

Most changes and major decisions, including the budget, must be approved by the Board. Administration: The Administration Office at Mountain Shadows will be closed for Thanksgiving on Thursday, November 26, and Friday, November 27.




SCOTTY'S CASTLE AND DEATH VALLEY NATIONAL PARK

you are thinking about running for SCSCAI's Board of Directors, it would help to know a little about one of the position's major responsibilities.

Sun City Summerlin operates nine volunteer committees that work to ensure everything from the Association's bylaws, CC&Rs, architectural development standards, and rules and regulations are being met. In 2014, SCSCAI celebrated its 25th anniversary, and over two and a half decades the Association has grown to become the largest HOA in the state. As you can imagine that translates into a lot of work to ensure that the community continues to thrive. Much of that work, in the form of implementing and guiding policy, is the result of work achieved by SCSCAI's committees.

ARCHITECTURAL REVIEW COMMITTEE - ARC





Ken Caroccia, Chairman

The Architectural Review Committee is composed of Sun City resident volunteers. This committee was established to maintain and enforce the standards and guidelines set forth in the governing documents to provide an orderly and visually cohesive community. It also provides a timely review of all projects planned for the community.

Two committee members are required to review applications. Committee members come into the Community Standards office on a weekly basis to review plans. All submittals for room additions, walls/fencing, patio enclosures and patio covers are reviewed by the construction sub-committee. These members physically view the property; check measurements, etc. before approving. If applications are denied, residents have the opportunity to revise their plans or appeal to the committee at the next scheduled ARC meeting. ARC members perform inspections 120 days after an application is approved. Applications are grouped according to locations within the community to minimize the amount of travel required. Where it is necessary to enter the property, the doorbell should be rung to see if there is anyone home. If no one is home, the inspection may be made if there is access to the area to be inspected.

Each of Sun City's nine elected board members serves as the chairman of one or more of the committees. A Board member's responsibility as chairman is to act as the liaison between the BOD and the committee. While resident volunteers make up the working arm of the group, the chairman is charged with updating the BOD on that work. Board chairmen appoint and remove committee members, and have much input into their committee's direction.







Bruce Alitt, Chairman

On a regular basis, members of the Common Area Properties Committee conduct thorough inspections of all the Association's real and personal property. The committee determines and makes recommendations to the Board of Directors that said property is maintained in a manner to ensure safety of personnel, long life and efficient operation. The committee is available for consultation to the Finance Committee during the budget process. The committee is also consulted by the executive director on all individual purchases of machinery, electrical and mechanical equipment. This applies to new and replacement equipment.

CHARTERED CLUBS & COMMUNITY ORGANIZATIONS - CCOC



Glenda Rogers, Chairman

The president of the Board of Directors appoints Board liaisons to chair our various committees. The Board of Directors of the Association has the right to approve or disapprove any decisions made by the Chartered Clubs and Community Organizations Committee. It was an honor to accept the position as liaison from the Board to the CCOC inasmuch as I have been a member of the CCOC for approximately 10 years.

The CCOC has a procedure manual that must be followed by all clubs and community organizations. Every year, the director of Community Services, Melissa Spina, invites all club presidents to a meeting during which she discusses the CCOC procedures. The manual addresses what clubs may do, how they function and reports that need to be filed. Every club president receives a copy of this manual with all the CCOC rules and regulations. It is my job as liaison to the Board to bring all matters for approval to the Association Board.

DEED RESTRICTION HEARING COMMITTEE - DRHC



Leo Crawford, Chairman

The Deed Restriction Hearing Committee is delegated authority by the Board of Directors to hear formal complaints brought by the Association alleging violations of the governing documents. A hearing on a formal complaint shall be presided

over by a hearing panel consisting of at least three members in accordance with the Association's complaint and hearing protocol. If, after a hearing, the formal complaint is upheld, the hearing panel may sanction the respondent up to and including suspension of Association privileges.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

This committee will have general oversight of the financial policy, subject to the approval of the Board of Directors, including ways and means for obtaining funds necessary to meet the authorized budget for carrying out the work of the

Association. The committee will review and make recommendations to the annual budget that is prepared by the executive director. The committee comprises three sub-committees – Investment, Audit and Insurance. My role as treasurer of the

During my years on the Board of Directors I have served as chairman of ARC, Finance and Golf Oversight. I currently serve as chairman of the Community Preparedness Committee.

This past year CPC has undergone a reorganization. Five years ago, the committee had a membership in excess of 40 residents. Most recently, that number had reduced to less than 10 members.

The committee has split its major responsibilities, assigning "first responder" duties to the Security Patrol. Next, all of the community education issues have been assigned to a small group made up of residents who have remained loyal to CPC. They produce articles for the Link and promote events to teach residents about the importance of being prepared for an emergency. Recently, an evening of learning CPR and the AED was held for residents. Members of Las Vegas Fire & Rescue handled the instruction duties.

BOD has afforded a unique opportunity on the Finance Committee, where there has been some overlap. Among the committee members, there is such a variety of experience that it is exciting to serve alongside them.

Some of the bigger projects this year for Golf Oversight included: the huge golf path removal and replacement with all cement on the Palm Valley Golf Course. Now finished, it looks and feels great. All the feedback I have received has been positive. Overseeding and the work to make our Highland Falls Golf Course water friendly (holes 6, 9, and 10) are complete. We should have our "Best of Las Vegas" course back to its playing best. Do a little practicing and get that handicap to a single digit again – even Ron Lawson can do it!

This time of year is critical to our courses. As the committee chairman, you can help control the costs and quality of our golf courses. Please support your courses and hit them straight.

IT in Sun City. We are fortunate to have residents as volunteers who bring a wealth of experience that they are willing to share to help SCSCAI improve IT support.

The Board has been very supportive of the recommendations made by the IT Committee. Several completed projects significantly improved IT support. The replacement of our cabling infrastructure and Internet access greatly improved our network speed and, most importantly, network reliability. We also outsourced most of our IT support (operations and maintenance) so we would have access to a broader range of expertise, as well as reduce our cost of IT support. The company selected, NetEffect, was hired following a request for proposal process. NetEffect is working with SCSCAI to further improve IT support. We are in the process of replacing our backup systems and implementing a virtual machine server strategy.

The next project the IT Committee will most likely take to the Board for approval will be the replacement of SCSCAI's administrative telephone system, which will not only improve telephone support but save money. There are other projects under discussion, such as expanding our Wi-Fi system.

The IT Committee is an active, talented group of residents who are dedicated to using IT to improve the experience of living in Sun City.

LEGAL SERVICES COMMITTEE



Ellen Bachman, Chairman

I am the Sun City Board liaison and chairman of the Legal Services Committee, fondly known as LSC. Although I am a retired attorney, I am one of only four attorneys on LSC. The majority of committee members are not attorneys, but they have

experience in a wide variety of fields, including law enforcement, medicine, insurance and engineering. Although it may come as a surprise, LSC does not provide legal advice to the Board of Directors or the Association. So, what does LSC do? Under Sun City's bylaws, LSC may review Sun City's governing documents, review and recommend strategies to keep legal costs down, and review legislation that may impact the Association and make recommendations to the Board regarding that legislation. Upon the request of the Board, the LSC also provides training in areas where committee members have expertise and recommends selection criteria for new legal counsel. Recent Boards have not requested training or legal counsel selection criteria. However, those are two areas to consider for the future.

Additionally, a panel of LSC members holds hearings on complaints about violations of SCSCAI's rules and regulations and development standards.

Last year, at the request of the Board, LSC began a project of reviewing Sun City's governing documents for conformity with current law and Association practice. That project is ongoing. At

this writing, the committee is completing its review of the bylaws. Recommended changes will be presented to the Board for approval and, once approved, the changes will be presented to the Sun City membership for approval. The next steps for LSC involve completion of a review of Sun City rules and regulations, then SCSCAI's policies and procedures.

Ms. Drakeley may be reached at 966-1408. NRS 116 requires each candidate to sign a candidacy disclosure statement, which will be included in the February Link, along with the ballot. The candidate disclosure statement will need to be included with the candidate's letter of intent to run for election.

Do You Know Your Home's Plumbing History? Class Action Trust Set to Expire



If your home's first escrow closed before July 17, 1991, it was part of the homes excluded from the Galvanic Class Action lawsuit upheld by the state of Nevada on July 17, 2001. The Nevada State Law for Construction Defects excluded these homes, citing they closed escrow more than 10 years before the court's certification date.

Because hundreds of homes were excluded from the lawsuit, a trust fund of \$2.5 million was established to help excluded homeowners correct the problem of below-slab hot water leaks. Individual reimbursement was set at \$5,000 (with proof of payment) for the termination of existing under-slab lines and the installation of a new hot water system installed in the attic.

For information on your home's first closing date, you may contact your Realtor; Sun City resident Sheila McCanna, sheilamc@cox.net; or Jennifer Warhol at Fenton Grant Mayfield Kaneda & Litt, LLP, 702-947-4900, jwarhol@fentongrant.com, the law firm assigned to manage the trust.

If you are a new homeowner and want to see if your home was or may be affected by the settlement there are a few things you can do:

- Check to see if your home has been replumbed. Have a handyman inspect your attic to see if the hot water lines have been rerouted from under the slab. If this has been done, your house should be fine.
- If water lines are not visible in your attic, your home may be included in the final distribution from the funds remaining in the trust. You will most likely want to have the water lines rerouted. Remember to save all your receipts to turn in for reimbursement. Reimbursement usually takes about 30 days.
- If you experienced a hot water leak under your slab and corrected the problem but have not yet submitted your "paid" receipts to Fenton Grant Mayfield Kaneda & Litt, LLP, you may want to do so by December 31. The trust terminates at the end of the year.

All residual funds will be equally distributed in 2016 to homes that HAVE NOT received reimbursement and/or have not experienced a hot water leak. The amount available for distribution will not be known until the fund officially closes at the end of this year. Eligible homes will receive a letter from the attorneys in early 2016.

It's been said that laughter is the best medicine. Laughter is a powerful antidote to stress, pain and conflict. What is Cardio Training? How to Get Started (Part 2)

It can be difficult to know how to begin exercising. We know we should, but how do we get started? Here are some tips to help you get started and feel better now. Choose an activity that you enjoy. The best movement for you is the one you will do. Whatever you choose needs to involve continuous movement of your large muscles. For

example, biking, walking, swimming and using the NuStep, stair stepper and elliptical are great ideas. Our fitness centers have a wide variety of cardio equipment to choose from that will make it easier for you to decide what will work best for you. If you are not sure what cardio machine would be best, sign up to participate in one of our Equipment Orientations (see Page 23 for dates and time).

Start with two or three days per week with a rest day between workouts. Gradually add more days as your stamina improves. Remember to begin slowly at 5-10 minutes per day. It takes time to build your endurance in your heart and muscles. Only do what you can handle and when you start to feel like you can do more, do it!


Going slow at first and allowing your body to adapt to your new cardio program is how you can make the changes you want with your health and avoid injuries.

For the first three weeks don't worry about your distance or how fast you are going. Instead, focus on showing up so you are creating the habit of exercising. It takes 21 days to create a new habit. When you follow through with this new commitment it will give you a great sense of accomplishment and your body will be feeling better, too.

Next month I'll talk about how to enhance your cardio program. For those who already have a steady cardio regimen, kick it up a notch and add some interval training.

Cataract Surgery Changed the Way I See the World ~ By Ellen Greenspan

(Editor's note: Link contributing writer Ellen Greenspan underwent surgery to remove cataracts in both of her eyes in August. In this account, she aims to help anyone who may be facing the same surgery uderstand what to expect.)

hat Is a Cataract? The Mayo Clinic defines a cataract as "a clouding of the normally clear lens of the eye."

I knew my eyesight had deteriorated when I couldn't read the large menu sign at a fast food restaurant. I made an appointment with an eye doctor, who diagnosed cataracts in both of my eyes and scheduled surgery to remove them.

In itself, the surgical procedure usually takes about a half-hour. Time at the surgical center throughout the process, though, may take up to four hours. Pre-operative concerns measure blood pressure, blood sugar, oxygen level, heart rate and temperature. At least 15 eye drops were instilled to dilate, prepare and numb my eye while I was in the pre-op area. Next, I was on a gurney attired in an unflattering hospital gown and I had not had anything to eat or drink for 12 hours. Still, my blood sugar – I am diabetic – and my blood pressure numbers were elevated. A mild sedative from the anesthesiologist soothed my anxiety. Once that was taken care of, I was ready for surgery.

In the operating room I was aware of everyone – the surgeon, an anesthesiologist, the optical tech assistant and a registered nurse. The doctor numbed my dilated eye and said I would be awake but comfortable. He explained that I would see only a bright light and he would talk to me as he progressed, but that I should not feel any discomfort to the

surgical eye. He was truthful; I was grateful. Occasionally, he said "Look up" or "Look down," or he reminded me not to move my eye as he worked. I heard him clearly, but all I saw was a bright light. He told me when the cataract was gone and when he was about to insert the clear replacement lens. I neither felt, nor sensed anything.

Following the surgery, a protective shield was taped over my eye, which I was to wear until the next morning and then for the following few nights while I slept. I was lightheaded, but sat up as I was moved to the recovery room. In a little while, I drank a coveted glass of cold water and a friend drove me home. By the next day, vision in my "new" eye was excellent. Without needing corrective eyeglasses, I drove my car.

SCSCAI Board President David Steinman had cataract removal surgery more than 12 years ago. He told me, "The most important issue is for you to get the other 'new' eye quickly. Only then will the true, full miracle become a reality." Respecting David's advice, I had my second eye repaired two weeks later.

After cataract removal surgery there's a month-long regimen of instilling a horde of daily eye drops, essential to avoid inflammation, infection and promote general healing. The drops are very expensive, encouraging me to become skilled at getting them into my eyes, not running down my cheek and off my chin.

I wear reading glasses for close work, but my distance vision is as keen as a hawk's eye. Through my new eyes, the world looks brighter, more colorful; it's beautiful. No pain, big gain.


Nowadays the terms tend to be interchangeable. A pool table has pockets and a billiard table does not.

The game has been around a long time. The first recorded pool table is reported to have belonged to Louis XI of France in the late 1400s; tables were first brought to the United States in the 1600s. There are even historic reports of George Washington winning a pool match in 1748.

The word "pool" itself is believed to have evolved from rooms in gambling halls where people bet on horse races and "pooled" their money together to determine the odds and the payoffs. Pocket billiard tables were introduced to these rooms to entertain the bettors between horse races and the name stuck.

Members of the Billiards Club meet to play pool Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays at Desert Vista. The president of the Club, Ron Hill, likes the challenge of the game as well as the camaraderie and the fact that each individual player is responsible for the outcome of the game, with the exception of a small percentage of luck.
