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



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LANDSCAPE DEPARTMENT SPOTLIGHT Mission: Maintain Community's Splendor While Conserving Water

or the past 20 years, Louis Darling has been responsible for maintaining the mature landscaping that beautifies today's Sun City Summerlin community. As a teenager, Louis learned and labored in landscape construction. That career spanned 30 years before he began to focus on landscape maintenance. Except for time out for his U.S. Naval service, construction and maintenance of turf, plants and trees has been his life's work.

According to Louis, evergreens or pine trees prevalent in Sun City were the perfect trees for Del Webb

Snap dragons planted in early fall add vivid color to entrances and intersections throughout Sun City. In early summer, they are replaced by colorful heat-tolerant Pintas and Vincas. Residents might notice the plants that have been cropped back along Lake Mead's perimeter to Sun City. This is called restoration pruning. "That promotes better health for those plants," explained Louis. "By cutting them back, the plant is less woody and more colorful flowers will re-bloom."

to plant in the desert. Most of them, native to Afghanistan and Mediterranean countries, were durable attractive young trees when originally planted in the barren new Sun City community. More than 25 years later, these extensive huge-rooted, needle-dropping trees have become problematic. Our landscape staff has removed about 30 percent of the community's originally planted pine trees, most often to prevent their roots from damaging walls and concrete walkways.

Sun City's landscapers avoid plants that are known allergens. Louis mentioned that new residents who relocate here from non-desert areas often develop allergies due to the native plants. For that reason, olive or mulberry trees may not be planted in Nevada or California.

plants that you like. This will help you know which plants do well here," he said.

Texas Rangers, green or grey clouds, and roses all contribute color and do well in desert areas with average care. Ocotillos are attractive desert plants that occasionally are killed by residents who over-water them. "A big killer of plants in the summer is over-watering," Louis said. For the first year, an Ocotillo needs only to have its trunk occasionally sprayed, after which it can be watered weekly. At maturity, an Ocotillo may be watered up to three times a week or less.

Louis is serious about our community's obligation to never waste water.

"Wasting water in the desert just isn't smart," he said. "We cannot let younger generations worry later about diminished available water."

Resident's Donation Is a Beautiful Gift

A year ago in May, David Urban became a Sun City resident property owner, whose new home was decked out with lush sago palms. Sagos are magnificent and they are costly, but they are not an ideal landscape selection if you tend to let gardening slide. Each year, maintenance necessitates that excessive growth at the base of a sago must be chopped off to avoid tangled clutter. Older leafy spines also should be routinely cut off.

"One huge palm was impeding the driveway and other large plants were scratching stucco on the house," said David, who decided "It was my responsibility to remove the trees and transition to a desert landscape."

Leaving only three small palms in the back patio area, David offered to donate five sagos to his new community.

Upon learning of the donation, SCSCAI Landscape Maintenance Director Louis Darling was excited. Not only did he realize the value of the palms, but he had an ideal location in mind for them - in the spacious patio area alongside the Mountain Shadows Community Center.

"I'm glad the community can enjoy the sagos, and that the community employs professional landscapers who will take care of them," David said.

In March, 190 days had passed with no measurable rainfall in Sun City. One fairly recent conservation project involved Louis' crew removing the grass that covered the hill in front of the Desert Vista Community Center. According to Louis, the grounds were watered every day in the summer from 8 p.m. to 6 a.m., utilizing an exorbitant amount of water. Since the turf's removal, the modified desert-landscaped is watered for only a half-hour each night.

Two neighboring developments to our community have not invested efforts in excess turf modification.

"When I drive through those communities, I see puddles and water running along the curbsides - all wasted water that is not being monitored," Louis said.

When we irrigate turf areas in Sun City, Louis said,

water is turned on, depending on the type of sprinklers, for 3 minutes. Then, it is turned off for 15 minutes, which allows the water to soak into the ground. Finally, the water is turned back on for another 3 minutes. "We have no collecting puddles, no wasted water," Louis said.

Sun City's landscape staffers are on the job weekdays from 5:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. They take a 15-minut break at 8:30 a.m. and a half-hour for lunch at 11 a.m. Our easily recognizable landscape employees wear bright yellow shirts with their name and "Sun City Landscape" imprinted on their shirt fronts.

When driving family or visiting friends through Sun City, it's impossible not to hear someone remark about the community's attractive mature landscaping. It's all the result of very hard work and very well-planned maintenance.

et-walking volunteers on the Neighborhood Watch K9 Corps are given red dog tags for their tail-wagging partners and guidelines explaining the "See something, say something" practice of the community-service program.

Like Sun City's K9 Corps who walk with their dogs while increasing the visibility of the Security Patrol, residents who exercise by walking for their health usually follow familiar routes, and while doing so, they socialize with the neighbors they meet along the way. They have developed an awareness of typical activity in those neighborhoods. And similar to the K9 Corps, Watchful Walkers also are aware of anything that might be amiss.

containers that may not have been returned to a garage. Such indications as lights that have not been switched off in daytime, or bulbs that are not lit after dark, are possible clues that something might be wrong inside a home.

If you have been making an excuse not to exercise on your own behalf, this is your chance to fortify your resolve, while also making a real contribution to your community. You can be a K-9 Corps volunteer or a Watchful Walker even if your neighborhood does not yet have an organized Watch group. Watchful Walkers wear Sun City V.I.P. wristbands.

While they exercise, Watchful Walkers add to the visibility of Security Patrol cars that monitor





NEIGHBORHOOD WATCHDOG

One Sun City resident wanted to join the K9 Corps but told the program coordinator: "I don't have a dog. I walk most days for my health and I would like to be part of the program." So, the program welcomed him to join the civic-minded, dog-less residents who walk – just for the health of it. Walking is excellent exercise and now it also can be an ideal way to help keep our community safe.

According to Barbara Holden, Chairwoman of the Neighborhood Watch/Community Preparedness Committee, "The guidelines are much like the K9 Corps, except dog-less walkers don't carry a plastic waste bag. If you see something, say something," Barbara said. "It's still that easy to do."

Although the focus is on crime prevention, the true premise is about neighbors helping neighbors. While walking their routes, Watchful Walkers might notice newspapers, advertisements or packages collecting in driveways, or empty trash

the community. Walkers report questionable situations that they see, but they never should confront anyone, or intervene in any apparent criminal activity. Depending on an occurrence, volunteers will call the Security Patrol's dispatcher, 702-254-2303, or if they witness an emergency situation, they may take it upon themselves to dial 911 to summon emergency responders.

It bears repeating that Watchful Walkers will not personally confront questionable individuals. Communication with residents will continue to be the responsibility of the Security Patrol or Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department officers. It's a good idea to program the Security Patrol's number into your cell phone.

o you know how to recognize if someone is having a heart attack or stroke? Do you know when to call 911?

Signs of a heart attack are discomfort or pain in the chest and upper body (arms, back, neck, jaw or stomach), shortness of breath, cold sweats, nausea, and/or lightheadedness. For women over 50 years of age, nausea (with no known cause) is the most common sign of a heart attack. If you have any of these symptoms for which there is no noticeable cause, you should call 911 immediately.

Signs of a stroke are the **sudden onset** of numbness or weakness on one side of the body, confusion, trouble speaking, trouble seeing, trouble walking, dizziness, loss of coordination, or a severe headache with no known cause. If you suspect someone is having a stroke have them do the "smile test." If only one side of the mouth smiles they are most likely having a stroke. Call 911 immediately.

In both cases, there is a small window of time to receive life-saving medications and treatments for a heart attack or stroke. So, calling for emergency help is very important. Do not drive yourself or have someone drive you to the hospital. Paramedics will be able to provide life-saving medications and utilize an Automated External

Defibrillator (AED) when needed. Call 911 and have an ambulance transport you to the hospital for the best and quickest medical care.

Important Note: When you call 911 for help, paramedics will be sent. There is no charge for them to come out to you and give emergency aid. You are only charged if the ambulance transports you to a hospital or other medical facility. So, if you are unsure of the situation, call 911. It's better to be safe than sorry.

DID YOU KNOW?

Sun City Summerlin has 10 AEDs (Automated External Defibrillators) located throughout our community in each fitness center, social hall and golf course pro shop. Most of the staff that works in the vicinity of an AED is trained and certified in the machine's use, as well as the most recent guidelines for first aid care and CPR. In addition to the fitness and social monitors, and pro shop employees, many others from Maintenance, Landscape and Administration departments are trained. We have more than 130 employees throughout Sun City Summerlin who are trained to respond to emergency situations. It's just another way we are trying to take care of the residents of our community.

MR. GYM ETIQUETTE

For your safety, appropriate shoes should be worn in the fitness centers. Closed-toe, rubber-soled shoes are required for weight rooms. Sandals and wedge shoes are not allowed in the weight rooms. Clean pool shoes are allowed in the pool as long they are not worn outside the pool areas (i.e. sidewalks, parking lots).



PALM VALLEY GOLF

\$1.9 Million Upgrade Needed to Bring Irrigation System Up to Date ~ By Golf Course Maintenance



On May 1, 2018, SCSCAI's Board of Directors approved the Palm Valley Irrigation System upgrade. Heritage Links was awarded the \$1.9 million contract.

The new system will replace the original Rainbird "block" irrigation design that was installed in 1989. According to Brian Bagwell, Director of Golf Course Maintenance, the block design is not water efficient, nor is it easy to maintain consistent turf grass on golf courses.

"With this block-system irrigation design, overwatering is unavoidable. The current sprinkler heads that we have on the course are no longer available, and the piping system is deteriorating," Brian said. In addition, "Head spacing is very inconsistent. The new irrigation system will be a Rainbird system, but it will have single-head control."

Having single-head control will allow the GCM staff the ability to manipulate the water at each sprinkler head instead of the entire line, Brian said. "The sprinkler head spacing will be consistent at 60 feet. This will save the



Association water and help us be more efficient in our watering practices."

The irrigation project will take place along the front nine holes of Palm Valley's Golf Course. The start date is set for Monday, June 18. Completion is scheduled for September 17. During this time the front 9 will be closed, with play available on Palm Valley's back 9, only.

"During this process, our maintenance staff will be working hard at promoting Bermuda grass in the front 9 fairways. This has been an ongoing project over the years and we only have No.s 1, 4 and 6 to complete," Brian said.

Overall, the Palm Valley Golf Course irrigation project will help the Association with its water-saving goal as Bermuda grass is much more drought tolerant.

"The contractor has been asked to keep the integrity of the old system as long as possible so the greens won't die and we can keep things as green as we can during the construction," Brian said.



Safeguarding Your Home Against Rats

Much like rabbits and coyotes, rats are here and will not go away any time soon; they have learned to live with us. According to the Southern Nevada Health District, rats can and do live in areas of high human population density undetected and without creating significant public health hazards.

That said, there are many things a resident can do to prevent having a problem with rats invading their home. Some simple, effective measures have yielded great results in controlling rat populations.

Seal off cracks and crevices around your home that are easy entry ways for rats. Roof rats can gain entry into your home via small openings in the eaves.

Do not feed your pets outdoors. If you must, pick up any food debris quickly after your pet has eaten. Do the same for water.

Food stored in the garage should be held in sealed glass, metal or sturdy plastic containers.

Bushes and trees should be kept to at least 18 inches from the outside of the house, making it difficult for rats to access an entry site. For more information on the topic, visit www.southernnevadahealthdistrict.org/health-topics/rodent-pests.php.

get a conversation started. Please remember that the page is designed to connect the community, not divide it, so keep your comments helpful and fun.







id you ever have the feeling that when you are dealing with government at any level you're shoveling against the tide? Or maybe it is more accurate to say that you are whistling into the wind because it seems that no one is hearing you. Well, times are changing – at least here in Sun City.

Executive Director Mitzi Mills has introduced a new process that allows every resident's idea to be heard. More than that, the process she calls a Conceptual Idea involves the stake-holders of an idea taking their thought through a series of steps that provide detailed information (pros, cons, costs and benefits) by gathering comments and input from homeowners, staff, industry professionals and committees. Following that is a presentation of the findings that allow for an educated decision to be made. The study is then published in the community library and website (scscai.com) for future reference.

Here are the steps:

1. An idea or request is submitted to Mitzi. An appropriate team is then constituted to do the following:

- a. Cast the Line Identify the parameters of the project/ idea to discover what the end goal is and create a clear and concise introductory paragraph of the request.
- b. Stake Holders Identify the stake holders. This could be a chartered club, an activity, individual homeowners, a committee, staff or a combination of those identified. The stake holders are those who will benefit from the project or idea, those who may be negatively affected by it, the clubs, the homeowners and the committees that need to be included before the Board of Directors sees the request.

2. SWOT Analysis

- a. S = Strengths of the project. How it benefits the community, club, organization or individuals.
- b. **W** = Weaknesses. What obstacles need to be overcome to do this project or idea, and at what cost.
- c. O = Opportunities. What added value and opportunities does this project or idea bring to our community.
- d. T = Threats. What are the threats or disadvantages to moving forward or not moving forward. What possible negative impact is there.

3. PEST Analysis

- a. P = Political impact on the community. Will the project or idea be well accepted by those who own the community? Will this project or idea create controversy outside our community?
- b. E = Economical. What is the estimated cost of the project or idea? What are the long-term costs of the project? What will be the bottom line effect on the Association budget if this project or idea is adopted by the Board? How will it be funded?
- c. S = Social. The basis of Sun City Summerlin is to promote social activities in an active adult resort-style community. In the CI, we quantify the social benefit by identifying who will benefit.
- d. T = Technology. Does the project or idea update or bring new technology to the community that keeps us competitive with new communities and provide convenience to our homeowners?

CI Process Paves Way for New Saws for Sawdusters n one of the first applications of the Conceptual Idea process in Sun City, Sawdusters Club members Chris McKee and Tom Johnson presented the justification for the purchase of two new computer-controlled saws for the Club. The presentation was backed by facts developed by the CI process. In short, the CI process allowed the

Club to submit the purchase request to the Administration, which assembled a task force to determine the pros and cons of the purchase. The main purpose of the acquisition is safety as this model of saw is capable of detecting and reacting to human skin so quickly that it is nearly impossible to cause injury. The CAP committee

voted to approve the request, which now must be acted upon by the Chartered Clubs & Community Organization Committee and the Finance Committee before submission to the SCSCAI's Board of Directors.

In other news: Maintenance Supervisor Brandon Balek reported that an acceptable bid had been received for the creation of golf cart parking at Mountain Shadows. Executive Director Mitzi Mills authorized the work. Creating these spaces will free up more parking for automobiles.

Fitness Director Kristie McWhorter reported that the chairs and lounges at Mountain Shadows are being re-slung and that the acquisition of replacement furniture for Sun Shadows and Desert Vista was moving forward. A new low-back extension machine and a vertical knee raise dip machine have been recommended for the space made available by the remodeling of the Pinnacle Fitness Center.

Landscape Director Louis Darling reported that the turf in the Mountain Shadows BBQ area is being refurbished.

Director of Golf Donny Long reported that the new PA system at Eagle Crest has been installed. In addition, the golf pro shops are in the process of converting to Cox high-speed Internet service, which will reduce the time it takes golfers to purchase rounds/items at the pro shops.

Each CI is introduced to the community at the beginning of the study and the membership is updated as it progresses, so they can provide feedback. Comments are included in the final study before it goes to any committee for review, and also when it goes to the Board. All comments contain the author's name for publication on the Association's website. Anonymous comments will not be accepted.

The process allows for homeowners to be completely informed on proposed ideas before any decisions are made. Once a decision is made by the Board, the CI is updated to document the Board's reason for approving or denying the

CI. With this history, any homeowner, who in future years, is interested in an item that was denied can read the research. If there is nothing new that would change the decision of the Board the item will not be re-submitted.

Studies are updated every time new information is available. When a CI is going to be on an agenda for a committee, organization or Board meeting, a notice will be sent out with a direct link on the website to the completed CI.

There you have it. A complete, well-developed process that will allow each of our voices to be heard. The next step is up to you.

So why would you volunteer for a 12-hour shift and be responsible for dispatchers, drivers and the concerns of your neighbors? The answer is so simple it seems trite.

Watch Commanders Sandy Weiser, Doug Krause, John Breed and Sandy Lyons answered the question. To give back to our community.

They accepted the watch commander position in addition to their regular four-hour shifts as driver, dispatcher or IC (information center) volunteer.

"Many residents are original residents. Some have no family or friends in the area that can help them. They are alone and cannot care for themselves," said Sandy Weiser. "Security Patrol has expanded its role to fit the needs of the community.

Sandy Lyons added, "We perform welfare checks, follow-up on resident emergency lights, hospital calls and maintain contact will distant

family members."

For Doug Krause, "When we moved here, I read an article in the newspaper about Security Patrol and decided I wanted the challenge. I joined and trained as a driver."

John Breed said, "I played golf and joined book clubs, but there wasn't enough variety for me. So, I joined Security Patrol as a driver and then trained for watch commander. I'm still surprised by new situations to help and calm our residents. Eight years as a watch commander has provided great variety in the exposure to a number of residents."

A "concern for resident" situation recently arose that put the skills and training of the watch commander and the driver to the test. The daughter of a resident phoned the Patrol base asking if someone could check on her parent. The driver, John Breed, assigned to the area where the resident lived, became concerned when he didn't get a response from the resident even though a neighbor said the resident was home. Looking in the window, he saw the resident reclining on the bed not responding to his knock at the window. Breed radioed the watch commander, Sandy Weiser, and she went to the residence. Observing exactly what the driver saw, Watch Commander Weiser phoned 911. When the Fire Department paramedics and Las Vegas Metro arrived, they found the resident responsive and in good physical health, but depressed. After the emergency team left, Weiser returned to the residence and talked with the resident whose spouse had recently died. Weiser observed the resident was extremely depressed and voiced a negative view of life. Weiser contacted the daughter and reported her observations, suggesting the resident be put on suicide watch until the daughter could come to Las Vegas. The daughter agreed.

Security Patrol's Policies and Procedures govern responsibilities for each discipline and shift. "They are necessary to do the job correctly," Krause said.

Band of Brothers

There's something special about Iowa. Something that creates large, close-knit, patriotic families even during the harshest of times. Take these two examples, both products of the Great Depression: The Sullivan brothers and the Davis brothers.

Everyone in America at the time knew of the five Sullivan brothers who served on the light cruiser U.S.S Juneau and died with the ship in November 1942. They were from Waterloo, Iowa.

Hardly anyone knew of the seven Davis brothers who lived in Burlington, Iowa, 150 miles away. They, too, were a Navy family.

"There was never any question of which branch I would chose," recalled Sun City resident Mel Davis, 92. "We were a Navy family. My oldest brother Sheldon joined the Navy before the war started. In fact, he was serving on the West Virginia in Pearl Harbor on December 7. The ship was gone, but that didn't stop Sheldon. He just transferred to submarine duty. The only question was: When would I enlist? The answer was October 1943. I was the sixth brother to enlist."

He was sent to Farragut, North Dakota, for boot camp. Not a great place to spend the winter. Upon completion, he was assigned to signal school in San Diego, a vast improvement. Upon graduation, he was assigned to the USS LCI(G) -752, a new ship commissioned in late April 1944. LCI (Landing Craft Infantry) were 158-foot, long-range ships designed to carry 190 infantrymen into combat. Some of those were converted to other uses. The 752 was reclassified as a gun ship and outfitted with 10 rocket launchers a mere 3 months later. Once the retrofit and shakedown cruisers were completed, the ship and crew, including 18-year-old Mel Davis headed for the South Pacific, assigned to LCI Division Sixteen in support of General Douglas MacAuthor's Southwest Pacific campaign.

"As a gun ship, we had a complement of five officers and 65 enlisted men. Our first combat assignment was to provide close-in fire support for the infantry invading Leyte Island in the Philippines. That was October 20, 1944. We started firing early in the morning. Later that day, we were assigned the task of delivering a group of

doctors to the northern end of the island, behind Japanese lines. We never made it. At about 6:30 that evening, we were attacked by six Japanese dive bombers attacking the bow of the ship along with two others

diving on the stern. I think one of those planes was a kamikaze because he was headed right for us. One of our guys got him with a sub-machine gun and he crashed harmlessly into the water. The guys on the 20mm and 50-caliber guns shot down four of the planes and drove off the others heading for our bow. But the last plane was able to drop a 250-pound bomb aimed at our stern. It missed, but was close enough that the explosion lifted our stern out of the water and twisted the propeller shafts. We were dead in the water and out of the war," Mel said.

"After things guieted down (the whole attack probably lasted 5 or 10 minutes - though it seemed like 10 hours) we noticed that the suspected kamikaze was floating about 50 feet from the ship. We didn't want it drifting into us, so three of us took a small boat out to the plane. We opened the hatch. It was sealed and could not be opened by the pilot, thus confirming to us that it was a kamikaze. We checked to be sure the pilot was dead. He was. One of the guys took a souvenir. We made sure the plane would sink and returned to the ship.


"They towed us back to the bay, where we dropped anchor and waited for a tow to Pearl. While we were waiting for that tow, we were attacked by Japanese torpedo planes four or five times. It seemed like they would always attack early on a Sunday morning, coming in low out of the morning sun so we didn't see them until just before they launched. We were able to see the wake of the torpedo as it targeted us. Let me tell you, that was not a good feeling. We were helpless, a sitting duck. But it appears that the torpedos were set for a depth of 14 or 15 feet and we were drawing only 4 or 5 feet of water. They passed right under us," Mel said with a smile.

The ship had to wait three months for a tow back to Pearl Harbor for repairs. By the time the repairs were completed, the war was over. Mel and the 752 went to Tokyo for occupation duty. They arrived in time to witness the formal surrender on the USS Missouri on September 2, 1945.

"We were anchored very close to the Missouri, maybe 200 yards. I was able to watch the whole thing through my binoculars," Mel said. He remained in Japan until December 1945, when they returned home. The ship and Mel were decommissioned in April. Mel returned to lowa to be reunited with his mother, six brothers and four sisters.

Mel and his wife, Kathy, moved to Sun City in 2003. Mel has been a member of the Niners golf group for those 10 years. And, at 92, he still plays three times a week.

n a beautiful spring Saturday a couple dozen men gathered at All American Park to play a game that most grew up playing in the countries of their origins. They hail from Mexico, Jamaica, Columbia, Canada, Russia, the Netherlands, former Yugoslavia, Turkey and Poland. Most of the players are in their 30s and 40s with the exception of one goalie. The younger players call this player "Papa." Eddy Biren has played soccer and coached at the semi-pro or pro level in several countries, and his love of the game and his expertise has earned him the respect and admiration of his teammates.

Mike Nikolic, a former professional player and current teammate, described Eddy as "one of the greatest goalkeepers of the game."

Eddy Biren has a few years on his fellow players. Let's just say he is approaching 80

years old and his enthusiasm for the game of soccer and life in general is infectious. He has been playing the game since he was 6 years old. Eddy plays soccer twice a week. He also regularly plays ping-pong, pool, tennis and, occasionally, hockey.

"When I was 40, I used to think I hope I can play soccer when I am 50, and when I was 50, I said 'I hope to play when I am 60 and so on.'

Now I will be 80 in a few years and I hope I will be playing at 80, as long as I can," Eddy said.

In the recent Senior Olympic Games in California, his team was awarded a silver medal in the 75 and older category,

This Sun City resident was born in Russia. His family left when he was 6 years old and moved to Poland. From there he continued playing in Austria, moving next to Italy and Canada and finally to California. He came to Las Vegas for tournament play and a friend showed him around Sun City.

"Soccer is how I ended up in Las Vegas," he recalled.

Soccer has not only been the vehicle for Eddy's travels,

but has afforded him the opportunity to be conversant in several languages. While he is self-deprecating about his command of the English language, which, by the way, is better than some native speakers, he also speaks Russian, Polish, Italian, German, French and Yiddish.

Eddy was trained as a draft designer. He also has worked as an

electrical contractor and owned some clothing stores in his pre-retirement life. He managed to continue playing the sport he loves while working to support himself and his family.

He attributes his health and well-being to exercise and watching what he eats. He also doesn't drink or smoke,

and doesn't take any medications or supplements. Eddy does confess that he loves to eat, donuts being a favorite indulgence.

He is the proud father of two and has nine grandchildren.

Jett, one of his grandchildren, is following in his grandpa's soccer boots and at 6 years old has already distinguished himself in the sport – recently being awarded a Most Valuable Player trophy.





Like Meets Like In Group Made Up of New Residents

n 2011, residents Julie Zerbel, Lynda Carpenter, Sue Papilion, Ellen Bachman and Nancy Banner got together at Lynda's house to discuss forming a club that would allow the residents of Sun City Summerlin to connect with others among the more than 12,000 people living here.

The result of that conversation was the establishment of the Boomer Connection, a club "aimed at the newer members of the community and those residents whose status had changed over the years," said Club President Julie Zerbel. "The club has always encouraged its members to start new sub-groups within it to find others with similar interests. Throughout the six years the Club has been in existence this is how most of the events have come to be. A chairperson oversees the event throughout the year and usually a new chair-person takes over every year or two."

As the Club began to take shape, Julie said, "We talked about how there were no social clubs in Sun City, and every club was just for one specific thing like Mah Jong or Shuffleboard. There didn't seem to be a club for people to just meet others, socialize and make friends. That was the biggest point for us, making friends as most of us had been here a year or two and hadn't found people with similar interests through other clubs. We had our one-time meeting, where you get a free room to try and organize a chartered club, and had about 75 people show up."

We had fun ice-breaker games, great party music (at a sensible noise level) and a photo booth. A hospitality crew was available to make introductions and assist in table selections. Everyone brought a hot or cold appetizer to share, and a cash bar was available. As members schmoozed, exchanged ideas and made new friends in Sun City Summerlin, they sipped on the evening's signature cocktail – The SCS Boomer Boomerang."

Community Updates as of April 30, 2018

(Please Note this article reflects the status as of April 30, 2018)

Mountain Shadows Golf Cart Parking Area Addition – An area has been added for golf cart-only parking. Our inhouse landscape crew will be preparing

the area on April 30 and May 1. Following that an outside contractor will be installing the parking area and marking it for golf carts. This will free up spaces for the parking of cars.

Desert Vista Indoor Spa Salt System – A new salt system is needed for the Desert Vista indoor spa. The cost of the system is \$2,567.66 (POII302) and was budgeted for as part of the Pool Equipment Budget. The system was ordered approximately four weeks ago from a company in Australia and is scheduled to arrive in two to three weeks. Once the system arrives the installation will be done by staff and take approximately one day. We do not anticipate having to close down the area or the spa for this installation. Currently we are using chlorine tablets so the spa is open and usable.

Desert Vista Indoor Pool Heater – A new pool heater circulation pump was needed for the indoor pool heater. The cost of the pump was \$1,006.50 (PO11333) and was budgeted for as part of the Spa and Pool Equipment Budget. The installation was done by our in-house staff.

Desert Vista LED Lighting Retrofit – Our in-house maintenance leadership is preparing to start the LED lighting retrofit at Desert Vista. They are currently preparing information on the quantity and types of lights to be changed to LED. Once this is completed the application will be made to NV Energy to qualify for the rebate program. The LED lighting will then be ordered in the Association's fiscal year that ends June 30, 2018. The retrofitting will begin in July 2018 and will be one of the many summer projects.

Swamp Cooler Maintenance and Start-Up – Our inhouse maintenance crew is busy checking all of the swamp coolers on the common area buildings. The start-up process includes checking (and replacing if needed) cooler pads, pumps, motors and belts. In addition, all of the pans and frames are cleaned and a rubberized coating is applied to

preserve them. There are approximately 30 swamp coolers that have to be inspected, maintained and repaired (if needed) before start-up and the maintenance crew is about half-way through this process.

Air Conditioner Maintenance and Start-Up – Our inhouse maintenance crew will be beginning the maintenance and start-up procedure on the air conditioner units on the common area buildings. We have 104 units. The start-up includes replacement of the air filters and coil cleaning, and identifying any other repairs that may be needed. Once the work is started it takes about two weeks to complete all units.

Highland Falls Maintenance Yard Parking Lot Reseal -

The work on the Highland Falls maintenance yard parking lot has been completed. The lot was resealed as part of the normal asphalt maintenance and to seal cracks to keep water from penetrating and causing damage to the asphalt that would decrease the life and cause replacement to have to be done sooner than planned.

Desert Vista Tennis Courts and Pickle Ball Courts Windscreen Replacement – All of the windscreens at the tennis courts and the one side of the windscreens in the Pickle Ball courts are in need of replacement following a windstorm that damaged them. The replacement will be done by Superior Courts at a cost of \$5,200.00 (PO11338). This is a budgeted expense.

Pinnacle Tennis Courts – All of the windscreens at the tennis courts are in need of replacement, following a windstorm that damaged them. Since only half were budgeted for we will do half of the replacements now and then replace the remaining half in 2018/2019 budget. The replacement of the first half will be done by Superior Courts at a cost of \$4,200.00 (POI1338).

Mountain Shadows Tennis Court #3 Resurfacing – Tennis court number 3 at Mountain Shadows is scheduled for resurfacing by Superior Courts at a cost of \$8,000.00 (PO11337). This is a budgeted expense.

Mountain Shadows Shuffle Board Court Resurfacing – Staff will prep the shuffle board courts by sanding the surface. Resurfacing with green stain, glaze, wax, stencils and lines will be done by Superior Courts at a cost of \$4,000.00 (PO11341). This is a budgeted expense.

Sun Shadows – Pool – Cubbies for Shower Area – Our in-house maintenance staff will be installing cubbies near the outdoor showers for the convenience of our residents, so they can place their items in a cubby instead of taking up seating space.

Pinnacle Fitness Center – Addition of a Knee Raise Apparatus Machine – The Common Area Properties Committee approved the purchase of a knee raise apparatus for the Pinnacle Fitness Center at a cost of \$582.13 (POI1351), including delivery, set up and sales tax. This item was not budgeted for as new equipment and will be purchased as an unbudgeted expense and added to our reserve fund for future replacement.

Pinnacle Fitness Center – Addition of a Back Station
Apparatus Machine – The Common Area Properties Committee approved the purchase of a back station apparatus machine for the Pinnacle Fitness Center at a cost of \$1,318.38 (PO11351), including delivery, set up and sales tax.
This item was not budgeted for as new equipment and will be purchased as an unbudgeted expense and added to our reserve fund for future replacement.

Mountain Shadows BBQ Area – The area has been closed for the last few weeks while the grass areas were revamped by reseeding and where seed would not help by adding new sod. The area is complete and the seed and sod have had time to become established. The area will open the week of April 30.

Desert Vista Picnic Area – This area is in need of clean up and repair. The area was taken over by rabbits that destroyed the landscape. A fake owl was installed and over the last few months the rabbits have stayed away. The area will now be closed and the grass restored. The area will be

cleaned up and additional plants will be added as needed. Work should begin right after May 1, 2018, and will take a couple of weeks before the area is opened back up for use.

Online Ticket Sales for Sun City Summerlin Events – Starting Monday, May 7, residents are now be able to pur

Starting Monday, May 7, residents are now be able to purchase tickets to Sun City Summerlin events online using a credit card. In the past the only event that had online ticket sales were those held at the Starbright Theatre. The ability to purchase tickets online has been requested by many of our residents and the Community Services Department is happy to make this request a reality.

EI Numbers for Chartered Clubs and Community

Organizations – In order for a business, organization or club to have a bank account, the Federal Government requires an Employer Identification Number (EIN) or a Social Security Number (SSN) to be submitted to the bank as part of the application. Since club members do not want to tie their personal SSN to club activities, the Association EIN was used for all 77 chartered clubs and three community organizations. This is not the best way to do business since, in reality, it would mean that the officers of the clubs should be the same as the officers of the Association. In order to remove the confusion and make it easier for chartered clubs and community organizations to do banking, SS-4 EIN applications were mailed to the IRS for all chartered clubs and community groups. It will take approximately two weeks for each chartered club and community organization to be assigned its own EIN. This is being done in order to remove the Association EIN from the bank accounts and banking information of each of the chartered clubs. We expect to provide the exclusive EINs to each chartered club at the May chartered club meeting.
