

BOD Oks Dust Collection Unit for Model Builders Club

Area Properties Committee approved four items – two significant and two minor – for submission to the Board of Directors with a recommendation to approve.

At the meeting, Stephen Linder and Jim Twohig of the Model Builders Club, accompanied by Club President Bruce Adams, presented

a slide show that detailed the need for the installation of dust collection equipment for the Club's workshops. After some discussion, the Committee approved a resolution to submit the request to the BOD with a \$4,000 limit. The proposal was approved at the January 9 BOD

would be recouped in just over eight years.

meeting and sent to the executive director for implementation using internal personnel.

The second major action concerned the ongoing investigation into the use of solar panels to help reduce Sun City's operating costs. SCSCAI Building Maintenance Supervisor Brandon Balek presented a financial summary that, using 2017 actuals, showed that a \$19,040 net investment would be recouped in just over eight years. The committee approved sending the proposal to the BOD with an approval recommendation.

The two minor actions involved the sale of Association equipment. Now that the new table tennis units have been installed, SCSCAI

Fitness Director Kristie McWhorter reported that several residents have inquired about the possibility of purchasing an old unit. After some discussion, the committee decided that the units should be offered to all residents via an auction. Appropriate information will be sent via an eblast.

Dennis McGrew,

SCSCAI's director of facility maintenance, reported that two very old trucks were available for disposal. It is expected that these vehicles will be sold at a commercial auction site.

Security Patrol provides a service called vacation house checks. Once a resident completes the request form at the Security base office, a Patrol volunteer will check the residence every other day looking for evidence of attempted break-in. If the resident, who is away, expects a package or has forgotten to cancel the newspaper delivery, the Patrol volunteer will place the items in a less visible area on the property.

Security Patrol cannot emphasize enough that newspapers in driveways, packages left at the door in full view from the street and notices attached to doors notifying the resident of coming repairs are invitations for a burglary.

It is recommended that if a resident doesn't want a vacation house check, then the next best approach is to ask a neighbor or family member to monitor the property for items left by delivery trucks. Even a pamphlet from a charity orga-

It was the first model home past the sales center and it had a magnificent view of the valley from every room in the house except the west bedroom. It also had a small decorator pond with a waterfall, a lovely garden and beautiful decorator touches and furnishings throughout. They wanted it just the way it was. The saleswoman explained the models would not be for sale until after the Phase II was sold out, and then they would be offered by lottery. So, George and Georgie put their names into the lottery and waited.

For three years they dragged every family member, friend or neighbor out to see "their" house. One day, a miracle happened – the saleswoman called and said the models were for sale and their name had been drawn in the lottery. They were thrilled!

They sold everything, including the kitchen sink, and moved in on April 1, 1996, along with all the other new model home buyers on the street. They had many happy times together. Georgie and one other neighbor are the only remaining original owners. George passed away a few years ago. I came here to be with both of them and I have stayed.

The Model Home Center, which was immediately adjacent to George and Georgie's model, was a beautiful property with many gorgeous evergreen trees surrounding it and a full sweeping view of the valley that included all the north, east and southern mountains. When Phase II closed, the sales office was torn down and all the trees were carefully dug up and placed elsewhere in Sun City. What remained were five over-sized lots that were then sold where huge new custom homes were built.

My mother, Georgie, is still delighted being here in her dream house and I am just as delighted to be here with her.

Electronic Focus Group Update

SCSCAI Board member Barbara Holden presented initial results from Sun City's Electronic Focus Group during the February 6 Board of Directors' meeting. According to Barbara, a summary of the findings will be presented to the Board at the March 6 meeting. In April, project organizers will return to the Board with detailed data and a recommended timeline for a plan that makes use of the information obtained.

Overall, Barbara reported that there were 1,285 responses to the survey, with 1,793 comments logged. Of the responses, 98% were made electronically. The data suggests that "all age groupings were very comfortable with electronic media." Of those who responded, 19.7% were under 65 years old; 46.5% were between the ages of 65-74; and 34.1% were 75 years old and over. The majority of responses (45.4%) came from residents who have lived in Sun City for five years or less.

A cursory summation of the questionnaire by project organizers revealed that "Residents clearly communicated their desire for improvement, but also what a desirable community we live in."

New Surveillance Cameras in Fitness Centers

s many residents have noticed, new surveillance cameras were installed in and around the fitness centers during

December and January. This was approved by the Board of Directors during the November Board meeting, and the IT and Fitness departments moved quickly to initiate the project.

All of the cameras are functioning properly and already have proven to be very helpful in

several situations involving resident safety. We have four cameras each at the Pinnacle and Mountain Shadows; six cameras at Sun Shadows; and nine cameras at Desert Vista. The cameras are motion-sensored so they only record footage when there is movement within the camera frame.

When accidents or safety incidents occur, video footage can be pulled to be used for figuring out what happened. This will protect both the individual resident and the Association at large.

These cameras have been placed to observe various areas inside and outside of the fitness centers – entrances, exits, lobbies, outside of locker room entrances (not inside), cardio and strength exercise areas, indoor and outdoor pool areas, and outdoor pool gates. Although not all areas in the fitness center are under surveillance, most common areas and high traffic areas are being recorded.

Q: Who has access to or sees the video footage?

A: All camera feeds go directly to the fitness monitor desk at that specific location, where the monitor can zoom in and view certain areas of the fitness center. Also, the director of fitness,

executive director and IT manager have access to view live or recorded footage remotely via computer, tablet or phone.

Q: Why did the Association decide to get surveillance cameras?

A: Accidents happen in the blink of an eye and these cameras will help us capture those moments. For liability reasons, having video footage will protect both the individual resident and the Association. There also have been numerous issues of theft in fitness centers, which is why we are specifically observing the entrances to the locker rooms.

Charli's Corner

How to Change your Strength Program

ast month I talked about changing up your cardio exercise program to add variety and challenge to your existing program. This month we will be talking about how our bodies adapt to strength or resistance training and what we can do to update our programs and wake up our muscles and brain.

When you do the same activity all the time, your body gets used to it and becomes very efficient. Eventually, that adaptation means you burn fewer calories even when you're doing the same amount and type of exercise. The solution is to challenge your body in a new way.

The exciting part about changing your workout program is that it also can enhance your brain function by improving your memory and thinking skills. It's a matter of keeping your exercise options open and allowing your body to adapt to new stimuli so your muscles can become stronger and your brain stays alert.

There are many ways to change up your strength training program. Here are just a few simple ones to get you started:

Get off the machine! Try using dumbbells to do an exercise. For example, instead of the chest

press, use dumbbells to do a chest press or flyes.

Slow it down. Change your tempo. Slowing down your lifting and lowering pace can make a big difference with your muscles. Try lifting for 3 seconds and lowering for 5 seconds. Any change will wake up your muscles.

Try a circuit with no rests. Instead of doing two to three sets of one exercise at a time and resting in between, try doing one set of all your exercises in a row with little or no rest in between. This will also increase your heart rate and help you burn more calories.

Take a group fitness class. Structured classes with an instructor can speed up your workout and teach you some new exercises.

Embracing change is the best way to continue to make positive changes for your body and mind. Try one or two of these ideas and see where it takes you.

esidents are invited to attend a 90-minute class to learn how to survive at home for three days (72 hours) if Sun City is affected by an emergency situation.

The City of Las Vegas' Office of Emergency Management provides training for and coordinates the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) program. CERT training includes disaster preparedness, fire suppression, medical operations, search and rescue, team organization, weapons of mass destruction/terrorism and disaster psychology.

Neighborhood Watch/Community Preparedness Committee volunteers Bruce Spitzer and Bill Holden have graduated the entire CERT course. Accordingly, they are sharing their expertise in a series of safety classes with Sun City residents.

Following a major disaster, professional first-responders providing fire, police and medical services may not be able to meet the demand of these services. A vast number of victims, communication failures and road blockages may prevent people from accessing the emergency services they have come to expect by dialing 911. In Sun City, residents might have to rely on each other for help to meet their immediate life-sustaining needs, especially if there is no warning, as in an earthquake.

If an emergency situation makes it advisable for Sun City residents to stay inside their homes, are you prepared to remain there for up to 72 hours? Will you have non-perishable food in flip-top cans? Do you have a battery-operated radio, a cell phone charger, flash lights and extra batteries? Do you have an adequate supply of your prescription medicines on hand? Which possessions will you want to take with you if, unexpectedly, you must leave your home? If the electric garage door opener isn't working can you manually open the door?

If a power disruption affects Sun City, are you prepared to cope without heat, lights, television, radio, telephone, refrigerator, microwave and your computer?

What will you do if water service is disrupted? Do you have emergency water stored in your home? Your kitchen is for cooking. Never use the stove or oven to heat your home, and do not operate a generator inside your home or garage.

Evacuating Your Home

Know how to manually open your garage door in a power outage. Plan where your family members will meet after evacuating their homes. How will you know if everyone is safe and where they are? Assign someone unaffected by the emergency for everyone to call.

Decide now, before an emergency strikes. If you must leave your home, the amount of time you have to pack will depend on the existing hazards. Some severe weather, fire or flood emergencies allow no time to gather even basic necessities, which makes it essential to plan ahead. You will want your will and insurance papers, including health, life, car and property. You'll want to have ready cash, credit cards, account numbers, blank checks, telephone numbers and keys. Take a multipurpose pocket knife, flashlight, cell phone, battery charger and batteries. Remember irreplaceable family photographs and wear your heirloom jewelry so that it does not become lost or stolen. Pack a change of clothing and wear sturdy shoes. You might be grateful to have a camera, hand sanitizer, a tooth brush, bottled water and a first aid kit.

Have a carrying case ready for your pet, as well as a pet collar, identification tag, leash, pet food, drinking water and a water bowl. If food supplies become scarce or unavailable, you might be glad to have packed a jar of peanut butter, some energy bars and bottled water.

Try to form a good practice of not letting your car's fuel gauge fall below the half-tank point. In a power outage, gas stations may be closed or unable to pump gas. And, if you are able to do so, try to offer help to others who may not be as well-prepared as you.

Answers to Some Frequently Asked Questions idewalks – Las Vegas Municipal Code 13.56.040 Maintenance and Repair of Existing Sidewalks: "It shall be the responsibility of the property owner to maintain and repair existing sidewalks whenever necessary to the health, safety, welfare and benefit of the public."

If the damage is caused by a utility company box in the ground, contact the applicable company and advise them of the problem. If you live in an attached unit, contact your management company.

Blocking sidewalks – We have many residents who enjoying walking around the community on nice days. Some of our residents use walkers or motorized wheelchairs. Las Vegas Municipal Code 11.52.130 (A)(6) states: "No person shall stop, stand or park a vehicle except when necessary to avoid conflict with other traffic in compliance with the law or the directions of a police officer or a traffic control device, in any of the following places: On or blocking sidewalks."

If you are inconvenienced by a vehicle on the sidewalk, you can call parking enforcement at 229-6432. If you park your vehicle on your driveway, please make sure that it is pulled up enough so as not to block the sidewalk. Also, on trash days, do not block the sidewalk with your containers or trash bags.

Parking – Since Sun City does not own our streets, Nevada Law prohibits the Association from restricting street parking. Anyone can park in the street as long as no other city regulation is broken. For instance, the vehicle must have current registration and be operable. It is unlawful to park a vehicle in the street for more than 72 consecutive hours. Moving a vehicle every three days a few feet will not avert a violation. Parking on any portion of the landscape or landscape rock is not permitted.

RV Parking – RVs and mobile homes may not park in residential streets without first obtaining a temporary RV permit from the city of Las Vegas in order to allow for loading and unloading. A permit allows street parking for a maximum 48-hour period. If an additional permit is desired, a minimum of 72 hours from the previous expiration is required. No more than six permits may be acquired during any threemonth period. Permits may be revoked for abuse, misuse, ineligibility or other good cause. All permits are issued Monday to Thursday, 7 a.m. to 5 p.m., at the Parking Office, 500 S. Main St., Las Vegas, NV 89101, or online at https://secure3.lasvegasnevada.gov/eparking. For additional information, call 229-4700 or 800-228-3332.

Las Vegas Municipal Code 11.52.305 states: "Except as otherwise provided in this Section, it is unlawful for a person to stand, park or store, upon any residential street, a commercial vehicle, recreational vehicle, trailer, or any combination of vehicle and trailer having an overall length of (24 ft.) twenty-¬four feet or more, or an unladen weight in excess of (8,000 lbs.) eight thousand pounds."

A permit issued for recreational vehicle parking shall specify the location and vehicle to which it pertains, the date and time permitted parking may begin, and the date and time the permit expires. The permit must be displayed in or on the vehicle in a conspicuous location that is clearly visible from the street.

'Looking Forward' to the Adventure of Viet Nam

iet Nam, 1969, up close and personal: Hot and humid, lush scenery and dangerous times for young Vince Acosta. But those were times yet to come.

Born and raised in the San Francisco Bay area, Vince always knew he wanted to go into the Army. So, when the draft board called in 1968, he was ready to go.

"This was my war," he said. Vince was sent to Ft. Lewis in Washington State for basic training after which he went to Ft. Leonard Wood, Miss., to be trained as a combat engineer. (The Army has five combat arms: Infantry, Artillery, Armor, Corps of Engineers and Signal Corps.) After completing the engineer training, Vince was given 18 days leave before being sent to Viet Nam.

"I was actually looking forward to it. They put us on a Flying Tigers airliner and the adventure began. The long flight over there was one big party. We had no idea what was waiting for us. What should have been the first clue came as we left the plane and I jokingly told the flight attendant that I would see her in a year. She just looked down and didn't say anything. I guess she knew that many of us wouldn't be making the return flight."

Initially assigned to the 97th Replacement Depot in Long Binh, Vince was soon sent to A Company, 70th Combat Engineers, 35th Engineer Group, 18th Engineer Brigade.

"The 18th Brigade was responsible for engineering operations in the northern half of South Viet Nam. That area was mostly mountains. Our duties were varied. We built bridges, established base camps for the infantry, built revetments for helicopters and most anything else that was needed. Charlie often blew up our bridges at night and we had to rebuild them ASAP. More often than not, Charlie would be waiting for us. We had to establish our own perimeters and protect ourselves while rebuilding. The mortar attacks were the worst. That's something I don't like to talk about," Vince said.

During this time, the company moved often.

"Home became whereever we were and that was usually some 60 miles ahead of the Battalion HQ. On top of that, we bathed using makeshift showers built from empty Agent Orange drums. Who knew?"

December 1969 finally arrived and the one-year tour was complete. It was time for Vince to go home.

"I had mixed emotions about leaving at the end. I was settled in and Nam had become home - the Engineers, my job," he said.

Vince did go home, but it seemed somehow different. "It felt like everyone had changed. I didn't like them anymore."

But, of course, it was Vince that had changed.

Assigned to the 24th Infantry Division, Vince was stationed at Ft. Riley Kansas. "To me, it was another 9 to 5 job. My wife and I rented a house off base, but it was really a tough adjustment going from combat to normalcy overnight. It was too much for my (first) wife. The marriage didn't survive."

Eight months after being assigned to Ft. Riley, Vince's hitch was complete and the transition to full-time civilian life began. While still in the service, he applied to the post office and was immediately accepted. He was able to go directly from one job to another, and he was back in the Bay area working in the Oakland post office sorting room. But he was still restless, and after five years he left that job for one outdoors. He became a longshoreman.

A few years later, Vince found his true, postwar calling: He became a cut man.

Pop quiz: What is a cut man?

A. An assistant director whose job it is to yell "Cut" at the end of a scene.

- **B.** A butcher in a wholesale meat market.
- **C**. A ringside attendant for professional boxers.

If you said A you are probably watching too much TV. If you guessed B, nice try. Probably a good career move, but not the one Sun City resident Vince Acosta chose.

If you said C, you're right. After years of unsettled times after leaving the army, Vince found his second career.

"I grew up in what was probably the worst part of Oakland, Calif. You learned very early how to defend yourself or you suffered the consequences. As a kid, I spent a lot of time at the Boys Club, where I learned to box. I actually liked being in

and around the ring, but I'll admit I became less interested as I moved into the teen years and discovered another distraction – girls," Vince said.

"But I never completely forgot the ring. My boyhood friend Charley Shipes became a professional boxer and I followed his career, watching him move up the ranks until he became welterweight champion in 1968. Charley was managed by Dick Sadler, who eventually managed George Foreman and Sonny Liston. That connection was my entry into the business."

Who you know always has been important, but not as important as what you know. There were no formal apprenticeships, but Vince started spending his free time at the boxing rings watching the trainers and cut men at work.

"It didn't take long for me to get the hang of it. I was able to pick up the best practices of the professionals. I also found that I had an intuitive knowledge of what was happening in the ring. That allowed me to spot things during a fight that would give our fighter an edge. I would always work through the trainer, never directly with the fighter. That talent would help me move up the ranks in time," he added.

The connection with Sadler eventually got Vince jobs with small-time fighters. It was a start. Sadler managed and trained several well-known boxers, including Freddie Little and Archie Moore, who was to become a personal friend of the Acostas. But much of that work was in Las Vegas, then the fight capital of the world. So Vince moved to Las Vegas to be where the action was. And it paid off. He worked his way up the ladder being able to work with more skilled fighters.

"Eventually, I got to work for George Foreman at one of

his championship fights. In an everyday fight, the boxer is allowed three ringside helpers. In a championship battle, that goes to four. I was the No. 4 man. But George never really needed a cut man. He was never cut. He was that good. I worked with George for about seven years."

At one point, Vince met Luis Tapia. Luis was a manager and trainer for some 27 boxers, including six-time world champion and the first female fighter to win the BKB lightweight title, Layla McCarter, and Friday 'the 13th' Ahunanya, who went on to win both the NABA and PABA heavyweight titles.

Work was steady, with Vince working as many as 160 fights a year.

"I got to see more of the world as a cut man than I did while in the army. Many of the fights were held overseas in

places like Germany and New Zealand," he said.

But there was another fringe benefit. As Vince became better known in the industry, he had the opportunity to work with some of Don King's fighters. He also knew Bobby Goodman, King's second in command, who would often give Vince ringside tickets for his fights – tickets that retailed for \$1,000 each!

When asked what were among the more memorable moments in his career, Vince thought about it for a moment

and said, "It was late in my career when one day I was leaving the dressing room at the MGM Grand when I ran into James Gandolfini, the actor from 'The Sopranos,' and Charles Dutton, who had appeared on that show and in many, many more movies. The pair approached me and said that they were big fans. I was speechless. To think that these two famous actors who had a large fan base of their own were fans of me!"

Vince's wife Gail had a more humorous anecdote. They were relaxing at home in Las Vegas one day when George Foreman's cousin Pop and his trainer Charley Shipes stopped by as they often did when they were in town. It was a good place to relax away from the casinos (and the food was better.) Pop brought a load of Forman's laundry with them and asked her to run it through the washing machine. No big deal.

"But as I was taking the sweat suit out of the dryer, I noticed a loose \$10 bill, then another and another. It seems that George had a role of 10s in his pocket that he used for tips," she said.
