Preside S MESSAGE

Board of Directors' Election Top Event of the Month



The Residents' Forum hosted a Meet the Candidates Night in January.

G ood day to all our wonderful Sun City Summerlin residents. A few words about what you read in the Link. The notes in the Link are due to the Link editor about 30 days prior to publication, so I'm writing this note on January 1, 2020, for the February 2020 edition of the Link. The Link staff then edits the content and prepares the magazine for publication, which you will receive toward the end of January. We are fortunate to have such a great magazine, keeping us all up to date on our community. Thank you, Jeannette and Stacie!

During February, all SCSCAI homeowners will join their homeowner brethren in voting to fill five Board of Director positions. The January issue of the Link included a one-page note from each candidate summarizing his or her qualifications for being on the Board. Please read what each candidate wrote and use that information to help you decide who to vote for. On January 8, the Residents' Forum hosted an evening with the candidates, where the candidates introduced themselves and answered questions from the audience. Candidates Night is a great event and I hope you were able to attend. If you could not attend, talk to your friends who did attend and ask their opinion of the candidates. Consider all the information you can gather and then select the candidates you will vote for. The selection of SCSCAI Board members deserves your thoughtful attention.

When Del Webb incorporated SCSCAI, he included in the Articles of Incorporation and the Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions (CC&Rs) many restrictions as to what the Board and Executive Director can do. Nevada Revised Statute (NRS) 116 adds about 400 more pages. Yes, 400 pages of HOA dos and don'ts. What that means to you is that many times the Board cannot do what might seem to be a great idea because it could be violating the CC&Rs or Nevada law. Can those rules be changed? Yes, but it is VERY difficult to do and not done very often. In the case of NRS 116, the Nevada Legislature would have to make the change (good luck with that) and to change the CC&Rs, it takes a vote of the homeowners. There are two changes to our governing documents that require homeowner approval on this year's ballot. Consider their impact and then vote according to your assessment of each change.

And as a final note, a no-brainer that might even save your life. The SCSCAI Security Patrol keeps a database of emergency contact information for homes in SCSCAI that the Security Patrol uses to contact you or your designated representative if something is amiss, such as water leaking from under the garage door or a friend reports they have not seen you for several days, etc. It's an opt-in program that you must submit the information or not, your choice. The information you provide will only be used by the Security Patrol for the stated use; it is never shared with anyone else. The emergency contact form is available from the Security Patrol HQ at Desert Vista, the SCSCAI Administration Office at Mountain Shadows and at many activities such as Residents's Forum events. Please, please have a current emergency contact form on file with our Security Patrol.

s you read this article, you should have received your packet in the mail to vote for your choice of candidates running to serve on the SCSCAI Board of Directors. If you have not received your large, white envelope with the red marking "SCSCAI Election Material Enclosed, Time Sensitive," please contact the Administration Office at Mountain Shadows, 9107 Del Webb Blvd.

The envelope contains everything you need to know about the 10 candidates running for the Board. There are statements prepared by the candidates to acquaint you with their qualifications and experience, as well as a disclosure statement, required by Nevada State Law, which states that the candidate is a member in good standing with the Association and has no conflict of interest in serving on the Board. Candidates are:

Most importantly, your ballot to vote is in the packet, along with a return envelope. The YELLOW ballot has the names of all 10 candidates in the order that was determined by a draw of numbers in an organizational meeting that was held in December. There are five (5) open Director positions. As Sun City is in the final year of a transition from two-year to threeyear Board terms, the top three vote recipients will be elected to three-year terms with the next two highest vote recipients receiving one-year terms.

The ballot is to be returned either in person or by mail to the SCSCAI Administration Office at Mountain Shadows. You MUST use the YELLOW envelope provided in your packet to return your ballot. The envelope has prepaid postage and a bar code. Please do not write on the envelope – no return address. Do not cover the bar code as it is needed to validate your ballot. To ensure privacy, the envelope will be separated from the ballot before counting.

All ballots must be received no later than 5 p.m. on Tuesday, February 25, whether mailed or hand-carried. Ballots will be opened and tabulated on Wednesday, February 26, at the Association's Annual Meeting at Mountain Shadows with the call to order at 8 a.m.

SCSCAI Bylaws and CC&R Proposed Changes

In addition to voting for candidates for the Board of Directors, there are three other items that require your vote.

Ballots for these changes are blue and each change has a separate ballot. Please note that these ballots should be placed in the same yellow envelope that contains your election ballot. The deadline for votes being received is the same 5 p.m., February 25, time frame, and counting will take place on February 26.

National Atomic Testing Museum

This is an extremely rare view of Hoover Dam that very few people have the opportunity to see. Guests board large comfortable rafts that have been carefully constructed with safety in mind. Rafts have multiple air chambers and are outfitted with all of the Coast Guard-required and recommended safety equipment. During this excursion, experienced and knowledgeable guides share the history of this magnificent geological area. Be prepared to see desert bighorn sheep, osprey and great blue heron in their natural setting. The tour stops along the shore to give you a chance to enjoy the cool, clear and calm waters below Hoover Dam. Ham Radio Operators Ready When Emergency Strikes



Many ham radios have their own emergency power, batteries, generators or solar. Some even have windmills that give them the means to communicate around the world or across town.

ou've seen it all on TV, the devastation in the wake of wildfires, earthquakes, dams that failed, hurricanes, blizzards, even terrorist attacks. What you don't see is the destruction wreaked on our infrastructure – power goes out over wide areas, cell phone towers topple, traditional phones have no dial tone, cable TV and the Internet go down, dams and bridges may even be destroyed.

With no electricity, computers won't work, so there is no email or Facebook. None of the phones will work, either. Roads are blocked, gas pumps don't work and you can't drive to safety.

How do you get out? How do you get word out?

That's where amateur radio, also known as ham radio, comes into play. Hams have networks set up citywide, statewide and nationwide that operate on emergency power so you can let someone know you need help, or so you can let worried relatives in Boston know you're safe here in Sun City.

Amateur radio operators are ordinary friends and neighbors who enjoy chatting on their shortwave radios to other hams in other states and even other countries. They can talk to astronauts on the International Space Station and even bounce their signals off the moon.

But there's also a very serious side to amateur radio. Hams get the word out when traditional communications systems are down. Many hams have their own emergency power, batteries, generators, solar, some even have windmills giving them the means to communicate around the world or across town. Ham radio has saved thousands of lives over the years. Sun City Summerlin has its own amateur radio organization that is part of the Sun City Neighborhood Preparedness Team. While members enjoy "rag chewing" (chatting) with other hams much of their focus is on emergency preparedness and what they can do to help when called upon. They're constantly upgrading their skills to learn what they can do when disaster strikes, and they devote much of their time and energy to assisting other volunteer organizations and government agencies in keeping information flowing.

Hams conduct practice drills throughout the year. And while the drills are quite serious most have an element of fun attached. One of the most popular is the annual field day in which local amateurs haul their transmitters, antennas and generators up Mount Charleston where they compete with other hams around the world to make as many contacts as they can in a day or over a weekend. This helps them sharpen their operating skills under less than ideal situations.

Ham also have been known to set up demonstrations in public parking lots or other spaces to demonstrate their ability to communicate across the globe or across the street.

Sun City Hams has 35 members and welcomes new members all the time. Even if you know nothing about radio or electronics, you can get up and running with the help of Sun City's Hams and the many resources that are available.

THANK YOU FOR YOUR SERVICE JIM AND PEARL RUPERT: LOVE TO LAST FOR A LIFETIME

t almost reads like a 1940s wartime romance movie script. Jim Rupert and Pearl Smith met in the summer of 1937 at the county fair. Although that was the beginning of what was to be a 70-year romance, the dating was casual at first. Jim was a high school senior; Pearl just 16. Both had plans for the future, and although marriage was part of those plans there was nothing immediate being planned. Jim had a job and had joined the National Guard in 1936 at age 18. Pearl looked forward to a career as a hair stylist.

In many ways, Pearl's life was typical of her generation of rural Americans. In one very important way, however, she was unique. Pearl Smith was born on a farm in Smethport, Pa., at the beginning of the Roaring Twenties, the first of eight children. She attended school in a one-room schoolhouse, not that unusual for farm country children at that time. If you asked her to describe her childhood she would say it was a horse and buggy time. She would go on to graduate high school and become a hair stylist. She was days shy of turning 20 when Pearl Harbor was attacked and everything changed.

Jim was born in Rew, Pa., one of four sons – two of whom had served during the First World War. He was already a Master Sergeant in the Army National Guard's 28th Division when his unit was activated in February 1941. By the summer of 1942 he was enrolled in Officer Candidate School (OCS). Jim was to be an infantry officer. He was stationed at Fort Benning, Ga., and had already received sealed orders sending him into harm's way.

Jim and Pearl had talked about getting married 'someday.' Among the things that Pearl Harbor changed was their wedding plans. Times were uncertain; live today – today! The Army arranged transportation for Pearl to Fort Benning and the couple were married in September 1942. Three days later Jim shipped out to where Pearl later learned was Sitka, Alaska, the site of the Battle of the Aleutian Islands. It would be two years before they were to see each other again.

Back in Pennsylvania, Pearl resumed her civilian life. In April 1943 she had to go to Pittsburgh. While in the train station, she spotted a Navy recruiting poster that caught her eye. The Navy was looking for women to become WAVES. Jim was serving, why shouldn't she? She found the nearest recruiting station and walked in ready to join the Navy. But there, staring her in the face, was a Marine Corps poster. The Marine Corps, the last of the services to open its ranks to women, publicly began recruiting in February 1943 with a goal of enlisting 19,000 women. Unlike the




other services, these women were not going to be assigned to an affiliated branch like the Army's WACs or the Navy's WAVES; they were Marines. The goal being to release men from support roles to make them available for combat duty. And this is where Pearl's experience became unique.

"It sounds silly now, but you have to remember that I was a hair stylist and my best friend was a hat designer, so how the uniform hats looked on women with the hair styles of the day was important to me. And, to me, the Marine uniform hat won handsdown, so I volunteered for the Marines. They sent me to Camp Lejuene, North Carolina, for basic training. We were trained by regular Marine drill sergeants. There were no women Marine officers at that point. I was making history by being part of the very first woman Marine boot camp class." Pearl said proudly.

After completing boot camp, Pearl was assigned to Aviation Quartermaster School to prepare her for next assignment.

"My next duty station was Cherry Point, North Carolina,

where I was to spend the rest of my service. When I reported in, I was assigned to learn the duties of a particular young man who worked in aviation supply. He immediately let me know, in no uncertain terms, that he was ticked! 'Because of you, I am going to be sent into combat. Hell, I'm married,' he shouted. 'So am I,' I shouted back."

In 1944, Jim rotated back to Fort Dix, New Jersey, prior to being sent to Europe as part of the 106th Infantry Division. Pearl requested leave and took the train to New Jersey to spend time with him before he shipped out to England in November 1944. The division would go on to the Ardennes on November 26 and was partially overrun in the initial German assault (Battle of the Bulge) on December 10. Jim's platoon was quickly surrounded and forced to surrender. They were being held in a Belgium farm house when American forces reclaimed the area and freed the POWs. In all, the Division lost 8,600 men in that battle. Jim was awarded the Bronze Star.

In the meantime, Pearl returned to her post stateside. However, she soon discovered that she was pregnant with their first child, a daughter. In accordance with the policy of the day, Sergeant Pearl Smith Rupert was honorably discharged on December 13, 1944, for the convenience of the Government..

"I went back to Pennsylvania and lived with two of my sisters who were still in school while I awaited the birth of my daughter and the return of my husband," Pearl said. "My daughter was born in July and was 4 months old when Jim came home. Unlike many of his compatriots, Jim wasn't anxious to leave the service. He wanted to make a career in the Army. That sounded good to me and we became a military family traveling to many parts of the world. I loved it!"

Jim retired as a Major in July 1962.

"In 1999, with Jim's health deteriorating, we thought of moving to Las Vegas to be near my daughter. I found this wonderful house on the golf course where Jim, by then wheelchair bound, could watch our neighbors on the course. It has been just wonderful living here," she said.

Jim passed away in 2007. Pearl turned 99 in November.



elcome new neighbors. The holidays are over and it's time to check the new resident packet you received. Look for the blue form entitled Emergency Contact. It's an important form that needs to be completed and delivered to Security Patrol base at the Desert Vista Community Center (look for the flagpole next to the Pickleball courts) or any one of the Information Centers located at one of the entrances to the community at Del Webb and Rampart boulevards; Lake Mead and Del Webb boulevards; and Sun City and Lake Mead boulevards. The information you put on the form can help prevent a burglary or save your life. If you have misplaced the form, extras are available at the Information Centers and at Security Patrol.

Neighbors, has your friend moved out of Sun City? The one who had the key to your home in case of an emergency? If so, you'll need to change their name on your Emergency Contact form.

Why bother? Because that form provides Security Patrol with the names and contact information of people who can help in case an emergency. For example: An accident puts you in the hospital. Perhaps you left your garage door open, or your front door was left unlocked by first-responders, or your mail and newspapers are piling up signaling that your home is unoccupied. There are people who monitor such activity and use the information to burglarize your home. Security Patrol volunteers who drive the community report these situations to their dispatcher. The dispatcher will then begin to contact your Emergency Contact person.

How else does Security Patrol help? Another example: Your neighbor notices that you haven't been collecting your mail and he/she hasn't seen you for a few days. He/she contacts Security Patrol worried that you, the resident, may be ill or away. A driver scheduled for that neighborhood will be instructed to check the outside of your house and contact the neighbor who inquired about you to let them know you

are out of town or in the hospital. If no information is available from the neighbor/s, the dispatcher will access your Emergency Contact information and begin calling the people on the form to see if they have any information about you. If the neighbor is concerned about your health and safety, a Security Patrol Watch Commander will go to the residence to decide if a welfare check is necessary. In some situations, a Watch Commander may call 911 for first-responders. It is very important that

Healthy and fitness

Functional Fitness: A Prescription for Wellness

s seniors, whether we are still very active or struggling with mobility issues, we should all be concerned about maintaining our overall health and maintaining independence for as long as possible.

Among other things, exercise can keep your muscles strong, improve your circulation, support your immune system and improve your mood. Most people are either doing the same fitness routine they've always done or don't know what type of exercises they should be doing.

For example, swimming is an excellent form of exercise. But if that is all you are doing, you may be missing out on the benefits of balance and strength work, which you will need for loading the trunk of your car with groceries or picking up your grandchildren. If all you do is walk or run on the treadmill, you may be missing out on the balance and agility required by navigating real terrain like cracked sidewalks, hills and other obstacles. If all you do is lift weight in the gym, you might be missing out on some of the benefits of balance, agility and cardiovascular training.

A good answer is to add variety to your workout. A better answer is to exercise with a focus on including the four cornerstones of physical fitness - strength, cardio, balance and flexibility. Functional training can do this for you.

According to WebMD.com, functional training is focused on building a body capable of doing real-life activities in real-life

weight in an idealized posture created by a gym machine. Functional training targets your muscles to work in coordination to simply accomplish daily tasks or prepare for a sports competition. This is accomplished by using muscles in the upper and lower body, sometimes including rotation with an emphasis on core stability.

Many gyms offer functional fitness classes and other boutique studios have designed their entire business around functional training. You can choose to join an existing program



or put together your own. In the March Link, we will cover specific exercises and discuss what makes them functional. We'll also explore ways you can work functional fitness into your daily routine.

As always, if you haven't exercised in a while or plan to start a new program it is recommended that you check with your doctor.

Nutrition Tip-Healthy Foods for Healthy Eyes

hat foods come to mind when you think about keeping your eyesight healthy and strong? I'm sure we all can remember a time in our childhood where we were told to "Eat your carrots!" Carrots cannot restore vision loss or make any structural changes to the eye, but they are definitely beneficial for overall vision health. Let's take a deeper look at the role that food plays in eye health.

According to "The Age-Related Eye Disease Study" (AREDS), updated in 2013, the report found that certain nutrients like zinc, copper, vitamin C, vitamin E, beta carotene, omega-3 fatty acids, zeaxanthin and lutein may reduce the risk of age-related decline in eye health by 25 percent.

Failing eyesight doesn't have to be an inevitable result of aging. A healthy lifestyle can significantly reduce the risk of eye health problems.

Here are the Top 10 foods for healthy eyes recommended by the American Optometric Association (AOA) and the American Academy of Ophthalmology (AAO):

Physical Tip – How to Stretch Your Neck

Neck pain is one of the most common types of pain in the United States. Here are a few stretches to incorporate into your daily routine. Always talk to your doctor before starting any new routine.

Forward and Backward Tilt

Can be done seated or standing. Movement is slow and controlled. Start with your head squarely over your shoulders and your back straight. Lower your chin toward your chest and hold for 10-15 seconds. Relax and slowly lift your head back up.

Tilt your chin up, eyes toward the ceiling and slowly bring the base of your skull toward your back. Hold for 10-15 seconds then return the head back to neutral.

Repeat several times.

Side Tilt

Can be done seated or standing. Movement is slow and con-

Fish. Many fish are rich in sources of omega-3 fatty acids – tuna, salmon, trout, mackerel, sardines, anchovies, herring.

Nuts and legumes. Nuts contain a high level of vitamin E. Walnuts, Brazil nuts, cashews, peanuts and lentils.

Seeds. Seeds are high in omega-3s and vitamin E – hemp seeds.

Citrus fruits. Rich in vitamin C – lemons, oranges, grapefruits.

Leafy green vegetables. These contain lutein, zeaxanthin and vitamin C – spinach, kale and collards.

Carrots. Rich in both vitamin A and beta carotene.

Sweet potatoes. A good source of vitamin E.

Beef. Rich in zinc.

Eggs. A good source of vitamin C, E and zinc.

Water. Essential to life and preventing dehydration. Water may reduce the symptoms of dry eyes.

It's not surprising that eating a variety of fruits, vegetables and lean proteins will contribute to eye health, as well as overall health. If one is on a restrictive diet, has food allergies, or is taking medications, always talk to an eye health provider about the right foods to eat.

Start with the first step and take a look at the food you eat. Make it as colorful and bright as you are!

trolled. Gently tilt your head toward your right shoulder and try to touch it with your ear. Stop when you feel the stretch. Don't raise your shoulder. Hold for 10-15 seconds then slowly bring your head back to neutral. Repeat on the other side.

Repeat several times on either side.

Side Rotation

Can be done seated or standing. Keep your head squarely over your shoulders and your back straight. Slowly turn your head to the right until you feel a stretch in the side of your neck and shoulder. Hold for 10-15 seconds then slowly turn your head forward again. Repeat on the left side. Do up to 10 times on either side.

Shoulder Roll

Can be done seated or standing. Raise your shoulders straight up and move them in a circle going forward 6 times. Return to the start position and move them in a circle going backwards 6 times.
