New Year Signals New Projects

uly I is the beginning of our new fiscal year and the start of our new budget. Our operating budget for 2016-2017 includes revenues of approximately \$15 million and expenditures of approximately \$15 million. Much of the funds that will be spent in the coming year are for the specific purpose of keeping the community facilities comfortable, neat and clean for your use and enjoyment. The Board of Directors and staff work diligently to keep everything in good repair and looking nice in an effort to sustain and enhance our property values.

In an effort to keep the common properties in good and serviceable condition, we will be spending approximately \$3 million on various repair, replacement and renovation projects this coming year. Some of the larger projects include:

- 1. New pool furniture at the Pinnacle and Desert Vista outdoor pools.
- 2. Refurbish Tavern at the Falls with new paint, as well as new dining room furniture. We also plan on expanding the dining



room by enclosing the covered patio area. The outdoor furniture will be replaced and relocated to the lower patio area. These improvements will allow us to bring in more golf tournaments, which will help mitigate the financial burden of the golf courses in general.

3. We plan on enclosing the patio area adjacent to the Mountain

Shadows kitchen and relocating the Exchange Room, library and card room in that area. We will remodel the Exchange Room to accommodate additional office and conference room space.

- 4. Throughout the year we will be improving and upgrading the lighting around our buildings in the parking lots and sport courts for your safety.
- 5. Replace the tables and chairs at the Desert Vista meeting rooms.
- 6. Purchase new and more functional furniture for The Summit room at the Pinnacle.

These and many other smaller projects will be implemented and are intended to improve the quality of life in Sun City Summerlin.

I would also like to thank the Board of Directors who serve many hours on your behalf with no financial compensation to themselves to ensure that the money available to the Association is used in the best possible way to your benefit. THANK YOU!



PRESIDEN President's Message

Sun City Still One of the Safest Places to Live in the Valley

s a senior, you are subject to risks that were much easier to handle when you were in the prime of your life. The risk of health deterioration increases as we pass the age of 55. Safety is very high on the list of priorities. You seek a living environment that minimizes these risks.

Recently, Sun City experienced some events that pierced the veil of safety. Armed robbery and burglary to commercial property was an indication that new risks had surfaced. The ongoing threat of break-ins to our residential property appeared to be multiplying daily. In fact, the rumor mill produced numbers of home burglaries to excessive levels. And residents demanded that our Board do something to eliminate these risks.

Official statistics from Metro indicate that home break-ins in Sun City amount to approximately 1.5 incidents per week in our community of nearly 8,000 residential units. During a three-week period in April-May, I heard many statements that we were having 8-10 home burglaries per week. Despite the recent

glaries per week. Despite the recent crime wave in the Las Vegas Valley, we are still considered the safest place to live among the 2,000,000-plus residents of Las Vegas, per Metro stats.

Metro did arrest a suspect in the armed robbery attempts within a week of the occurrence. The break-ins at the Computer and Quilting clubs remain unsolved. Over the past several years, Metro has arrested suspects in home burglaries but this type of crime continues.

What can we do to keep this matter under control? Recently, the Board hired a security consultant to review the risks of security breaches in and around all of the Association buildings. A report was to be issued in June and reviewed by the Board.

What can you do to lower the risk of invasion into your home? Keep all doors (including garage doors) locked at all times, even when you are at home or working in your yard. These criminals are so bold that they will enter an unlocked back door while you are working in your front yard. Keep a radio or TV on when you leave your home, and when you leave your residence, look around to see if there are any strange vehicles parked nearby, possibly observing your departure. The criminals have the ability to enter your home and exit with your valuables in 5 minutes or less.

Always be vigilant and be prepared to advise Metro or the Security Patrol of unusual happenings in your neighborhood. You need to help yourself and your neighbors by giving good information to authorities, including descriptions and license plate numbers of vehicles.

Let me assure you the Board of Sun City Summerlin takes the issue of crime in our community seriously and will do everything possible to reduce risks. But you are the key to prevention by observation and reporting of unusual situations.

Yellow Dot Decal Alerts Firstresponders he Regional Transportation Commission of Southern Nevada (RTC), partnering with an organization that also makes road safety its utmost priority, AAA Nevada, is the primary sponsor of the emergency Yellow Dot

Nevada program. Yellow Dot Nevada provides a vital service for motorists, giving them peace of mind if they ever find themselves in a situation where they can't communicate their medical conditions. The information

is vital following an accident or roadside medical episode. Referring to the Yellow Dot kit, emergency workers can increase the chance of survival or lower the risk of error for a motorist who may be incapacitated.

A Yellow Dot decal on the rear window of the driver's side of the vehicle alerts first-responders to check the glove compartment, where a Yellow Dot kit contains vital medical information about the vehicle's occupants. In addition to the Yellow Dot decal, the kit enables residents to have the following information readily available:

- Name and emergency contact information for individuals in the car.
- Medicines, allergies or medical conditions.
- Name and contact information of the participant's physician.
- Information about the participant's health insurance

Sun City Summerlin residents can pick up their free Yellow Dot kits at any one of the community's social or fitness centers. To request a kit, just ask the monitor on duty.

The Cold War was not only the longest and most costly war in American history, it also posed the greatest danger our country and the world ever faced. That America emerged victorious from the Cold War was due largely in part to those who worked in secret. Without their contributions, the Cold War could very well have had a different ending. The United States Air Force 9068 Memorial honors the 14 victims of the 1955 topsecret plane crash on Mount Charleston carrying an Air Force crew, Lockheed and Hycon engineers, CIA personnel and scientists bound for Watertown, now known as Area 51, to work on the U2 spy aircraft. The full story of the 14 men aboard and the U2 reconnaissance plane they helped build remained classified for more than 40 years. Also classified as top secret was the account of the men who risked their lives while braving subzero temperatures at the 11,500-foot elevation to attempt a rescue. Over four decades later the formal dedication of this memorial, with dignitaries and families, took place on May 29, 2015. Chairman of Silent Heroes, Steve Ririe, will lead this informative and intriguing tour.

New Locking Mailbox Delivers Peace of Mind

mailbox is much larger and deeper to accommodate packages containing medication or large amounts of mail. The approved mailbox is called Mail Manager and measures 10.75 x 11.25 x 21 inches. The black mailbox is model #7506. The white mailbox is model #7507. The police, Post Office and mail carriers all feel this new mailbox will help stop some of the incidences of stolen mail that have occurred recently in our community.

WARNING: Never put up the red flag on your mail box! By doing so you are telling everyone you have mail in your mail-box to be picked up.

Please note that ANY change to your mailbox MUST be approved by ARC, as is the case

with any change to the outside of your property.

We have all heard about the break-ins that have occurred in our neighborhood. There is no reason to panic. Good common sense as to what one should do prevails, and if you are thinking of some security measures, here are some suggestions:

NO SOLICITING

Number: One (1) sign in the front of lot.

Type/Size: Weather resistant, thirty-six (36) square inches maximum.

Height: Thirty (30) inches maximum from finished grade to top of sign in yard. (See Development Standards, Page 18.)

NO TRESSPASSING

Number: One (1) sign in the front of lot. Dwellings bordering a golf course or greenbelt may post a second sign in rear of property.

Type/Size: Weather resistant one-hundred fifty (150) square inches maximum.

Height: Thirty (30) inches maximum from finished grade to top of sign in yard.

Location: In front yard on anodized or brushed aluminum, fiberglass or steel post painted to prevent rust in yard or on wall near front entrance door(s), gate or railing. (See Development Standards, Page 19.)

SECURITY SYSTEM

Number: One (1) sign in front and one (1) sign in rear of lot maximum.

Type/Size: Unaltered weather resistant signs provided by the security company one-hundred fifty (150) square inches maximum in yard and window decals not to exceed thirty-six (36) square inches.

Height: Thirty (30) inches maximum from finished grade to top of sign.

Location: Detached dwellings between the eighteen (18) foot setback from street-side. (See "Development Standards, Page 19.)

SECURITY/SCREEN/STORM DOORS

a. A security/screen/storm door may be added to the front, rear or side of the dwelling. This door must be mounted to the existing door jamb. The color shall be one of the approved standard colors on file in the Community Standards office.

b. Wrought iron decorative security gates may be added to the entry area of the roof enclosed front porch. The vertical distance measured from the ground to the highest point of the gate or any appurtenance attached thereto shall be no greater than four (4) inches higher than the front door. Gates shall match existing wrought iron or may be black, white, tan, or beige.

- c. Decorative or wrought iron security coverings are not permitted over windows.
- d. Rolling shutters are permitted. Color must be approved by ARC. (See Development Standards, Page 9.)

A <u>NEW FACE</u> FOR HIGHLAND FALLS EMERGES

he renovations to Highland Falls' practice facilities keep moving forward; residents will notice that a lot of work has taken place over the last two months. The once undulating slope of the practice tee is now a level surface and the previous eight-station driving range now offers room for up to 35 golfers to send their practice balls screaming toward the flags.

"By flattening out the entire area, we will have a TPC-style practice facility," said SCSCAI Golf Operations Manager Donny Long, who is excited to present the revitalized venue to residents and their guests. "There will be a huge putting green, a large chipping green with a bunker, a fairway bunker located on the right side of the range and an enormous area of tee space to practice off the grass," Donny said. "We are adding two shorterapproach greens for players to practice their 30- to 60-yard shots, which was requested by many residents."

Add to that other improvements like 260 feet of artificial turf mats that will be added to the area behind the tee box, a 120-foot colored concrete walking path from the parking area to the driving tee, 240 feet of new curbing, relocation of the main water line, and bunker repairs and adjustments along 14 of the course's holes. One of the largest bunker projects will take

place at Hole No. 16, where, in addition to installing a new liner and sand to six bunkers, Sun City's Golf Maintenance staff will eliminate one bunker to the right of the canyon wash and reduce the size of the bunker behind the green to create four new, smaller bunkers.

The impetus for the nearly \$300,000 project is a 2015 golf study commissioned by Sun City's Board of Directors.

"The driving range was one of the first projects suggested by the Keegan report," said Donny. "It's the first experience the guest encounters after checking into the pro shop, so it is a very important area. The previous driving range had a few issues where the practice green and teeing area were built with large elevation changes that waste usable areas. In the windy summer months we would lose those areas due to the IIO-degree heat and wind drying out our greens and portions of the tee box."

Donny hopes to unveil the soon-to-be jewel of Sun City's golf courses in October. For now, he's pleased with the progress.

"Our plan is to have the greens and entire facility fully open and operational when we open from overseed," said Brian Bagwell, general manager, golf course maintenance. As for the









artificial mat, once it's installed it will be ready for use. The issue, however, will be water.

"Irrigation will come on throughout the day to get the grass established and the greens will need extra attention as there will be many things happening to them to get them ready for golf play," Brian said. "We can accommodate tournament play; let them practice before the shotgun start and then once golf is out on the course, close the range for the remainder of the day for maintenance. That way, customers don't get wet and the grass has the proper amount of time to heal."

In addition to the improvements designed to boost the player's experience, the Golf Department will see an opportunity to attract more tournaments as the expanded tee area will accommodate tent setup and food and beverage.

"We needed these upgrades to catch up to speed with the surrounding competitors," Donny said. "Nearby courses offer extended opportunities for golfers to practice and then capture revenue down the line when they return to book tee times."

Due to that, Highland Falls will offer a new monthly range membership in addition to the current range card that discounts range balls.

"It's great to see that Highland Falls is getting that extra touch to create a full opportunity to experience golf," said Tony Derhake, former president of the Men's 18-Holers golf club. "I applaud the Board of Directors for moving forward on the project. When complete, Highland Falls will be as good a golf course as you can play."


Bunker Project at Highland Falls

Cover Up for Safety While Out in the Summer Sun

ummer is upon us again and I would like to remind everyone about the heat. When working outside try to do the work in the morning before it gets too hot. Drink plenty of water and don't forget to eat. Also wear a hat with a brim and light-colored clothing. Sunscreen is a must. This is also good advice when you are running errands or just out having fun.

As for your plants, take care not to over water them. When watered during the hottest times of the day, plants will wilt. It is natural to want to water them but don't, unless the plant requires it. Check the root system before adding extra water. The biggest killer of plants is over

watering during the summer months. If you water when the roots are still wet and they don't dry out it will lead to root rot. As I have mentioned before, if you're not sure invest in an inexpensive moisture probe. You can usually get one at your favorite hardware store or nursery. Stick the probe into the soil and as far into the root ball as you can and check what the moisture reading is. The reading should be in the middle after the watering and around 2 or 3 at the end of the day.

I hope you all enjoy the weather. The Landscape Department is watering every evening.

Charli's Corner

Perform Better with Good Posture!

ood posture is the backbone of a strong core! When you are not aware of your posture your shoulders and chin move forward and your back slouches. Simply sitting up tall will help position your spine better and move your head and shoulders back. Practicing slouching and then sitting up is a great way to improve your posture. You can do this while watching TV, on your computer, driving your car or playing cards.

Your core is not able to activate and stabilize with poor posture, which is also a major factor in balance and falls. Here are two simple exercises you can do to improve your posture and strengthen your core.

Chin Tucks: Helps to correct forward head position that develops while sitting for long periods of time.

- Sit in a supportive chair as erectly as you can. (Can also be done standing.)
- 2. Keep your head straight, breathe in and draw you head back so your neck is in line with your spine. HINT: Take your index finger, place it in the middle of your chin, push your chin back and up.
- 3. Hold this position for 10 seconds, repeat five times every hour.

Elbow Press Backs: Helps to strengthen the neglected mid-back muscles.

- 1. Sit in a supportive chair or stand with your back against a wall. Tuck your chin in, breathe.
- 2. Bend your elbows at your sides and close your fingers in a relaxed fist.
- 3. Gently press your elbows back into the back of the chair or wall.
- 4. Hold position for 10 seconds as you breathe deeply. Do not move.
- 5. Breathe in and release this position slowly.
- 6. Begin with three repetitions and build to 10-20 reps, once to twice per day.



Local A.A. Meeting an 'Exercise in Caring'

When you first meet Stan O. you know that you've met a man on a mission. It's not that he's extreme or fanatical about Alcoholics Anonymous (A.A.). In fact, he seems quite the opposite. But Stan O. is serious. And you quickly become aware that he cares deeply about helping others whose lives have become unmanageable because of their powerlessness over alcohol.

A.A. was started in 1934 by Bill W. Since then that is the only way he has been known: Bill W. The practice continues to this day; all members of the group

are known only by their first names and the first letter of their last names.

To prepare to write this article, I followed Stan O.'s advice and attended an A.A. meeting in Sun City. It was an exercise in caring. What impressed me most about the group of about 40 men and women was the active support shown to each member. First-timers were greeted, offered coffee and generally helped to feel at home. It surprised me how quickly newcomers were assimilated into the group.

Upon entering the meeting each person was handed a card that contained just a single word; my word was "change." After a brief greeting by the facilitator, each member spoke for no longer than two minutes on a topic or experience based on the word on his or her card. Speaking was purely voluntary; anyone could decline to speak, but no one at this meeting abstained. That is a good indication of the level of comfort among the attendees.

Before telling their story, each member stated his or her first name and last initial, in

keeping with Bill W.'s concept. This was followed by, "I'm an alcoholic." This recognition of the problem is the first of the 12 steps an A.A. member practices. The stories were sad, humbling, triumphant; some were even humorous. As each member finished speaking, support was demonstrated in the form of hand-clapping, thanks and congratulations.

At an A.A. meeting, each alcoholic meets others who have suffered the same pains, the same embarrassments, and the same feelings of guilt; so he or she no longer feels alone. At an A.A. meeting the alcoholic meets others

holic is free to express him or herself and deal with the problem.

A.A. starts the process of recovery by promoting the Twelve-Step Program. It begins with recognizing and admitting that the person is an alcoholic, is powerless to control it and that alcoholism is destroying their life. This first step is perhaps the hardest of all. It takes a special kind of strength at a crucial moment for someone to recognize and admit that the need for alcohol is something they cannot control. None of us wants to admit that a situation is hopeless, but that is the first step to ending the misery that is alcoholism.

Sun City Summerlin is fortunate to have a branch of A.A. in the community. There are no dues for the group, but a voluntary collection is taken at each meeting to help with maintenance costs. A.A. groups meet at Saint Andrew's Lutheran Church, 8901 Del Webb Blvd. For a schedule, see Page 24 or call

12 Steps of Alcoholics Anonymous

We admitted we were powerless over alcohol that our lives had become unmanageable.

Came to believe that a Power greater than ourselves could restore us to sanity.

Made a decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God as we understood Him.

Made a searching and fearless moral inventory of ourselves.

Admitted to God, to ourselves and to another human being the exact nature of our wrongs.

Were entirely ready to have God remove all these defects of character.

Humbly asked Him to remove our shortcomings.

Made a list of all persons we had harmed, and became willing to make amends to them all.

Made direct amends to such people wherever possible, except when to do so would injure them or others.

Continued to take personal inventory and when we were wrong promptly admitted it.

Sought through prayer and meditation to improve our conscious contact with God as we understood Him, praying only for knowledge of His will for us and the power to carry that out.

Having had a spiritual awakening as the result of these steps, we tried to carry this message to alcoholics and to practice these principles in all our affairs.

WARRIOR SPIRIT:

Resident Pushes Past PTSD to Recapture the Spirit of Competition

esidents who work out at the Mountain Shadows Fitness Center know her as Deborah. Five days a week, Deborah hits the gym for about 45 minutes a day. For 37 years she's dedicated herself to building the award-winning muscle she puts on display at bodybuilding competitions around the United States. In March, she took fourth place at the NPC Jay Cutler Classic at the Palms. This month, July 20-23, she will take to the stage at the NPC Masters National in Pittsburgh, Pa. Unlike the March event, where she competed against women in different age categories, the Masters will pit Deborah against women in her 55-year-old age group. Also unlike March, when she hadn't expected to compete, Deborah is excited about traveling to Pennsylvania. Her training schedule started roughly 12 weeks ago. And if the physical preparation seems rough, Deborah says the mental conditioning is tougher, especially when you're working through post traumatic stress disorder.

Deborah was diagnosed with PTSD three years ago, following the suicide of her husband.

Deborah recalls the day her husband of 15 years came home and headed for their bedroom. Upon following him into the room Deborah said she saw her husband take his life right in front of her.

"There were angels in the room that day," she said. Because before he pointed the gun at his own head, he pointed it at Deborah, paused, and then turned it on himself. What happened next set Deborah on a course of grief, anxiety, introspection and healing.

"I used to walk around in circles for hours. I didn't know what was wrong with me until I went to counseling and they told me I had post traumatic stress," Deborah said.

Upon hearing the term, PTSD, Deborah said she didn't think it was real.

"But it is. People in the military, God bless them. They come back with PTSD and unless you've gone through something you don't really understand. What I went through. What I saw. Your body goes into flight mode. Certain things are a trigger, like sirens or loud noises, and then your mind goes back to that vision. It's devastating."

During the years since the suicide, Deborah said, "I was like a sparrow with a wing that was broken. I had to decide to fly again or not, and I chose to fly again."

But learning to re-trust the wind and cast yourself into the sky without fear of dive-bombing to earth is anything but easy.

"It was very difficult to go on stage," said Deborah. "The first competition after his suicide I walked off. I wasn't ready. He was a well-known body-builder and when they introduced me they mentioned his name. I couldn't take it."

But time marches on.

Deborah moved to Sun City a year ago because she said she needed peace.

"These people give me peace," she said. "They are amazing. They talk with me and they love me. They give me hugs. People here are genuine, and the best thing is is that they all have stories. I love to listen to their stories."


Add support to peace and Deborah says she's found a place where she is beginning to fit in.

"I believe your blessings come to you if you are good to people," Deborah said. "I'm looking for the new norm and that's hard for me. But faith, that's what's important to me. I don't know how people do it without faith because I have hope that I will see him again."

Snowbird Pre-flight Checklist

Before you head out for the summer, take a few steps to safeguard your home while you're away.

- Check all doors, including the garage, and ensure all latches are fully closed.
- Close all blinds and other window treatments.
- Turn off the power to the garage door opener.
- Turn off water valve to the clothes washer. (You may want to consider shutting off the main water supply to the interior of your home, as well).
- Turn water heater setting to low or "pilot" and turn cold water inlet off.

- Stop daily newspaper delivery, or have a neighbor pick up and hold for your return.
- Inform your neighbors if others are expected to be in the house during your absence (cleaning personnel, relatives, real estate agents).
- Consider installing timers for lights to turn on at dusk and off at your normal bedtime. Timers for the TV and radios also should be considered.
- If you have a grass yard, arrange to have the lawn cut while you are away.
- If you will be gone for several months, consider arranging for landscape trimming.

In one month, Security Patrol volunteers alerted residents to 255 garage doors that had been left open after dark. They did 406 house checks and investigated 45 flashing emergency lights. The Information Centers at community entrances gave directions and guidance to 248 visitors. During their 24-hour shift, Patrol drivers logged 14,837 miles patrolling Sun City's streets.

ike everything else on the planet, quilts have a history. And it is that story that former Club President Lin Stahlhut aims to share with residents when the Quilt Club moves into the display windows at Mountain Shadows this month.

"Did you know that a yellow box sewn into a quilt pattern during the Civil War was linked to the Underground Railroad?" Lin said. An example of a fabric block displaying a similar yellow symbol will be on display, as will a quilt made in 1899. Other quilts will illustrate the evolution of colors, fabrics, themes and sewing techniques over the centuries.

The piece de resistance of the Mountain Shadows display, however, will be the annual raffle quilt the Club aims to award at this year's Arts & Crafts Fair on October 1. "The king-size quilt is a monster of a beauty," said Club President Theresa Cooper. "The quilt was donated to us and it's beautiful, showing images of Japanese lanterns in reds, blues and shimmery white." Tickets for the raffle quilt are on sale now and may be purchased at the Quilt Room at the Pinnacle, or from any Quilt Club member. Tickets are \$1 each or 6 for \$5.
