From the Executive Director

I wanted to remind everyone that the streets throughout Sun City Summerlin are city of Las Vegas streets. The city enforces all rules regarding traffic and vehicles. When you are driving through Sun City, always keep basic rules in mind, including driving at a reasonable and proper speed. This means that in addition to any posted speed limits, you must consider the amount and type of traffic, weather, road conditions and other factors. The proper speed may be considerably less than the posted limit. (NRS 484B.600).

Another concern is our STOP signs throughout our community. Recently, the city of Las Vegas placed red blinking lights above some of the stop signs in various locations. This effort was made to make them more visible.

In addition to stopping at the signs, which is the law, here are a few things to remember:

Be extra cautious at intersections with a STOP sign and no pavement markings. Legally, there is a crosswalk at every intersection even if one is not marked.

At a two-way stop, always come to a complete stop before either the stop sign or the limit line, whichever comes first. Look left and right for traffic. If you cannot see traffic, pull up carefully and come to a complete stop again. Check again in all directions for traffic, pedestrians, golf carts and bicycles before proceeding.

At a four-way stop, come to a complete stop before either the STOP sign or the limit line, whichever comes first. Look left and right for traffic. The vehicle that arrives at the intersection first goes first. The vehicle to the right goes next when vehicles arrive simultaneously. Be prepared to yield the right of way to any vehicle that goes out of turn.

Hopefully, these few reminders regarding speed and STOP signs will help everyone. I personally want to ensure that our residents are safe as they drive through ~ Source: www.dmvnv.com our community.

Other important topics Sun City residents need to keep in mind include:

- Dog waste. Please remember always to take a plastic trash bag with you when walking your dog. It is not only a good neighbor practice, but a sanitary one to pick up after your pet during its daily walk.
- **Securing trash.** This is especially important on windy days. According to the office of Community Standards, always make sure that the receptacle lid is securely fastened. Tie trash bags and secure recycled newspapers to keep them from taking flight around the community.

The rules for governing an HOA in the State of Nevada are lengthy and complex, and are specified primarily in Nevada Revised Statute (NRS) 116 and expanded on in our own governing documents such as our Master Declaration of Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions (CC&Rs). As an example, Sun City Summerlin Community Association, Inc., must follow Robert's Rules of Order when conducting formal board meetings.

It takes a lot of work to follow all those rules and to keep Sun City Summerlin operating. To help make that happen, we have eight standing committees that do much of the work for the SCSCAI Board of Directors. Committee members are resident volunteers who consider items under their jurisdiction and make formal recommendations to the board. We are fortunate to have so many dedicated residents who contribute their time and talent in keeping our community running so well. For example, the Common Area Properties Committee members spend many hours inspecting facilities and making suggestions for improvements or identifying deficiencies. Finance Committee members recommend insurance needs, monitor our \$14 million budget and oversee investments. We all owe a big thank you to all our committee members.

The *Link* publishes meeting schedules, and the committees would love to have residents attend and participate; it's a great way to find out what is happening in our community. If you have a question or complaint, start by attending the appropriate committee meeting.

Summertime! Home turnover tends to accelerate in the summer months, and when you get a new neighbor, go say hello and greet them to our community. Ask what their interests are; do they play softball, tennis, woodwork, paint, exercise? Drive your new neighbors around; show them a facility; visit the Security Patrol and Sunshine Service building. Let's make our new residents feel welcome and show them that moving to Sun City Summerlin was one of the best decisions they have ever made!

- The Board of Directors approved a motion as follows: Resolved that SCSCAI retain Jackson Lewis (Kelly Kichline); fees to be negotiated by the executive director and subject to approval of the retention agreement being approved by the BOD.
- The Board of Directors unanimously approved the LSC's recommendation [regarding Assembly Bill 44].
- The Board of Directors unanimously approved the LSC's recommendation [regarding Assembly Bill 34].
- The Board of Directors unanimously approved the appointment of the ARC members for FY 2013-2014 as provided in the BOD backup.
- ◆ The Board of Directors unanimously approved the Finance Committee's recommendation to approve the total revenue of \$14,322,592 and total expenses of \$13,972,593 with a net surplus of \$350,000 operating budget for SCSCAI supported by attached documents incorporated therein, submitted by the executive director for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2013, and ending June 30, 2014.

- The Board of Directors unanimously approved the Finance Committee's recommendation to approve the new capital acquisitions budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2013, and ending June 30, 2014, in the amount of \$60,000 supported by attached documents incorporated therein.
- The Board of Directors unanimously approved the Finance Committee's recommendation to approve the capital asset reserves budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2013, and ending June 30, 2014, in the amount of \$1,200,720 supported by attached documents incorporated therein.



Fire Station 107 Settles Into Sun City Ample Activities, Assistance Mark 1st Year of Service



t's called the prototype for future two-bay designs. It has received two energy awards in its first year of service.

Seven days a week, 365 days a year, Las Vegas Fire & Rescue Station 107 is referred to as a necessity and good neighbor by Sun City Summerlin residents who have either used its services or who have been granted peace of mind by its proximity to the community.

"It fits in so well with the community," said Sun City resident and Security Patrol member Mary Jo Richards. "The design is so beautiful. Instead of being just a square building, it's nice to see they made it so nice and efficient."

And while Mary Jo has not had any direct contact with the firefighters to her great relief, resident Matt Kisosondi, who suffered a heart attack last year, has.

"I was for this fire station from the beginning," said Matt. "I thought if they save one life it's worth it. Little did I know that it was going to be mine."

In 2008 when Sun City Summerlin was approached by Las Vegas City Councilman Larry Brown and then-Las Vegas Fire & Rescue Chief Greg Gammon, the community did not have timely coverage for fire and rescue calls. Many calls at that time averaged 8- to 12minute response times.

The need for a fire station within a community of 14,000 senior citizens was obvious. Unfortunately, because Sun City had been built out, there was no logically available space to place the building until the Sun City Summerlin Community Association, Inc., and the city of Las Vegas launched a coordinated effort to pinpoint a location. Over the next four and a half years, the plan for Fire Station 107 not only materialized but reached fruition when the station celebrated its grand opening in June 2012 with an engine. Two months later, the community welcomed a rescue vehicle to the station.

"It's a great location," said Louis Baker, construction project administrator for Fire & Rescue for the city of Las Vegas. "The firefighters love being part of the community and overall it was a win-win decision."

Fire Station 107 is staffed by three platoons composed of six firefighters each – a captain, an engineer (who drives the engine), two firefighters and two rescue vehicle paramedics - who work 24-hour shifts.

In addition to their life-saving responsibilities, FS 107 firefighters maintain an active presence in Sun City. Events over the first year of operation have included a grand opening, an open house, softball games with the Sun City Summerlin Men's Softball Club and Wounded Warriors Amputee traveling team, a kickoff pancake

breakfast for the MDA Fill the Boot fundraiser, a Save a Life compression CPR event sponsored by Sun City's Community Preparedness Committee, as well as an ice cream social and several resident meet-and-greets.

Fire Station 107 Stats

Since its opening in June 2012, Fire Station 107 logged 2,439 calls within the first nine months of operation in its service area.

Overall, the engine responded to 1,193 calls, 746 of them in Sun City Summerlin; while the rescue (or ambulance) has made 1,246 calls, 762 of them in Sun City.



The LED sign on the front of Fire Station 107 is part of a safety initiative across all newer fire stations. The technology is quick and efficient, as Fire & Rescue personnel can program messages from their desktops that alert residents to weather hazards and heat warnings, while reminding them to change their smoke-detector batteries.



Measuring approximately 7,800 square feet, Fire Station 107 sits on less than an acre of land adjacent to the 9th tee of the Palm Valley Golf Course. Referred to as a "smart building" in construction design, FS 107 is Leadership & Energy Efficiency Design (LEED) Silver certified and employs technology like Low-E glass and state-of-the-art insulation. A building management system remotely controls A/C and heat, and monitors water use.

Community Preparedness Committee

Can You Survive 3 Days on Your Own?

Your Community Preparedness Committee (CPC) suggests you have an emergency survival kit in case of a disaster. The basic survival kit should meet your needs for three days. If you don't have such a kit, you can make one.

A basic emergency supply kit includes the following recommended items:

- Water. One gallon of water per person, per day for at least three days for drinking and sanitation
- Food. At least a three-day supply of non-perishable food
- Battery-powered or hand-crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert and extra batteries for both
- Flashlight and extra batteries
- First aid kit
- Whistle to signal for help
- Dust mask to help filter contaminated air and plastic sheeting, and duct tape to shelter-in-place
- Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation
- Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities
- Manual can opener for food
- Local maps
- Cell phone with chargers, inverter or solar charger You also may want to include your prescribed medications and food for any pets you may have. Keep this

kit in a designated place and have it ready in case you need to leave your home quickly.

CPR & AED 101

Sun City Summerlin residents received handson training Saturday, April 13, during a Save-A-Life event presented by SCSCAI's Community Preparedness Committee and the Las Vegas Fire & Rescue Department at Desert Vista. CPC Co-chairwoman Teresa Frederickson originally contacted the Fire Department about the program because she said residents had been asking her how they could learn to use the automated external defibrillators. What she discovered was the Save-A-Life program, administered by the fire department, which teaches compression-only CPR and how to properly use an AED machine. In Sun City, there are 10 AEDs, located in all centers and both pro shops, and all fitness and social monitors, as well as some staff are trained on how to use the AED. Because the event turnout was so strong, Teresa said CPC will look to hold a similar event in the fall.



NRA - Residents might reconsider the habit of putting a National Rifle Association membership sticker on their window. An NRA sticker tells a burglar there is a likelihood that he will find guns in the house.



Pets Inside - If you are not at home but your dog is inside, one of the best crime prevention tools is to let a potential intruder know there is a dog in the house. Put Pets Inside stickers on your front and back windows. It's a good bet that burglars will reject a house where it is apparent they will encounter a barking watchdog.

Vial of Life - When emergency responders see the red Vial of Life window sticker, they know your vital health information is on your refrigerator. If you are confused or unconscious, they immediately learn your medical history, attending doctors



and medications that you are taking. That accurate diagnosis and swift treatment could save your life.

Security Patrol has free Vial of Life and Pet stickers at its headquarters located at the back of the Desert Vista parking lot. Stop by and ask for one.

SECURITY TIPS

Be aware when placing trash out on collection days that empty television or other expensive appliance boxes are red flags to burglars. Refrain from putting out such boxes the day/night before to keep from advertising recent pur-chases. Also, always remember to bring in trash cans and recycle bins quickly because leaving them out all day is a signal that no one is home.

Water is the most common substance on earth, and it's also the most common substance in the human body, making up more than 60 percent of a person's body weight. While you could potentially live without food for weeks, you are unlikely to last more than a few days without water.

Staying hydrated is extremely important; water is used by your body to perform almost every major function. For example, your body uses water to transport nutrients and oxygen to cells, regulate your body temperature, moisten mouth, eye and nose tissues, protect organs and tissues, lubricate joints, and flush out waste products. Without proper hydration, the body's normal functions can become seriously inhibited.

Dehydration occurs when liquid is being replaced at a slower rate than it is being used up by the body and is most commonly caused by diarrhea, vomiting or sweating. Early symptoms include dry mouth, the inability to produce tears or sweat, muscle cramping and lightheadedness. At its worst, dehydration can be life-threatening.

Be sure to have extra available water in situations that involve physical activity. Avoid outdoor exposure and limit physical activity when it's particularly hot or humid outside. Pay close attention to physical cues (thirst, dizziness, headache), which might indicate your fluid levels are getting low.

Small, Steady Steps Net Enormous Rewards

n the verge of seeing the scale hit the big 200, having my blood pressure register in the highborderline category, seeing the onset of high cholesterol and realizing the threat of having to resort to a lifetime of medications to help control the symptoms, I knew it was time to get serious about my health.





When Janine Lowen decided to get fit, she consulted with her doctor and headed on a path to health that has resulted in her losing 55 pounds.

About eight years ago, I dusted off the treadmill that had been sitting in the spare bedroom and began my weightloss program. My doctor recommended a low-carbohydrate diet, which promoted eating less of the bad carbs - bread, potatoes, pasta and sugar. Most of the high-protein foods I liked were OK, so it was not too difficult to stick to the recommended foods, and I did not need to count calories or keep a daily list of everything I ate.

After following the diet and exercising consistently for a few weeks, it was great to see the weight begin to come off, and my blood test results and blood pressure were improving dramatically.

For me, I found that weighing in regularly and keeping a log of my progress helped me to be aware of where I was in relation to my goals.

Today, I do a lot of brisk walking, play tennis once or twice a week, swim laps occasionally and enjoy the benefits of Pilates. I also ride an exercise bike for 10 miles and work out with weights. Now I am 55 pounds lighter, and my doctor couldn't be happier with my progress. But most of all, I feel great, and I am happy, too!

By the way, I love dark chocolate and still enjoy it as a treat.

Be Careful Not to Over-water Plants This Month

June is here and another summer is upon us. I like to remind residents of two things:

First, don't forget to be careful working and being outside in the heat. As I have mentioned before, stay hydrated and do the hardest work in the mornings. Even just sitting in the heat can cause ill effects.

Second, remember that one of the biggest killers of plants during this time of year is over-watering. It is very common for some plants to wilt during the heat of the day. When you add water to a plant that doesn't need it, it will continue to wilt and look worse. If this cycle continues, within a few weeks, the plant will start changing colors on the edges (usually a blackish color). If the plant is not allowed to dry out, it will die of root rot.

During the day, the top 2 to 4 inches of soil/root zone will dry out. Further down the plant, however, the roots might be sitting in water. As I have advised in the past, it



would be helpful to have a soil moisture probe. You don't need to spend a lot of money on one, either. The probe can be very helpful in determining the condition of a plant.

When a plant looks ill, check the moisture first, then decide what action you need to take.

Volunteers work in teams with a team leader. The team leader organizes inspections of their assigned areas and writes a report that is given to Patty Rosia, executive director of Sun City Summerlin Community Association, Inc. Patty then passes the information on to the director responsible for the facility or equipment listed on the report so problems can be corrected quickly.



All items are addressed and a report is issued back to the CAP committee and discussed at the monthly meeting.
