



Medication Management and Preventing Falls

The importance of medication management cannot be overstated, especially when it comes to seniors or older adults, who often take multiple medications to treat multiple symptoms and conditions. This is called polypharmacy and can

cause overmedication, dangerous drug interactions and increase your fall risk. According to American Nurse Today, 44 percent of men and 57 percent of women older than age 65 take five or more medications per week.

How can you manage your medications more effectively and safely?

- 1. Keep a personal medication list that includes drug names, dosages, dosing frequency and the reason for taking the drug. Review this list often with your doctor and pharmacist to avoid drug interactions. Keep a copy in your wallet, car and home for emergencies.
- 2. Ask your doctor or pharmacist if the dosage is ageappropriate. Older individuals metabolize drugs differently and may be more or less sensitive to drugs than other patients.
- 3. Ask your doctor or pharmacist about any concerns or issues you have about your medications.
- 4. Know the potential side effects of the drugs you are taking and be aware of other changes in your health when taking new medicines.
- 5. Use pill organizers or dispensers to take the right pills at the right time every day.

Medicines and Falls

The more medications you take, the higher the risk of a fall. Some sleeping medications and those for anxiety and depression have been proven to increase your risk of falls. These drugs may affect reaction time or concentration, or make you slightly drowsy. If you are already at risk for falls due to muscle weakness, trouble with balance or walking, or vision problems, be cautious about taking medication that may further increase your risk. Most importantly, don't be afraid to ask your doctor or pharmacist for clarification on medications you take, whether prescribed or over the counter.

Health Nut: North Pole or Bust **Dolores and Frank Kology**

Every evening as the sun sets over Mount Charleston, you will find Dolores and Frank Kology walking, handin-hand (to maintain balance and stability), in the neighborhood bounded by Sun City Boulevard, Billy Casper, January and Castle Bar drives. Using their car mileage indicator, they mapped out several 1-1/2-mile street routes within this zone, which they walk each day. A 45-minute workout without using any facilities or equipment other than a new pair of sturdy walking shoes, replaced twice a year, whether they are worn out or not. This daily ritual has continued each day without fail, in the cool of the evening, for the past three years, in the rain (with an umbrella) or in sunshine, summer and winter.

In one year of walking, Dolores and Frank have walked 550 miles - 365 days x 1 ½ miles per day. That is the distance to Salt Lake City and beyond. "After three years, this adds up to 1,650 miles," said Frank. "We must be someplace in Canada by now, and there is no stopping because our doctor at Senior Dimensions has recently given us a clean bill of health."

This year, Frank will be 93 years old and Dolores, 92. They are high school sweethearts and have been married for 70 years. They moved to Las Vegas from Montana in 1963 when Frank was offered a position as principal in the Clark County School System -40 years ago.

To maintain their health, lifestyle and positive outlook, Frank says he played golf several times a week earlier in retirement. After golf, 30 minutes of walking on a treadmill at a spa became routine. Later, weekly hikes with the Hiking Club were added. When unable to keep up because of age, the two took to walking for exercise. It enabled them to stay active physically and to maintain good health.

"Scheduled dental appointments every six months are routine. We have no dentures. Annual flu shots are a must and necessary doctor visits are made as needed," Frank said.

Ten hours of each day are devoted to uninterrupted sleep and naps. A breakfast of oat meal with walnuts and 2-percent milk is followed with one banana to start each day. For the rest of their diet, salt and sugar



are eliminated when possible. Each balanced evening meal includes a protein, a carbohydrate, oil and a salad. A variety of fruits and vegetables are always available as snacks throughout the day.

"Living here, in this beautiful Sun City Community, with our own age group, the responsive management staff, the facilities, the clubs, the Security Patrol and being located in the safe and peaceful part of town, makes this definitely an ideal place to enjoy and experience retirement at its best and fullest," Frank said.



It's Always a Good Time to Talk About Safety

I had a safety meeting with my workers and want to also remind all residents to be safe while working in the garden. Some things to remember:

- Stay hydrated. Drinking water is very important as the weather gets warmer.
- Insects. Bees will start to swarm, so be careful if you have any irrigation valves that are underground and are covered with a box. Bees will try to nest in them, and if you open one up and they are in there you could bee attacked. One precaution is to plug any holes where they can enter. Also, check for gaps around your home and seal them. It's best to keep bees out than have someone remove them.
- Lastly, I know this is early, but when thunderstorms are in the area remember that lighting can strike many miles away from the actual cloud front.

Keep safe, and I hope everyone is enjoying their spring.

Tourniquet Use

What is a tourniquet? The term originated from the French word *tourner*, which means to turn. The first reported use of a tourniquet is traced to French Army surgeon Etienne Morel in 1674 to help control hemor-rhaging sustained from battle wounds.

Historically, Hindus, Greeks and Romans used tourniquets as early as 600 B.C. Tight bandages above wounds were used by surgeons as an aid to amputation as early as 1517. Due to new research from battlefield injuries, however, this old way of thinking has changed. Since the Iraq/Afghanistan War, no loss of limbs have been reported due to the use of tourniquet.

When we have our blood drawn, the first thing done is to apply a tourniquet on the upper arm to dilate, or enlarge, the vein. That is called a venous tourniquet. The pressure applied by this type of device measures around 40 mmHg (arterial pressure or blood pressure, normally 110/70 mmHg, is not occluded). So, when we speak of a tourniquet in first aid it refers to an arterial tourniquet, which means a higher pressure is applied to above the systolic (or upper number) of the blood pressure.

When I was a Boy Scout, my first-aid training taught me to stop bleeding by applying direct pressure for a good 5 minutes. If the bleeding continued:

- 1. Apply enough pressure to compress the artery.
- 2. If all else failed, use a tourniquet. A tourniquet should be used only as a last resort. Note the time and release pressure every 20 minutes to prevent a loss of limb. Write TK on the patient's forehead to remind everyone.

The Community Preparedness Committee is actively acquiring first-aid medical supplies for use by Sun City Summerlin residents should a man-made or natural disaster occur where Emergency Medical Services (EMS) may not be able to respond quickly due to overwhelming numbers of calls or road obstructions.

Security Patrol Dispatcher at Center of the Action

Sun City residents have a good friend in Security Patrol's dispatcher, who routinely is in the middle of whatever is happening in the community. A dispatcher is always on duty at Patrol headquarters to answer residents' phone calls and dispatch Patrol Drivers where they are needed. Dispatchers respond to telephone calls from residents about such concerns as aggressive solicitors, coyote sightings, unresponsive residents and other issues that may need someone's attention.

Dispatchers have a collection of dependable reference material. Generally, they can provide accurate information to callers. The dispatcher is in radio contact with Patrol drivers who are patrolling throughout the community and can direct an officer or emergency responders to a resident's home if they are needed.

Head Dispatcher Silvia LaMay is especially fond of animals. Silvia is gratified when she is able to help reunite a lost pet with its worried owner. "When a resident calls to report having found a pet running free, I ask them to please keep the animal safe, while giving me time to locate its owner," explained Silvia.

Dispatchers also take calls about confused residents who have wandered from their homes and face certain danger from street traffic, temperature extremes, or a lack of drinking water. "We want to help them quickly, give them water and get them safely home," Silvia said.

"Residents who live alone occasionally become frightened when they hear a noise outside their home," said Cynthia White, who enjoys dispatching an early morning shift. Is it a cat, or a cat burglar? "I'll direct a Patrol officer to the address to check around the property for anything that might not be right. We really are all about neighbors helping neighbors," added Cynthia. "I respond to calls about dogs that won't stop barking, blinking 911 emergency lights and, recently, I heard from a resident who had been awakened by someone ringing her door bell." (Alarms sounding at vacant homes are referred to the respective alarm companies.)

"I have answered calls from residents who needed help to manually open their garage doors," said Assistant Security Patrol Chief Bill Henriod. "When residents call us about a suspicious person or vehicle, it would be helpful if they would try to explain what they mean by suspicious." said Bill.

One resident reported an active bee hive in his yard and wanted to know how to identify killer bees. Dispatchers advise such callers to assume all bees are killer bees and they should call an exterminator to remove them. Dispatchers also deal with water leaks and must determine if they are on a resident's property, Association property or city property in order to correctly report them for repair.

To always have someone ready to help you, Security Patrol must have 42 volunteers to work dispatch each week.

Their home in Granada Hills was almost totally destroyed by the quake.

By this time, also, all their children were grown and on their own, so the couple made the decision to move to Las Vegas, where they settled in Sun City Summerlin.

The beautiful blue skies over Las Vegas inspired Sandy once again, and he decided to try something new. He soon became involved with stained glass and joined the Stained Glass Club.

He really loved working with the large pieces of glass and cutting them into smaller pieces, then fitting them together like parts of a puzzle. To hear Sandy talk about the glass, "It gave me the creative freedom I had been searching for all of my life," he said.

If you were to go into Sandy and Joanie's house, you would think you were in a stained glass showroom. Sandy has crafted several windows and wall decor for friends and neighbors. He was amazed and deeply touched that other people not only loved his work, but were offering to pay for it.

After 61 years with Joanie and 18 years of creating stained glass artwork, Sandy's love for both is still going strong.
