An Association meeting for the purpose of counting the ballots for the Sun City Summerlin Community Association, Inc. Board of Directors Election will take place at 8:30 a.m. at Mountain Shadows Community Center. the envelope so that the "bar code," which is used for validation, shows through the envelope's window. On vote-counting day, the Election Committee will cut off the bar code **before** removing your secret ballot. We will use optical scanners to count the ballots and tabulate the votes electronically.

If you make a mistake marking your ballot, do not correct it. Exchange the old ballot for a new one at the Administration Office (located at Mountain Shadows). Before requesting a replacement ballot and envelope, be certain that another member of the household has not voted. Should two ballots be received from the same home, **both will be voided.** Casting **more than four votes** also will **void** the ballot.

Your four votes may be cast for one candidate or divided among two or more candidates.



The association and its directors, officers, employees and agents are immune from criminal or civil liability for any act or omission which arises out of the publication or disclosure of any information related to any person and which occurs in the course of carrying out any duties required pursuant to this subsection.

• The four community center complexes, including the fitness centers, indoor and outdoor pools, tennis courts, bocce courts, mini golf course, horseshoe pits, walking tracks, as well as all the buildings and surrounding grounds.

• The golf pro shops and cart barns, and restaurant facilities.

• Common area landscaping along major internal streets (Sun City, Del Webb and Thomas Ryan), as well as along the external streets that border the community (Lake Mead, Anasazi and Rampart), and in the green belts scattered throughout.

• All rolling stock – pickup trucks, golf carts, food carts, mowers and other golf course maintenance equipment, landscape maintenance carts, anything owned by the Association that has wheels.

All of our inspections include appropriate staff members to ensure the best results for our residents.

What We Do Not Do

We are not responsible for any of the maintenance or landscaping that is part of any of the sub-associations within the community. Those areas fall within the responsibility of each respective sub-association.

In addition, we do not inspect the golf courses themselves. The Golf Oversight Committee is responsible for monitoring the maintenance of the golf course greens, fairways and adjacent plantings. Information on contacting the Golf Oversight committee can be found in the Link and at our SCSCAI website.

Finally, anything concerning private property surrounding single-family homes should be directed to the office of Community Standards, 966-1411. This includes issues/ questions about a neighbor's tree that blocks a street sign, weeds in yards and similar items.

SCSCAI Tallies Survey Results, Reporting to Begin

Several months ago the Link included a flier asking for residents' responses to 10 questions. Thanks to the almost 600 residents who took the time to respond. In the next several months we will be summarizing those responses and responding.

Several people commented on specific maintenance issues, such as a leaking faucet and those were immediately referred to the maintenance folks for correction. Whenever you do see a maintenance problem, call facility maintenance at 966-1417 during working hours, or notify one of the social or fitness monitors. We need your help to keep our facilities in tip-top shape.

A number of responses concerned issues that we have very little control over. We are an open community and do not own the streets, street lighting, traffic control, bicycling, etc. Those are under the control of the city of Las Vegas. We can try to influence them, but the city has the last say. Likewise, trash collection is provided by a contract between the city and a vendor. You pay for trash collection directly to the vendor (some sub-associations may have other arrangements for paying). If you have an issue with those services, please call the responsible city department or vendor and notify the SCSCAI Board member who heads up the appropriate committee, probably Common Area Properties, in most cases. But, again, recognize we are not able to take direct action.

There were several comments about people not picking up after their dog. If you see that happening, please say something to them. If they refuse to comply or repeat and you know who it is, let us know. We have no way to monitor for such instances.

Make Your Appointments Now For Free AARP Tax Help

AARP volunteers are providing free income tax preparation for Sun City Summerlin residents, beginning Thursday, January 31. The service is offered in the Mint Room at Mountain Shadows on Thursdays and Fridays. Appointments are necessary and may be made with the Social Monitor at Mountain Shadows.

Taxpayers need to bring a copy of last year's return and Social Security cards along with all W2s, 1099 R, INT, DIV, MISC, Social Security SSA-1099, W2Gs and broker statements with purchase date and cost of any stocks or bonds sold.

You also will need receipts for itemized deductions for medical expenses, mortgage interest, real estate taxes paid, gifts to charity and any other miscellaneous deductions.

Please note that we can prepare returns

only for electronic filing with the Internal Revenue Service. Paper returns are not permitted. Also note that we cannot prepare state returns or returns with business or partnership (K-1) income, other than simple interest, dividends and capital gains.

Security Patrol — A Sun City Summerlin Organization 254-2303

(Editor's note: The following article is the first in a two-part series regarding safety in Sun City Summerlin.)

According to the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department, **Sun City Summerlin ranks as one of the safest communities in the Las Vegas Valley.** Undeniably, however, crime happens everywhere. Using information shared with Metro, the Security

Patrol has documented 41 thefts or attempted break-ins in 2012.

The following articles are designed to get residents thinking outside the box with regard to safety and, in turn, minimize the likelihood of being victimized by a crime.

Daytime awareness

According to Metro's Undersheriff Jim Dixon, **nearly all burglaries in Sun City last year occurred during daylight hours.** Residents should not confuse burglaries with robberies. A burglary involves property thefts, where there is no personal confrontation between burglar and victim. A robbery is a face-to-face confrontation.

According to Security Patrol reports, two robberies last year involved residents who were targeted at a nearby casino. In each case, the resident was followed home and robbed. If the victims had lived somewhere else, the robberies would have been committed elsewhere. The lawbreakers were not targeting Sun City residents, said Sun City Security Patrol Crime Statistician EC Forbes.

Apart from a single incident in 2012, burglars have managed to enter properties while residents were not at home. According to Forbes, who talks with residents who have been burglary victims and attempts to establish trends if/when they become apparent, the question becomes: "How do they consistently determine that a home is unoccupied before they break into it? One theory offered by the statistician is that two burglars work together. Before committing to a target, they drive through the community watching for a resident who is backing out of his or her driveway, leaving home. After the resident drives away, one thief may follow the car, while the second one knocks on the front door making sure that no one is inside. If there is no response, a break-in is attempted. The two culprits stay in contact by cell phones, one advising that the coast is clear, while the other loots the house. Forbes said that in most cases, burglars are looking for money, jewelry, small electronics and guns - items that easily can be carried away and sold quickly.

Residents must take responsibility to protect their property. Security Patrol's high visibility is effective, but patrol cars cannot be everywhere.

The How and Why of CPR

Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) for use by nonmedical personnel began in 1972 in Seattle, Wash. Since then many changes have occurred to how CPR is performed. Every five years the American Heart Association (AHA) gathers the latest research and makes improvements to the use of CPR.

Currently hands-only CPR (no breathing assistance) is taught as the best technique for CPR. This consists of 1.) Call 911 and 2.) Push hard and fast with the heel of your hands on the middle of the chest at a rate of 100 beats per minute (bpm).

Why is CPR so important and effective?

When the heart stops, the blood flow throughout the body also stops. Fortunately, our body can usually maintain electrical impulses for 3 to 5 minutes following heart failure. This phase is called the electrical phase. If CPR is started and maintained during this phase the electrical phase will be prolonged. Defibrillation or electrical shock delivered during this stage has the best chance of converting the heart rhythm back to an organized heart beat.

After 3 to 5 minutes, the circulatory phase begins. Electricity starts to diminish and the oxygen reserve is depleted. Defibrillation at this point will not be as successful. CPR initiated during this phase will return the body to the electrical phase.

The last phase of the process is the metabolic phase, which starts approximately 8 to 10 minutes after the cessation of circulation. At this phase, cells in the body begin to die. Since cells are only starting to die, if CPR is performed, it can help revert the body back to the electrical phase and defibrillation can be successful in returning heart function back to an organized beat.

CPR started after 10 minutes has a survival rate of less than 1 percent. Calling 911 and starting CPR early is the best way to ensure a higher survival rate.



First Aid Through the Years

What has changed with first aid over the last 50 years?

With regard to bleeding, it was taught to use direct pressure and then pressure point techniques. If that didn't work, a tourniquet was recommended as a last resort. (The use of tourniquets was frowned upon as the lack of circulation could result in the loss of a limb).

While direct pressure remains the preferred method to stop bleeding, the use of tourniquets remains. During the Iran Afghanistan war, tourniquets were used first and foremost to control bleeding during battle. The results were astonishing – no limbs were lost; but a loss of life was reported when tourniquets were not used. This news resulted in tourniquets becoming the acceptable and recommended treatment for the control of hemorrhage or bleeding.

Other developments made during this time period included the use of clotting agents to help control bleeding. Such ingredients were combined into gauze. The use of this so-called "combat gauze" has resulted in decreased recovery periods and blood transfusions.

CPC is always looking for volunteers who are current or retired medical professionals to help with the training and treatment of Sun City residents during an emergency event.
