From the Executive Director

Vandalism and Theft

In the last few months, several incidents of vandalism and theft within the Association's property have occurred, i.e. to our golf courses and maintenance yard. The first incident occurred at Highland Falls Golf Course, between holes 13 and 14. Approximately 13 pine trees were deliberately poisoned and are either dead or dying. This was a deliberate, malicious act of vandalism on and of Association property that has cost the Association well over \$35,000.

Secondly, our golf maintenance yard also had a theft of landscape material. Las Vegas Metro is investigating a lead on this specific event. As the executive director, I, along with Metro, am pursuing both of these incidents and will aggressively see that those responsible are held accountable. That said, I would ask anyone to please, if you know anything or if you have seen any suspicious activity in either of these areas, to contact Metro immediately.

It is also necessary to set up operations of the voting and counting days. Only on actual counting days and meetings are all members asked to be present. Actual work days rarely exceed four or five, and those are usually partial days. All Election Committee communications are by email.

Nevada Revised Statutes (NRS) 116 and other Nevada statues define how we must run our Association – what we can and cannot do. For instance, our Board meetings must be run using "Robert's Rules of Order." We also are subject to our governing documents and a host of other laws that pertain to us. As an example of where the law restricts what we can do, several people have asked about controlling who can rent here. There really is nothing we can do to prohibit someone from renting out his or her property. As long as the renters meet the age restrictions (no one under 19 and one person 55 years old or over), they are legal renters. If you do know of a property where that is not the case, report it to the office of Community Standards.

The election for the Sun City Summerlin Board of Directors takes place on Tuesday, February 25. Applications to get on the ballot are due no later than Wednesday, November 27. - The Board of Directors unanimously approved that the employee handbook will be tabled until the October 8, 2013, Board of Directors' meeting when it must be brought to the BOD for approval.
- The Board of Directors approved the guidelines of a repayment plan to be offered to delinquent unit owner(s) as required by SB 280, effective 10/1/2013.
- ◆ The Board of Directors approved an amended motion to revise the proposed document (Resolution for Repayment Plan) as follows: 1.) Include a statement in paragraph No. 3, stating that the executive director shall negotiate the terms of the repayment plan; and 2.) Delete paragraph No. 5.
- The Board of Directors approved the "Procedure for Requesting a Board Hearing Regarding Delinquent Assessments" as required by SB 280.
- The Board of Directors approved a motion to remove the last sentence from paragraph No. 7 in the proposed document.
- The Board of Directors unanimously approved the proposed calendar dates for the 2014 Board of Directors' meetings. (See BOD schedule in the Link magazine)
- ◆ The Board of Directors unanimously approved a motion to acknowledge that the Board of Directors has fulfilled their duty as a Board in reviewing the April, May and June FY2013 financial documents in accordance with NRS 116.31083(6). The Association is in compliance with Paragraph (b) of the subsection 2 of NRS 116.3115 and reserve funds have not been used for daily maintenance.
- The Board of Directors unanimously approved a motion to resolve that there should be no more than three voting Board members on any of the standing committees, effective March 1, 2014.
- The Board of Directors unanimously approved the

ratification of the expenditure of \$7,169.10 to Floorworks for the emergency replacement of the kitchen floor area at the Vista Grille (approximately 1,110 s.f.) for safety reasons.

Southern Nevada Water Authority Comes to Sun City

In late September, the Southern Nevada Water Authority (SNWA) came to Sun City Summerlin to give a comprehensive picture of the water situation in Southern Nevada. Chief Financial Officer David Wright shared his organization's predictions of the decreasing water levels at Lake Mead and the estimated costs to each homeowner and our Association affected by the decline. The audience included SCSCAI staff, the Board of Directors, subassociation presidents and members of the Common Area Properties and Landscape committees.

Mr. Wright told the audience that the water level at Lake Mead will continue to decline and in 2016 is predicted to fall below 1,000 feet. As a result, anticipated increases to water bills can be expected. The increase would be close to 15 percent over the next three years, or 5 percent a year, starting in 2016.

Conditions are the result of a drought, which the SNWA reports has no short end in sight. Nevada is not expected to run out of water, Wright explained, as the state recycles 70 percent of the water it uses.

Addressing Lake Mead, Wright explained that the basin gets its water from the Colorado River, which carries runoff from the western slopes of the Rocky Mountains. So the recent flooding in Colorado had little effect on the river.

Jeff Meckley, an HOA advisor from SNWA, and his staff are looking at ways to assist SCSCAI in conserving water going forward. The plan includes turf removal and innovative timing technologies for irrigation. Meckley said residents can get a lot of useful information by visiting www.snwa.com, where they also can print coupons good toward the purchase of new timing devices for their own irrigation systems that include shut-off features for when it rains. He said that drip systems must continue to follow the allowed days of the week for watering, but should run 40 minutes to get water down into the the roots of trees and plants. Grass should be watered before 11 a.m. and after 7 p.m. for four-minute intervals. Runoff onto sidewalks and streets are subject to fines.

Landscape

With Winter on the Horizon, It's Time to Prune



Prepare now for January pruning of grey cloud Texas rangers (leucophyllums). Proper pruning will ensure the plant returns with vibrant new growth.

Winter is coming and as the cold temperatures start to set in, the landscape department will start restoration pruning of the leucophyllum (Texas rangers), green clouds and grey clouds. This year we are planning on doing up to 90 percent of them. At first it will look barren, but as the plants grow we will have fresh new

plants. If this is something you would like to do in your own yard, it is recommended to begin in January. The landscape department will begin the process earlier due to the larger amount of plants needed to prune.

With restoration pruning, cut the leucophyllums as low to the ground as you see fit and then give the plant a dose of nitrogen, which you will then need to water in well. If you do not water in the nitrogen you risk hurting the plant by burning the roots and exposing the freshly cut tissue. Be aware that if you cut the plants too far down they may grow back from the roots and sprout farther from the original plant. With regard to Association leucophyllums, I'm going to cut them down to around 2 feet.

The landscape department is now watering once a week, turf on Tuesday and drip on Wednesday, most likely during the day, depending on the nightly lows. As usual, please report any ice as soon as you can to 254-4092 or 363-7655.

Aerobic Exercise Helps Protect the Aging Brain

Need another reason to participate in aerobic exercise? Keeping the heart fit with aerobic exercise also may boost older adults' brainpower. Researchers found that when healthy adults older than 55 improved their fitness through

aerobic exercise, there was often an improvement in memory, attention or other mental abilities.

Aerobic exercise is any activity, such as brisk walking, biking and swimming that gets the heart rate up and improves endurance over time. This type of exercise has proven benefits for the heart. At the same time, research has linked regular exercise to better cognitive function in older adults.

There are many other reasons why aerobic exercise or better cardiovascular fitness, in particular, would benefit the brain. Improvements in cognition as a result of improvements in cardiovascular fitness are explained by improvements in cerebral blood flow, leading to increased brain metabolism, which, in turn, stimulates the production of neurotransmitters and the formation of new synapses. Neuro-transmitters are chemicals that carry messages between nerve cells, and synapses are the connections through which this communication takes place.

Improved cardiovascular fitness also may protect the brain by lowering the risks of heart disease and stroke. Cardiovascular disease is known to contribute to problems with mental function.

So, start today with a walk around the block or come to one of Sun City's fitness centers for a ride on a bike, or swim a few laps. Not sure where to start or what to do, contact me, or attend an equipment orientation class held at our fitness centers.



For program participants, Republic provided two medium-size wheeled containers - one for trash and one to hold all recyclables. The carts come in three sizes. Trash and recyclables are picked up at Palmridge Drive homes once a week on Friday. The system uses mechanized collection trucks that will work only with the new carts. Carts are rolled into the street with wheels backed against the curb.

Palmridge Drive sub-association volunteered as the first group in Sun City Summerlin to make the conversion to enhanced recycling. The effort is independent of current trash collection procedures put in place by the master association, Sun City Summerlin Community Association, Inc. At this point, the program is entirely voluntary.

Joyce Sherwood, a 21-year resident of the Palmridge Drive association, exchanged her containers for the new cans. Joyce is delighted with the program because "both containers fit nicely inside my garage, and I don't

have to make three trips to the curb while carrying heavy recycling containers."

Herb and Beverly Smith, Sun City residents for seven years, chose to keep the two medium-size containers. "It's a good deal," said Herb. "We park a car and a golf cart in our garage. We keep the recycling can in the garage and put the trash container outside."

Desert Butte Drive resident Jean Olson had Republic Services swap her medium containers for the more popular smaller ones. "It's perfect for me. I put the trash out every Friday and the recycling container only as often as I can fill it."

Fran Hinden, another Palmridge Drive resident, said she wasn't "too happy" with the new system. Fran does not like having to keep food scraps in her trash container for more than a day or two. Other residents, too, expressed that objection, but they are dealing with it in various ways, such as wrapping scraps in foil and then placing them in a plastic bag before depositing them in the trash container. Another resident said she hasn't detected any odor, but keeps a can of Lysol in the garage and gives the trash can a spritz whenever she thinks it might need it.

Directly across Rampart Drive, 2,500 homes in Sun City's adjacent community of Desert Shores have been

> participating in the enhanced recycling program for nearly two years. Desert Shores' resident Jan DeRoth immediately exchanged her containers for two of the smaller ones and now she does a lot more recycling. Jan completely fills her trash and recycling cans once a week and said, "It's easy; I'm 75 but I am not too old to learn some new tricks."

According to Steven DeStefano, Republic Services project manager, more than 150,000 Clark County citizens already are participating in the enhanced recycling program. DeStephano broke that number

down to roughly 60,000 in North Las Vegas; 80,000 in Henderson; 15,000 in Las Vegas; and 7,000 in unincorporated Clark County. In Henderson, the program kicked off in 2010 and Republic expects to have every Henderson home involved by the end of this year.

Lynette surprised her dad by accompanying him on the Chicago Honor Flight to Washington, D.C., on September 12.

In the early hours of September 12, 2013, Sun City resident Phil Tenerelli began a journey to Washington, D.C., from Midway Airport in Chicago to take part in a dedication ceremony at the World War II Monument. Phil served in the Marine Corps during World War II, where one of his campaigns took him to the Paulau Islands and the Battle of Peleliu.

"I was honored to accompany my father on his journey," wrote his daughter Lynette Findlay. The trip was sponsored by Honor Flight Chicago, and began with a serenade by an Andrews Sisters tribute trio. The ladies serenaded the veterans while they enjoyed coffee and doughnuts, and reminisced about their service. Veterans were greeted by active military personnel and helped onto buses, where their first stop was the WWII memorial. A ceremony and several photo opportunities followed. Next, the veterans traveled to the Lincoln, Korean and Vietnam memorials. The final stop was the Air and Space museum, where guests observed WWII aircraft, including the Enola Gay - my father was amazed by the size of it. Back at Dulles, the veterans ate supper and shared their thoughts on the day. As the flight back home began, many started to dose off, but another surprise awaited them - mail call, where each participating veteran received letters from their family and friends thanking them for their service. Upon arrival back at Midway, the veterans were greeted by a color guard and assigned a Navy escort who accompanied them through the airport. Each veteran was saluted as he/she passed and motorcycle club members, family and friends stood in line to shake their hands and shower them with huge, welcome-back hugs. Bagpipers and a brass band played patriotic songs. It was a wonderful homecoming for the heroes of WWII." ~ Lynette Findlay

Will Gildner, United States Navy, World War II

While longtime Las Vegan Will Gildner says he doesn't have much of war story because he never saw combat, his voice lights up when he talked about his days flying for the United States Navy. Originally inspired to join the armed forces when he accompanied an older co-worker to Los Angeles to take the Navy Aviator Cadet test in 1941, then 17-year-old Will said, "Sounds good to me! In those days, large posters with a Naval aviator standing in front of a Navy fighter plane were displayed in post offices." And they did the trick because during that trip, Will decided to take the cadet test, which he passed, and later the physical, which he also passed. However, his vision of soaring through the wild blue was dashed when his mother would hear noting of his plan. A year later, after enrolling in college and no longer needing parental permission to sign up, Will enlisted in the Navy. His military service eventually landed him in Pensacola, Fla., then on to fly the SC-1 aircraft stationed on the USS Bremerton. The way the aircraft took flight was to be catapulted off the stern of the ship. Will said, "In still air, the plane accelerated to 60 knots in 60 feet, a good jolt! Landing most times was a thrill because the water just wouldn't remain calm." Our job was to scout enemy positions, spot ships' gunfire and perform air/sea rescue."

Carl Reisman, United States Navy, World WAR II



"He's a little piece of history," said Claire Reisman of her husband, Carl, who was assigned by U.S. Fleet

> Admiral William Frederick Halsey, Jr. to escort the Japanese envoys who

would sign the Instrument of Surrender on September 2, 1945, onto the USS Missouri. The document officially brought closure to World War II. Carl even carries an ID card in his wallet that cements his name in that moment of history. Carl began his service as a gunnery officer onboard the cruisers USS Quincy and USS Columbia. Later, he helped commission the battleships USS Iowa and USS Missouri, and he saw action during Iwo Jima and Okinawa. Today, Carl, who is 93 years old, recalls his service proudly, always willing to share a tale or two of his days in service to the United States. He made great friends during the war, Claire said, and he has managed to keep in touch with a few of them to this day.

John J. Erlanger, United States Air Force, VIETNAM



As a Vietnam veteran and an Air Force retiree, I am always heartened by the number of Sun City residents who display the American flag on appropriate holidays. What disheartens me, however, is the lack of understanding of flag etiquette displayed by many of our residents who fly the flag 24 hours a day without proper lighting. For

the edification of all of our patriotic Sun City residents, here is the applicable section of the United States flag code that pertains to sunrise-to-sunset flag displays: United States Code Title 4 Chapter 1 – The Flag, section 6, time and occasions for display. a.) It is the universal custom to display the flag only from sunrise to sunset on buildings and on stationary flagstaffs in the open. However, when a patriotic effect is desired, the flag may be displayed 24 hours a day if properly illuminated during the hours of darkness. As a proud American and a member of the Sun City community, I hope I haven't offended anyone with this observation.


Lena Kearney, United States Marine Corps, Korean War



"We are a military family," said Lena Kearney, who joined the Marines in 1955 after serving in the Marines Corps. Active Reserves, 5th Infantry Batallion in Detroit during the Korean War. "My husband, brother, cousin, nephew and son-in-law are all Marines," she said. As for the then-22-year-old's

decision to enlist, Lena said: "World War II had a big influence on me and I wanted to help my country in some way." And while her mom supported her decision, Lena recalls her dad wasn't too happy. "But I told him that I was old enough." Some of Lena's first memories of joining the Marines included marching a lot in basic training, and most specifically, "It was the first time I had ever been on a train on my trip to boot camp from Michigan to Parris Island, S.C." After basic training, Lena was stationed in San Francisco, where she worked as a secretary for a commanding general. Of her post, Lena said, "So many of us feel so proud to have served our country. The men mostly made all the sacrifices, but we supported them."

Joe Harf, Harvey Lawrence Etch Out a Legacy of Service to Sun City

Two Sun City residents, two twice-retirees and two men totally committed to their community.

Between them, Joseph Harf and Harvey Lawrence have dedicated 25 years of service to Sun City Summerlin's Architectural Review Committee, SCSCAI's entity responsible for writing and enforcing the residential standards outlined in the association's Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions.

Lots of people and stories in local media coverage knock homeowners' associations, claiming their rules are restrictive, their officers are less than admirable, or their fees are too excessive.

But ask Joe or Harvey about why they have donated over a decade each of their lives to serving on ARC and their answers may inspire you.

"There are no paid positions in the community other than the limited staff positions, so if you love your community then you have to stand up," said Joe from his new home in San Marcos, Calif., where he moved to after spending 13-½ years in Sun City. His reason for moving: "The only reason, to be closer to my grandkids," he said.

With three youngsters – Tanner, 9; Cooper, 7; and Montgomery, 5 – eager to take on grandpa, Joe's got his hands full in an entirely different way.

As for his previous post as cochairman of ARC, which was his position for 13 years, Joe said: "I volunteered because I wanted to add

to the beauty of the community by making sure the standards were upheld. My most proud memory of being a part of ARC was being part of revising the standards and upholding the standards for residents."

During his tenure, Joe sat through two complete revisions of Sun City's CC&Rs.

While Joe's departure from ARC was motivated by fulfilling his duties as a grandfather, Harvey heeded the call of health.

Harvey served as an uninterrupted committee member from October 2002 to July 2013. Harvey passed away in October and all those on ARC extend their deepest sympathies to his wife, Norma, and their family.

Serving on ARC gave Harvey the opportunity to be a part of the group of volunteer residents who make decisions that ensure Sun City remains at the pinnacle of age-restricted living.

In an interview that took place while Harvey was in the hospital, he said what he'll miss most is: "The true friendship of my fellow residents who give so willingly to

maintain the high standards of our little town."

Kate Carroll, director of Community Standards for Sun City Summerlin Community Association, Inc., who served with Joe and Harvey for nine years, said "I would like the residents to know how much time these two gentlemen gave to the community. They were each committed to fairness and were always willing to give their time to work with individual residents when appropriate. They were invaluable to the ARC and the Community Standards office.

In the end, the choice to volunteer falls on the individual. While there are difficulties, as with anything in life, Joe said it's the rewards that outweigh any obstacles.

"Inspections take the longest amount of time," Joe said. But even with a few to do, the total time rarely exceeds three hours a week.

"Given all the possible activities available to our residents, coupled with a lifetime of work we all share, the choice of joining any volunteer community service club or organization becomes competitive at best. Sometimes we spout the old adage, "Let the other guy do it. . . . It's a pity that more of our residents don't experience the real rewards of giving back to their community," Harvey said.

"The history of horse-shoes dates way back," said Larry Wyntjes, the longest-standing member of the Horseshoe Club, going on 23 years. Recalling those days growing up in Buffalo, N.Y., in the 1930s, Larry said he remembers hearing horseshoes clanking against steel stakes in back yards and vacant lots as people of all ages played horseshoes.

"I didn't know anyone worked," he said.

The object of horseshoes is to toss a horseshoe to connect with or "ring" a metal stake positioned at the opposite end of the pit. The player to achieve the closest position can earn between one to three points, depending on the shoe's proximity to the stake. Games are played to 21. Strategy kicks in when players seek to cancel out their opponents' points with their tosses. For fairness' sake, players 70 years old and older are allowed to toss from 30 feet away, while younger players must stand a distance of 40 feet from the pin.

"The Club is in a transition, which is true of most of the clubs right now," said Club President Ralph McGee. "We've had about six to eight new members this year, but we'd like to see more. We have people who start and don't know how to play, but the more you play, the better you get."
