From the Executive Director

How May We Help You?

Most homeowners have used the services of the administrative office at one time or another. The staff is always ready to assist with paperwork, payments or answer any questions that residents may have regarding the Association. Recently, I spent some time with the staff at the front desk, answering phones and assisting where I could. I wanted to share with you some of the questions that were asked on a regular basis:

Q: What fees are there for the Association?

A: The current annual assessment for SCSCAI is \$1,284, or \$107 per month.

Q: If I am a homeowner, how do I get an identification card?

A: Homeowners will need to make an appointment with the administration staff by calling 966-1401. They will need to bring in proper identification, such as a driver's license.

Q: Do I live in a sub-association? If so, what are the fees?

A: The easiest and quickest way to determine if your home is located in a sub-association is to look at your house. If you live in a villa or a town home, that is, if your home is attached to another unit, you are in both a sub-association and the master Association. If your home is a detached structure, you are in the master Association only.

There are 39 sub-associations in Sun City Summerlin, each with its own fee schedule. For help determining your sub-association's name and its representative, call the administrative staff at 966-1401.

Q: How do I find out about clubs?

A: The names and phone numbers of all official chartered clubs in Sun City Summerlin, along with their presidents, are listed in the Link.

These are just a few of the many questions that staff help to answer. For more information, visit the Sun City Summerlin website, www.scscai.com, where you will be able to find the answers to the majority of your questions. The website is very thorough and easy to maneuver through.

Remember, we are here to help you, whether in person, by phone or on our website.

Announcing the New Resident Orientation

Another process that the staff conducts is the new resident orientation. This orientation has been done in the past on an individual basis as new owners close on their homes. Sun City Summerlin has now implemented a new process that will bring new homeowners together for a group orientation. We are very

These events will be held every Tuesday, beginning at 2 p.m., and on Friday, beginning at 9 a.m. They will be held in the Exchange Room at Mountain Shadows. Items scheduled for review are the Association's by-laws and CC&R's, development standards, rules and regulations, age restriction policy, procedures for a guest pass, explanation of NORA, a review of transfer fees and all of the amenities and what they offer. During the presentation, staff will be present to answer questions. New residents also will be given their Association membership card.

3. Cut back the vegetation that is edging onto the sidewalk. And while you are doing that, trim tree branches that hang over the sidewalk that people have to avoid when they walk by your home. Included in your trimming should be those beautiful cactus plants that, with their sharp needles, can be nasty should someone brush up against them.

As a final note, along with the better weather, more people will be out walking, enjoying the sights and getting some exercise. Remember that we walkers are not allowed on the golf courses. During the day the golf carts and golf balls are a hazard and at night, the courses are not lighted and you could easily trip and hurt yourself.

The Finance Committee

(Note: In November, the Finance Committee recommended and the Board of Directors approved to direct SCSCAI staff to attempt to limit next year's operating expenses to the current budget's expenses of \$13.9 million, even though there are many costs that are expected to increase.)

March is the month that Sun City Summerlin introduces the budget for fiscal year 2015, which begins July 1. Your Finance Committee plays a key roll in reviewing



and validating the budget so it is ready for the Board of Directors and the homeowners to approve no later than June 24. The Finance Committee acts as an advisor to the Board of Directors. It reviews and recommends financial reports, audits and investments to the Board.

The first presentation of the FY2015 budget will begin on Tuesday, March 18, at an open meeting in the Desert Vista committee room. Homeowners are welcome to attend the meeting and ask questions, as well as listen to the conversations between Finance Committee members, Board members and staff. The budget meetings will last for three days, and any changes that are made to the budget are often a result of these meetings.

The Finance Committee is made up of residents who have had careers in finance, and new volunteers are always welcome. There are sub-committees in audit, insurance and investments that advise the committee. If you are interested in the Finance Committee, come to the monthly meetings that are held at 1 p.m. on the fourth Thursday of every month.

Landscape

Now Is the Time to Focus on Lantanas



March is marching in and it's time to work in your garden. You may have noticed that the Landscape Department started trimming the lantanas early this year. I still suggest that you trim them now and not as early as we did for the health of the plant. You should start fertilizing your plants now and get them ready for the growing season. As usual, I suggest a balanced

fertilizer. If you can add organic material to the soil your plants will love you for it. Also, if you planted spring bulbs it's OK to harvest the flowers. However, as the plant dies back don't cut it. Rather, let the plant absorb the nutrients back into the bulb. In the past, I have done both and the bulbs that I didn't cut performed better the next season.

The Landscape Department is looking at more areas for turf reduction. The parks have areas that could save a lot of water with less impact on the community's overall look. In these areas there are large slopes that are unusable to residents.

I hope everyone has a great spring.

The Landscape Department is now watering three days a week and at night. Turf is on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays; drip on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

A Message From the Chief

England, Oregon and Vienna all are cold, wet and damp places where the sky is a constant, depressing gray. That's why my wife, Jen, and I came to sunny Sun City Summerlin in 2004, where the sky is blue, everyone is happy and it never rains.

We are committed to this community and have been engaged with it since we arrived. From the

start we have been members of the Cribbage and Hiking clubs, and have been involved with fitness activities. I was the president of the Hiking Club for a couple of years, as well as an instructor in the Fitness Department. After being laid off when the Fitness Department's budget was slashed a few years ago, I helped start the new Fitness Club and continue to teach one class a week as a volunteer. Jen and I started in Security Patrol in 2006 and 2007, and my becoming the chief seemed to be the next logical step of our involvement.

My philosophical goal for Security Patrol is summarized in one word: professionalism. But how can a bunch of volunteer amateurs be professional? Well, stop by the Security Patrol office and take a look at the full version of my philosophy posted on the chief's notice board. Professionalism is espoused under 10 headings: good customer service, image, quality work, job satisfaction, excellent communications, management mode, one house, high ethics, value, respect for people and balance.

Studies of volunteer organizations demonstrate that there are two keys to success. The first is that the volunteers need to feel they are doing a job worth doing. Study the crime maps of Sun City Summerlin and surrounds and it is clear this is the case. The second is that the volunteers are appreciated for what they are doing. I can thank and appreciate patrol members, but it means so much more when it comes from you. Think about a word of encouragement next time you encounter an officer in uniform.

Statistics: In one month, 226 residents were alerted that their garage doors had been left open after dark. Patrol drivers investigated 66 flashing emergency lights; 617 homes were checked for vacationing home owners; and 271 visitors stopped by the Information Centers for directions and guidance. Day and night, drivers patrolled every street in Sun City Summerlin, adding 14,360 miles to the five cars' combined odometers.

Spring Is Here, Tra La La*

It's March and thoughts turn to, well, spring cleaning.

One of the important things you should consider this spring is cleaning out your garage. For many, the garage has become more than just a place to shelter your vehicle; it has become a storage unit for all kinds of stuff, a lot of which is just plain dangerous. And if you think not, just remember back to August when Sun City residents suffered from a garage fire that caused a lot of damage to their home. Think what damage a fire would cause in your garage with all those cans of paint thinner you may have stored ready to catch fire. A good spring cleaning is your opportunity to throw out all those unneeded flammable items.

Consider the following:

 How many cans of old paint, solvents and other chemicals do you have in your garage?

- When was the last time you used any of it?
- What about flammable garments, blankets, paper, and boards that you haven't used in months or even years that are stored near your furnace?

If in doubt, throw it out

Storing old stuff that is flammable can pose a serious risk to your health and safety. If you don't plan to use it within a few months, ask yourself if you really need it? By the time most folks get around to using those old items they are often unusable anyway, especially after a summer in the heat of your garage.

Do yourself and your neighbors a favor and get rid of unnecessary stuff. March is a great time to clean out the



To install the bulbs, you need to swivel the bulb socket on the address bar 45 degrees down to enable you to install/or remove the bulbs," George said. The light bulbs average 3,000 hours each. The two-bulb pack costs about \$5. Another suggestion we found are the #1815 mini Bayonet-Base Lamp light bulbs at Radio Shack. A pack of two bulbs goes for around \$2.50.

Spokesmen Revisited:

Motorcycle Club Open to All Makes and Models of Riders





They go by names like Jumper, Beek, Drags, Gizmo, Hawkeye and Quacker.

They abhor drama and love to have a good time, riding their motorcycles through the Southern Nevada scenery, meeting every Sunday morning at the Chevron gas station at West Cheyenne Avenue and Interstate 215 (just outside Sun City Summerlin), where Spokesmen MC Las Vegas, Nevada, members arrive, fuel up and visit before heading out on the day's adventure.

The rides can take the motorcycle club anywhere from Mount Charleston to Mesquite and Death Valley to Zion National Park.

"We just did the Bordello Run in Pahurmp," said Sun City Summerlin resident and club member Jumper, a k a Jim Elgin, 75. "It was mandatory that we had to stop at four houses."

Getting serious, Jim said the club is "about camaraderie, and I don't use that word lightly."

Jumper, who has been riding with the Spokesmen for over a year, takes his name from his experience jumping out of airplanes while in the United States Army's 101st Airborne Screaming Eagles. Jumper said his buddies have been there for him in times of need, including the time he needed a ride to the airport at 5 a.m. or transportation back from the hospital following surgery.

This month, the Spokesmen will participate in the Bikers for Boxers fundraiser on Sunday, March 16.

"We have a member, Hawkeye, who loves dogs and he's putting the event together for the club," said current President John Griego. John, a k a Drags, got his name on account of his former NHRA status as a record-setting drag racer.

"We don't have fundraisers, per say, but we participate in a lot of rides to help support others' causes," he said, listing annual events like the Toys for Tots ride and the Ride For Kids that benefits children with brain cancer.

Drags, along with four other club members, started the Spokesmen in August 2012.

"There were five of us who belonged to another club here in Vegas," Drags said. "We left it because we wanted to be able to admit women. Today, all women are equal members in the Spokesmen. We don't have any dues. We're a social club that just loves to ride."

Drags explained how the original Spokesmen motor-cycle club was chartered in the 1960s. And when he and his friends decided to form a new club, they looked to reprise the Spokesmen partly because one of the five was a member of the 1960s club.

"We took the name and the original patch. The only thing we did different was change up the design from a three-piece patch to a one-piece one to signify adding the women," Drags said.

Members come from all over the valley. Today, the Spokesmen MC Las Vegas counts 53 members on its club roster and welcomes visitors all the time.
