

FROM GANDER, NEWFOUNDLAND TO A BROADWAY HIT: FIVE QUESTIONS WITH "COME FROM AWAY" DIRECTOR CHRISTOPHER ASHLEY

The storyline of "Come From Away" might seem unlikely for a Broadway musical. It's the real-life story of 7,000 airline passengers grounded in Gander, Newfoundland after 9/11, and how the small town banded together to make the newcomers feel welcome and safe.

Yet thanks to the vision of director **Christopher Ashley,** who won a Tony for his direction of the show, it became a heartwarming portrayal of humanity in the midst of dark times.

Coming to The Smith Center from February 19 to 24, "Come From Away" has received glowing critical acclaim.

Ashley spoke with The Smith Center about how this incredible show came together.

1. How did the idea for this production even come about?

CA: Writers David Hein and Irene Sankoff initially received a grant to visit Gander, Newfoundland on the 10th anniversary of 9/11. They gathered countless stories of what happened in the days following the attack, stories that became this beautiful and unique musical.

2. What made you want to be a part of this production?

CA: I was in New York City during the 9/11 attacks, and like many Americans, was profoundly shaken. When I read an early draft of this script, I was immediately drawn to telling a story about joy and kindness in the wake of such a horrific tragedy.

3. How do audiences usually respond to this show? What overall experience do you hope they have?

CA: Every audience member brings their own experience of the week of 9/11, and watches the show through the lens of their own story. Hopefully the audience comes away with a positive story of hope and humanity, and a belief that community, generosity and kindness can transcend tragedy.

4. How did you approach this show as a director, to make this story resonate with audiences?

CA: We cast 12 superbly versatile actors to tell the stories of 16,000 people. We asked those 12 actors to perform a theatrical coup: transforming from character to character, shifting dialect, physicality and intention in the blink of an eye.

5. Is there anything else you would like to share about this inspiring production?

CA: As the actors perform a story about generosity, they are constantly helping each other out in large and small ways. Watch closely, and you will see the performers quietly passing each other props, helping with costume changes, repositioning a chair for the next actor to sit in it. This show is not only about kindness, it requires collaboration and kindness to perform.

Safety First Is Head Driver's Priority

ecurity Patrol drivers are on the streets of Sun City Summerlin 24/7. That's a lot of wear and tear on the vehicles.

"We have five cars and whenever there is a manufacturer's recall, that car is at the dealership the same day. Safety is first," reported Norman Cohen, head driver for Security Patrol.

"We keep track of the mileage daily, tire rotation and oil change needs. At 100,000 miles we consider all the information we have on that car when considering a replacement vehicle," Norman said.

Cohen has a team that drives the cars for maintenance – Allyn and Hilda Ayotte, and Bob Sebastian. They also drive regular shifts. Another responsibility Norm has as head driver is training and scheduling new drivers. "First, if possible, I have a phone interview with new trainees," he said. "Then I try to match the person with an instructor that he or she would be compatible with. Very important is the person's willingness to learn."

Cohen has assembled several experienced drivers and trained them as instructors. An instructor is assigned to a four-hour shift with a trainee who begins to learn how to patrol the streets in an assigned area. It is a challenge when the trainee lives in the neighborhood of Sun Shadows Community Center and must learn the streets in the Pinnacle Community Center neighborhood. Drivers are assigned different areas on each shift. Eventually, drivers learn all Sun City Summerlin streets. Next, the trainee learns how to respond to 911 emergency lights, open garage doors and inquires from concerned families or friends about a resident. Security Patrol's manual outlines the responsibilities for drivers on every shift. Each instructor evaluates the driver at

the end of a training session and the evaluation is given to the head driver and the head trainer. At the end of the four training sessions, a completed evaluation is sent to the Patrol's personnel.

In addition to vehicle maintenance and driver training, Cohen also drives two to three shifts weekly and is available whenever a driver is unable to work. When asked about his ideas for improvements to the program, Cohen said "I'd like to begin more driver safety checks. We have a great group of dedicated drivers and I think that a re-check every five years would be beneficial for all of us. I also would like to see us update our safety equipment and training for better traffic control when Metro requests Security Patrol to assist after a traffic accident."

Security Patrol has a ride-along program for residents interested in joining the Patrol. If you are interested in being a driver or would like to learn more about other volunteer opportunities with the Patrol, call 702-254-2303.

2019 Board of Directors Election

Information — How to Vote

ELECTION DAY IS TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 26, 2019 — THIS IS YOUR LAST CHANCE TO VOTE.

- 1. Note: Because of the Bylaw vote to change the BOD term of office from two years to three years, this year we will be electing four (4) residents to serve on the Board of Directors as follows: The three candidates with the highest votes will be elected for three-year terms. The next candidate receiving the highest votes will serve a two-year
- 2. The ballot is the address label for the February Link and a pre-posted return envelope is included in the magazine package. Instructions are printed on the ballot. A household has four (4) votes.
- 3. After marking the ballot, remove the "Instructions" side to remove your name and address. Insert the ballot half into the envelope so that the bar code, which is used for validation, shows through the envelope's window. On vote counting day, Wednesday, February 27, the Election Committee will cut off the bar code before removing your secret ballot. The Committee uses optical scanners to count the ballots and tabulate the votes electronically.
- 4. If you make a mistake marking your ballot, DO NOT correct it. Exchange the old ballot for a new one at the Administration Office at Mountain **Shadows.** Before requesting a replacement ballot and envelope, be certain that another member of the household has not voted. Should two ballots be

- received from the same home, both will be voided. Casting more than four votes also will void the ballot. Your votes may be cast for one candidate or divided among two or more candidates. Each member household receives one ballot. Each member household will have four (4) votes.
- 5. Validation and counting of the ballots occurs at an official SCSCAI Association meeting on Wednesday, February 27, 2019, starting at 8 a.m.
- **6.** Mountain Shadows. The election results will then be announced by the secretary of the Association. All those who wish to witness the ballot tabulation are invited to attend the ballot counting meeting.



Pursuant to NRS 116.31034, Section 12

An association shall not adopt any rule or regulation that has the effect of prohibiting or unreasonably interfering with a candidate in his campaign for election as a member of the executive board, except that his campaign may be limited to 90 days before the date that ballots are required to be returned to the Association. A candidate may request that the secretary or other officer specified in the bylaws of the Association send, 30 days before the date of the election and at the Association's expense, to the mailing address of each unit within the common-interest community or to any other mailing address designated in writing by the unit's owner a candidate informational statement. The candidate information statement: (a) Must be no longer than a single typed page; (b) Must not contain any defamatory, libelous or profane information; and (c) May be sent with the secret ballot mailed pursuant to subsection 8 or in a separate mailing. The Association and its directors, officers, employees and agents are immune from criminal or civil liability for any act or omission which arises out of the publication or disclosure of any information related to any person and which occurs in the course of carrying out any duties required pursuant to this subsection.





Otherwise, why would a boy born and raised in the Detroit area, a product of the Catholic school system and the descendent of people who were neither professionals nor veterans, turn down an opportunity to attend Notre Dame and opt for a career in the Navy? But that is just what Bruce Adams did.



"I was born in Farmington, Mich., a member of the Baby Boomer generation. There I attended the local Catholic grade school and attended a boys' Catholic high school in Detroit (Detroit Catholic Central). As a kid, I was fascinated by all things military. Watching every episode of "Victory at Sea" and "Men of Annapolis" was a high priority. I never missed a military movie and devoured military novels and military history books. Looking back, I realized I knew almost no one who served or made a career in the service. Almost all my relatives manufactured war material during WWII, in the Arsenal of Democracy, Detroit. My father manufactured parts for Sherman Tanks.

"Three friends had received appointments to the academies. That was certainly an incentive to make me feel that, if they could do it, so could I! My teachers at Catholic Central were closely aligned with Notre Dame University and certainly pushed qualified students to

attend there. But you got a pass if you attended a Service Academy. I did apply to, and was accepted by Notre Dame, which was my backup school. But I really wanted Annapolis," Bruce said.

The entire process of applying to the Service Academies was both lengthy and difficult. Certainly the path to Notre Dame was much easier, but it paid off. Bruce was accepted to West Point. It wasn't his first choice, but he



was resigned to becoming a member of the Long Gray Line until, at the last moment, he received a telegram stating that he had been accepted at Annapolis. "It was a life-altering reprieve, and it didn't take long to make my decision. I showed up at the US Naval Academy on 30 June 1965, to be sworn in as a Midshipman, a



member of the Naval Academy Class of 1969," Bruce recalled.

He was prepared. He had read a lot and pretty much knew what to expect, and was never surprised by anything that happened.

"I might have been scared, hurt, disappointed or angered, but never surprised. Except for the weather. Annapolis,

Maryland, in the summer is truly the most miserable place on earth. The heat and humidity took a lot to get

used to. And Bancroft Hall (our gigantic dormitory building) was not air conditioned. Nor were there screens on the windows. Humidity, heat and flying bugs became something to live with, along with all of the misfortunes of being a Plebe under constant mental and physical assault." Life at any military academy is very ... structured and Annapolis is no different. The course work is rigorous and the Naval Academy had a regular curriculum of engineering, science and math, as well as courses geared specifically to the military profession. But it was not all course work. There were sports and, of course, summer training cruises.

rotating through the various departments on our assigned ship. I was lucky enough to be assigned to a ship

whose home port was Newport, R.I. Being in Newport was fabulous, but being at sea was equally fascinating. After our junior year, we were again assigned to ships for the summer, but this time as junior officers (Midshipmen First Class). I was assigned to the USS Cromwell, about the smallest warship in the Navy. The Cromwell was a destroyer escort, 300 feet long and outfitted with all the weapons necessary to escort convoys in WWII.

"But this was 1968 and we were bound for a show-the-flag visit to all the major Northern European ports. (Copenhagen, here I come!)

Il Sun City Summerlin residents are encouraged to take advantage of services provided by the Neighborhood Watch/Community Preparedness Committee, which has transitioned from an SCSCAI standing committee to the Neighborhood Preparedness Team, a community service organization. Benefitting participants of an educational program are all Sun City residents, including those who rent their homes, as well as property owners.

"With a name change to the Neighborhood Preparedness Team, our mission will remain the same, but the organizational structure will be more inclusive of everyone who lives here," said Erik Braun, the Team's co-chairman. The Neighborhood Team will continue to teach residents to be more self-sufficient in knowing how to respond to emergency situations.

Business Meetings

The Neighborhood Preparedness Team provides its annual schedule of meetings to the Community Services Department, which coordinates notification of all monthly meetings in the Link, Sun City Summerlin's official publication.

Mission Statement

The purpose of the Neighborhood Preparedness Team is to educate all community residents to safely respond to consequences of a natural, industrial or crime-related adversity by means of a communitywide network, and to heighten awareness of crime prevention techniques through a partnership with the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department. The neighborhood team benefits Sun City residents as a nonprofit organization with all funds used for community organization purposes.

A Full Calendar of Work **Awaits Committee** in 2019

ecember 11, 2018, was the last meeting of the year for the Common Area Properties (CAP) Committee. As members brought 2018 to a close there were several issues reported that might be of interest to residents, as well as some new and exciting projects to ring in the New Year.

Winter play at the golf courses was slower due to the irrigation project, but SCSCAI Golf Director Donny Long reported that the numbers were expected. Donny reassured everyone that a great spring turnout is expected.

December 2018

The "12 Days of Christmas" promotion began at our pro shops on December 13 and was very successful. When someone paid for a green fee, they received various gifts and raffle tickets. Lots of gift cards were purchased for merchandise and food and beverage.

January

- The new carpet at the Mountain Shadows miniature golf course was to be replaced, but due to bad weather on the East Coast, the project was delayed. It is expected to start as soon as the carpet arrives.
- The Desert Vista Social Monitor's station, as well as the Mountain Shadows Social Monitor's station will be remodeled. Bids are expected by the January Board of Director's meeting, with work to start when the funds are approved.
- The window treatments for Tavern at the Falls arrived with installation set for this month.
- The twisted Junipers at the Mountain Shadows Community Center have been removed, and that project is complete.
- Louis Darling, SCSCAI's Director of Landscape, reported that he is waiting on BOD approval to start a project at the Desert Vista pool area patio. That work will include the installation of new pavers and removing certain trees.
- The Golf Maintenance Department reported that spraying work on the test fairway at Palm Valley was complete.

March

Repairs to the shuffleboard courts at Mountain Shadows have been put off until March because warmer weather is needed to repair courts 3 and 4, which had been done unsatisfactorily.

June to September

A second irrigation project at Palm Valley is expected to close the course, starting June 3. The work will include replacing the irrigation project along the back nine. The work is estimated to cost \$2.4 million and should be complete by September 16.

Health & Fitness Department

Along with the new flooring at various centers and the two new fitness monitor stations, different layouts are being reviewed that would allow for more efficient movement throughout the gym. The department is also evaluating adding new equipment to several centers. Every month throughout 2019, the Health and Fitness Department is projecting "A Year of Healthy Living," with each month covering a new theme. SCSCAI Fitness Director Pam Shields reported that the use of the new antimicrobial spray is working, and that the spraying of the equipment, door handles, lockers, mats, etc., has proved to be highly effective.

Food & Beverage Department

Anthony Marrone, Food & Beverage Manager, was unable to attend the meeting, but SCSCAI Executive Director Mitzi Mills filed the report in his stead, announcing that Mr. Gage Stringer, who has worked with Anthony, will be staying on staff as the new Food & Beverage Assistant.

A New Year's Resolution (though a bit late in reporting), I'd like to report that all department directors are working hard to improve and help our community thrive and grow in 2019. We are very fortunate to have the staff we have aiding us in our vision to see Sun City Summerlin continue to be the very best retirement community to live in across the country.

Model Builders, Golf, Neighborhood Watch Seek CCOC Assistance


ecember 2018 was a busy month for CCOC. Some of the highlights were: The Model Club made a presentation regarding the cost of its new and modernized Lone Mountain Railroad exhibition. Club members informed CCOC that they had spent about \$10,000 from the Club and private donations to date. They asked for an Association contribution of about \$6,000 to completely finish the project. Our Executive Director agreed to make the request a Conceptual Idea and to bring it forward to all stakeholders.

The CCOC reviewed a proposed constitution for a new community organization, the Neighborhood Preparedness Team Community Organization. It was explained that this new community organization

would eventually take the place of and do all the things presently being done by the Neighborhood Watch/ Community Preparedness Committee.

The presentation detailed how the change in status to a community organization from an Association standing committee would make the group more inclusive to all residents because membership would not be limited to only SCSCAI members. The request was approved for forwarding to Sun City's Board of Directors. SCSCAI Executive Director Mitzi Mills presented an issue on behalf of the Sapphire golf members who are not all SCSCAI members. According to Ms. Mills, the members, who are a valuable asset to our golf program, would like to participate in golf club activities and tournaments. After an interesting discussion, the CCOC proposed that all Sapphire golf members be allowed to participate in golf club activities so long as the club members approve and they pay all associated costs and fees. This matter will be forwarded to the Golf Oversight Committee for review and possible forwarding to Sun City's Board of Directors.

Getting to the Heart of the Matter

February is Heart Health Month! What comes to mind when you think about heart health? High blood pressure, diabetes, congestive heart failure, etc. While genetics can play a role, these conditions are largely the result of choices we make over the course of our lives. Your heart pumps blood throughout your body, carrying oxygen and other key nutrients vital to your survival. Anything that disrupts this blood flow (smoking, dehydration, poor diet, lack of exercise) increases your chances of contracting heart disease and other chronic conditions. The good news is it is not too late to improve your heart health. We've got some suggestions below that don't cost a lot, don't involve drugs and will put a smile on your face!

5 Interesting Facts About Your Heart:

- 1. Your heart is about the size of your clenched fist and weighs slightly less than 1 pound.
- 2. Your heart pumps about 2,000 gallons of blood every day
- 3. A woman's heart beats slightly faster than a man's heart.
 - 4. The beating sound of your heart is caused by the valves of the heart opening and closing.
 - 5. It is possible to have a broken heart. "Broken heart syndrome" has similar symptoms as a heart attack but is caused by a rush of stress hormones from an emotional or physical stress event, versus heart disease.

5 Lifestyle Changes to Improve Your Heart Health:

- 1. Laughter is good for your heart. It reduces your stress level and boosts your immune system.
- 2. Stand up and move around. The USDA recommends at least 30 minutes per day of physical activity, but even if you get 30-60 minutes of exercise per day, it matters what you do with the other 23 hours. Move around frequently throughout your day.
 - 3. Hydrate, hydrate, hydrate.Getting plenty of water improves your circulation.

- 4. Eat a heart-healthy diet and maintain a healthy weight. Processed and fast foods produce inflammation. Whole foods are anti-inflammatory. Eat more fruits, vegetables, whole grains, beans, nuts and fatty fish.
- 5. Get your zzzz's. Lack of sleep increases the risk for heart disease. The sweet spot seems to be between 6 8½ hours per night.

5 Easy Nutritional Changes:

Isatu Isuk, R.D., L.D.N., a dietitian at the Johns Hopkins Hospital, suggests simple dietary adjustments.

- 1. Choose nuts over chips.
- 2. Choose coffee or tea over soda.
- 3. Choose dark chocolate over baked goods.
- 4. Choose broiled or grilled salmon over steak.
- 5. Choose green side dishes over white ones (potatoes, breads, rice, etc.).

5 Recommended Check-ups for Heart Health:

- 1. Blood pressure checks
- Blood glucose
- 3. Cholesterol
- 4. BMI Body Mass Index
- 5. Waist circumference

5 Types of Exercise to Improve Your Heart Health:


- 1. Walk
- 2. Swim
- 3. Dance
- 4. Tai chi
- 5. Strength training

Whatever you choose to do, know that you can improve your heart health, starting today. As always, check with your health care provider before beginning a new exercise program. It is normal to feel some soreness when you do something new and/or different. Start slow and listen to your body.





It's Time to Decide Where to Permanently Store Your Trash Cans Outside

Trash and Recyclable Pickup

We understand that the new Republic Services schedule may be confusing to residents as we continue to receive complaints that residents are putting their trash out too early for Tuesday pickup. Some residents also think that trash will be picked up on Fridays if they put it out. Others are storing their trash carts in front of the garage and putting trash bags out for pickup.

- 1. Trash should not be at the curb prior to 3 p.m. on Monday for Tuesday pickup.
- 2. Until February 28, 2019, trash carts **THAT ARE NOT STORED IN THE GARAGE** must be stored on the side of the home, behind the front line of the dwelling; not in the front of the garage. **As of March 1, 2019**, the carts must be stored in a manner so as not to be visible from the street, unless at the curb for scheduled pickup.
- 3. If you plan to build an enclosure for the carts, it must first be applied for and approved by the Architectural Review Committee (ARC). The carts can be concealed by:
 - a. A masonry enclosure with a stucco finish painted to match the color of the house
 b. A wrought iron enclosure with metal mesh screening painted to match the color of the house
 c. Bushes or shrubs that are tall enough to cover the carts at the time of planting.
- 4. Republic will no longer pick up loose trash bags unless it is on bulk pickup day, which is every other Tuesday. Check the calendar you received from Republic when your trash cans were first delivered, or

- see the calendar posted on SunCitySummerlin.com. You may also call Republic Services (702-735-5151) to have a calendar mailed to you.
- 5. Trash containers must be placed in the street with wheels against the curb at least 2 feet apart from each other and away from objects.
- 6. Each sub-association may determine where trash containers can be stored, as long as the containers are not visible from the streets.

PODs and Dumpsters

A Barricade Permit is required from the City of Las Vegas Public Works Department to store a POD or Dumpster on the street for any length of time. For information, call 702-229-6276.

PODS or Dumpsters can be stored on private property for a maximum of 14 days without a permit. Longer than 14 days requires a permit from the City of Las Vegas Planning Department. For information, call 702-229-6301.

City of Las Vegas Parking Services

Recreational vehicles (RVs) and mobile homes may not park in residential streets without first obtaining a temporary RV permit. A permit allows street parking for a maximum 48-hour period. If an additional permit is desired, a minimum of 72 hours from the previous expiration is required.

Permits are issued Monday to Thursday, 7 a.m. to 5 p.m., at the Parking Office in Las Vegas, 500 S. Main St., or online at https://secure3.lasvegasnevada.gov/eparking. For information, call 702-229-4700 or 800-228-3332.



appy New Year to each and every one of you. I hope you had a wonderful holiday season. As we start off 2019, I am looking for your opinion on some items we are considering. If any of the items below apply to you please respond by sending me an email (MitziM@SunCityLV.com) or letter, no verbal responses will be taken as we need to log and document each response. You only need to reply to those items that are of interest to you, and you do not need to reply if none of them pertain to you. This is just a way for me to get the community pulse from residents who use the facilities being addressed.

Basketball Court – If you use the basketball half-court at the Pickleball courts at Desert Vista, please let me know. We are considering moving the half-court to a different location or possibly getting rid of it all together. But we want to hear from those who use it before we do.

Horseshoe Pits at Desert Vista – It appears that the horseshoe pits at Desert Vista are not used. We would like to make changes to this area and add some other type of activity for our residents to enjoy. If you presently use this area, or if you have ideas for a new outdoor activity for the area we want to hear from you.

Fitness Center and Community Center Hours - Do you use the fitness centers or community centers? Sidewalk parking is a violation of two separate city ordinances - sidewalk obstruction and residential parking. Also, if you send me an email with the address and a picture (or description of the car) with the license plate number I will send the owner of the property a head's up letter that they are violating city ordinances and could receive a ticket and fine from the City of Las Vegas. You do need to send this concern to me by email (MitziM@SunCityLV.com) or drop it off in writing to my office at Mountain Shadows (signed) as I do not take reports of this nature over the phone.

I appreciate your input on these items. This is not a vote, but an information gathering exercise to help me in my management reports on certain items. It is important that you only respond to items you use or participate in. You will see more of these types of inquiries from me as issues come up, and your input is always appreciated.




