

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

s I am writing this article, I know that the voting is going on for two ballot issues and the race between five candidates for three open Board seats. As you read this article, you will know the results of the election. Congratulations to the newly elected Board members! Buckle up, we are beginning the 2021-2022 budget process. Four to eight hours a day, the first week of March and then again as often as it takes to arrive at a budget to present to the residents. Since December, the Administration and the Department Directors have been working on preparing, not only budget requests, but the "backup" material now called a "narrative" to justify or explain the dollar amount requested. I urge you to attend all or some of the budget hearings. They will be conducted via Zoom and therefore more accessible than ever before. Generally, each Department will make a presentation and the Board members will ask guestions. Some guestions will require research and compel that Department to return in the future with those answers. Each Department will present their requests for operating funds for the next fiscal year and their requests for expenditures from the Reserve Fund. Without going into detail, Reserve Funds are generally expenditures to repair or replace larger or more expensive assets of the Association. A major consideration given to this area of the budget may well be preventative maintenance of our assets. The Board and I believe that prolonging the life of assets is both prudent and cost-effective. The hearing process may be adjourned for a few days if the Administration needs time to research in order to answer questions raised by the Board. For the most part, these meetings are led by the Finance Department and the Administration.

By the time that you read this, we as a community should be beginning phase two of vaccinating our residents. Starting on February 2, the Las Vegas Fire Department in conjunction with the Administration, community volunteers, staff, and Security Patrol, began the daunting task of vaccinating the residents of Sun City. The quest or story began at least a month earlier when our Executive Director, Mitzi Mills began the process by asking our elected representatives, if one of the sites for vaccinating citizens could be Sun City. She got the Mayor and the City Manager of Las Vegas to agree and then involved staff in meetings with the Las Vegas Fire Department, to make this become a reality. There were, of course, delays in getting approvals and then the logistical obstacles and manpower demands. Every challenge presented was met with "we can do it," or "we can get whatever you need." Special thanks to the staff that became intimately involved. Brandon and the Maintenance Department for moving, buying and otherwise procuring all of the furniture, equipment and supplies needed both inside and out. Thanks to Melissa and the Community Services staff for organizing, training and scheduling all of the volunteers that helped. Thanks to those 40 plus residents who stepped up to not only use some of the work skills that they had, but for attending training and working so many hours. Thanks to Security Patrol for those 10-hour days in the parking lot directing traffic, assisting some of our more senior residents with wheelchairs and walkers, as

well as assisting in keeping the residents in line in a timely fashion.

Perhaps the most important function was performed by Pam,
Jessie, and the Fitness staff. After Doug and the IT staff set all the
appointments up, we had to change the appointments and reschedule
or call all the residents to either set up, reset, or remind folks of their

appointments. No small task. I visited the vaccination site a

few times and was not only very impressed by the organization, but mostly by the kindness that the volunteers were showing to the residents and the gratitude that the residents were showing to the volunteers. It made me smile, and once again be thankful that I am a part of this wonderful community that we call Sun City.

The First Dose



uring February SCSCAI, under the leadership of Executive Director Mitzi Mills and her staff organized the COVID-19 Vaccination Program for residents of Sun City Summerlin. As of this writing, 4,587 residents were vaccinated with their first dose. Second doses to follow. This program would not have been possible without the assistance and cooperation of the Las Vegas Fire Department, Fitness Department, Community Services, Sun City Summerlin Security Patrol, Building Maintenance and up to 100 volunteers.

My wife and I were assigned different days because of our age. In my almost fourteen years living here, I have never experienced any event as well organized as this program. I drove into the Desert Vista parking lot and was directed to a parking spot by the Security Patrol. Then I got on to a small line to check-in with the papers I had filled out, then I was directed to a chair in the Ballroom. I sat on the chair as someone checked my paperwork. Medical personnel administered the vaccination. A third person filled out my card. I just sat in the chair until a timer set for 10 minutes rang and then I was directed to the person who would set up my second dose appointment. The whole procedure took about twenty minutes!

In conclusion, this was well organized and productive from beginning to end.



The Community Standards Department within Sun City has the responsibility of maintaining high standards of appearance and upkeep in our neighborhoods. With only two of us in the office, my Assistant, Julie Zerbel and I, review and process applications along with verifying possible violations. We both

rely on a comprehensive list of Development Standards that are also upheld by the Architectural Review Committee (ARC) members to keep our home values at the highest possible levels. We also provide administrative support to the Deed Restriction Hearing Committee (DRHC) which hears formal complaints alleging violations of the Development Standards.

The Community Standards Department and ARC are two names that have quite often been used interchangeably, but they are two different entities. To clarify, the ARC maintains the standards and guidelines to provide an orderly and visually cohesive community. The Community Standards Department is total administrative support to ARC and DRHC, accepts responsibility to review and process applications for a large variety of homeowner requests, and verify and resolve possible violations.

While ensuring the standards of our community are maintained (it may not sound like the world's most exciting job), I truly enjoy interacting with so many of you and doing my part to make sure our residents enjoy this amazing community to its fullest. I take great pride in keeping up the beauty of our little city and look forward to seeing more of our residents' faces soon.

Begosh and Begorra!

h, the Irish. As the song goes, "When Irish eyes are smiling, sure 'tis like the morn in spring. In the lilt of Irish laughter, you can hear the angels sing."

For most people, St. Patrick's Day is a day to make light of all the seriousness of the world, to enjoy some merriment and to unite as one by wearing green, because after all, everyone is a little Irish on St. Patrick's Day! But not too long ago, Americans didn't feel that way about the Irish when they arrived in the United States as immigrants.

Two very different perspectives. How did this come to be? Why do we wear green? Who is St. Patrick? How did this holy day become a day of celebration? Let's discuss the history, the legends, and the myths.

St. Patrick was not Irish. Who knew? He was born sometime around the 4th century, in Roman Britain and was kidnapped during an Irish raid at the tender age of 16. Born into a wealthy family, he was forced into slavery working as a shepherd for six years before he escaped back to Britain. His parents were Christian, and St. Patrick accepted the Catholic faith. Soon after, St. Patrick began religious training and ordained as a priest. He elected to go back to Ireland to help save the Pagans and introduce the Christian faith. St. Patrick died on March 17, 461 (St. Patrick's Day). One of the legends about St. Patrick is that he "drove the snakes out of Ireland". This turned out to be symbolic, because Ireland never had any snakes to begin with; therefore, the "snakes" represented the Pagans. St. Patrick also famously used the "shamrock" (3-leaf clover) as an educational tool, to explain the Holy Trinity (the

Father, Son, and the Holy Ghost) to non-believers. In fact, it's a form of clover and there are no such things as shamrocks.

Why have people traditionally worn green on St. Patrick's Day? In the 18th century, Irish Catholics began to wear "shamrocks" on St. Patrick's Day as testimony to their faith. That eventually turned into the "wearing of the green" among the Irish population, and eventually throughout the world. One notable thing that St. Patrick did, that is not well-known, is that he played a part in the Irish saving civilization as we know it; that is, the literature and culture of Europe. After the fall of the Roman Empire, Germanic tribes invaded Europe intent on destroying the culture and literature of the Greeks and Romans. St. Patrick created several monasteries in Ireland and the monks dutifully copied the manuscripts of the Greek and Roman culture. It is said that these manuscripts proved invaluable in creating the Renaissance.

St. Patrick's Day falls during the season of Lent, and years ago the Church lifted the ban against meat and alcohol for the day, and a day of celebration commenced. According to the records, the first day that was celebrated in St. Patrick's honor in the U.S., was on March 17, 1601, and was celebrated in a Spanish colony in St. Augustus, FL. However, another document records that the first St. Patrick's Day was in Savannah, Georgia. A century later, on March 17, 1722, a group of homesick Irish soldiers marched in the streets of New York to honor St. Patrick, and that was the first actual parade.

The Great Potato Famine of 1840, brought hundreds of thousands of destitute Catholic Irish to the United States. Until then, only wealthier and educated Protestant Irish immigrants had made the trip across the pond. Like many immigrants who have moved to the United States, they were considered strangers because of their traditions and accents. In New York, Boston, and other major cities, the Irish couldn't even get the most menial jobs, and most ads in the newspapers printed the slogan, "No Irish Need Apply." It takes time for immigrants to be accepted and become accustomed to the American way of life, and this has been the history of many cultures who have come to our shores and faced rejection. Indeed, in one of the first St.

Patrick's Day parades, the Irish were portrayed as drunken, violent monkeys by the newspapers. Prejudice was rampant.

So how did things change, you might ask? The Irish started to realize that there was strength in numbers, and various Irish societies formed parades for St. Patrick's Day. They became a formidable political force, and the "green machine" as it was called, built clout. Soon, political hopefuls wanted to be included in the St. Patrick's Day parades. A proud moment for the Irish who continued to fight racial profiling and stereotyping came when President Harry S. Truman attended the New York St. Patrick's Day parade in 1948. Fast forward to more modern times, and you will find St. Patrick's Day celebrated in many communities and cultures. In 1962, Chicago began dyeing the Chicago River green in observance of St. Patrick's Day. The story goes that the city pollution control workers came up with the idea as they used dyes to trace illegal sewer discharge, and they thought it might be a nice way to celebrate the holiday. At that time, they used 100 pounds of green vegetable dye which kept the river green for a week. Today, they use 40 pounds of dye, and the river stays green for several hours. But that's not the way Tom Whoolley, a hotel manager in Savannah, Georgia, would have you believe. He claims that in 1961, he convinced city officials in Savannah to dye the Savannah River green. Unfortunately, it didn't work out very well and the river only had a greenish hue. He then claims that he personally shared his idea with the Mayor of Chicago, Richard M. Daley. There are some who refute his claim.

Nowadays, people from all around the world celebrate St. Patrick's Day with parades and the wearing of the green. Many will indulge in the traditional Irish meal of soda bread, corned beef, and cabbage. In fact, over 300 historic landmarks in 50 countries "go green" on this day. Some of the countries that celebrate the holiday are Malta, Russia, Bosnia & Herzegovina, Scotland, Switzerland, Lithuania, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, Montserrat, Mexico, Argentina, and even the International Space Station! Until the 1970s, St. Patrick's Day was consid-

ered a religious holiday and the pubs were closed. However, the Irish government thought it a good idea to use St. Patrick's Day as a tourist attraction to showcase Irish traditions and culture to the world, and opened the pubs.

Personally, I feel that it would be nice if the tradition and culture of the Irish were more emphasized, and people educated to some of the contributions the Irish have made. On the other hand, who can argue with the world wanting for one day to be a little Irish, have a little merriment, wear a little green and dream a dream of a better world?

I will close with the first stance of an old Irish prayer:

May the road rise to meet you,
May the wind be always at your back.
May the sun shine warm on your face,
The rains fall soft upon your fields.
And until we meet again, may God hold
you in the palm of His hand.

WHO IS A GOLF COURS







Not the 1st starter on a pro-sports team,

Not the beginning of sour dough bread,

Not where you put your key to start the car,

and

Not an American clothing manufacturer.

However, the Starter is the person who controls the pace of play on the golf course by directing players to the first tee at the appropriate time. They are the information booth, responsible for imparting information regarding the tees, scorecards related to golf play and explain Handicapped rules. For this, they need organizational and communication skills.

Moving into the Starter/Ranger position, the skills and abilities include working knowledge of the game of golf (rules and etiquette), maintaining the speed of play logs by recording each cart number by group and records time at each hole. Also, they

communicate with the pro shop to keep them informed of play progress and special circumstances. They are also responsible for maintaining proper use of all carts to protect the course playing surface and equipment as well as the safety of all players.

They monitor and advise groups that are not keeping up and encourage players to properly repair their divots, ball marks and to properly rake sand bunkers after use. The Starter/Ranger is also responsible for monitoring players for appropriate attire and golf shoes, keep players off the playing and practice surfaces during frost delays. Yes, it can happen in Las Vegas. Their work encompasses an environment that has risks and discomforts of typical outdoor environments. They work in all types of weather and are on their feet for most of their 4-to-5 hour shift. All while watching out for the errant golf ball.

They must have the ability to become and maintain a 2-year

certification in CPR by the American Heart Association Standards and be ready, willing, and able to perform until assistance arrives. Also, First Aid certification is required.

So, the next time you think that golf is just a ride in the cart and a game of hitting a ball with a stick, think of all that goes on before a person even tees off the first hole. The Starter/Ranger position functions like a well-oiled machine and keeps the game of golf moving down the fairway for the enjoyment of all.





Smoke Alarm Update

The Good News ... and then

The good news is that COVID-19 vaccinations are happening. Almost 5,000 in the last two weeks in Sun City. And the Governor will be easing some restrictions soon. Cases and hospitalizations are down. Light at the end of the tunnel.

I mention COVID-19 because that continues to impact our smoke alarm installations in a big way.

- We stopped in mid-March with 4-6 weeks of installations yet to happen.
- We restarted in October for two weeks before COVID-19 shut us down again.
- The Governor's "pause" pushed us back to mid-February.

Our smoke alarm program is owned by Las Vegas Fire and Rescue. The same fire service people who do smoke alarms are the same people who are helping vaccinate Las Vegas. And COVID-19 vaccinations take priority over smoke alarms.

I spoke with Zach Collins, our fire service installer, today at the Desert Vista vaccination clinic. He says it will be "at least 60 days" before they can get back to smoke alarms. They will still have to come back to Sun City to deliver 2nd shots. The next few weeks they will be staffing a clinic on the under-served East Side of town. Then they'll have to go back to give those residents their second shot. (We take pride in that they've laid out those clinic procedures on what we've been doing here in Sun City. We are considered a model "Point of Distribution." A big 'thank you' to the resident

volunteers inside the clinic and those outside managing people as they enter and leave.)

To summarize:

- Smoke alarm installations will resume sometime after mid-April 2021.
- The first installations will be for those residents who have been waiting a year. That should take about a month.
- Sometime after mid-May we will start doing people who applied in October of last year. We will have about 2 months of work to finish these people.
- At some point this summer we will re-open the application process.

We appreciate everyone's patience. Short of more waiting we can offer two other choices.

- We can refund your money. But that puts you at the back of the line, waiting to reapply.
- We can deliver the smoke alarms needed for your home and you can work with a handyman to have them installed. Please note that labor costs for our program are zero. We work with volunteers, and fire service personnel are paid by the fire department. We cannot cut you a check for your labor costs.

The fire chief has assured Mitzi Mills, Sun City's Executive Director, that smoke alarm installation is his highest priority after COVID-19 vaccinations. This program will continue.





hen asked as a child, "what do want to be when you grow up?" Sun City Summerlin resident Susanne Rowe would reply, "a paleontologist." She dreamed of searching the desert for dinosaur bones. Today, Susanne works in a related field and loves her job. She is presently an archaeologist.

A Master's Degree in Anthropology, specializing in Archaeology from the University of Nevada, Las Vegas, led Susanne to work more than twelve years for the Bureau of Land Management. Susanne was the District Archaeologist in Southern Nevada for seven years before moving to Arizona as the Bureau's Deputy Preservation Officer (also known as State Lead Archaeologist).







In 2014, Susanne retired from the Bureau, and it was at that time she moved to Sun City Summerlin to become a loving caretaker for her father, Alfred Rowe. Many here may remember Alfred as one of our World War II veterans honored in the Link magazine and it's 75th Anniversary D-Day Invasion publication, written by Bob Cohen (former Link columnist). Sadly, Alfred passed away in 2020.

With the move to Sun City, Susanne was now back in her "beloved Mojave Desert"—her words. During her time working in the Mojave, Susanne has conducted inventories at Nellis Air Force Base where she once worked in a fenced compound posted "The Use of Deadly Force Permitted." She also conducted inventories out on the remote Nevada Test and Training Range near enough to permit lunch at the Little A'Le'Inn

located in Rachel, NV. We all know that means in, or very near the mysterious Area 51. As a "compliance" archeologist, she works to ensure that areas for proposed development are inventoried for cultural resources, such as rock shelters, campsites, trails, early mining sites, historic and prehistoric artifacts.

It is interesting to note that, on the way to her dream job, Susanne had many incarnations. She began her studies at the University of California Davis, as an Animal Science major with the focus on pre-veterinarian studies. A field trip to a slaughterhouse ended that particular career goal very quickly. She earned her bachelor's degree in Geography. However, the many science classes she had taken while an Animal Science major helped her land an early job as a Pharmacy Technician at Methodist Hospital in Sacramento.

Next, she was a graphic artist working for newspapers and magazines in California, Washington, and Nevada. She designed ads for The Sacramento Bee and The Las Vegas Review-Journal. Susanne was also a copywriter for an adagency, writing news releases, advertising copy, marketing brochures, and magazine articles.

Working with paleontologists at what is now Tule Springs Fossil Beds National Monument, Susanne decided that though her earliest wish was to become a paleontologist, she was and is happy she is an archaeologist. Though fossils are interesting, Susanne would rather

study the survival skills of early humans in our harsh desert setting. Two finds of which she is particularly thrilled are, a prehistoric pottery fragment that has a perfect fingerprint fired into the clay and an ox shoe having fallen from an ox sometime between 1860 and 1925. The ox shoe was found just north of what is now the Las Vegas Motor

Speedway.

In the future, Susanne hopes to share her experiences with fellow Sun Citians in a lecture series. May the "new normal" after COVID-19 afford Susanne the opportunity to do so.

WILLIAM BESTO: NAVY

ill recalled that when he was 17 years old, he drove fast cars and racked up 13 tickets in Tacoma, Washington. Not liking the college scene, he quit in 1969 and tried to join the Navy, however, due to his driving record he was not accepted until the recruiter realized he didn't make his monthly quota.

In January 1970, Bill left for Boot Camp. "The yelling started as soon as I got off the bus, everything was a 'hurry up and wait hell' and that continued throughout," Bill said. "They were breaking us down as individuals and getting us to do things the Navy way."

After Boot Camp Bill was assigned to Bainbridge Maryland Training Center's Class A Yeoman School. "Everyone called me lucky saying, east coast schooling meant I would be sailing the Mediterranean. Lucky? Out of my class of 40, I was the only one transferred back to the Pacific." Bill's first sea assignment was on the destroyer USS Dennis J. Buckley, which sailed off to the coast of Vietnam rescuing pilots and firing on gunships that fired back. "A Yeoman is the Navy's "Radar O'Reilly," but a destroyer is a small ship, and we had many jobs to do," said Bill. "One of mine included being on front-deck duty when we were anchored in the Mekong Delta. Although I didn't know it at the time, I was repeatedly exposed to Agent Orange while standing on that deck."

Bill returned to San Diego in July 1971 and was soon transferred to the USS Gurke, which sailed to the Philippines, Thailand, Hong Kong, Japan, and Vietnam, where he participated in two major battles. "One night when I was sleeping, I was jolted awake. A shell pierced the bulkhead two inches above my ear. If my head was on a thicker pillow I wouldn't be here."

"When we were in port, I partied good," Bill recalled. "Once, I met up with some old buddies from the Buckley and I partied so good, that I missed my morning flight to Subic Bay for TAD on the destroyer USS Lang. By the time I got there, it already set sail. For the next two weeks, my only assignment was to take muster, but then the carrier USS Kitty Hawk ferried me to Danang for another Vietnam duty tour."

The USS Gurke was also a station ship in Hong Kong. Station ships carried out all of the official communications for the United States Embassy. "Radio operators were the only sailors on regular duty, and I got a lot of liberty. My buddy

introduced me to a young lady, and long story short, in October 1973, my Captain gave me a wedding present, a helo ride to a ship headed to Hong Kong, and I married the most beautiful woman." "We're still married and have two lovely daughters," Bill said.

Bill was Honorably Discharged with numerous medals in January 1974. "I used the "G.I. Bill" to go to school and became a computer programmer on old, oversized IBM machines, the kind that used punch cards, vacuum tubes and were the size of a building," Bill said. "Computers were modernized, and I repeatedly changed jobs and eventually became an Information Systems Manager for the Tacoma Police Department in 1988, but by 1995 I was burned out."

Bill went on to help his parents build a mini market/gas station that he and his wife ran until his health deteriorated. "We sold it in February 2015 and moved to Sun City that May."

"The VA determined that my Agent Orange exposure contributed to my health problems, and I was also told to see a psychia-

trist. I distrusted her at first but after gaining confidence and learning to be honest with myself I was diagnosed with PTSD. The report the psychiatrist wrote about me was eye-opening," said Bill. "It explained why I constantly changed jobs, repeatedly moved, and why I would get frustrated and mad all the time. After starting treatment my wife said she noticed a big change in me. She was an angel to put up with me all those years. My recovery was not quick, nor was easy, and it wasn't until 2019 that I started feeling good about myself."

After moving to Sun City, Bill became involved with the Las Vegas Chapter of the Vietnam Veterans of America and is now on the Board of Directors. "Our chapter has 225 members who meet and support each other. We have a store that sells Vietnam era shirts, hats and other memorials and we raise money to donate wheelchairs and other equipment to Vietnam Vets in need," Bill added.
