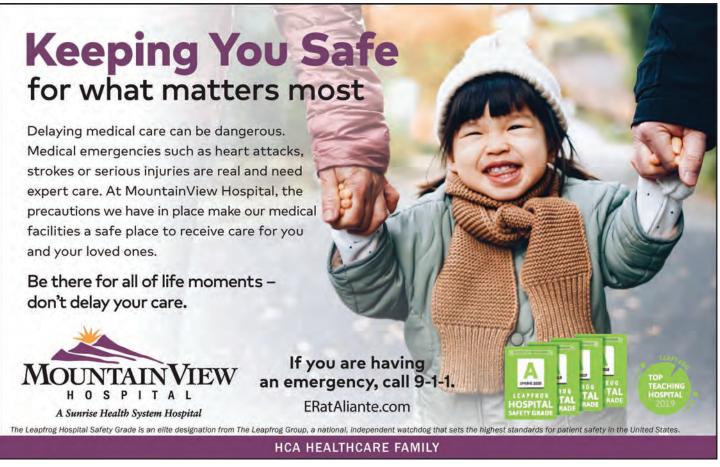

Election Update: Nominations End 11-30-2020

Election news is everywhere. By the time you read this, we should know the results of National, State and Local races. Based on early voting, it appears that there will be a large response which we hope will carry over to Sun City elections.

Over the next several weeks, the election news you will be hearing will have to do with Sun City. You will soon be seeing the names of the candidates who have chosen to serve our community by running for election to the SCSCAI, Inc. Board of Directors. As with any election, voting is important and we look forward to a strong response. The names of candidates will be revealed after the November 30th submission deadline and a "Meet the Candidates" event, most likely held virtually, will be hosted by Resident's Forum the second Wednesday in January. Instructions on how to participate will be forthcoming closer to the event.

Ballots will be mailed to every homeowner, one per household, and the mailing will include information about each candidate. There are three vacancies on the Board and each elected member will serve a three-year term. Detailed information about how to vote will be in the packet. Be sure to read all the material distributed to you.

The 2021 Sun City Election Committee consists of Michael Christiansen, Melanie Kirby, and Ruth Mintz with Lynn Kasner Morgan as Chair. The goal of the committee is to conduct a fair and open election and to count the ballots. Ballots will be mailed in mid-January and all ballots must be received by the Administration Office at Mountain Shadows by 5 p.m., Tuesday, February 23. They will be counted at our Association's annual meeting which begins at 8 a.m., on Wednesday, February 24.

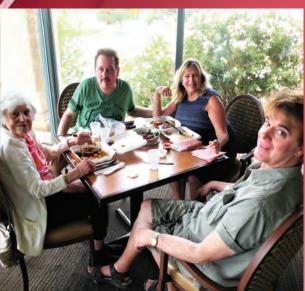

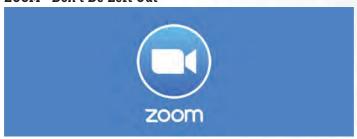

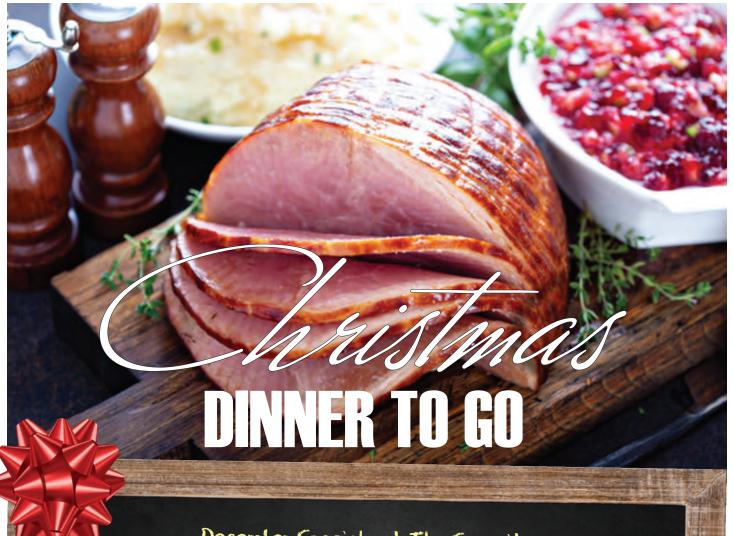

Fitness Year in Review

t is the last month of 2020 and we want to take a moment to reflect on things that went well. While it would be completely understandable if you would prefer to say, "Good riddance to 2020", it is helpful to balance it out with some gratitude.

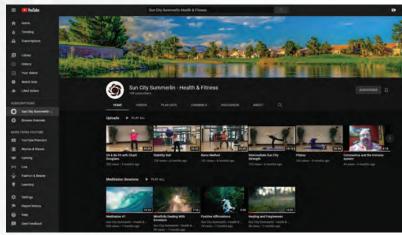


Last month, we wrote about gratitude and put up Thanksgiving trees in the fitness centers. Thank you to everyone that helped fill the trees with their own personal notes of gratitude.

Our 2020 theme was "Year of Healthy Living: Head to Toe." January through March, we focused on the upper portion of the body, holding seminars on oral health, neck care, eyes, ears, dizziness, thyroid, the aging spine, and brain health. For a mental wellness focus, we began the monthly "Life 102" workshops, and started our Friday Meditation sessions. We featured a Health Screening Day offering a number of screenings ranging from blood pressure to memory screenings. Over 800 residents attended our in-person seminars and workshops.



After the mid-March shutdown, we created a YouTube channel called Sun City Summerlin Health & Fitness, to stay connected with residents at home with meditation, fitness classes, Doc talks and a cooking demo. We added 158 subscribers and a total of 22 videos.



April through September focused primarily on the reopening of our fitness facilities. Although there were several new restrictions and rules to follow, we were able to open all our fitness facilities on May 29th, with the exception of the hot tubs, which remain closed in accordance with Governor Sisolak's directives. This allowed you to get back to many of the activities you enjoyed pre-pandemic.

Group fitness classes started up on June 15th. This fall we added two new Sit n Fit classes (for a total of 7 per week) and one new Chair Yoga class (for a total of 6 per week). Some fitness classes are now being offered via Zoom. We have received such positive feedback on the Zoom classes, that we are considering continuing Zoom classes for those who just prefer to work out from home.



We held virtual seminars on sleep apnea, CBD, sun safety, back and hip health, and fall prevention. Late September featured our virtual fall fitness week with daily 30-minute classes.

October through December, we extended outdoor pool season on a trial basis for an extra two weeks, November 1-15. We had two drive-thru flu shot clinics in our community with immunizations offered by Albertsons. They administered a total of 545 flu shots!





November featured our first virtual cook-along demo, with resident Mary Fairhurst leading Sun City residents in their own homes in the preparation of delicious, healthy recipes.

While many people are still not comfortable returning to public places, several of you chose to put on your masks, hand sanitizer, and returned to the fitness centers. In addition to the many cleaning and disinfecting protocols we now have in place, our fitness centers have been protected with an antimicrobial spray coating, MicroShield 360, since late 2018. We





believe these stringent cleaning protocols have contributed to the very low numbers of COVID-19 positive cases involving the fitness centers.

Between May 29 and October 31, there were over 109,000 check-ins at the fitness centers!

Here's the breakdown of what you have been doing at the fitness centers:

Pools 54% Gyms 30% Fitness Classes 13% Other Activities 3%

2020 certainly has been a crazy, challenging year; but this adversity has forced us to take a new look at our operations and make several positive, lasting changes. Let's all head into 2021 with a focus on making our community a better, safer place to live!

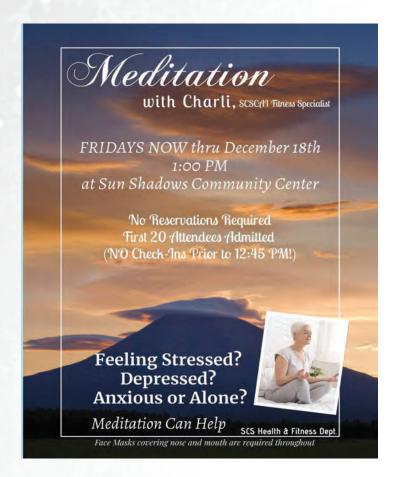

Shia and Sunni believers will celebrate on separate days by reading the prophet's teachings, according to Interfaith Calendar. *

- * Nov. 29th December 20th Advent Fast begins Orthodox Christian. Though Advent began this last weekend,
 the fasting starts midway through the month with only two
 weeks until Christmas. The holiday is celebrated by believers
 lighting Advent candles, hanging wreaths, and attending Church
 ceremonies, according to Interfaith Calendar.
- * Dec. 6: Saint Nicholas Day Christian. This holiday honors the birth of Saint Nicholas, the saint who serves as a role model for gift-giving and is commonly known as Santa Claus, according to Interfaith Calendar.
- **Dec. 8: Immaculate Conception Catholic.** In the lead-up to Jesus' birthday celebration on Christmas, Catholics celebrate the day of Immaculate Conception to honor his mother Mary, who they say was preserved from original sin for her entire life.
- **** Dec. 8: Rohatsu (Bodhi Day) Buddhist.** This holiday celebrates the historical Buddha's decision and vow to sit under

faiths and cultures lead to interfaith and interracial families, bringing with it different traditions, celebrations and blended families.

I started to think about the different faiths, and I wondered if there was something, we all had in common, regardless of the faith. Was there a shared belief? I mean, we all follow the belief that there is something greater than ourselves, but was there a common thread that could bring us all together? Curious to see if I could link any of the religions together with a common belief, I did some research.

Did you know, in the modern day there are 15 different religious holi-days that are celebrated between October and January? I didn't know that either!

Many of these religious days are observed by Christians, but here are some you may not be aware of:

Oct. 28-29: Mawlid el-Nabi — **Islam**. This is an Islamic holiday that honors the birth of the Prophet Muhammad, who

the Bodhi tree until he reached spiritual enlightenment. It's celebrated through meditation and is embraced similar to how Christians celebrate Christmas to honor Jesus Christ.

Dec. 10 Sundown – Dec 18: Hanukkah – Judaism. This is the Holiday of the eight-day Jewish festival of lights, which celebrates the Maccabean revolt in Egypt. Eight candles are lit on the menorah to honor the miracle of the oil lasting eight days.

* Dec. 12: Feast Day of Our Lady of Guadalupe -

Catholic. This is a primarily Catholic holiday celebrated by Mexicans and Americans of Mexican descent that honors the reported appearance of the Virgin Mary in Mexico City, according to Interfaith Calendar.

* Dec. 16 to 24, 2020 Posadas Navidenas — Christian. This is a primarily Hispanic Christian holiday that commends Mary and Joseph's journey to Bethlehem to give birth to Jesus, according to Interfaith Calendar.

- * Dec. 21: Solstice Wicca/Pagan. Solstice is the point in the year "when the earth is most inclined away from the sun. It is the most southern or northern point depending on the hemisphere," according to Interfaith Calendar. Pagans and Wicca believers will celebrate that event through Yule, in which believers also honor "winter-born king," symbolized by the rebirth of the sun, Interfaith Calendar explained.
- * Dec. 25: Christmas Christian. Christmas is a primarily Christian holiday that celebrates the birth of Jesus Christ. Many will attend church, have family parties, and exchange gifts, according to Interfaith Calendar.

Dec. 26: Zarathosht Diso (Death of Prophet Zarathustra)

- Zoroastrian. Unlike many of the other holidays in the month, Zoroastrians honor the death of their prophet, Zarathustra, who founded Zoroastrianism, one of the world's oldest monotheistic religion. (Dates may vary and be celebrated on different days, depending on individual communities.)
- **Dec. 26 to Jan. 1: Kwanzaa (/ 'kwa:n.ze /).** An annual celebration of African-American culture held, culminating in gift-giving and a feast of faith, called Karamu Ya Imani. It was created by Maulana Karenga and first celebrated in 1966.
- * Dec. 28: Holy Innocents Day Christian. Christians solemnly honor the deaths of children killed by King Herod, who was attempting to kill Jesus, according to Interfaith Calendar.
- * Dec. 31: Watch Night Christian. For Watch Night, Christians will thank God for the safety they received during the year, according to Interfaith Calendar.
- * January 1, 2021: Feast of the Holy Family Catholic. Catholics use this day to honor Jesus, Mary and Joseph, according to Interfaith Calendar.

So, again, I asked myself (and Googled) what is the one thing all religions in the world have in common?

There are many things that religions seem to have in common: A higher power or deity; A way to connect or merge with that higher power; A moral or ethical framework; A set of guiding principles for living one's life in a purposeful, meaningful and satisfying way; A social structure (the church, group activities); An oral or written history; A divine leader.

That sounded a bit like a "formula," and there is nothing wrong with that, but I was looking for more; something more powerful that might bring us all together. So, I searched further. This is what I found:

Something that the five major world religions (Christianity, Judaism, Buddhism, Hinduism, and Islam) have in common is a sense of community.

Nope, that's not what I was looking for either. All very good definitions but something was missing.

According to one religious scholar, Reza Aslan, who appeared on Oprah during an interview for OWN's "Super Soul Sunday," it is this:

"It is the Golden Rule. Do unto others. (As you would have them do unto you.) This principle is not just a decree that religions allude to," he continues. "In many cases, it is explicitly written."

Ah! Okay, that came closer to what I was looking for; some universal truth that in this year where we've had such despair between the elections, COVID-19, the economy, the fear of loss of health, jobs and being separated from our families, I think we can celebrate the Holidays no matter which religious faith we choose to observe as this:

If you observe your special Holiday with love in your heart for yourself, your family, your friends and those whom you don't even know as best that you can, then peace, love and joy will come to you. And what better Holiday can there be than that – connecting with the Divine with a true love of all your brothers and sisters, and isn't that what it is really all about, no matter what faith?

So, maybe the "Universe" however you describe it, is teaching us all something different this year about the Holidays; it's not about parties and presents and a big family get together, per se, but more about truly appreciating ourselves, our families and the love that we can share with them and with the World. That is my take-away.

I think there is a song – "What the World Needs Now is Love Sweet Love" that may say it all.

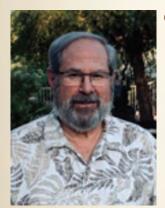

"As I See It . . . "

My Dad Taught Me . . .

If you know me, you know that my father was my mentor, my guide, my hero, my idol, my role model. I always considered myself lucky to have a dad that I could look up to and learn so much from. I always think of him and have been thinking about some of the things my dad taught me that are really important these days.

- Using swear words just means you don't have a good vocabulary and cannot find the real words to communicate your message.
- Words matter remember it is easy to say things in haste or in anger that will exist forever and that you might regret forever.
- Shouting and yelling prevent you from communicating effectively and accomplishes nothing.
- Interrupting when others are speaking doesn't help you be heard. It just tells everyone you are rude.
- Listening is the most important part of any conversation.
- You learn more from those you don't agree with, than with those you agree with.
- Most of the time, you cannot change the world, but you can always change yourself.
- Saying "please" and "thank you" is not only good manners, but it accomplishes much and speaks well of the person you are.
- You cannot wait for "someone" to do it. You are that "someone."
- Honor and respect your elders.
- Being respectful of others will bring you respect from others.

My dad taught me so much more. All this gave me pause at how much bitter disagreement there is nowadays and how bitter and awful people can be to those they don't agree with. Can't we disagree with someone and still be friends, and respect their point of view? Can't we find ways to advocate for

our point of view without resorting to putting the other person down and demeaning them? Would we not be more successful in being heard and achieving our goals, by using civil discourse and the power of our words and actions, rather than namecalling, public humiliation, and anger?

As I often do, I turned to the wisdom of others for some helpful guidance.

- 1. People differ in their thinking as they differ in their physiognomy. Yet, it is always possible to discuss and settle differences in a friendly way, as all are imbued with the same ideals and have the same goal in mind so that those ideals and goals could be attained with a truly concerted and concentrated effort.
- 2. Passionate disagreement. Ancient wisdom implores us to engage with people who are, in our opinion, mistaken because although their view may not be ultimately accepted, it is nonetheless legitimate. This element of respect for the views of others is a critical ingredient of a decent, harmonious, strong and healthy society. Respect for intellectual rivals should be seriously heeded. Yes, we can disagree—and even passionately so. However, we must never allow ourselves to become so entrenched that we stop talking to each other—or "talk" only to belittle, defame and delegitimize the other's view. Others always have something to teach us, only if we are open to the lesson.
- 3. Like two diamonds that when rubbed together, polish each other, you are meant to overcome the difficult aspects of your personality by interacting with others whom you also find difficult. But that doesn't always necessitate a declaration of war. Here are a few suggestions for tools you can use in your interactions that will make for less turbulence in this journey we call life.
- 4. **Listen!** Most people want, need and crave to be heard, and when they whine, yell, demand or criticize, this is usually the result of them trying to find a way to be listened to. You'll find that after a few minutes of unpleasant expression if people feel you're listening, they will temper their tone and speak pleasantly. They will feel safe and won't project their aggression onto you.
- 5. Have realistic expectations. If your neighbor doesn't say "thank you" when you do something considerate for them, if your uncle always starts a political argument at every family get-together, if your friend is always at least a half-hour late, it's unrealistic to expect that this will change. Expect the expected, and don't get angry each time anew at something that is bound to happen. It's like getting mad that it's snowing in winter. It's disappointing and futile.
- 6. Protect yourself. Knowing that people are going to offend,

hurt or inconvenience you doesn't mean you have to collude with them. Before you engage with a person whose behavior affects you negatively in some way, find a way to minimize the effect of their negative behavior on you:

- Give the interaction a time limit.
- Have a plan B or C.
- Reward yourself if others don't.
- Have something to look forward to later.
- 7. **Practice gratitude and appreciation**. Before interacting with others, think of some positive quality they possess, such as kindness or productivity. Ask questions or give compliments to show that you notice and appreciate them, and they'll let their guard down. Even just having positive thoughts will change the energy between you.

arguments with people on social media, people we've never met, or unlikely to ever meet and have no connection to other than the fact that they are a Facebook friend of a friend of someone we hardly know? The reason is that we get involved. We engage. Taking a step back from any relationship and putting emotional distance between us and the other person helps us disconnect from the conflict. Ask yourself, is this really important? Why do I care about this? Will it matter in 10 years? Can I really make a difference here? If the answer is no, be as neutral and as uninvolved as possible.

11. **Focus on shared goals.** Focus on what you're trying to accomplish together, not on the differences that are making it difficult to accomplish it. 4. Observe more.

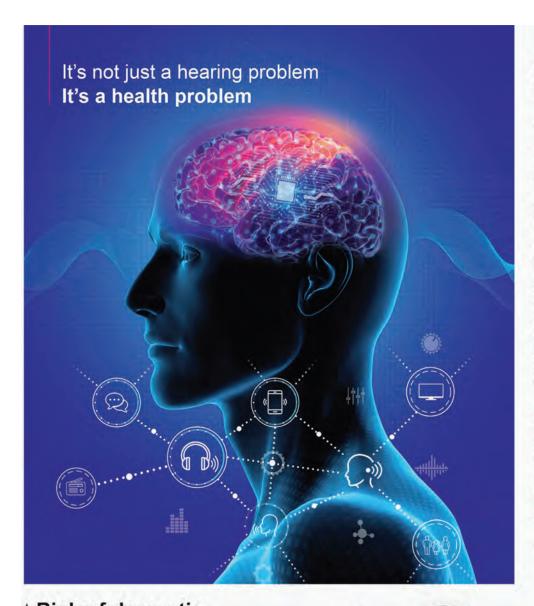

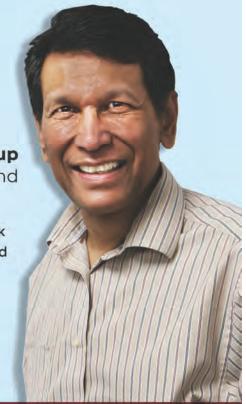

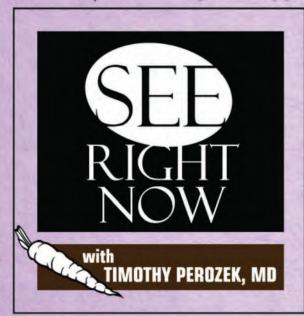

Holiday Salad

Serves 4-6 people

4-6 cups of mixed greens

1-1/2 cup of diced butternut squash, roasted. Quick tip: I buy butternut squash cut up. I cut it smaller for the salad prior to roasting.

1/2 -3/4 cup Craisin's 1/2 c feta cheese or

gorgonzola crumbles

1/2 c toasted walnuts chopped or roasted pumpkin seeds.

Optional: 2-3 tangerine wedges split down the middle.

Directions: Pre-heat oven to 400 F. Toss diced squash with 2 tbsp of olive oil, roast until lightly brown and cooked. Cool!

Dressing: (makes 1 cup)

2/3 cup virgin olive oil 1/3 cup apple cider vinegar

2 tbsp Dijon mustard 2 tbsp real maple syrup or to taste

1/2 tsp salt 1/2 tsp pepper

Combine ingredients and shake. Lightly dress salad with 1/2 c salad dressing or more depending on taste. Serve salad immediately. Refrigerate remaining dressing

Note: For a complete meal, add sliced roasted chicken to salad.

Soft Gingersnap Cookies

With White **Chocolate Chunks**

Brittney Senko, Office Manager at Golf Summerlin offers this wonderful cookie recipe. Here is her family from last Christmas (husband Eric and daughter Grace) and my absolute favorite Christmas cookies (coincidentally the only ones I'm allowed to make at our annual cookie exchange).



2 tbsp canola oil

2-1/4 tsp baking soda

1-1/4 tsp cinnamon

1 tsp ground ginger

3-1/2 cups all-purpose flour

Ingredients:

1 cup unsalted butter (room temp) 1 cup granulated sugar

1/2 cup molasses

1 tsp vanilla extract

1 tsp salt

1-1/4 tsp ground cloves

2 large eggs

1-1/2 cups white chocolate chunks

1 cup granulated sugar (for coating cookie dough balls)



Preheat oven to 350 F. Line two large baking sheets with parchment papers or with silicone baking mat. Set aside. In the bowl of a stand mixer, cream together butter and sugar until smooth and creamy. Beat in the molasses, canola oil, vanilla, baking soda, salt, and spices. Mix until well combined. Add the eggs, one at a time, and beat until smooth. Slowly add in the flour. Next, stir in the white chocolate chunks. Scoop the dough into balls and roll in granulated sugar. Place on lined baking sheets, about two inches apart. Bake for 10 minutes, the cookies will still be soft. Remove from oven and let cookies cool on the baking sheet for five minutes. Transfer to a wire rack and cool completely.

The History of Hannukah

f you think I spelled it wrong, it's not a problem, because in my 74 years I think I've seen it spelled about six different ways.

Hanukkah is known as the "Festival of Lights." That's because, while the Jews were hiding from the Greek-Syrian oppressors during the Maccabean Revolt, they had found shelter in the Second Temple in Jerusalem and only had one day's worth of oil for their lamps. That oil lasted for eight days! They considered it a miracle. This revolt took place around 160 BC, when King Antiochus IV decreed the Jews must worship Greek Gods in the Temple. The Jews have been the most oppressed group of people and they have been cast negatively for over 2000 years!

The centerpiece of the Hanukkah celebration is the menorah, a candelabra that holds nine candles. Eight of the candles represent the eight days that the lamps stayed lit, and the ninth is the "helper candle" called, the shamash, used to light the other candles each day. Along with the menorah, is the dreidel (a pointy four-sided spinning top) and is played as celebratory game for Hanukkah. Jews traditionally eat latkes (potato pancakes), usually with sour cream or apple sauce.

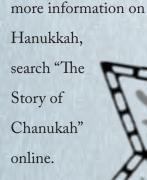
The traditional colors for Hanukkah are blue and silver/white which come from the Israeli flag, which has a white background with two horizontal blue stripes and a

Star of David in the center. This flag originated in 1891 when the Zionist Movement began. This color combination has represented Jewish culture for the past century.

This year, Hanukkah will be celebrated from

December 10 to December 18. The Jewish calendar has
twelve months of 28 days, and every fourth year a
thirteenth month is inserted. This is the reason why
some major Jewish holidays coincide with Christian
holidays. From time to time, Christmas and Easter are
almost a month apart from Hanukkah and Passover.

Enjoy your latkes and let us know if you prefer the apple sauce or the sour cream. For





ARE YOU A MEMBER OF A SUN CITY SUMMERLIN COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION, CHARTERED CLUB OR ORGANIZATION?

If you are, the time to volunteer to run to be an officer is closely approaching and so is voting!

Many of you are asking how the required Membership meeting, self-nominations and election of officers will be held with all the COVID-19 restrictions and many of the Chartered Clubs or Organizations, not meeting.

You will be happy to know that we not only have a secure and fair procedure for Clubs and Organizations to follow, but your Administrative staff is willing to facilitate all of the procedures for your Club to save you time, frustration and expense.

Following is an outline of the mandatory procedure, and an explanation of how we can do each process for you.

MANDATORY PROCEDURE:

- 1. Due to COVID-19 restrictions, Clubs and Organizations will not hold a meeting this year to report to their membership and to elect their officers. Since all Club members have equal rights to attend a meeting, there are limitations on how many people can attend a meeting, and at this time some members would not feel comfortable attending a meeting. The requirement to have a meeting is lifted for this election year.
- 2. Ballot Boxes in rooms or personal residence will not be allowed. To provide a fair and equitable opportunity for all members of a Club and Organization to cast their vote, and since Ballots will not be opened and counted at a meeting of the Club or Organization, ballots cannot be received or counted by a member or members of the Club and must be delivered to a neutral

location by email, mail or placement in a drop box. The Association address, dedicated email address and drop box will be provided, and the items will be retrieved by staff members that are dedicated to making the Club and Organization process successful.

- 3. A blast email will be sent out by the Association to every member of every Club and Organization. Giving every Club and Organization Member the opportunity to self-nominate. All nominations will be submitted to the Association through email, regular mail or drop box. Since many of the Clubs are not meeting right now, and even for those that are, many members are not participating. This effort will allow any member interested in running for any open position to submit their names to a neutral party.
- 4. A ballot will be prepared by the Administration for each Club or Organization with the names of those who have self-nominated, and if the Club or Organization has a Nominating Committee with the names submitted by the Nominating Committee. All ballot formats will be uniform in design to assist the counting process.
- 5. The current Board of the Club or Organization will decide what method their Club will use to vote. Clubs and Organizations can use a combination of:
- A. Hard copy ballot mailed to Members and then returned by mail or to a drop box at the Administration Office. *If preferred, the*

Administration Office will take care of preparing the envelopes and mailing costs as the postage is offset by other expenses, we are not experiencing for preparation of Club meetings. Those returning the ballots will have to provide their own envelopes and mail them to the Association address and provide their own postage, or they can drop their ballot in a drop box outside of Mountain Shadows.

- **B. Email Balloting.** With the ballot being sent to members of Clubs or Organizations that have email addresses for their members. The ballot is sent by Administration from an email address unique to your Club or Organization and the member votes right from the email and returns it to the same email address.
- C. You can use option A or a combination of options A and B. But unless 100% of your membership has an email address you cannot just use option B.
- 6. Unless your election day was before October 15, your election day will stay the same as your Club has already submitted and was posted in the Link Magazine. If your election day was between October 1, and October 14, your election day was October 15. The date change for those at the beginning of the October gives the Club, or Administration if the Club elects to take us up on our offer, the opportunity to get all notices out to their Membership.
- 7. All ballots will be received by the Administration through US Mail, drop box or email, and will be sorted and counted on the date of the Clubs designated election day.

The name of the voter will be verified against the Club or Organization membership list. All member identification on the ballot will be kept secret and will not be provided to anyone outside of the Administration offices. If a Club

- or Organization or a member of a Club or Organization challenges an election, the Club or Organization or a member of a Club or Organization can observe a re-counting. Any one (1) Club or Organization officer who is not a candidate for a position can be appointed by the Club or Organization to observe the original counting of the ballot in a Social Distancing set up or by Zoom.
- 8. The Club or Organization will be provided with the final vote and will make the announcement to their Club or Organization. I know when the step by step procedure is put into writing, it seems long and even confusing, but keep in mind, these procedures make sure that, during this time that:
- A. Every Member of a Club or Organization has the opportunity to self-nominate and run for a position on the Club or Organization Board.
- B. Every Member of a Club or Organization receives a ballot, regardless of whether or not they are here at Sun City Summerlin, and whether or not they are participating in activities.
- C. Since Ballots will not be opened at a meeting of the Membership, that all Ballots are received by a someone that is not in the Club or Organization and the Members vote is kept secret.

Also, please note, uncontested ballots will not be sent out, and the Club or Organization will be provided with the information and will just make an announcement. We look forward to working with each of the Clubs and Organizations to make all of the elections uniform in process, yet unique to your Club or Organization, and encourage you to let us take the stress out of your election by handling every step this year.

- 4 oz. of New Year's Resolutions (preferably with the intention of Keeping them)

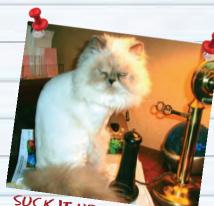
Fold in:

(SCSCAI).

Meetings of the Standing Committees are open to the Owners of SCSCAI, and you are welcome to attend by ZOOM and submit questions.

Please note, Standing Committees make recommendations to the Board of Directors, except for the Architectural Committee, Standing Committees cannot make final decisions. The items noted as "recommended to the SCSCAI Board" still need SCSCAI Board approval and are scheduled to appear on the December 8, 2020 SCSCAI Board Agenda. Presentation of scheduled items is subject to change as required or requested by the SCSCAI Board.

Architectural Review Committee

Chair: Ellen Bachman (Vice President of the SCSCAI **Board of Directors)**

Meetings Held: 2nd Thursday of the Month @ 1:00 pm The Architectural Review Committee (ARC) met on Thursday, November 12, 2020 at 1 pm. Five of the six voting members were in attendance, two of the five non-voting members were present and one of the three alternate members was in attendance. Agenda items included: Owner request to have a Pine Tree Planted on #10 the Highland Falls Golf Course-After review of the request and the input from the neighbors on each side of the Owner making the request, a motion was made and unanimously approved to defer this item to the Golf Oversight Committee for a decision on if and where a tree could be planted, noting that Pine trees are no longer allowed, so if a tree is approved it cannot be a Pine tree, but would need to be another species of tree that does

Owners requests for the Association to allow HAM Radio Antennas - In the spring of 2019 approximately 40 Owners and residents formed the Sun City Hams, with 25 of those members active on the airwaves. These HAM radio operators have formed as a hobby and also to provide communication services during an emergency when power, cell phones and landlines may fail. Many of the members participate in programs set up by Clark

County Emergency Services, and through this could serve to be an important communication link from SCSCAI and emergency responders in the case of an emergency. The Sun City Ham radio operators have been limited in their ability to communicate because the Association does not allow external antennas. The Ham Radio Club came to the ARC to request that the Association reconsider its position and allow a maximum of two external antennas, one for HF and one for VHF/UHF. Proposed language for the proposed Community Standards was reviewed, that would allow one yard antenna and one antenna mounted on the roof. Softball Club Request for the Installation of a Flag Pole at

the Softball Field - was deferred until the December 10, 2020 ARC Meeting so that a representative of the Softball Club could be present to answer questions.

Review of the Development Standards – The ARC finished their review, amendments, changes and updated to the Development Standards and staff will now incorporate all changes into one document for a final review by the ARC before sending it on to the Board of Directors for review and possible adoption.

Proposed Changes by Board Member Ken Resnik to the wording of the CC&R's as to the role of the Architectural **Review Committee** – At the November 10, 2020 Board of Directors meeting, Board member Ken Resnik proposed an amendment to Article XI of the CC&R's. Article XI pertains to the establishment of the Architectural Review Committee, review by the Architectural Committee, Appeal of the Architectural Review Committee decisions, processing fees for applications, violations of approved plans, right of entry by the ARC, non-liability for approved plans and Declaration exemption. The SCSCAI Board of Directors referred this item to the ARC, and it will be an agenda item for the December 10, 2020 ARC Meeting.

Request from Owner, Pat Vaughn for clarification on how many receptacles can be installed on the outside of the home for flying flags. Currently only one receptacle with one flag flying from it is allowed, the proposed Development Standards would allow two receptacles, one on each side of the garage, with one pole and flag for each receptacle. There were no comments or action taken on the Owners comments.

Chartered Clubs and Community Organizations Committee Chair: David Putney (Director on the SCSCAI Board of

Meetings Held: 3rd Thursday of the Month @ 9:00 am The Chartered Clubs and Community Organizations Committee (CCOC) met on Thursday, November 19, 2020 at 9 am. Five of the six voting members were in attendance. Agenda items included:

Shuffleboard Chartered Club – Dissolution – Dori Gonzales, President of the Shuffleboard Chartered Club was present at the meeting and shared that while many of the Shuffleboard Chartered Club members enjoy the sport, they are not interested in serving in a leadership or officer role to organize Club activities. Director of Community Services, Melissa Spina reported that she had called almost every member of the Shuffleboard Chartered Club to see if any of them were interested in keeping the Club active and serving on the Club Board, none of them were. Ms. Gonzales will serve until the end of the year, and at that time is requesting that the Club be dissolved. There was discussion regarding the Club assets, which include equipment, supplies and cash. Ms. Gonzalez shared that many of those who truly enjoy Shuffle Board have guit playing the game because they are no longer strong enough or agile enough to maneuver the cart that contains all of the necessary equipment and court supplies to play the game. The CCOC voted to recommend the dissolution of the Club at the end of the year and to recommend to the SCSCAI Board of Directors that the cash remaining in the Club treasury be used to purchase or build a locking cabinet that will house all of equipment and supplies needed to play shuffleboard, and eliminate the need for the people wishing to play to have to wheel the cart from the Fitness Center to the playing area, instead after checking into the Fitness Center they will be given the key to the locking cabinet and will be responsible to return the equipment and supplies to the cabinet, lock the cabinet and return the key to the Fitness Center. As with all items that are borrowed from the Community or Fitness Centers, the Activity Card of the person taking the key will be kept at the desk until the key is returned. Softball Chartered Club - Raising of the Outfield Fence -Ted Biedryck, President of the Softball Chartered Club presented to the Committee the need for raising the outfield fence on the SCSCAI Softball Field. Mr. Biedryck stated the safety and risk mitigation were the top two reasons that the existing fence, which is just a little over 3 feet, needs to be replaced with an 8 foot fence. Reason #1, the current height of the fence provides a direct threat to the safety of those using the walking path surrounding the SCSCAI Softball Field. There have been several close calls where balls have traveled over the fence and barely missed a walker. On the right side of the field, the sidewalk is very close to the fence, which increases the danger of being hit by a ball. Reason #2, a number of Softball Chartered Club players have been hurt by slamming into or backing into the top rail of the fence. The low height of the fence means the top rail of the fence, that has no give, inevitably result in a blow to a player as they run forward or backward to catch a ball after it has been hit. It is the opinion of the Softball Chartered Club that by raising the fence to 8 feet that the risk of a ball going over the top of the fence and hitting a pedestrian is mitigated, as is the risk of injury to a player who is running forward or backward, with their eye on the

ball, if they run into the fence. Ms. Mills explained that this request more than likely seems familiar to the CCOC as a little over a year ago the proposal was presented to the Common Area Properties Committee, Chartered Clubs and Organization Committee and Architectural Committee and was recommended by all for approval by the Board in the next budget cycle in the amount of \$15,000.00. The only reason that it was not completed was because the estimates and proposals submitted by the Softball Chartered Club were for the addition of a 5 foot fence on top of the existing 3 foot fence. The addition to the top of the fence would not have eliminated the top rail of the 3 foot fence and also was determined to not be structurally sound so new bids were needed to add a new 8 foot fence. The bids came in between \$30,000 to \$36,000 for a new 8 foot fence, professionally installed. This item is now going back through the Committees for consideration by the Board of Directors. At this meeting the CCOC voted unanimously to recommend to the SCSCAI Board of Directors that the 3 foot outfield fence be replaced with an 8 foot fence. This item will now go to the Common Area Properties Committee and the Architectural Review Committee for consideration.

Chartered Clubs and Organizations – Non SCSCAI Owners/Residents Guest Speakers and Instructors – The Community Services Department has received requests from Chartered Clubs that now that they can host membership meetings (with limits in place per the Governors Directives and SCSCAI Regulations) they would like to from time to time invite speakers or instructors who do not live in SCSCAI to address their Clubs. The Committee discussed if this would be an issue as presently the Board of Directors has stated that the use of our facilities are only for our Owners and for our residents with a current Activity Card. It was determined that in order for some of the Clubs and Organizations to function experts who do not live within Sun City Summerlin are needed. The CCOC members noted that (1) most our employees do not live within Sun City Summerlin (2) providing instruction or giving a seminar would not classify a person as a guest, as their use of the facility would be limited to addressing a specific Chartered Club or Organization and (3) social distancing, temperature taking and mask restrictions would need to apply to the instructor or speaker and the attendees.

After further discussion, the CCOC voted to unanimously recommend to the SCSCAI Board of Directors that Chartered Clubs and Organizations be allowed to have guest speakers or instructors at their membership meetings or class activities as long as restrictions were put in place and followed. It was suggested that the following restrictions be included as part of any other restrictions the Board of Directors may adopt.

Guest Instructor or Guest Speaker shall mean anyone

- who is not an Owner or Resident with a current Activity Card.
- Any Chartered Club or Organization that wishes to have Guest Instructors or Guest Speakers, must update their Rules of Operation Under COVID-19 and submit them to the Director of Community Services, Melissa Spina, for approval. After internal review and approval, Ms. Spina will submit the same to Ms. Mills for final review. This is the procedure put in place by the SCSCAI Board of Directors for Clubs to meet or to use Dedicated Rooms or Space.
- No Food or Drink to be brought in by the Guest Instructor or Guest Speaker
- No More than two (2) Guest Instructors or Guest Speakers at any Chartered Club or Organization meeting or class.
- Guest Instructor or Guest Speaker must be local and cannot have traveled from another state or country.
- Guest Instructor or Guest speaker must be disclosed on the Room Reservation form at the time the reservation is made by the Chartered Club or Organization.

Fitness Centers Gym and Pool Use Reservations – There was discussion that the Board of Directors has never lifted the requirement for reservations to use the Fitness Center Gyms and Pools. The Governor and State of Nevada Health Department lifted the requirement early on after the original Directive requiring reservations was put in place. Ms. Shields shared that currently people with reservations know they have a spot, but if the maximum occupancy is not met then walk-ins are allowed. It has become apparent that we do not need reservations as the maximum is hardly ever met, and in fact we are at a point that it would be very pleasing to the users of the gyms and pools if we would do away with the reservation system, and operate the way 99% of the gyms and pools are operating and go to "no reservations", first come, first serve. This would allow our Owners and residents with current Activity Cards to just come in when they feel like it. The Fitness Committee is endorsing a recommendation from the Director of Fitness, Pam Shields that we do a trial two (2) week period of "no reservations' where Owners and residents with current Activity Cards be allowed to come in at any time. Documentation will be made during this trial period to determine if it should continue. The CCOC supports this trial. Executive Director, Mitzi Mills, will contact the Board of Directors to see if this trial can start prior to the December 8, 2020 Board of Directors Meetings, allowing Ms. Shields to gather information and report to the Board at that meeting.

Common Area Properties Committee

Chair: Dick Clark (President of the SCSCAI Board of Directors)

Meetings Held: 1st Tuesday of the Month @ 9:00 am
The Common Area Properties Committee (CAP) met on
Tuesday, November 13, 2020 at 9 am. Ten of the eleven
voting members were present. Agenda items included:
Common Area Landscape - Addition of Plant Material Lake Mead Drive/Sun City Drive Entrance — The planting of
additional plant material to improve this area has been
completed and the final cost was \$1,380.00 which was
\$110.00 under the budgeted amount.

Common Area Landscape - Annual Planting of Flowers -We have 17 areas that we replace the flowers in twice a year (spring/summer and fall/winter). (1) Rampart Entry (North side, South side and Median) (2) Sun City/Del Webb (North side and South Side) (3) Del Webb Entry (West side and East side) (4) Sun City Entry (West side, East side and Median) (5) Sun City Entry – Security IC Planters (6) Pinnacle/Thomas Ryan (7) Pinnacle Entry (East side and West side) (8) Lake Mead/Thomas Ryan (Southwest, Southeast, Northwest and Northeast) (9) Anasazi (North and South) (10) Highland Falls (11) Palm Valley/Echo Mesa (12) Palm Valley Entry (North and South) (13) Palm Valley Pro Shop (14) Mountain Shadows/Echo Mesa (15) Mountain Shadows Entry (West and East) (16) Mountain Shadows/Crown Ridge (17) Mountain Shadows Fountain. The planting for this year began on October 28, 2020.

Common Area Landscape - Water Schedule Adjustment — For the winter months the turf will be watered on Tuesdays and the drip system for plant material will run on Wednesdays. If you notice water running in these areas on any other days please send an email to mitzim@suncitylv.com and let me know so I can check and see if there is a clock stuck on or other issue.

Fitness Centers – Outdoor Pools – All outdoor pools, except for the outdoor pool at Mountain Shadows closed on October 31, 2020. The Mountain Shadows outdoor pool will remain open until November 15th. The day and nighttime temperatures as well as the cost to keep the pool opened the additional two weeks will be evaluated for consideration in the future.

Design and Restoration – Sub Committee – The Design and Restoration Sub Committee has been busy touring the buildings and evaluating the decorating and functional needs of each location. The sub committee has established the need for a community look, while at the same time creating a unique design for each area based on what activities take place in that facility. It has been noted that much of the furnishings are outdated, and also there is a need for furniture that meets the needs of a 55 and over community. Designs were reviewed for a new monitor station at Mountain Shadows Community Center. The Executive Director will be reaching out to the SCSCAI Owners for input and expertise.

Shade Covering for the Highland Falls Patio/Deck Area –

Owners submitted a request for consideration of the installation of a permanent shade covering in the patio/deck area of Highland Falls, this would make this area usable in the spring and summer as a seating area and also as an eating area. This item will be on the agenda for the December 1, 2020 CAP Meeting.

Interactive Electronic Kiosks for the Community and Fitness Centers – A Committee member submitted a request that staff look into eliminating flyers and bulletin boards by installing electronic kiosks where people can look up information about Clubs and events, and also can sign up for events sponsored by clubs or the Association. Staff will add this to the Conceptual Idea list and will solicit Owner input on this suggestion.

Future Projects or Purchases from the Reserve Fund or **New Capital Fund** – When the 2020/2021 Budget was approved earlier this year the Board of Directors directed staff to freeze all wages and to now propose any spending from the Reserve Fund or the New Capital Fund unless it was an emergency expenditure. Board President, Dick Clark, has now asked staff to go back through the proposed spending for 2020/2021 for the Reserve Fund and the New Capital Fund, as well as any other projects the staff, Committees or Charter Clubs have requested and to put together lists of needs and wants to present to the appropriate Standing Committees for recommendation to the Board, a preliminary list of items was presented at the November 3, 2020 CAP meeting and these items and others will be presented and discussed further at future CAP meetings, at other appropriate Standing Committee meetings and at Board meetings. Please note, none of these items have been approved, they are only being discussed for consideration.

Finance Committee

Chair: Gerry Sololski (Treasurer of the SCSCAI Board of Directors)

Meeting Held: Last Thursday of the Month at 2:00 pm The Finance Committee (FC) met on Thursday, October 29, 2020 at 2 pm. Seven of the nine voting members were present. Agenda items included:

Review of the September 2020 Financial Reports – The Financial Statements for the period ending September 30, 2020 were reviewed by the Committee and staff. The Committee unanimously accepted the September 30, 2020 Financial Reports and sent them forward to the SCSCAI Board of Directors for review and acceptance at the November 10, 2020 SCSCAI Board of Directors Meeting. At the November 10, 2020 SCSCAI Board of Directors Meeting the Board of Directors accepted the September 30, 2020 Financial Reports subject to audit.

Review of the October 2020 Financial Reports – The Financial Statements for the period ending October 31, 2020 were reviewed by the Committee and staff. The Committee unanimously accepted the October 31, 2020 Financial Reports and sent them forward to the SCSCAI Board of Directors for review and acceptance at the November 10, 2020 SCSCAI Board of Directors Meeting. At the November 10, 2020 SCSCAI Board of Directors Meeting the Board of Directors accepted the October 31, 2020 Financial Reports subject to audit.

Insurance Sub Committee Report – Insurance Sub Committee Chair, Jim Camburn reported that the Insurance Sub Committee recently met with our representatives from Cragin & Pike. Cragin & Pike is an independent insurance broker that works on our behalf to find the right coverage and plans for our property and business needs. Presently the Committee is preparing for the March 1, 2021 property and casualty insurance policy renewal. The Insurance Sub Committee expects to review all of the renewal information at their meeting in January 2020 and to report on their findings and recommendations at the January 28, 2021 Finance Committee Meeting.

Investment Sub Committee Report – Insurance Sub Committee Chair, Dick Gluch reported that the Committee is looking to the future and using the cash projections provided to Director of Finance, Lisa Hermann to determine how funds in the Reserve Fund should be laddered for future spending on projects. The Association invests fund in Certificates of Deposit (CD's) with terms that range from one to five years, to create a ladder with maturity dates each month. The current issue is that interest rates on CD's right now have been declining and even though they appear to be leveling off, they are leveling off at a low rate. The Association works with Wells Fargo Investment Bankers, who keep a close eye on what is happening and keeps the Investment Sub-Committee informed as to the trends and expectations. For now the Association is in a holding pattern on investments, and recommends the Board continue to follow the adopted Investment Policy. **Audit Sub Committee Report** – The audit performed by RubinBrown has been completed and accepted and filed by the SCSCAI Board of Directors. The Audit Committee will review the auditor comments against accounting practices to insure that we have incorporated any suggestions that may have been made. Board Treasurer, Gerry Sokolski recommended that the SCSCAI Board approve what the actual function of the Audit Sub Committee should be. **Food and Beverage Software Report** – Board member Jeff Rorick reported that a Request for Proposal (RFP) had been sent out to seven (7) different Food and Beverage Software providers and that he is waiting on the responses. He noted the importance of the Food and Beverage Software interacting with the Accounting Software and this will be considered in the search for both.

Accounting Department Policies and Procedures Manual – Preparation of the Accounting Policies and Procedures Manual is back on track. Staff will be meeting with RubinBrown to outline what is needed in order to create this important documentation for the Accounting Department and Executive Director. Once the "need" is defined, RubinBrown will submit to the Board of Directors the cost for producing the product requested.

Fitness Committee

Chair: Jim Akers

Meeting Held: 2nd Thursday of the Month at 10:00 am. The Fitness Committee (FITC) met on Thursday, November 12, 2020 at 10 am. Six of the seven voting members were present. Agenda items included:

2021 Fitness Programs – The Committee discussed what the focus or theme should be for 2021 Fitness Programs. It was suggested that cardio, strength, balance and flexibility for older adults be showcased, because of its importance as we grow older. Other ideas were, the importance of creating a strong immune system and getting back to training after COVID 19 restrictions. In the

end it was agreed that the Committee would focus on all aspects of health and fitness in 2021.

Pool Furniture-Replacement of Umbrellas – Director of Fitness, Pam Shields, reported that approximately 1/3rd of the pool furniture is in bad shape and needs to be replaced. This was originally budgeted to be done in the fiscal year 2020/2021 and was put on hold by the SCSCAI Board of Directors when a freeze was put on all spending due to COVID-19. Bids on replacing pool furniture and umbrellas will be reviewed by the Fitness Committee and Common Area Properties Committee for recommendation to the SCSCAI Board of Directors on whether or not we should move ahead with replacement of these items at this time. Mountain Shadows Fitness Center - Precor Strength **Equipment Replacement –** Director of Fitness, Pam Shields, reported that the Precor Strength Equipment at Mountain Shadows has become obsolete and has been discontinued. This means we can no longer get replacement parts to repair the equipment. Bids on replacing the designated pieces of Precor Strength Equipment will be reviewed by the Fitness Committee and Common Area Properties Committee for recommendation to the SCSCAI Board of Directors on whether or not we should move ahead with replacement of these items at this time.

COVID-19 - Fitness Center Gyms and Pools Reservation **System** – The Committee discussed the reservation system that was put in place due to COVID-19. Early on one of the Governors Directives required that along with masks and social distancing, that those using gyms and pools at fitness centers be required to have a reservation. The requirement for a reservation was dropped soon after the Directive was published, however at SCSCAI we kept it in place. Based on use of the gyms and pools during COVID-19 restriction, staff would like to do a trial for a two week period where Owners and residents with a current Activity Card are not required to have a reservation, and can come to the centers at the time that best suits them. The person will be let in based on availability. It was noted that presently it is very rare that any of the areas are at capacity. The restriction on usage time, masks and social distancing will all still apply. The SCSCAI Board of Directors will be asked for their support on a two week trial basis with a full report to the Board at the first Board meeting following the trial. Fitness Centers – TV Policy- During the Presidential Election, it was decided (after a poll of those who use the Fitness Centers) that only non-news stations would be on the televisions. Now that the election is over, a determination will need to be made on what tv channels should be on. There was no discussion on this at the November 12, 2020 meeting and this item will be discussed at a later meeting. Fitness Centers - New Lobby Furniture - Director of Fitness, Pam Shields informed the Committee that the Decorating Sub Committee of the Common Area Properties

Committee had met with her in regards to replacing the lobby furniture in the Fitness Centers. Board President, Dick Clark who is also the Chair of the Common Area Properties Committee suggested that new lobby furniture be purchased in this fiscal year.

Sun Shadows Community Center and Fitness Center – Utilization – Director of Fitness, Pam Shields reported that the purchase of Functional Fitness Equipment for the Sun Shadows Fitness Center was presently on hold, however she would like to form a sub-committee of the Fitness Committee to review and assess the utilization of the Sun Shadows facility.

Pinnacle Fitness Center – Pool Area – Music – Director of Facilities, Brandon Balek reported that pool music for the pool area will be done by his in-house maintenance team and will be completed before the pool season.

Pinnacle Fitness Center – Tennis Court #3 – Director of Facilities, Brandon Balek reported that the Request for Proposals would be sent out the week ending November 13, 2020 and will be reviewed by the Fitness Committee and Common Area Properties Committee for recommendation to the SCSCAI Board of Directors on whether or not we should move ahead with replacement of these items at this time.

Pinnacle Fitness Center – Softball Field – Raise the Outfield Fence - Director of Facilities, Brandon Balek reported that the Request for Proposals would be sent out the week ending November 13, 2020 and will be reviewed by the Fitness Committee and Common Area Properties Committee for recommendation to the SCSCAI Board of Directors on whether or not we should move ahead with replacement of these items at this time.

Mountain Shadows Fitness Center – Tennis Court #4 – Replacement – This court is scheduled to be replaced, not resurfaced. Director of Facilities, Brandon Balek reported that the Request for Proposals would be sent out the week ending November 13, 2020 and will be reviewed by the Fitness Committee and Common Area Properties Committee for recommendation to the SCSCAI Board of Directors on whether or not we should move ahead with replacement of these items at this time

Desert Vista Fitness Center -Pool – Resurface Indoor Pool

- Director of Facilities, Brandon Balek reported that the Request for Proposals would be sent out the week ending November 13, 2020 and will be reviewed by the Fitness Committee and Common Area Properties Committee for recommendation to the SCSCAI Board of Directors on whether or not we should move ahead with replacement of these items at this time.

Fitness Chartered Clubs President Meeting — Director of Fitness, Pam Shields will be contacting and meeting with all of the fitness related Charter Club presidents in the month of January, with the purpose being to work

together on programming, space utilization of classes, equipment needs and responsibility. The meeting will focus on the Charter Clubs and the Health and Fitness Department working together on future programs and health and fitness ideas.

Golf Oversight Committee

Chair: Ken Resnik (Secretary of the SCSCAI Board of Directors)

Meeting Held: 3rd Wednesday of the Month @ 1:00 pm

The Golf Oversight Committee (GOC) met on Wednesday, November 18, 2020 at 1 pm. Ten of the thirteen voting members were present. Agenda items included: Golf Course Maintenance - Director of Golf Course Maintenance, Brian Bagwell, reported that at Palm Valley Golf Course with the change in the weather, the turf is quickly going dormant. The goal is to paint the turf on the Fairways prior to Thanksgiving, but this will depend on the weather. The maintenance crew continues to work on the bunkers. Both Highland Falls and Eagle Crest Courses are in great shape and the crews are working on detail work. Play, Income and Programs - Director of Golf Operations, Donny Long reported that for the month of October, rounds were better than budget by 2,500 rounds and income was better than budget by \$80,000.00. Year-todate as of the end of October, rounds were better than budget by 11,900 and income was better than budget by approximately \$385,000.00. The Pro Shops will close at 1 pm on Thanksgiving Day and will be open on Friday with special Black Friday sales.

Dress Code for Golfers and Beverage Cart Attendants – Over the last couple of months the Golf Course Dress Code was discussed. Everyone is in agreement that the dress code needs to be enforced for the golfers and the cart attendants.

Owner request to have a Pine Tree Planted on #10 the *Highland Falls Golf Course*-After review of the request and the input from the neighbors on each side of the Owner making the request the Committee agreed that per the CC&R's the Association is not responsible to take action in regards to the possibility that golf balls may hit someone's home. In this case the homeowner is requesting the planting of a pine tree in an open area in between other pine trees to help with deflecting golf balls from hitting their home. The homeowner was willing to pay for the tree and the installation. After review of the information, Committee Chair, Ken Resnik asked for a hand poll of whether or not the Committee wanted to recommend placing a tree, at the Owners expense in the location requested. All Committee members indicated that a tree should not be planted. This issue will now go to the Board of Directors with the recommendation from the Golf Oversight Committee and the Architectural Review Committee.

Information Technology:

Chair: Jeff Rorick (Director on the SCSCAI Board of Directors)

Meetings Held: 4th Tuesday of the Month @ 10:00 am The Information Technology Committee (ITC) met on Tuesday, September 29, 2020 at 10 am. Eight of the eleven voting members were present. Agenda items included:

Social Distancing and ZOOM Room for Board and Committee Meetings — A permanent set up has been put in place that has card size tables spaced 6 feet apart on all sides. Individual microphones and new audio interface has been ordered, and at the time of the meeting was on backorder, but since the meeting has been received. In addition, since the meeting individual tablets have been installed at each table for use by the Board or Committee members, and staff computers have been equipped with cameras. This has greatly improved the visual and audio of the ZOOM Meetings.

Office 365 Migration – Office 365 Migration was completed and as of September 29, 2020 all staff computers are fully on Office 365.

Cox Communications Issues – Cox determined the issues we are experiencing with our computers and phones is due to an issue Cox is having with a redistribution point out in the street. We are not the only area experiencing issues with Cox Communications.

Chartered Clubs/Organizations Elections — Chartered Club Elections will be done electronically using Constant Contact. Constant Contact is the online marketing company that we use to do blast emails to our Owners and residents, and it offers many features such as polling and voting. The IT Department will be responsible for creating the ballots and receiving the electronic votes, as they have no interaction with the Chartered Clubs/Organizations that could be deemed a conflict of interest.

Four Goals of IT for the Year

- Marketing Golf and Food & Beverage the goal is to encourage more Golf and in turn improve Food and Beverage Sales through a Website that targets our 55 and over buyer.
- Disaster Recovery System the goal is to put in place a backup system that prevents business interruption and data lost, and quickly resumes work and reduces interruptions.
- 3. New Accounting Software the goal is to put in place "all in one software" that performs all of the needs of our large scale community instead of having several stand alone software products that have to be integrated into our system or entered through a journal entre.
- 4. New Food and Beverage Software RFP's have been

sent out to find software that will streamline orders, track inventory and costs, be customizable, prepare reports, prepare menus and will track food, beverage, staffing and other expenses.

Legal Services Committee

Meeting Held: Third Wednesday of the Month at 9:30 am The Legal Services Committee (LSC) met on Wednesday, November 18, 2020 at 9:30 am. All four of the voting members were present. Agenda items included:

Complaint and Hearing Protocol – Chair, Sandy Krause, informed the Committee members that the Proposed Complaint and Hearing Protocol sent forward to the SCSCAI Board of Directors was approved by the Board and published in the November issue of the Link Magazine for Owner notification. Once the Owner notification period passes the staff will begin using the newly adopted protocol.

Proposed Fine Schedule – Chair, Sandy Krause, informed that Committee members that the proposed Fine Schedule sent forward to the SCSCAI Board of Directors by the Legal Services Committee was not voted on, and therefore the staff is operating under the existing protocol. There was discussion that an updated Fine Schedule is needed. Board Member, Leo Crawford, was present at the meeting and agreed with Ms. Krause that Executive Directors, Mitzi Mills should send a request to the Board of Directors from the Committee and Mr. Crawford asking for the SCSCAI Board to reconsider this item at the December 8, 2020 Board of Directors meeting, so the topic can at the very least get a second and be opened for discussion.

Age Restriction Policy Review – The LS Committee will be starting their review of the existing Age Restriction Policy to see if any updates or changes are needed.

Rules and Regulations Review – The LS Committee will be starting their review of the existing Rules and Regulations to see if any updates or changes are needed. The first phase of the review will be done by the Department Directors and the Executive Director.

Renters Policy Consideration - The LS Committee will be reviewing a Renters Policy that was proposed a few years back to see if it is an item that should be considered again. It was noted that this consideration is not to prohibit renting or to place restrictions on renting, but to possibly create a policy that compliments the existing governing documents and create guidelines that would assist in making sure renters are aware of the Association governing documents.

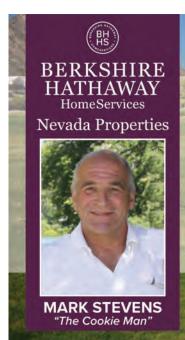
