

Campaign Stops Are a Win-Win for Sun City

I received a phone call from a resident recently who asked me why the

Board of Directors permits political agendas to be debated in our community. There are two primary reasons. First, Sun City is known to be a community that exercises its right to vote. Voter turnout is exceptional in Sun City when compared with other voter blocks in Clark County; therefore, our residents deserve exposure to candidates without having to get into their vehicles and drive many miles to a rally. Second, our Association rents our facilities to candidates. Las Vegas Mayor Carolyn Goodman, Councilman Stavros Anthony, Jeb Bush and Rand Paul were in Sun City for events during a two-month period recently. Your Association received \$5,070 in rent from these candidates.

AND THE NO. 1 GOLF COURSE GOES HIGHLAND FALLS Sun City Jewel Is a Real Sparkler

No one makes it to the top alone.

Along the way there are many helping hands that support, advise, assist and applaud your efforts. Whether you're an actor accepting a shimmering gold statue or a golf course collecting kudos from the players who revel in your fairways and worship at your greens, staking a claim at the No. 1 spot represents the hard work and determination of many.

"It starts with the golf course maintenance staff, in my opinion," said Donny Long, director of golf at Sun City Summerlin. "Without great conditions we can't sell the course. If conditions aren't acceptable for the guests, we will lose them for good."

Donny assumed the helm of SCSCAI's golf department in 2013 after spending 13 years learning the nuances of the community's three public courses. These days, if you ask him about the wide smile on his face, he'll most likely tell you it's due to the great pride he takes in Sun City's golf program; more specifically, he'll tell you about the latest honor bestowed upon Highland Falls Golf Course by readers of the Las Vegas Review-Journal. On March 29, the course was voted Best Public Course in Las Vegas in the newspaper's annual "Best of Las Vegas" readers' poll.

"Our goal is to give the customer the best experience possible from pulling in the parking lot to having a drink in the restaurant following play," Donny said. "With the local competition around town, we must strive to have better course conditions and great customer service to stay on top."

From the friendly, professional faces at the front of the house who greet golfers at the door to the qualified teachers who lead exceptional, fun and comfortable clinics to the dedicated groundskeepers who start their day well before sunrise to ensure immaculate playing conditions, Donny says the experience offered at Highland Falls is full circle.

"You are only as good as your staff. This is something I will never forget. I have surrounded myself with an amazing group of people. Every one of them has multiple tasks that must be done daily that allow our operation to run smoothly. With three courses at three different locations, staff must stay on top of their duties to be successful. Take Golf Course Maintenance, for example. Director Brian Bagwell and his Superintendent Roger Knight have done wonders with the look and feel of the course. I think what they have accomplished with additional tasks and a limited budget and limited staff is remarkable," he said.

When he first heard about the award, Donny said, "I am very proud of my staff all the way around for winning this award. This is voted on by the public, who have played multiple facilities around town. We compete with all the public courses in Las Vegas, including Angel Park, Sienna, Silverstone, Badlands, Arroyo and Painted Desert, so I'm very excited."

And resident golfers should be ecstatic about the wonderful playing opportunity they have in their own back yard.



We were living in Minnesota at the time, and my helpful husband drove me to the Courage Center, a therapy pool 55 miles away from our house twice a week. There I did exercises in the water with other stroke patients. Besides being good for my body, it was good for my spirits because I made new friends and enjoyed myself. But Minnesota winters are harsh and we decided to move to Sun City, where the weather is kinder to our aging bodies.

We had chosen a house on the golf course with a lovely view of the mountains because I spent most of my time in bed reading or watching television. That way, I could enjoy the beautiful mountain scene from my window. Then we discovered the Arthritis Club in the Link and the exercise class that met at Desert Vista twice a week just like in Minnesota. This class was three miles away. Shyly, I came to the pool and found that some of the exercises were exactly the same ones I had learned back at the Courage Center! I like the class and the exercises, but mostly I love the people, who are so supportive. After months I not only felt better, I was stronger! I no longer spent time in bed during the day, either. I was hooked!

Two years ago, I happened to see Darlene Rogers, the coach of the swim team. I asked her, "Could you teach me to swim?"

She answered without hesitating, "Sure! Come on down to the pool at 9 a.m. on Monday and we'll get started." Well, I did. At first, I swallowed what I thought was half the water in the pool – but I persevered. It took six months before I reached my goal. After that, I swam more confidently with my one arm and my one leg until early last year, Darlene said, "I think you should compete in the Nevada Senior Olympics in the fall."

Shocked, I replied, "Who, me?" It was not on my radar screen, that's for sure. But, in October, I swam at the Nevada Senior Olympics. I was cheered on by a group of yelling teenagers so I had to complete the race (out of breath and panting). They awarded me with medals (I think it was for not drowning) for which I am extremely proud.

Sun City, the pool, the exercises, my coach and the residents have all been a catalyst for my happy success in the water. If I can help anyone else to take a chance and try something new, it would be an honor to me.

Landscaping

Always Remember to Look First

When working in the desert, it is a good idea to be familiar with creatures that can be deadly, or cause you pain if they strike you. There are black widow spiders, brown recluse spiders and several types of scorpions. Snakes sometimes show up, but not too often.

Always be aware when working outdoors. Check the area closely before picking up things or reaching in. Valve boxes are an ideal home for scorpions and spiders. Be sure to check out the box thoroughly before reaching in. If you see a web, take a stick and break it up. Ninety percent of the time the spider will hide from you. When digging up a valve box keep an eye out as creatures may try to use you as a hiding spot. They can crawl onto you and bite or sting.

There are several types of scorpions here in Sun City. They are nocturnal, but if you disturb their home they can attack. Scorpions live in valve boxes, under and in rocks and boulders, under pavers and stepping stones. The native scorpions are less of a health threat than their cousin, the bark scorpion, which was imported via trees and palms brought in from Arizona and California. The bark scorpion is small and mostly brown. Its sting can cause death in




The potentially lethal bark scorpion is an Arizona import.

some people. In general, it is wise to treat all scorpions as if they are deadly. Wear gloves when working in the yard, but most importantly, inspect the area you intend to work on before you begin. If you keep a watchful eye out you will be safer. Recently, a landscape staff member lifted a stepping stone and didn't check under it. Before he knew it, a scorpion had crawled onto his hand and stung him. He got a good look at it and thankfully it wasn't a bark scorpion, but it still caused pain and numbness, however it didn't require medical attention.

Someone Is Always There to Help

Security Patrol's membership roster lists 223 volunteers who serve the community every hour of every day. Exactly 111 men and 112 women are watch commanders, dispatchers, patrol drivers or information center staffers.

There are six daily patrol shifts, each four hours long. A total of 32 volunteers are needed to patrol the community for a single day, including two watch commanders, six information center staffers, six dispatchers and 18 patrol drivers. That translates to 224 working volunteers per week. Every volunteer is expected to serve a four-hour weekly shift. Fortunately, there are patrol members who serve two or more shifts a week.

Security Patrol always welcomes new volunteers. If you think helping your neighbors might be a good fit for you, don't hesitate to learn more by talking with the patrol's personnel officer. Patrol member Silvia LaMay has recorded the highest number of hours as a Security Patrol volunteer. Her currently accumulated service time is 23,483 hours since she and her husband, Walter, joined the patrol 19 years ago. Walter, a watch commander, has more than 20,000 hours to his own credit. Silvia is a watch commander and the Patrol's head dispatcher. In recent years, Silvia has gained an awareness that Sun City's patrol members, as well as the community's residents, embrace a generation that has occasional difficulty with tasks that they more easily did in past years. Silvia remembers how her own parents were helped by friends and neighbors when they needed it. "Now it is our turn to help others," she said.

If a safety or security issue concerns you, call 254-2303, any time. A patrol dispatcher always will be there to do his or her best to help you.
