



With its 500 mines, Calico produced more than \$20 million in silver ore over a 12-year span. When silver lost its value in the mid-1890s, Calico lost its population. The miners packed up, loaded their mules and moved away abandoning the town that once gave them a good living. It became a ghost town. Walter Knott purchased Calico in the 1950s, architecturally restoring all but the five original buildings to look as they did in the 1880s. 

# PREPAREDNES Reighborhood Watch

SafeCam is a voluntary program designed to take advantage of home video surveillance systems across Las Vegas to reduce crime. To register for the free program, visit LVMPD.com.

hen a crime is reported, Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department officers and detectives can save valuable investigation time with help from residents who are registered with Vegas SafeCam. The program allows LVMPD to look for potential video evidence. Information provided by a resident can help solve a burglary, an auto theft or a more serious crime. According to Metro's Crime Prevention Specialist Randy Klenosky, during the past year, several major cases have been solved using citizens' video surveillance to help identify suspects. Registering with Vegas SafeCam does not allow the LVMPD access to privately owned sur veillance systems. It does not grant access to video feed, and the LVMPD will not be monitoring cameras. The free program allows residents to voluntarily register their home video surveillance systems with the LVMPD and is simply a list that Police officers may use to contact homeowners to determine if helpful surveillance video might be available.

To register your surveillance system online, search LVMPD.com.

- Click on "Online Services"
- Choose "Sign Up for Vegas SafeCam."
- Click on "Register Here"

SafeCam is a voluntary program designed to take advantage of home video surveillance systems across Las Vegas to reduce crime. Active programs exist with police departments across the nation. LVMPD has reached out to several police departments to review success stories about how the program has helped their communities.

How It Works: A home owner's surveillance system may catch something helpful to the Police Department. The resident, however, may be unaware of having captured anything suspicious until the recording is shared with police. The program broadens possible leads to solve criminal activity. Vegas SafeCam may give you and the LVMPD a chance to identify a perpetrator on your property, passing by, or even a package thief in the act of committing a crime.

As an example, using the registered SafeCam database, a police officer might inform you of a recent burglary in your neighborhood. The officer would ask if it is possible for you to review your video for a suspicious person or vehicle between the listed times of the event. Upon reviewing the video, you may have recorded a vehicle possibly connected to the crime. This information is passed along to detectives working on your neighborhood case. Your SafeCam infor-

mation would be accessible only with your permission for specific investigations.

#### ARREST MADE IN AUTO BURGLARIES AND DOORBELL THEFTS


Residents' surveillance efforts in Providence, a community located northwest of Sun City Summerlin, helped police identify and capture a burglary suspect, according to a eblast report from LVMPD Northwest Area Command.

Because of homeowners' extensive support, an arrest was made in an outbreak of auto burglaries and doorbell thefts that were happening in the northwestern community. The suspect in these crimes was taken into custody and objects he had stolen were recovered.

Burglary victims were advised that detectives would notify them to help identify articles that might belong to them that were found among the retrieved stolen items.

"Thank you, residents of the Northwest Area Command. We could not do it without you," said an LVMPD officer.





### Continue Learning With OLLI

#### UNLV-sponsored Program Meets Thursdays in Sun City

Have you heard of OLLI? No, it's not the name of the newest single man to move into Sun City. Just kidding. But it is a funny name, don't you agree? OLLI or Osher Lifelong Learning Institute is a program supported by UNLV that's dedicated to the continuing education of seniors. As such, OLLI instructors are retired or semi-retired professionals who volunteer their time and experience to bring classes of interest to seniors across Las Vegas. Classes meet at UNLV's Paradise Campus (851 E. Tropicana Ave.) and at satellite locations across the valley.

One such class, "Turning a Negative Into a Positive Without Algebra," meets every Thursday, 10 a.m. to noon, at Sun Shadows. The class is led by Sun City resident EJ Levine.

"Living in Sun City is so positive. It's so much fun. However, you do have to get up, take a shower and get out there," said EJ, who turned her former writing career and love of people and positivity into the popular class that tackles everyday subjects.

At the start of each session, EJ welcomes her students with salutations and a quick exercise designed to get the creative juices flowing. She uses guided writing assignments to prompt discussions that get the group sharing.

"I tell my students this is a safe place," EJ said.

One particular day, "control" and "focus" became the topics of the afternoon as the instructor shared an experience that had happened to her the week before class.

"The focus has to be on the acceptance of the situation -I accept I cannot control everything. And then it's over," she said.

EJ, who came to Sun City 19 years ago from teaching a similar class in California, enjoys sharing Thursdays with her students.

"I have some fun-fueled questions about junior and senior moments. People write if they want do, don't write, share, don't share, nap, whatever. No judging, no criticism, just plain acceptance and enjoyment of each other," she said.

It's true, at the moment the class is made up entirely of women. But EJ challenges a brave man or two, or three to join the conversation. Who knows? His name might even be Olli.

"Turning a Negative Into a Positive Without Algebra" meets Thursdays, May 24 to July 26, from 10 a.m. to noon, at Sun Shadows. It is one of many classes offered by OLLI for the summer semester. A registration fee of \$75 entitles members access to all OLLI opportunities. For information or a class catalog, visit olli.unlv.edu/courses, or call 774-6554.






#### **Celebrating Home Plate**

Maxine McKeown is one of the coordinators for the Mountain Shadows library and said, "The thing I like best about volunteering is the people you meet, and assisting them in finding a book that they may be interested in. If you want to donate, please bring ONLY paperbacks or hardcover books."

Cheryl Kidd assists Maxine as coordinator at Mountain Shadows. "The lending iibrary is one of the reasons we chose to move to Sun City from Oregon in 2012. From the moment I saw the library, I was hooked!"

Phyllis Resnik is another volunteers. "I volunteer at the Sun City library because I love being surrounded by books. They give me a feeling of comfort and serenity. Our residents donate books of all genres so it is possible to find books that interest you. We encourage residents to take a peek at both of our libraries. We also have many jigsaw puzzles."

For Eva, who grew up among books, as her mother and aunt were librarians, said the libraries contain more than 1,500 books and 75 puzzles.



#### Stay Safe & Healthy This Summer

don't know about you, but for me summer means backyard barbeques, lounging by the pool and enjoying the outdoors. Long days and warm mornings and evenings beckon us outside with friends and family. Staying smart and pre-planning can ensure that we enjoy all the benefits of the summer while minimizing health risks posed by a few summertime worries.

#### Top 5 Ways to Stay Summer Safe:

Stay Cool and hydrated. The average temperature in Southern Nevada hits 100 degrees during more than 60 days in the summer; humidity is around 26 percent. Heat stroke/exhaustion are serious risks that increase when you're working or exercising in the heat, spending time in a spa, or using some types of medications, and/or drinking caffeinated or alcoholic beverages, which are dehydrating. Signs of overheating include feeling faint, nausea, experiencing changes in your pulse rate, weakness and muscle cramps, and clammy skin. If you have any of these symptoms, get indoors immediately, drink water and cool down. Call 911 if symptoms worsen or persist.

Cover up. Too much sun exposure can cause sunburn, premature aging and skin cancer. Reducing your exposure during mid-day, using an SPF of 15+, and wearing hats and light-colored clothing are practical ways to prevent health issues related to sun exposure.

Fight the bite! Bees, wasps, ants, mosquitoes and ticks are more active in the summer months. Drain any standing water to reduce mosquito breeding grounds, wear long sleeves and pants in wooded or grassy areas when hiking or camping, use insect repellant, and never poke nests or hives. If you see a hive, call a professional to remove. Know the signs of an allergic reaction: Hives, swelling, throat tightness, difficulty breathing, vomiting and/or feeling faint/lightheaded. If you experience these symptoms, contact your doctor or call 911 immediately.

Watch that food. Follow five simple steps to food safety: Clean hands, surfaces and serv-

ing/cooking utensils often; separate raw meat from other food and clean any surface that held raw meat well before using again; cook foods to the right temperature; chill food promptly after meals; and when in doubt, throw it out!

Stay Water Safe. Avoid solo swimming. Don't mix alcohol and swimming, and designate a water watcher to keep eyes on children at all times around bodies of water.



#### BOARD MEMBERS GET ELECTRONIC FOCUS GROUP MESSAGE

"WE FEEL LIKE WE WERE HEARD."

Barbara Holden, an SCSCAI Board of Directors member and one of the facilitators of the Next Generation Sun City Summerlin project, culminated the efforts of the electronic focus group during the March BOD meeting when she introduced residents Dolly Mack and Wendy Bowles to officially present the findings of the January questionnaire regarding suggestions on how to enhance the community's amenities.

Dolly and Wendy opened their presentation by explaining to the more than 50 residents in attendance at Desert Vista that the presentation was intended to share data, as well as to provide a recommendation on a plan of action to the Board of Directors.

"We feel like we were heard," said Dolly. "We asked and they answered. It's a validation."

Overall, the project yielded responses from 1,285 responders, including 1,793 comments. Dolly and Wendy reviewed each response from which they culled their data.

Some of the feedback included ideas for a dedicated dance studio, an indoor walking track, a dog park, enhanced restaurant offerings, upgraded gym facilities and an ambassador program for new residents.

According to Dolly and Wendy, many of the responses touched on improvements that require little to no financial investment. Those ideas were passed along to SCSCAI Executive Director Mitzi Mills for review and potential implementation.

One such idea, the creation of an ambassador program for new residents, was off and running as soon as it hit Mitzi's desk. Upon hearing of the idea, Mitzi sent out a community e-blast and got the program going. In two days, Dolly said, Mitzi had received 55 responses from residents

volunteering to be part of the program. The idea is currently under development and additional details will be available soon.

After the presentation, SCSCAI BOD President Joe O'Connell told residents, "The future of the findings are in the hands of our executive director." Another Board member suggested the BOD receive quarterly follow-ups on the project's progress.

"This is a marathon, not a sprint," said Barbara. "We have begun a journey here." According to Barbara, keeping residents' enthusiasm up about the project will be the challenge to ensure that the efforts of the Next Generation Sun City Summerlin Committee will not go to waste.

"You have been heard," Barbara told residents. "The lightbulb is on!"

#### The Building Blocks of War

On December 7, 1941, America changed. We were at war; certainly not our first time, but this war would prove to be different. It was highly mechanized and fought on two fronts. We weren't prepared and it took some time to get up to speed.

By the spring of 1945, approximately one-half million engineer officers and enlisted men were in the armed forces - approximately 8 percent of the army. One of those men was Paul Gwin of Junction City, Kansas.

"I was a student at Kansas State College and like many others, I immediately volunteered for service in the air corps. But I was turned down because I was color blind. So, I decided to stay in school and wait for the draft. That happened in May 1943, and on the 14th of that month I reported for active service at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas," Paul said.

"After basic training, I was assigned to the 1782nd Engineering Parts Supply Company. Our initial training was in clearing minefields. But that soon shifted to warehousing of parts for big construction equipment used to build air strips, hangers, roads and such."

Part of that training was at the Engineering Supply Depot at Columbus, Ohio, which happens to be the home of Ohio State University.

"We never had it so good," Paul said. "The local USO Club was itching to entertain the troops and we were

about the only ones living nearby. We were invited to parties at the homes of the wealthy along the Sciota River. In addition, many of the coeds from Ohio State worked at the Supply Depot. Let's just say that the men of the 1782nd were well supplied with parties and dates during our stay there."

But the parties weren't to last. There was a war waiting for them and Paul was sent to Hollandia, New Guinea, as part of General Douglas MacArthur's Southwest Pacific Command. Hollandia had been recaptured in April, 1944. Retaking New Guinea was necessary to protect Australia and to provide a base for the liberation of the Philippines.

"Rumors spread that there was a tribe of headhunters still living in New Guinea. That was true but the only time we saw them was during the annual sing-sing, a gathering of the tribes from the various islands. The natives wore very tall headdresses and face paint and danced. We thought that looked like fun so we joined them, whooping and hollering," Paul recalled.

Meanwhile, the war was still going on. On October 20, The 6th Army invaded Leyte, the first step in liberating the Philippines. Three days later, the Japanese Imperial Navy went all in and committed its remaining capital ships to the Battle of Leyte Gulf in the hopes of destroying our fleet and thus being able to retain the Philippines. It was a decisive American victory. On January 7, 1944, the 6th Army invaded Luzon. Along with the infantry was the 3rd Platoon, 453rd Engineer Depot Company, including Paul Gwin. By the end of June, all of the Philippines was secured and life returned to normal, "playing cards, sports and what other excitement we could dream up."

"My last three months of service were spent with the occupation forces in Yokohama, Japan. We were quartered in the high school building with a barbed wire fence to keep out the starving locals who crowded the fence pushing plates through near the area where we emptied our plates and washed them. It was a pitiful scene and we began loading our plates with extra food and putting it in their containers.




will allow better two-way communication between staff and residents. These are ambitious projects and when completed will very much improve our community. There are other projects that you won't see but also will improve services for residents and staff.

Below are the stories of five pioneers who have earned a total of 96,330 hours of volunteer work for Security Patrol.

Silvia and Walter LaMay have been active in Security Patrol for 22 years. "We joined when we first moved to Sun City," said Walter. "I had an auto accident and went to the Security Patrol base for advice. I didn't know Nevada rules. Hugh Benoit was chief (1994) and said Security Patrol couldn't help, but that I should join the Patrol. They needed people." Silvia continued: "I joined in memory of my parents. They didn't speak English very well and I wanted to continue to be of help."

"I moved to Sun City a widow," remembered Kascy Englund. "I wanted to meet people and get involved. Kascy has worked at the Information unteers at my home because we didn't get to base often and needed to know what was going on."

Lea Solomon recalled that she wanted her husband to join. "So, I did as well," she said. "I volunteered all my life, since I was a kid when my mother made me volunteer." Jerry Solomon was Chief in 2008, and Lea has served as a dispatcher, head of dispatchers, a dispatch scheduler and a stint as a training officer. In 2017, Lea received the "Most Valuable Officer" Award for her contributions to Security Patrol.

"OK, I was coerced," smiled Lottie Tabor, remembering how she was recruited. "All I was interested in was bowling. I moved to Sun City because my sister and brother-in-law were living here. Bill Gutknecht (chief 2002) was recruit officer in 2001. He recruited me at the Newcomers meeting, suggesting I meet Mary Billege, who was on a bowling team.

Mary convinced me to become a dispatcher. I was assigned to the 1,600 hours shift (4 p.m. to 8 p.m.). Back then, new people were assigned to shifts that needed personnel. Now, I drive on the same shift and I am a watch commander on Thursdays."

Many changes have occurred at Security Patrol. Technology advances and social attitudes have evolved the Patrol to where it is at present.

Security Patrol is a service organization that adapts to the needs of the community and the abilities of its members. Please consider volunteering four hours of your time per week. Your talent will be used to benefit all residents in Sun City. And you, too, can receive a pay increase. In volunteering, the formula for success is 0 x 0 = great personal satisfaction. Security Patrol base is open 24/7. Call 254-2303 and a dispatcher will pick up the phone.

Walter has praise for Brian Dodd, (Chief 2016). "We have to thank Dr. Brian Dodd for developing the policies and procedures. There have been so many changes within the organization in general and in each discipline. The P

and P's are followed during training new recruits. It also helps when communicating with residents."

Silvia said that the biggest change is in training. "Recruits were assigned to their shifts and expected to work that shift. Now, trainees can pick their shift. And each discipline has its own program."

"Definitely," Lottie agreed. "Driver training now includes learning about the car. With the hybrid car there are things a driver who doesn't own one needs to learn. Now the trainee gets behind the wheel on the first night. And the biggest change for drivers was removing their logs. Each driver had to keep a written log each shift. All that information was radioed to the dispatcher and put into the dispatchers' log, which is the legal document, making the drivers' logs redundant. Drivers could spend half their shift logging open garage doors, 911 lights, checking Association property and other resident assistance."

# It's Springtime! Some Tips From Community Standards

#### General Maintenance

- How do your awnings look? Can they use some cleaning, repair or replacement? Maybe you just want to change to a new color. The approved color chart is available at the Community Standards Office.
- Don't forget about your windows and screens.
- How about your mailbox post? It should be either black or white (depending on your neighborhood). If it is faded, rusted or any other color, it needs attention.
- Take a look at your wrought iron fencing. If it is faded or rusted, it should be repainted.

#### Landscaping Tips

• Treating your lawn with a pre-emergent won't eliminate all weeds from your property, but it will surely reduce them.

- Don't forget to clean up those pine needles and pine cones that collect on your property. They seem to have a way of migrating uninvited to your neighbors' property, as well.
- If you live on a corner lot that is separated from the street by a wall, remember, YOU are responsible for the maintenance of the strip of landscaping in between.

#### **Community Pets**

 Responsible pet ownership includes ensuring your family pet does not bother your neighbors.
 Incessant barking can be considered a nuisance.
 It seems that some people are oblivious to repetitious barking while others are annoyed by a woof or two. If your dog is left unattended outside and begins to bark, bring it inside so as not to disturb the neighboring residents.



- Are your trees encroaching into your neighbor's property or over a sidewalk? If so, be a good neighbor and trim the limbs back. If the limbs are encroaching over a sidewalk and impede walking on the sidewalk, you can call City of Las Vegas Code Enforcement and report the property (702-229-6615). The City's requirement is that the limbs must be higher than eight (8) feet from the sidewalk.
- How about those palm trees? Dead fronds should be removed.



- Residents who walk their dogs must keep them leashed at all times. That's the law!
- Residents are reminded that they are responsible to pick up after their pets, no matter where they leave their deposits. That's the law, too!

#### **Moving or Estate Sales**



# BRIDGE CLUBS The 'King' of All Card Games

ost card players consider Bridge not only the ultimate, but one of the oldest of all card games. Bridge was derived from Whist in the 16th Century, which was then played by the British. It wasn't known as Bridge before the 1890s in the United States. In 1925, Harold Vanderbilt, while on a cruise, changed some tactics and rules, and Bridge became Contract or Rubber Bridge as we play here at Sun City.

Charles Goren called Bridge the "United States' No. 1 Card Game" in 1958 when he was on the cover of Time magazine. President Dwight D. Eisenhower played Bridge regularly on Saturday nights with the top experts. Omar Shariff ("Lawrence of Arabia") wrote books on the subject of Bridge. Warren Buffet got Bill Gates interested in Bridge again after having been taught the game by his parents. Buffet played in tournaments and Gates was quoted as saying, "Bridge is the king of all card games."

And then in 1931, there were the Bennetts of Kansas City, Kan. Mr. and Mrs. Bennett were playing Bridge one evening, as partners, with the Hoffmans. The Bennetts had been bickering all day and when Mr. Bennett failed to make the bid that he had proposed and Mrs. Bennett, who had not only supported but taken him to game, became extremely agitated. In fact, hysterical. He slapped her across the Bridge table and then she shot him. Ely Cuthbertson later analyzed the cards and proclaimed he could have made the contract.

My aunt moved to New York in the 1930s and got addicted to Bridge at their country club. She taught me how to play in the early 1950s and wanted me to win trophies as she had. Even though it takes years to learn Bridge and I've played off and on for a lifetime, I'm still just barely average.

We moved to Sun City and played Bridge – call it what you will – Contract, Rubber or Party. (We do not score Chicago.) We have two clubs here. The Monday to Thursday Bridge Club meets at 12:30 p.m. on Monday and at noon on Thursday. The Friday evening club meets at 6:30 p.m. Many players, as I do, belong to both clubs. We're not a serious bunch. We come to see our friends, have snacks, two or three lunches or dinners, on the club and play Bridge.

Dues for both clubs are \$10 annually and \$1 each time you play for prize money. Both clubs play in the High Sierra Room at Mountain Shadows. Both clubs play 24 hands – six hands and then the winners move. Monday and Friday, you play with the same partner that you start with. On Thursday, you change partners. Thursday is the more comfortable game for you if you haven't played for a while or don't have a partner. On Friday, we will try to help you find a partner the first time. Prize money is distributed according to the number of tables. Mondays and Fridays the money goes to pairs; Thursday it's to the individual. Average table count is 12 – 16 on Mondays; 8 - 12 on Fridays and 4 - 6 on Thursdays. You are welcome to be a regular or substitute. The first two games are free in each club and then you must join.

Please call before coming. As Bridge players know, it's four to a table and we don't want you to have to go home.

## From the Desk of the Executive Director

### Executive Director's Report for the Month of May 2018

1. Action 10/3/2017-04 - Purchase of a Tuff-Shed to serve as a Cart Barn at Eagle Crest - At the October 3, 2017, Board of Directors meeting the Board of Directors approved a capital expense not to exceed \$35,000 for the purchase

of a Tuff-Shed so the golf carts can be secured and stored at the end of each day. The budget for this item was \$20,000 and additional funding was needed in order to move forward with this project. This project has been completed and was closed at the April 3, 2018, Board of Directors meeting.

- 2. Action 12/5/2017-09 Additional HVAC Needed for the Highland Falls Enclosed Patio Enclosure - At the December 5, 2017, Board of Directors meeting the Board approved Change Order #3, with reservation and without giving up the right to pursue the matter further, for the addition of one (1) 3 -ton HVAC unit with metal duct work and a parapet wall to shield from view at a cost not to exceed \$12,300 for the Highland Falls patio enclosure project. This decision was made after much deliberation and confirmation that in order to be energy efficient and cool the addition effectively the installation of an additional HVAC is required. The Board moved this purchase on for the sole purpose of completing the project and expects that further meetings be held with the contractor and all contractual obligation (if any) as it pertains to sizing of equipment or meeting code requirements be an adjustment to the final billing. At the April 3, 2018, Board of Directors meeting the Board reviewed the costs and change orders for the entire Highland Falls enclosed patio enclosure and found the installation of a second air conditioner to be an added benefitted and the cost to be fair. This action item was closed at the April 3, 2018, Board of Directors meeting.
- 3. Action 12/5/2017- 11 Purchase of Table and Chairs for the Tavern Falls Restaurant At the December 5, 2017, Board of Directors meeting the Board approved the bid from Daniel Paul Chairs in an amount not to exceed \$38,000 for the purchase of 58 dining table chairs with arms, 44 dining table chairs without arms and 23 dining tables in a range of 5 different sizes. This action item has been completed and was closed at the April 3, 2018, Board of Directors meeting.

- 4. Action or/09/2018 -2 Disposal by Auction of (2) Maintenance Trucks At the January 9, 2018, Board of Directors meeting the Board approved the disposal of 2 Maintenance Trucks by public auction. The staff is to research and establish a minimum bid.
- 5. Action oī/o9/2018 3- Purchase and Installation of Dust Collectors & Ventilation System for Model Club Room at Desert Vista At the January 9, 2018, Board of Directors meeting the Board heard from me on the need for the installation of air purifiers in the Model Club Room. Earlier the same day the Common Area Properties Committee had heard directly from the Model Club Charter Club members who had put together and excellent presentation detailing their needs and the cost involved. The cost to replace and upgrade the current air purifying system was approximately \$4,000 and was approved by the Board of Directors. This action item has been completed and was closed at the April 2, 2018, Board of Directors meeting.
- 6. Action 02/06/2018 -1- Purchase and Installation of Carpet and Moving of the Monitor's Desk at the Pinnacle Fitness Center At the February 6, 2018, Board of Directors meeting the Board of Directors approved the bid from Floorworks in the amount of \$11,404 to replace the carpet at the Pinnacle Fitness Center and noted the moving of the monitor's desk would be done in-house with only minor costs for incidental construction items. This action item has been completed and was closed at the April 3, 2018, Board of Directors meeting.
- 7. Action 02/06/2018 -2 Reserve Study At the February 6, 2018, Board of Directors meeting the Board of Directors made a motion to table the RFP for a Reserve Study until the March 6, 2018, Board meeting, which would give Ms. Mills and the Finance Committee the opportunity to review the proposals and make a recommendation to the Board of Directors. 3/5/2018 Update – the Finance Committee was canceled in the month of February in order to give the accounting staff the opportunity to get caught up on their duties and prepare the January financial statement. This meant that the Reserve Study proposals also did not get reviewed by the Finance Committee. I have prepared a comparison analysis of all 4 bids received for the Board to review at the March 6, 2018, Board meeting. I am hoping that since "time is of the essence" and in March the committee appointments are made, that the Board will be able

to review the material and feel comfortable choosing a contractor at the March 6, 2018, Board meeting. 4/3/2018 Update – The Finance Committee met in the month of April and after reviewing the proposals from four companies, narrowed their recommendation down to two of the contractors. The Finance Committee made and unanimously approved a motion for the Executive Director to consider the two finalists and make a recommendation of her preference at the April 3, 2018, Board of Directors meeting for Board consideration. The Executive Director gave a report on each of the companies and the reasoning for the company recommended. The Board of Directors approved the recommendation of Complex Solutions in an amount not to exceed \$37,500.

- 8. Action 03/06/2018 I Two Utility Carts for Landscape Maintenance (RFP #18-26) At the March 6, 2018, Board of Directors meeting the Board of Directors approved the purchase of two Vantage Utility Carts in the amount of \$36,956.61, including the trade-in. The budget for this item was \$20,000. This action item has been completed and was closed at the April 3, 2018, Board of Directors meeting.
- 9. Action 03/06/2018 2 Rewrite of the Clubs and Community Organization Manual At the March 6, 2018, Board of Directors meeting, Board member Barbara Holden submitted to the Board a proposed rewrite of the Clubs and Community Organization Manual from the Clubs and Community Organizations Committee. The Board tabled a decision on this item until the April 3, 2018, Board of Directors meeting. At the April 3, 2018, Board of Directors meeting the Board passed a motion to accept the recommendation of the Clubs and Community Organizations Committee to accept the rewrite of the Organization Manual with the addition that the committee must stay involved and participate in the rollout of the new manual and the educating of the clubs on the contents.
- 10. Action 03/06/2018 3 Amendment to the Rules and Regulations in Regards to the Clubs and Community Organization Manual At the March 6, 2018, Board of Directors meeting, Board member Barbara Holden submitted to the Board a proposed amendment to the Bylaws if the Rewrite of the Clubs and Community Organization Manual was adopted. The Board tabled a decision on this item until the April 3, 2018, Board of Directors meeting.
- 11. Action 03/06/2018 3 Amendment of the Policies and

Procedures Manual - At the March 6, 2018, Board of Directors Meeting, Board member Ellen Bachman submitted to the Board a proposed resolution from the Legal Services Committee to amend the Policies and Procedures Manual. The Board tabled a decision on this item until the April 3, 2018, Board of Directors meeting. At the April 3, 2018 Board of Directors Meeting the Board reviewed the proposed changes and approved adopting the changes as proposed by the Legal Services Committee.

### 12. Action 03/06/2018 – 4– <u>Proposed Addendum and</u> Lease Agreement from Black Dot for the T-Mobile Lease

- At the March 6, 2018, Board of Directors meeting the Board reviewed the proposed addendum and advice from our attorney and denied the request from Black Dot to amend our existing lease with T-Mobile. This action item has been completed and was closed at the April 3, 2018, Board of Directors meeting.

13. Action 03/06/2018 – 5– Board Election Time Line – At the March 6, 2018, Board of Directors meeting, Board member Bruce Alitt submitted to the Board a request that the Election Committee, Legal Services and Staff research the current election timeline to see if it can be shortened, and to report their findings and recommendation in the next 90 days.

14. Action 03/06/2018 – 6– Next Generation Questionnaire - At the March 6, 2018, Board of Directors Meeting, Board member Barbara Holden submitted to the Board a power point presentation outlining the answers received to the questionnaire. We will now work on quantifying those answers, separating those items where immediate action can be taken from short term and long term goals. At the April 3, 2018, Board meeting an update was given by homeowners Dolly Mack and Wendy Bowles.
