

You might be surprised to learn that they all believed we have a great community that needs little work to keep it looking good, and financially sound. After the interviews they commented about the board's obvious willingness to work together, and actual fondness for each other. They were well aware that other places did not run that way. We are lucky to have talented people who volunteer their time, and work together like: the Judge, Dick Gluch, Ellen, Barbara, Caroccia, Akers and Karl. The

last week's efforts made me want to point out some of our really good assets.

Our 5 pools are great—open from April to October. Softball is now "state of the art." If you love train sets, glass-working, modeling, jewelry, carpentry, almost anything, it is here — and in a quality building and room. I know you are tired of hearing about our great golf courses, but we have three — one voted best of Las Vegas.

We have some very good restaurants. I eat at the Tavern at the Falls five times a week for breakfast. The service by Robina and Chefs like Daryl, and Denis, is really great. The hamburgers are huge and juicy - the Hawaiian burger is my favorite. Our new Food and Beverage Manager, Rick, is improving everywhere he can. Feedback on his performance is a real positive. Yes, I helped hire him. One of the candidates came in late and was served very politely and got some good chicken wings after 10 p.m. at Five Star. We also have in Sun City a Mexican Restaurant that has been around before I got to Las Vegas in 1981 – The El Burrito. The place started in the oldest building in Las Vegas on Fremont Street. I ate there once a week. Now I eat here once a month. They have the same great soup they were famous for on Fremont Street. I liked the Greek place, but it just closed. It has been replaced by an Italian restaurant that I just visited – My Mother's House. My Italian wife thought it reminded her of the sauces her mother made. It is old time New York style and it is great. Chef Mike and Chef Laura are old school nice and treat you like family. I weigh over 225 pounds and could not finish the "Fruti De Mari." Real prawns about 7 inches long, snow crab, and clams to die for. This place has to make it. It was packed Saturday night.

Some people like to complain a lot, but we really have a great place to live. Frequent our establishments, our pools, and all our amenities. We moved here for a reason - it's really great here!

Alcoholic Beverages

At the September 5 SCSCAI Board of Directors meeting, Barbara Holden, CCOC chairwoman and a member of the Board of Directors, proposed official language regarding alcoholic beverage serving, purchasing and consuming, which stated that, "All alcoholic beverages served at a Sun City Chartered Club or Community Organization event or in any SCSCAI common building must be purchased from and served by Sun City Summerlin personnel licensed by the State of Nevada to do so. No alcoholic beverages may be provided by residents of guests for consumption in any common area properties of Sun City, nor is the Association responsible for beverage consumption."

This proposal was tabled by the Board of Directors pending further information gathering by the Community Services Office, the CCOC chairwoman and member of the Board of Directors. Presumably, this issue will be reintroduced at the October 3 meeting of the Board.

Friends of The Summit

The Friends of The Summit will present any changes to its initial charter constitution and purpose of the club to the Community Services Office

for discussion and approval. Once that is accomplished, the constitution will be presented to the Friends of The Summit membership for approval.

Men's Softball

Softball President Jim Herhusky proposed a change in the Club's field use hours, incorporating taking the field at 7:30 a.m. instead of 7 a.m. The CCOC board approved the change in schedule. Jim also mentioned plans for the September 29 grand opening of the new field.

Zoom Zoom Club and Dance Connection

The president of the Zoom Zoom Club, Teresa Gusel, proposed that the Dance Connection not be allowed to conduct Zumba®-type dance classes. Zoom Zoom Club representatives believe that any Zumba®-type classes should be the domain of the Zoom Zoom Club. Teresa cited competition and conflicts in scheduling rooms as concerns. After much discussion, Ellen Bachman, a CCOC Committee member, moved that both the Dance Connection and the Zoom Zoom Club be allowed to continue their Zumba®-type offerings as long as they are not scheduled at the same time or at the same facility. The motion was seconded and approved.





T'S GOING TO BE A GRAND OPENING CELEBRATION WORTHY OF THE AMERICAN PASTIME, AND ALL OF SUN CITY IS INVITED," SAID JOE O'CONNELL, BOD PRESIDENT AND FORMER SOFTBALL PLAYER. THE OCCASION, OF course, is the rededication of the Sun City softball field at the Pinnacle. There will be food, music, recognition of residents who were instrumental in establishing the original field, as well as the current upgrade and, of course, the ceremonial throwing of the first pitch.

Ken Caroccia, chairman of the Common Area Properties Committee and vice president of SCSCAl's Board of Directors, added, "The Board of Directors is committed to Sun City's Renaissance and to the residents who enjoy the active lifestyle we have here. We continue to work on upgrading golf, the newly remodeled Pickleball courts are fantastic and now we've turned our attention to America's favorite sport. The new surface at the softball field, along with other improvements, will not only maximize the experience for the club, but for those who come out to watch the games and others who will use the field in the future."

At this point, some history is appropriate. The original field was developed in 1997 with some upgrades in 2005. Time has taken its toll on the field. The infield dirt has compacted and become a hazard, with many player injuries suffered.

"We have had black eyes, broken fingers, stitches, etc. due to the bad hops of the softballs, as well as falls caused by uneven and unreli-



able dirt areas," said Men's Softball Club member and co-project manager Jim Weniger.

Additionally, before each game, the field required over an hour of preparation, which raised large clouds of dust. As co-project manager Fred Baniecki put it, "That didn't make us too popular with the nearby walkers."

The idea for the new artificial turf infield actually surfaced in 2010. There was an article in the Sun City West (Phoenix) journal describing upcoming renovations to its field to include artificial turf. The project remained dormant until last year, when Fred and Jim decided the time had come to address the problem. The two presented the problem and some proposed solutions to the Softball Club, focusing on the safety concerns. With enthusiastic approval, they took the plan to Ken Caroccia and CAP. Committee approval led to putting the project on the BOD agenda and the subsequent thumb's up. Bids were obtained by the Association and the contract was awarded to CG&B Construction to replace the infield with turf (complete with permanent foul lines). Other improvements, accomplished in-house, included expanded dugouts, new benches and water fountains.

During the construction phase of the project, a number of opportunities arose to reduce costs. Early on, Jim and Fred applied to the Southern Nevada Water Authority for a water conservation grant to

replace the grass. That resulted in a check for \$8,000 to the Association. Additionally, another \$2,000 was saved when our Landscape Department took the dirt that had to be removed for the turf installation and used it on our golf courses.

While CAP approved an estimate of \$169,000, the final project cost will be closer to \$148,000.

"Our club members greatly appreciate Sun City's investment in this valuable facility," said Men's Softball Club President Jim Herhusky. "We now have the finest softball field in Las Vegas, and it represents its leadership's commitment to making Sun City Summerlin a preferred retirement community in the Southwest."

Department Welcomes 'Walktober' With a 5K Event

f you are looking to start or change your exercise program, a walking program is a great option. Walking for exercise is free and requires no extra equipment, just a safe, sturdy pair of shoes, the world around you and a few minutes of your time. Walking is aerobic exercise, or exercise that uses oxygen for fuel. This type of activity is considered an endurance activity, meaning it strengthens the heart and lungs, and builds overall physical stamina. Walking can be adapted to a much broader range of intensities than some other forms of aerobic activity, making it an ideal choice for everyone of any ability level, including persons who need to exercise but have to work with medical issues like high blood pressure or peripheral artery disease (PAD). It is also weightbearing for the major bones and joints of the legs and spine, and so helps prevent osteoporosis.

A brisk, 30 minute walk for a 130-pound person burns 60 to 70 calories, all while reducing stress and improving mood.

Always check with your doctor before starting or changing your exercise program. Once cleared to go ahead, build a walking program that includes short (5 minutes or so), slower-paced warm up and cool down phases at the beginning and end of your walk.

The warm up doesn't really have anything to do with temperature. It has to do with helping your heart and blood vessels prepare for the increased demands of the activity. Similarly, the cool down may not end up with you feeling cool, but it helps your heart rate return to baseline levels safely and your blood vessels adapt gently to keep your circulation humming along as it should.

When planning the main part of the walk, consider things like the terrain – are there inclines, declines, hard or soft ground, rocks or loose soil present along the way? Don't forget that however far you go, you'll have to come back. If you plan to incorporate treadmill use into the program as an option for inclement weather, remember that walking on a treadmill is different than walking on the ground, and not always easier. One is not better than the other, and there are pros and cons to each.

Important components of a safe, effective walking exercise program are stretching and strengthening exercises, which can be done before and after your walk as part of your warm-up and cool-down phases. Stretching helps keep your joints moving in their full available range of motion and helps your posture, which is key for maintaining your balance. It is important to add strengthening exercises, such as sit-to-stands, to your walking program to keep your thigh and hip muscles strong. Walking itself addresses the muscular endurance rather than the strength of your legs.

Using the Chest Press Machine

sing the chest press machine is a great way to strengthen your chest, triceps and front of your shoulders. These muscles are used all day long for reaching over your head as you do when you comb your hair or put your dishes away. These same muscles are used to help with pushing up and off of a chair and pushing yourself away from the dinner table when you have eaten enough.

I often see residents using the chest press machines incorrectly. Here are a few tips to help you get more out of your workout, using the machine correctly:

DO

- Use the foot assist at Mountain Shadows to push the handle bars forward before you begin the exercise.
- Use the range-of-motion setting at Desert


Vista so your shoulders line up with elbows before you push out.

- Adjust the seat so that the handles are at mid-chest level.
- Stay seated! Keep your butt on the seat to focus on the upper-body muscles.
- Keep your shoulders relaxed and down, avoid hyper-flexing.

All of our fitness equipment have instructions on the machine explaining how to use them. Be sure to read them even if you have been working out for a while and think you know how to do it. We also have five Equipment Orientation classes every week (see below for locations, dates and times). If you are not able to make the times available, please call the Fitness Office to set up an orientation with one of our fitness specialists.

Preparedness Committee (NW/CPC) is organized to help residents focus on crime prevention and to be better prepared to survive a disastrous incident if such an event were to affect

Sun City. Community Preparedness Committee members are your neighbors; they are knowledgeable volunteers who have learned to provide potentially life-saving advice if a worst-case scenario becomes a reality.

Neighborhood Watch/ Community Preparedness Committee members strive to develop educational and hands-on training procedures that teach Sun City residents what to do in

situations that might range from an extended power outage to dealing with the consequences of a major earthquake. Radio operators have a crisis communications system in place and the committee has mobile generators ready for use in an emergency evacuation center. Security and safety preparation issues also are addressed in NW/CPC's emergency response plans.

NW/CPC volunteers have diverse business,

professional and educational backgrounds, and they endorse the neighbors helping neighbors' concept. They are eager to serve where they can be helpful. In a disaster, their goal is to have a community that can be self-sufficient for a minimum of 72 hours, or until professional emergency responders are able to resume their responsibilities. Ideally, the committee hopes that residents will be able to shelter in place — in their own

homes, where committee volunteers will keep them aware of what is happening and what they should do until the emergency situation is stabilized.

HOW SUN CITY WORKS

Much of the success of Sun City Summerlin can be attributed to the level of volunteer activity. iIt is common knowledge that virtually all parts of the community's professional staff is supported by resident volunteers. That support ranges from architectural review to the Link magazine. In addition, there are volunteers in Security Patrol and Neighborhood Watch who provide additional services.

Among the more than 350 resident volunteers who perform these roles, collectively, they contribute some 516,350 hours each year! The direct economic benefit (money saved by the Association by not having to hire additional staff) amounts to over \$1 million each year, and that is conservatively estimated. Phrased differently, the economic benefit of these volunteers is about 8 percent of our annual Association budget. And those numbers do not take into account the amount saved by smarter buys in areas such as IT and insurance because of the expertise of those committee members.

There are some 12,500 people living in Sun City Summerlin. Just 3 percent are having a significant impact. Perhaps it is time the other 97 percent stepped up to the plate. Perhaps it is time for you to volunteer.



Ford Fusion **Hybrids Join** the Fleet

istory has claimed the days of the clutch, brake, shift, lurch automobiles. Gone, too, are the gas-guzzling, oil-changing and under-the-hood maintenance costs to the Association. In September, Security Patrol added two Ford Fusion hybrids with pushbutton starts to established fleet.

Security drivers patrol 343 colorfully named streets in Sun City Summerlin 24/7. All that

mileage takes a toll on

both the vehicles and fuel budget. The Ford Fusion gets 40 miles per

gallon. Hybrid vehicles entered the security

fleet in 2008. Hybrids cut fuel consumption and, with less carbon dioxide emissions, have a beneficial effect on the environment. Security Patrol's hybrid cars use two engines - an electric motor and a conventional gasoline engine. The electric engine powers the car at lower speeds. This allows drivers to patrol between 10 and 15 miles an hour, enabling them to look right and left, alert for emergency situations and open garage doors

during the evening shifts. The gasoline engine powers the car at higher speeds needed for an immediate response to a 911 light or concern for a resident. When driving on Del Webb and Sun City boulevards, security vehicles may cruise at 30 mph to keep up with traffic. Each time the brakes are applied at stop signs, the battery recharges a little.

The search for new hybrids began about a year ago. A committee of Security Patrol drivers did the research and the Security Patrol Board approved the switchover from Toyota (Prius) to Ford (Fusion). The Association purchased the 2018 vehicles for the price of the 2017 model.

So, when you see a Patrol car driving on the cocktail-named streets like Bourbon Run, Rum River, Gin Hill or Scotch Lake, wave to the driver. Same for the charming street names Red Dawn Sky, Ruby Hills, Leaf Gold, Blue Bell and Evening Star – flash a smile to the Security Patrol driver. They are your neighbors. Better still, think about joining Security Patrol. You can drive our new hybrids - maybe during your training.

To Jump or Not to Jump - What's the Question?



It takes a certain personality to be a paratrooper. Perhaps it is a feeling of immortality, so common among the young. Perhaps it is a love of adventure. Perhaps it's just being a dumb kid who never learns.

Take recent Sun City resident Dick Wilson, for example. He had a number of near-death experiences while growing up in the San Diego area. A few of those were the result of reckless driving on his motorcycle like the time he hit a soft patch and was thrown from the bike into a cactus patch. A painful experience but not as bad as the accident two weeks later when he rammed a car at some 40 mph. Those injuries took a year to heal. But perhaps the worst escapades were the solo abalone diving trips. On one dive, he was so tangled in seaweed that he nearly drowned. On another, a great white shark checked him out.

"Actually, I was the dumbest skin diver in San Diego," he said. "I would go diving by myself without telling anyone where I was going. If you get into trouble, there is no one to help you or even know where you are."

At 15, Dick lied to join the National Guard.

"It was during my two-week annual training in San Luis Obispo, Calif., that the Korean War broke out. Every unit in town was called up but mine. I was going to volunteer for active duty, but a motorcycle accident delayed that," Dick recalled. "When I healed, I started to enlist in the Marines, but I saw a poster that said 'Join the paratroopers and wear the badge of courage,' That did it. I enlisted in the Army and volunteered for jump school."

A potentially fatal incident occurred on his third jump. As he neared the ground, another paratrooper landed on his parachute collapsing it.

On a jump while stationed in Japan, his shoulder hit the side of the door and he went out backwards and found himself pinned to the fuselage by the prop

"I thought to myself, I can't stay here, so I pushed off. My chute opened but the risers twisted, putting me in a spin. Just as I finished unwinding, I looked over and saw that I was entwined with another jumper. I swung close enough to him to grab his suspension lines and started to climb down to him. I wasn't able to get low enough to ensure that our chutes wouldn't collapse. We managed to land OK, but there was a moment there when I wasn't so sure."

In Japan, Dick was assigned to the 187 Regimental Combat Team, a part of the 11th Airborne Division, the Rakkasans. The 187th was the only airborne unit to make a combat jump during the Korean War, but Dick wasn't part of the unit at that time. Between jump school and assignment to the 187th, Dick was assigned to the 612 Heavy Drop Regiment (experimental) and made the first historic air drop of all the heavy equipment required to build an airstrip, a technique that was critical in the Korean War because of the terrain and the lack of good roads.

In 1954, the 187th was put on alert for a drop into Dien Bein Phu to aid embattled French troops, but a disagreement over command authority with the French cancelled the mission at the last minute.

In 1955, his hitch complete, Dick left the Army.
