, It's Time for House Checks

If you are planning a getaway and would like the house-check service, stop by the Security Patrol base or call 254–2303 for more information.

t is summer in Sun City Summerlin and some residents escaping the heat have requested their house be checked while they are away. It is a simple procedure – the homeowner comes to the Security Patrol base located at the end of the Desert Vista parking lot. The

dispatcher will ask for the owner's Sun City Association photo ID with their membership number. There are a few questions regarding access to the back yard; any persons expected on the property or in the house; the duration away, and a vacation contact with contact information. House checks are performed for 30 days and cannot be renewed by phone.

Tak Matsumoto is one of many Security
Patrol drivers who perform house checks when it is 99 degrees and climbing at 8 a.m.
Tak, a retired financer from New Jersey, has been on the job for six years.

"I want to pay back to this community for the support and welcome I received while I was working. It is a thank you. I enjoy greeting people as I patrol." Tak said. Tak walked all the streets in Sun City before taking Security Patrol's driver's training. "I wanted to be able to know where the streets were located to respond quickly in emergencies."

Recently, this writer accompanied Tak while he performed house checks.

"The most important house check is the first one," said Tak. "Sometimes, the resident is in a hurry and leaves a window or door unlocked. When we see this, it is necessary to call the vacation contact who has a key so that the window or door can be secured."

Tak, who is also a driver trainer, has a strategy he follows and teaches for doing house checks. He starts by parking the Patrol car so it can be seen from the front door. Then he rings the bell announcing, "Security Patrol doing house check." The resident may have stated on the request form that the housekeeper or a guest may be in the residence. But sometimes a resident will forget to put that information on the house check request form.

While at the front door, Tak checks the door and windows in the front and makes sure that the screens have not been disturbed. He continues this process circling the residence.

"There are large scrubs in front of some windows and we have to get close to the window to make sure the latch is securing the window," he said. For safety, the driver must observe electrical wires, tree roots and branches, rocks, and irrigation lines. By the time a house check is completed, Patrol officers can be covered in leaves. It's all part of the job.

"One very important part of a house check is to make sure there aren't any vehicles parked close to the house," said Tak. "If there are workers in neighborhood, I'll come back for the house check. The presence of a Patrol car can send a message that the house is vacant."

In the summer months, each Patrol volunteer on the 0800 shift can have as many as 14 house checks. That takes up most of the four-hour shift. Security Patrol officers are armed with a radio, a clip board and water – lots of water.

Tak continued: "One year I had 38 house checks to perform because a driver was unable to come in for his shift."

House checks performed by Security Patrol volunteers provide a measure of security while residents are on vacation. The requests for a house check with the signature of the resident gives permission for the volunteers to enter the property. Patrol volunteers will put packages and newspapers in a secure area away from the front door. Items left on the walkway or at the front door can signal that the house is unoccupied and prone to burglary.

he SCS Men's Club has passed the five-year anniversary mark and the Club is already one of the most active at Sun City. Each month the Club has a happy hour, a nature walk/lunch, an afternoon discussion group, poker games, a Sunday coed brunch and discussion breakfast at Egg Works. All this in addition to its monthly membership breakfast meeting at Desert Vista. The group also plans interesting outings, trips and events. In the past, Club members have visited Sheri's Ranch, the Clark County Coroner's Office, the Tanked Company, Rick's Restoration and the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department's crime lab. Some activities are men-only, but many are coed to help develop special friendships among members and their significant others. This club is always doing something fun.

Last fall, the Club arranged a bus trip to the Nevada Nuclear Test Site at Mercury, Nev. The group of 54 was picked up by a very comfortable bus at the Pinnacle, and members enjoyed the 90-minute ride to the site, passing Creech Air Force Base, where we were lucky to see a fabulous USAF drone doing touch-downs in training activities. It was very, very impressive (and to realize that this is where USAF pilots fly the drones fighting in Afghanistan and other locations).

Before the Test Site visit, we had to arrange security clearances 30 days in advance. When we arrived at the site, we were subjected to intensive security checks. No cameras, no phones, no electronics were permitted. Only those who were cleared in advance were allowed to enter, and we were watched by armed military personnel that took security very seriously. What a tour we had!

Our bus took us from location to location (the NNTS is a

huge area of multiple testing sites, a test farm, an enormous nuclear waste storage facility and some very high secret areas). There is a small town area on the site that was used for housing and other support services like a post office, a commissary, recreational areas, etc. The bus picked up our boxed lunches at the commissary and we toured a number of sites where nuclear bombs were tested. We saw the aboveand below-ground test areas, and we saw photos of folks watching the massive explosions from the Las Vegas Strip years ago - the explosions lit up the skies that were viewed from many miles away. Some of the craters were small and close together, others were big enough to drive through (our bus actually did drive us into a crater, where we could experience the enormity of that place). We learned a lot about the previous activities conducted there, including the farm where animals were raised to be exposed to bomb radiation for testing, along with the buildings and furniture that also was exposed to bomb radiation for observation.

We drove past a highly secured road leading to some somber buildings that appeared to be the site of some very top-secret activities.

All in all, club members who attended the tour were most grateful to the Nevada Nuclear Test Site. We learned so much and had a wonderful day exploring with SCSMC friends. This was certainly a wonderful experience for members to share.







Action 01/09/2018 – 2 – Disposal by Auction of (2) Maintenance Trucks - At the January 9, 2018, Board of Directors meeting the Board approved the disposal of 2 maintenance trucks by public auction. The staff is to research and establish a minimum bid. June 19, 2018, Update: To avoid auctioneer fees

on these items we will be auctioning these as-is vehicles to the community and staff by closed bid. An email notice will be sent out to the community. The vehicles will be located at the Mountain Shadows parking lot for viewing. Envelopes for sealed bids will be available at the membership desk. In Progress.

- 2. Action 02/06/2018 2 Reserve Study At the February 6, 2018, Board of Directors meeting the Board of Directors made a motion to table the RFP for a reserve study until the March 6, 2018, Board meeting, which would give Ms. Mills and the Finance Committee the opportunity to review the proposals and make a recommendation to the Board of Directors. 3/5/2018 Update - the Finance Committee was canceled in February in order to give the accounting staff the opportunity to get caught up on their duties and prepare the January financial statement. This meant that the reserve study proposals also did not get reviewed by the Finance Committee. I have prepared a comparison analysis of all 4 bids received for the Board to review at the March 6, 2018, Board meeting. I am hoping that since "time is of the essence" and in March the committee appointments are made, that the Board will be able to review the material and feel comfortable choosing a contractor at the March 6, 2018, Board meeting. 4/3/2018 Update - The Finance Committee met in April and after reviewing the proposals from four companies, narrowed their recommendation down to two of the contractors. The Finance Committee made and unanimously approved a motion for the Executive Director to consider the two finalists and make a recommendation of her preference at the April 3, 2018, Board of Directors meeting for Board consideration. At the April 3, 2018, Board of Directors meeting the Executive Director gave a report on each of the companies and the reasoning for the company recommended. The Board of Directors approved the recommendation of Complex Solutions in an amount not to exceed \$37,500. May 1, 2018, Update: Staff members will be meeting with the reserve study specialist in the first two weeks of May to start the process. June 19, 2018, Update: The Executive Director and directors of all departments met with the owner and a representative from Complex Solutions on May 22, 2018, for introductions and to discuss expectations and needs. There was also a discussion on what was left out of past reserve studies that has caused issues for the department directors when they are trying to plan for the future. The reserve study will start the week of June 18th and will begin with Golf Maintenance. In Progress
- 3. Action 03/06/2018 2 Rewrite of the Clubs and Community Organization Manual. At the March 6, 2018, Board of Directors meeting, Board member Barbara Holden submitted to the Board a proposed rewrite of the Clubs and Community Organizations Manual from the Clubs and Community Organizations Committee. The Board tabled a decision on this item until the April 3, 2018, Board of Directors meeting. At the April 3, 2018, Board of Directors meeting the Board passed a motion to accept the recommendation of the Clubs and Community Organizations Committee to accept the rewrite of the Organization Manual with the addition that the committee must stay involved and participate in the roll-out of the new manual and the educating of the clubs on the contents. May 1, 2018, Update: The final forms are being put in the manual and then it will be posted on the Sun City Web page. A chartered club presidents meeting is scheduled for the end of the month. June 19, 2018, Update: The final forms were added to the manual. A

meeting of the club presidents and other officers of the clubs was held on May 21, 2018. The Clubs were well represented with more than 75% of the 80-plus Clubs in attendance. One change came out of the meeting and that was a modified travel release to allow members of clubs that do a lot of travel to fill the form out one time. In Progress.

- 4. Action 04/03/2018 1 Change from Century Link to Cox Communications. At the April 3, 2018, Board of Directors meeting the Board approved the recommendation of the Information Technology Committee to change from Century Link to Cox Communications for all of our Internet needs. The cost for these services will increase from \$3,000 a month to \$3,500 a month and are reflected in the 2018/2019 approved budget. Contracts have been executed. The pre-install for Mountain Shadows and Highland Falls is complete, and all other locations are proceeding per the schedule. Cox is waiting to get the permits to run the fiber optics. June 19, 2018, Update: Pinnacle/Summit will be completed by the beginning of July. Desert Vista, Highland Falls and Mountain Shadows are still pending permits and construction is estimated to begin at the end of August. Palm Valley - the site survey is in process. This had to be repeated because of the irrigation project to make sure there are no conflicts. Sun Shadow construction is completed. Cox to visit site on June 16, 2018, and their (Cox) equipment will be installed and activated. The next step is the connection of our existing equipment and we should be done with this location by the week of June 18, 2018. Construction entails the digging, trenching and installation of fiber optics. In Progress.
- 5. Action 04/24/2018 1 2018/2019 Budget. At the April 24, 2018, Board of Directors meeting the Board approved a motion to accept the 2018/2019 Operating, Reserve and Capital Budgets as recommended by the Finance Committee. May 1, 2018, Update: The Board of Directors established June 19, 2018, as the Board meeting that the budget will be ratified. June 19, 2018, Update: A letter to the homeowners with summary budget information and notification of the meeting date was included in the June Link Magazine. This served as official notification to the unit owners of the June 19, 2018, Board meeting to ratify the budget. The budget is deemed ratified, unless at the meeting a majority of all unit owners reject the budget. In Progress.
- **6.** Action 05/01/2018 1 Palm Valley Golf Course Irrigation Project. At the May 1, 2018, Board of Directors meeting the Board approved the bid from Heritage Links for the Palm Valley Irrigation Project front nine at a cost not to exceed \$1,950,000 as recommended by the Golf Oversight Committee and Finance Committee. June 19, 2018, Update: The project is scheduled to begin on June 18, 2018. The pipe for the whole project has been delivered and the rest of the equipment and supplies will be delivered as the project progresses. The contractor will start on Hole #1 and we will progress in order. Construction will be from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m., Monday through Saturday. On Hole #5, we will only be updating the water source and the control of the heads as the main work was done last year as a test for this project. In addition to the Irrigation Project, as each hole is completed the turf in the fairways and around the greens will have new sod added where needed. This project is estimated to be completed by September 17, 2018. In Progress.
- 7. Action 05/01/2018 2 Rental Policy. At the May 1, 2018, Board of Directors meeting there was discussion on if the Association should retain a database of the names and contact information of those residents who are renting property in Sun City Summerlin. In addition, it was suggested that consideration be given to the cost of an activity card for those residents who are renting. The Board deferred this item to the Legal Services Committee and the Executive Director for discussion. June 19, 2018, Update: At the Legal Services Committee on June 13, 2018, this item was discussed in detail. It was determined that the Committee first needed to establish the need and what they wanted to accomplish. It was also decided that before taking action staff would research and report how many offsite owners we have and of those

how many have renters who have provided the necessary information and payment and received an activity card. In Progress.

- **8.** Action 05/01/2018 3 Purchase of Club Cart for Painting. At the May 1, 2018, Board of Directors meeting the Board approved a motion to purchase a Club Cart to be utilized by Building Maintenance for painting. The cost of the club cart is \$8,983.67 and will be purchased from Golf Cars Etc. June 19, 2018, Update: The cart has been ordered and should arrive the week of June 18, 2018. In Progress.
- 9. Action 5/01/2018 4 Repair of the Sound System in the Desert Vista Ballroom. At the May 1, 2018 Board of Directors meeting the Board approved a motion to repair the existing sound system in the Desert Vista Ballroom. The cost of the repairs is \$6,585.35 (PO11346) and will be done by Dunamis Electronics. June 19, 2018, Update: The work was completed on Friday, June 8, 2018. The work included changing the system over to digital with its own WIFI. This was important because the WIFI for the building was interfering with microphones and the system. An enlarged screen (operation panel) will make it easier to use. Complete.
- 10.Action 5/01/2018 5 Purchase of a 2018 Ford Fusion for Security Patrol. At the May 1, 2018, Board of Directors meeting the Board approved a motion to escalate the purchase of one 2018 Ford Fusion Hybrid to replace one out-of-service Security Patrol vehicle. June 19, 2018, Update: The car has been purchased; the trade-in turned in. The new car has been licensed and insured, and is being used by Security Patrol. Complete.
- 11.Action 6/1/2018 1 Replacement of the Outside Patio Furniture for Tavern at the Falls. At the June 1, 2018, Board of Directors meeting this item was referred back to the Common Area Properties Committee. The Common Areas Properties Committee met on June 12, 2018, and reviewed the issue. The Committee decided that they would like more research on the use of this area, including drawings, photographs and what the area is used for now and what the intent for future use will be. Staff was asked to do this research as a Conceptual Idea (CI) so that all stakeholders are notified and all appropriate committees are included. Note: This CI will travel to the Common Areas Properties Committee, Golf Oversight Committee and Finance Committee. In Progress.
- 12.Action 6/1/2018 2 Palm Valley Restaurant Tenant. This item was tabled at the June 5, 2018, Board of Directors meeting to give Board members additional time to review the lease and submit comments to the Executive Director. The Letter of Intent was approved at the June 1, 2018, meeting so the prospective tenant could begin the permitting and licensing process. June 19, 2018, Update: The comments submitted by the Board were reviewed by the Restaurant Search Committee and items other than lease amount and security amount were forwarded to the attorney to incorporate. The Restaurant Search Committee, at the direction of the Board, had already negotiated the lease amount and security amount to the best of their ability, and believes they have negotiated the best possible terms based on the economic, demographic and geographical challenges this location faces and the fact that this loss by the Association for this restaurant was in the 6 figures when it was operated by the Association. The lease will be decided at the June 19, 2018, Board meeting. In Progress.
- 13. Action 6/1/2018 3 Sun Shades for Bocci Courts. At the June 5, 2018, Board meeting the Board approved the recommendations from the Common Areas Properties Committee and the Architectural Review Committee to add a shade structure at the Bocci Courts. Material costs not to exceed \$3,000 and labor to be done in-house. June 19, 2018, Update: The work on this project has started. In Progress.
- 14.Action 6/1/2018 4 City Wide Golf Contract Renewal. At the June 5, 2018, Board of Directors meeting the Board approved the recommendation of the Golf Oversight Committee to renew the contract with City Wide Golf at the same price and terms as the current contract. June 19, 2018, Update: The new

contract has been received and we will do a comparison read to make sure all of the terms are the same before having officers of the Board sign it. In Progress.

15.Action 6/1/2018 – 5 – Report by Homeowner of Rats at Hole #5 Highland Falls. At the June 5, 2018, Board of Directors meeting a homeowner reported her concern that when sitting on her patio she sees rats scurrying around the area of the golf course very close to her home. She requested that the Association look into this and take action. June 19, 2018, Update: Immediately following the meeting the Director of Golf Maintenance met with the Director of Landscape Maintenance to determine what the best type of control would be for this area. It was determined that in order to prevent birds or other animals from accessing poison, enclosed bait boxes would be ordered from a company certified to sell such items. On June 12 and 13, 2018, Golf Course Maintenance trimmed and thinned bushes in the area to get rid of hiding and nesting places. They found a nest of rats in the area and removed it and killed the rats. Bait boxes were placed in the known nesting areas. Complete as a Board action – Follow-up needed to re-bait traps and monitor the area.

16.Action 6/1/2018 – 6 – Report by Homeowner that the Draft LOI and Lease for the Palm Valley Restaurant were not on the Sun City Web Page. June 19, 2018, Update: The lease and LOI were added to the Website.

17.Action 6/1/201/ – 7 – Renewal of D&O Insurance. The Board of Directors approved the recommendation from the Insurance Sub-Committee and the Finance Committee that the D&O policy with Ironshore Indemnity be approved for the proposed annual premium of \$72,813. June 19, 2018, Update: Renewal application was signed by Board members and submitted; confirmation of coverage has been received along with the invoice. Complete.

Community Updates as of June 14, 2018

Desert Vista Indoor Spa Salt System – A new salt system was needed for the Desert Vista Indoor Spa. The cost of the system is \$2,567.66 (PO11302) and was budgeted as part of the pool equipment budget. The new system was installed by staff and is up and running.

Desert Vista LED Lighting Retrofit – Our in-house maintenance leadership is preparing to start the LED lighting retrofit at Desert Vista. They are currently preparing information on the quantity and types of lights to be changed to LED. Once this is completed application will be made to NV Energy to qualify for the rebate program. The LED lighting will then be ordered in the Association fiscal year that ends June 30, 2018. The retrofitting will begin in July 2018 and will be one of the many summer projects.

Air Conditioner Maintenance and Start Up – This work is complete.

Desert Vista Tennis Courts and Pickle Ball Courts Windscreen Replacement – All of the windscreens at the Tennis Courts and the one side of the windscreens in the Pickle Ball Courts are in need of replacement following a windstorm that damaged them. The replacement will be done by Superior Courts at a cost of \$5,200. (PO 11338). This is a budgeted expense. The wind screens were ordered the last week of April and we are still waiting for delivery and installation.

Pinnacle Tennis Courts Wind Screens – All of the windscreens at the tennis courts are in need of replacement following a windstorm that damaged them. Since only half were budgeted for we will do half of the replacements now and then replace the remaining half in 2018/2019 budget. The replacement of the first half will be done by Superior Courts at a cost of \$4,200. (PO 11338). The wind screens were ordered the last week of April and we are still waiting for delivery and installation.

Mountain Shadows Tennis Court #3 Resurfacing – This work is complete.

Mountain Shadows Shuffle Board Court Resurfacing - This work is complete.

Sun Shadows – Pool – Cubbies for Shower Area – Our in-house maintenance will be installing cubbies near the outdoor showers for the convenience of our residents so they can place their items in a cubby instead of taking up seating space. The cubbies were ordered from Lincoln Aquatics. The cost of the cubbies is \$1,397.92. This is an unbudgeted expense (PO11355). Still waiting on delivery.

Pinnacle Fitness Center – Addition of a Knee Raise Apparatus Machine – The Common Area Properties Committee approved the purchase of a Knee Raise Apparatus for the Pinnacle Fitness Center at a cost of \$582.13 (PO11351), including delivery, setup and sales tax. This item was not budgeted as new equipment and will be purchased as an unbudgeted expense and added to our reserve fund for future replacement. Equipment will arrive at the company warehouse tomorrow and Director of Fitness Pam Shields will arrange for delivery.

Pinnacle Fitness Center – Addition of a Back Station Apparatus Machine – The Common Area Properties Committee approved the purchase of a Back Station Apparatus Machine for the Pinnacle Fitness Center at a cost of \$1,318.38 (PO11351), including delivery, setup and sales tax. This item was not budgeted as new equipment and will be purchased as an unbudgeted expense and added to our reserve fund for future replacement. Equipment will arrive at the company warehouse tomorrow and Director of Fitness Pam Shields will arrange for delivery.

Desert Vista Picnic Area – This area is in need of cleanup and repair. The area was taken over by rabbits that destroyed the landscape. A fake owl was installed and over the last few months the rabbits have stayed away. The area will now be closed and the grass restored, the area cleaned up and additional plants added as needed. Work should begin right after May 1, 2018, and will take a couple of weeks before the area is opened back up for use. New sod is being put down June 14 and the area should be open by the end of June.

EI Numbers for Chartered Clubs – In order for a business, organization or club to have a bank account, the federal government requires an Employer Identification Number (EIN) or a Social Security Number (SSN) to be submitted to the bank as part of the application. Since club members do not want to tie their person SSN to club activities, the Association EIN was used for all 82 Chartered Clubs. This is not the best way to do business since in reality it would mean that the officers of the Club should be the same as the officers of the Association. In order to remove the confusion and make it easier for Chartered Clubs to do banking, SS-4 EIN applications have been filled out and mailed to the IRS for all Chartered Clubs. These applications cannot be done online and it will take approximately two weeks for each Chartered Club to be assigned its own EIN. This is being done in order to remove the Association EIN from the bank accounts and banking information of each of the Chartered Clubs. We are still waiting for the EIN numbers to arrive from the IRS, once we have them Community Services will distribute them to a Club officer.

Starbright Theatre House Lights – Replacement – The house light controls and dimmer racks at the Starbright Theatre failed and were flickering. The problem could not be solved with adjustments. This is a bank of professional theater lighting (277 volts) and it was determined that the house lighting controls and the dimmer racks would need to be replaced. Our existing equipment is manufactured by Levoton and the Design Concepts, Inc., that is an authorized contractor for Levoton will providing and installing the new controls and racks at a cost of \$6,184. This is a budgeted reserve expense (PO11358). The work will be scheduled to begin once the materials are received. Waiting on parts

Desert Vista Paddle Ball Court Elimination and Pickle Ball Court Resurfacing – Paddle Ball and Pickle Ball shared courts 1 and 2 at Desert Vista. In order to do this there were two sets of out-of-bound lines, one for Paddle Ball and one for Pickle Ball. Since for the last few years the courts have not been used for paddle ball when the courts were resurfaced only the Pickle Ball out
